Counterfeit bills being circulated

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department is issuing a warning to all business owners in Rockcastle County.

Over the past several weeks, several counterfeit bills have been passed at local businesses.

Most of the bills are \$20 counterfeits. Sheriff Darrell Doan said on Wednesday the bills are low quality, but are obviously passable.

All three local banks have volunteered to check any bill that someone may think is counterfeit. Also, you can have the bill examined by the Sheriff's office.

If anyone has any information regarding this investigation, they should contact the Sheriff's Department at 606-256-2032.

Brodhead agrees to contract

In a special session of the Brodhead City Council, it has become official that the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department will contract with the city of Brodhead for a full-time deputy to patrol the city of Brodhead.

Chief Deputy Nathaniel Price said there would always be a deputy in the area, and especially on third shift, seven days a week.

The agreement was placed on the minutes of Monday's meeting and the written contract will be finalized at the end of the week.

The city will pay the Sheriff's Department \$34,000 a year for their help.

Earlier this year it was learned that veteran Brodhead Police Chief Joe Buswell was not certified and could no longer work for the city.

Processed "pot" also taken Marijunana plants found at Cove Branch

A raid on Cove Branch Road last week, at the residence of Steve Miller, resulted in the seizure of a very large amount of processed marijunana and the destruction of a large number of marijunana plants which were growing on the property, according to a news release.

Police say they found 1,222 marijunana plants and 60 grams of processed marijunana.

They also seized an ATV, several firearms and items used in indoor marijunana cultivation.

674 of the marijunana plants were found in a utility trailer.

The bust was the result of information received on the Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment and Education (UNITE) tip line.

Officers from that department, along with assistance from the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department and U.S. Forestry Service, conducted the raid.

The case will be presented to the United States Grand Jury for prosecution.

U.S. Congressman Harold Rogers of Somerset has included \$16 million in the federal budget for UNITE over the past two years.

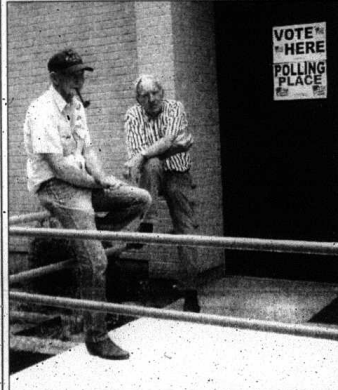
Health Fair next Tuesday

The Center is located on U.S. 25S next to Lumber King.

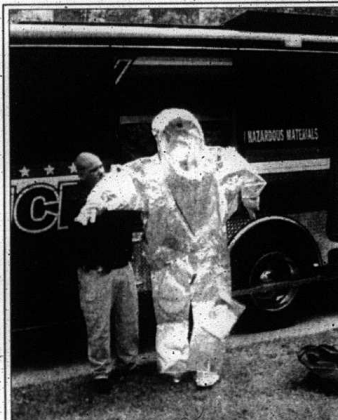

Also on Friday night, starting at 6 p.m., the bluegrass band Just In Time will be performing.

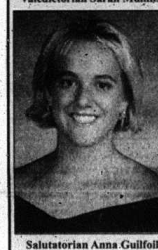

Commencement exercises for the thirty-second graduating class of Rockcastle County High School will be held on Friday evening.

The ceremonies will begin at 6 p.m. and it will be the first time that an outside speaker will not deliver a commencement message to the graduates in the 32 year history of the school.

RCHS principal John Hale said the graduates decided they did not want a speaker and because graduation is a day for them to be honored, their wishes were granted.

Class Valdictorian Sarah Mullins and Salutatorian Anna Gulliford and class President Allison Anderkin will all speak.

Devon Buswell will deliver a tribute to class members Ben McKibben and Chris Tolle who were killed in a car accident and Maggie Phillips will give the opening remarks. Lauren Clontz will give closing remarks.

Heather Adams will sing and the RCHS Band will perform.

Principal Hale will present Special Recognition and School Superintendent Larry Hammond will have congratulatory remarks for the class.

School board chairman Terry Burton will present diplomas.

Of the 176 graduates in the class of 2004, 15 graduates had a 4.0 grade point average or higher at RCHS.

Only eight percent go to polls

Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Houk says it is probably the lowest turnout ever for a primary election.

Only 968 voters went to the polls in Rockcastle on Tuesday, which computes to an eight percent turnout. There are 11,692 people registered to vote in Rockcastle County.

Republican Barry Metcalf, a former state legislator, faced off with incumbent northern-Kentucky U.S. Senator Jim Bunning and the outcome was what every observer had expected.

