

Sixty-one suits filed to collect delinquent taxes

Delinqueni por-beware! In a year when budget cuts are lin a year when budget cuts are slicing through important govern-ment services, the payment of prop-erty taxes is more important than ever, according to Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds, whose of-fice handles delinquent property tax collection.

Altorney Billy recynous, wone or the handles delinquent property tax collection.

So, Reynolds is presently-filing suits in an attempt to collect delinquent property taxes that are still owed for 2003 and preceding years. Since March 4h, 61 suits have been filed im District Court thus far and 19 are pending. Reynolds said 3349,000 in delinquent taxes are owned the county for just the last four control of the still st

erty taxés each year. Last year, former county attorney Jeff Burdette's office collected over \$89,000 on behalf of Rockcastle County. Since 1999. Burdette col-lected over \$380,000 in delinquent taxes. Remaining delinquent taxes

Reynolds said there is some confusion about the process of collecting delinquent property taxes. "Many people believe we are just waiting for someone to slip up, so we can fortune, we try to avoid foreclosure action. This method is one of last re-

To collect delinquent taxes, Reynolds said his office sends several written notices to those who have

neglected to pay.

If these attempts to 'collect fail, then a lawsuit to bring a foreclosure action is begun. There is a lien on the property until the tax bill is paid, or the property is sold to pay the delin-quent tax bill(s).

Reynolds said the majority of the time this can be avoided and he and his staff work with the taxpayer to get the taxes paid. He emphasized the importance and the serious responsibility to see that taxes are paid. "There is not a single person in Rockeastle County who does not benefit in some way by county government services, whether it is strong hattending our publie schools, driving on our roads or receiving indical care at our local health department," Reynolds said.
