

Stewart pleads to federal charges

An Orlando man has pled guilty to a charge of possession with intent obsistsbute a guantity of Tylox octataining oxycodone; a Schedule II controlled substance.

Elmer Boyd Stewart, 43, entered the plea bifore Judge Karán X. Caldwell in United States District Court, London, pursuant to a rpléa agreement which also included the forfeiture of Stewart's assets including \$43,353 in United States currency.

Stewart is scheduled to be sentenced on July 21, 2004 in United
States District Court in London. The

States District Court in London. The maximum potential penalties for Stewart are not less than 15 years, a \$2,000,000 fine and not less than 16 years, as \$2,000,000 fine and not less than four years supervised release.

The investigation preceding the plee was conducted by the Drug Enforcement Administration, Rockeastle Shreiff Darrell Doan's office and the Kentucky State Police Post 11, London. The United States was represented in this case by Assistant United States Attorney Roger W. West.


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




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



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