Metcalf lost by a wide margin and Bunning will now face Eastern Kentucky State Legislator, Democrat Daniel Mongiardo in the fall election.

Bunning defeated Metcalf 476 votes to Metcalf's 186 in Rockcastle County. Bunning carried all 14 precincts in Rockcastle county.

Mongiardo defeated David L. Williams by 90 votes on the Democrat side of the ballot.

The Democrats candidate for President, U.S. Senator John Kerry carried the county with 137 votes. His closest challenger was former U.S. Four Star General Wesley Clark, who received eleven votes.

Longtime incumbent 5th District U.S. Representative Harold Rogers of Somerset got more votes than anyone in Rockcastle County with 648. Rogers defeated his opponent Billy Ray Wilson of London, who received only 42 votes.

"For the turnout, it was certainly an expensive election for the county," Houk commented.

The lowest gas price in Rockcastle County has been surveyed at 189.9 for a gallon of regular and some gasolines have even quit selling premium gas because of the prices. The highest surveyed gas price is 196.9, but local gas station owners say distributors tell them it should not increase over the summer. However, prices change on a daily basis.

Two charged in Meth case

Points East

I still have not planted beans but I have the seed. Dibs for Boscopus sweet corn. I gave up on Spring peas many weeks ago and I have better luck with them in the fall anyway. Besides that, Lowell and daughter Elaine Adams on their respective gardening plots there in Laurel County have way more than they can possibly use. We'll figure out a way to swap something for the half bushel of sugar snap I need.

In the meantime, I set out seven different kinds of bell peppers, two varieties of sweet banana, planted five different varieties of summer squash, seven different cucumbers, 12 cabbage plants of two varieties for kraut, two different eggplants, and 11 varieties of tomatoes. We may have a garden yet. On top of that I planted four flats (7 varieties) of tomatoes for a late crop and a bunch of bell peppers that should be ready for the garden come July 4.

When it stops raining enough to run the tiller, I'm gonna get serious about beans. But for whatever it's worth, Labor Day is about the latest date you can safely plant beans if you want them to be fresh for Thanksgiving. You have to cover them up with something to keep the frost off. Bottom line is that if you have not started gardening yet, right now is about the time to start anyway.

In other news, 13 year-old James Lane and I spent most of the day Sunday on White Lick and Paint Lick Creeks catching bait and many, many angry warmouth. Warmouth, for those of you who do not fish a lot, are a species of panfish that average less than a quarter pound each but they are almost solid, boneless meat. And they are mean. They will routinely tackle a hard crawdad or a chub minnow nearly as large as they are and swallow the bait whole.

On ultralight tackle, they are a force to be reckoned with. Fun to catch. And a delicacy in the frying

pan that will remind you of shrimp if you fillet them correctly. Actually they are way better than shrimp in my estimation, but they are a pain in the behind to clean.

Paint Lick and White Lick are full of them this year. It took us nearly an hour but James and I just filleted out about a hundred—two fillets each, each about two inches long and half an inch thick, rolled in corn meal and lemon pepper seasoning, slow fried in olive oil with a cup of sauteer and then let them brown when the wine fries off. To die for!!! Me and James went through two big skillets full and he took home a half gallon zip lock bag full for his Mom. I got the same amount left over for breakfast.

The best Warmouth hole in the state has to be right here in the middle of town in Paint Lick. The hole of water is maybe long as a football field and less than half as wide. It's full of large mouth, Kentucky and small mouth bass just barely in the keeper range but you rarely catch a game fish. Too many crawdads and minnows occur naturally. But warmouth by the thousands and I suspect the larger fish feed off them. Suffice to say that the game fish are gonna be hungry if James and I keep hanging out there.

Like I said before, we just had supper an the afore was too good to describe.

This same hole of water, incidentally was home to a beaver colony that was the talk of the town several years back until we got used to them and then it was not a big deal. Beaver have since taken over the creeks for miles around but their dams got washed out on Paint Lick this past Spring and most folks who had shrubbery growing along the creek and be not missing them at all.

I'm not sure whether or not it's good or bad news, but there are at

Risks of Sunburns

Sunburns are not just a nuisance of summer or rites of a fishing trip. They are very harmful to skin and can lead to skin cancers and other skin damage. Sunburns are directly linked to melanomas, the most serious form of skin cancer.

While most skin cancers are relatively benign and do not spread, melanomas are much more like cancers of other areas: they spread easily, they are very difficult to cure, and they kill people.

