Deer are many excellent medicines for lowering
the blood pressure and they should be used when necstays. J. But many people can avoid the cost and possible side effects of these medicines by lowering the
blood pressure through exercise.
How does exercise lower the blood pressure? The
exact mechanisms are not known, but there appears
to be a variety of reasons for the improved-blood pressure.

As the heart becomes more fit it beats at a slower rate and the blood

vessels appear to relax slightly causing less resistance to the blood flow Exercise also makes the blood more slippery--it flows through narrow

ixercise also makes the blood more slippery-it flows through natrow-resels more easily.

Many people will make changes in their diets when they begin to extr-ise. They may eat less salt, cosume less alcohol, and very likely de-rease or quit smoking. Most people who exercise also lose weight. It may be only a few pounds or many pounds, but any weight loss has a good effect on the blood pressure.

Another reasons in the relaxation that exercise brings many people, A-person has less anxiety and less adrenaline-like hormones in the system. The reasons may be complex but the results are good and can be a-complished by exercising 20 minutes three times a week.
