Do you like to keep your tan all winter, or get an early start on summers by going to tanning booths or using other tanning.

Another had effect is that the tant that results from tanning booths does not protect like a real tan does. It is only about half as effective as the same degree of tan from the sun. Having this less protective tan allows a person to sunbum more easily than he expects when he gets out in the sun, And sulmums are more than an annoyance—they greatly increase the chance of developing skin cancers, including melanomas. Melanomas are the deadly form of skin cancer that grow rapidly and spread easily.


