How Much Exercise is Best?

How Much Exercise is Best?

Presented by Dr. Kimberly Cornelius

When a person begins exercising to improve his fitness, he has a desire to keep doing more and more to become fitter and fitter. Unfortunately, there is a limit to how fist and how far you can go.

The amount of exercise that is best, is determined by the goals you wish to achieve. For many people, the goal is to become "fit" so they feel better, stay slim, and reduce the risk of heart disease.

This cardiovascular fitness (the ability of the heart and lungs to deliver blood and oxygen to the tody) is measured by the heart rate and how quickly it returns to normal after exercise.

Right after exercise, your pulse may be 130 beats per minute. If you are fit, it ofreps 30 beats in the first minute, in this case to 100 beats per minute.

This first six pool fraining, going from normal fitness to moderate fitness, will give the greatest return for your efforts. For each additional increase in training, you will get a proportionarely smaller gain fitness.

These additional increase in training are more for improving com-

fitness.

These additional increments of training are more for improving competitiveness than fitness, and as greater and greater demands are placed on the muscles and joints, more injuries from overtraining occur. These injuries not only keep a person from training, but 48s on may do greater harm by the discouragement they cause.

The amount of exercise that is best for you should be a level that is safe, realistic and, most importantly, enjoyable.

Volunteers needed to assist local children placed in foster care

The Rockcastle County Citizen Foster Care Review Board (CFCRB) is seeking volunteers to make a difference in the lives of local foster children. Volunteers are needed to review cases of children placed in foster care because of abuse, dependency and neglect to ensure these children are placed in safe, permanent homes as quickly as possible. The Kentucky General Assembly created the Citizen Foster Care Review Board in 1982 as a way to decrease the time children spend in foster care. CFCRB volunteers review Cabinet for Health & Family Services files on children placed in out-of-home care and work with the cabinet and the courts on behalf of the state foster children.

All volunteers must complete an eight-hour initial training session and consient to a criminal record and central registry check. A recommendation is then made to the chief judge

of the District Court or Family Court

of the District Court or Family Court for appointment.