The incidence of melanomas is increasing rapidly—4% per year—and they are occurring at younger ages each decade. It is not uncommon to see these serious skin cancers in 30-year-olds, and they are being seen in people in their 20's and even teens.

It is not known exactly how sunburns predispose to melanomas, but it is clearly best to avoid sunburns. Each time you burn, it adds to the risk.

Sunscreen is very useful in protecting against the harmful ultraviolet rays which cause sunburns, skin damage and skin cancers. Sunburns and skin cancers are primarily caused by the lower portion of the UV band, called UV-B. The damage to collagen and elastic fibers in the skin is primarily caused by the higher portion of the UV band called UV-A. The first sunscreens that were sold only protected against UV-B and allowed the aging changes from UV-A to continue unabated.

Now, a person can get sunscreens which protect against a greater portion of the ultraviolet light—both UV-A and UV-B. You should be sure to use a sunscreen that protects against both. Look for avobenzone in the ingredients or ask your pharmacist for assistance in choosing from the many products available.

Give babies good start on lifelong learning

From their earliest days, newborn babies benefit from time, loving attention and reading by parents, grandparents and others. These precious gifts give children a good start toward lifelong learning.

Research results show a number of advantages from reading and listening to babies and toddlers. For example, respectful, affectionate touching while reading to little ones builds and strengthens brain cell connections. The first year of life is a prime time to learn language, the key to later reading success. About 90 percent of adult brain cell capacity takes place between birth and three years of age.

As a parent or grandparent, you are the young child's first and most important teacher. You are in charge of the child's learning. This is fun and exciting time for all of you.

Select age-appropriate books for your child. For birth through four months old, choose small, stiff cardboard books with brightly colored pictures. Four- to eight-month olds, who are putting everything in their mouths, need soft washable vinyl or cloth books.

Older babies and toddlers like stiff cardboard picture books they can carry around. Board books also are good for older toddlers and two-year-olds, who can learn to turn pages from left to right. They are able to understand simple stories with plots and enjoy repeating the words.

Listening and talking with your baby or toddler is the beginning of conversation and learning to take turns. By listening to each other, you and your baby teach each other. You learn about the child's wants, interests and needs, even if he or she can't speak words you understand. The baby teaches you by special sounds, movements, and expressions.

Young children learn language by direct contact with adults they love and trust. You are a much better teacher than the television. You can smile, speak, listen, read and sing with your child; the television cannot.

Watching too much television may be harmful to your child's brain development. Recent research suggests that children under age two years should not watch

television at all. The more time babies and preschoolers spend watching television, the greater their risk may be of developing attention problems.

Some programs, even cartoons, may contain violence that frightens older toddlers and preschoolers. Carefully select each television program, watch it with your child, and turn off the set if a program is unsuitable.

After your child has quit putting everything in his mouth, usually around one year old, give him lots of plain paper and large crayons for scribbling. Show him how to make marks on the paper, sit nearby and give him ample time to experiment. Gradually, the scribbling will change into repeated patterns of shape. Scribbling marks the beginning of expressing ideas on paper and writing later on in life.

Babies and toddlers need opportunities to use the five senses by actively playing and exploring their world. The mental symbols formed enable them to read, write and enjoy math and science later on. One way to be playful is to get down on the baby or child's level with a few play things and let him or her lead the activities. A baby or toddler learns best when having fun and loves to be in charge of playing. Smile, laugh and explain what the child is doing in simple terms.

You can use household items in play activities, the sure they are clean and don't have sharp edges. Plastic items such as cooking spoons, measuring cups and spoons, funnels and bowls make good mouthing, nesting, stacking, stirring and pouring toys. It's great fun to use these items in water play. Simply put a plastic wash tub on the floor, with a thick towel or rug beneath it and fill it one-third full of warm water, add the utensils, and enjoy playing with your child.

Establishing routines when caring for a child promotes respect, bonding and learning, especially when you involve him or her in the activity.

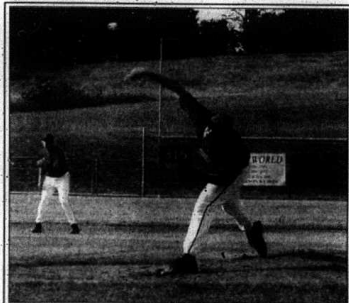

Domestic Violence a Family Tradition?

Usually when we think of a family tradition we think of holiday gatherings, naming a first child after the father or grandfather to carry on the family name, religious ceremonies, or going to a certain college, etc. but rarely do we think of domestic violence as a family tradition. For many of our victims, violence is passed on from father to son, mother to daughter. What this means is if you are a male child and you see your father either beat, degrade, rule or control your mother's every move, you grow up thinking that this is the way interaction between men and women is supposed to be.

If you are a girl you may grow up thinking you are "supposed" to be submissive to your husband no matter what he may do to you, even when it comes to physical abuse because that is what you have seen your mother do.

Statistics show that children who grow up in a household where domestic violence is prevalent are more likely to either be a victim of domestic violence or be a batterer. So the tradition continues.

One of the ways that we can break the "tradition" is through education. We can start in our schools, letting our young boys know that violence is wrong, even though they may have witnessed their fathers or even grandfathers using violence. Showing them that loving someone is not controlling them by lowering their self-esteem, isolating them from friends or family, or even beating them. Also by educating our young girls about the signs of a violent relationship. Teaching them that your partner does not have the right to hit you, call you names, or change you in any way (such as the clothes you wear or the color of your hair).

Education is the most powerful tool we have in the fight against domestic violence, and domestic violence is one "tradition" that needs to be broken.

Burley tobacco harvested during the 2004 calendar year and sold prior to the end of the 2003 marketing year (Sept. 30, 2004) against the 2004 marketing quota for the farm. Producers that acted on previously disseminated information to be eligible under equitable relief may file the marketing of 2004 harvested tobacco on the farm's 2003 marketing card.

Producers who wish to market on the farm's 2003 marketing card must:

*Request equitable relief from FSA-321 by July 15, 2004.

*Provide a written statement that states, based on previous misleading information, you believed you could plant a burley tobacco crop in 2004 and market a portion of that crop before Oct. 1, 2004 in order to recover lost 2003 undermarkings.

*Provide evidence that shows you adjusted your tobacco plantings for 2004 or took other action based on previous misleading information to grow and market a portion of the 2004 tobacco crop before Oct. 1, 2004 in order to recover lost 2003 undermarkings.

*By July 15, 2004 file FSA-578, Acreage Report, and indicated the tobacco fields that will be harvested and marketed before Oct. 1, 2004.

*Designate the location where the

tobacco will be marketed by filing a manual FSA-808, Designation of Burley Tobacco Sales and Request for Marketing Cards.

By Oct. 15, 2004 producers must return 2003 marketing card, provide proof of tobacco grade by USDA/AMS by submitting Form TB-85, Inspection and Classification Certificate and provide copy of sale bills. Burley tobacco harvested during the 2004 calendar year to recover lost 2003 under-markings MUST be verified by FSA by an on site farm visit.

Failure to meet any of these conditions will result in applying the sales to the 2004 marketing card for the farm.

2004 Burley Tobacco Adjustments
Burley tobacco adjustments are reserve quota pounds for correcting and adjusting inequities in old farms with burley tobacco quota when the COC determines the quota is not equitable to the quota for similar farms in the county.

Farms receiving adjustments in any of the six previous years are ineligible for an adjustment unless approved by the State COC. Farms receiving a new quota for the current year are ineligible. The minimum shall not be less than 100 pounds

unless the county's total allotment from the reserve is less than 100 pounds. Rockcastle County is projected 1845 pounds for the 2004 crop year.

Kentucky Phase II

Since 2001, the Phase II Board has kept the same distribution plan for the Phase II monies. Part of that plan pays the Growing Farm and Grower/Tenant portion based upon the average of crop year 1998, 1999 and 2000 certified payment pounds. If a farm had available Grower/Tenant or Growing Farm payment pounds in any of those years and were not claimed, that farm would continue to not receive payment for those unclaimed pounds. The amnesty program provides a final opportunity for those Grower/Tenants and Growing Farms to be included on future payments.

Claim forms will be sent beginning May 15, 2004 to Farm Operators of farms that did not claim all available Grower/Tenant and Growing Farm Payment Pounds for Crop Years 1998, 1999, and 2000. The Farm Operator will receive a claim form for each year that there were unclaimed payment pounds.

The Farm Operator will need to obtain the signatures and contact information from those that are described as Grower/Tenant and Growing Farms. After the claim forms is returned and is certified, all those claiming payment pounds will be sent a letter indicating that they have been certified. They will then be included in the December 30, 2004 distribution.

2004 Burley Tobacco Reports

All farms with an effective quota greater than zero are required to file a crop report by July 15th even if no tobacco is planted in order to attain planted and considered planted credit history. Crop acreage reports filed after July 15th will be required to pay a late filing fee.

Mandatory crop acreage reporting

for burley tobacco began with the 2001 crop year.

Farms which will have tobacco planted on the farm must wait until all crops are planted before filing the crop report.

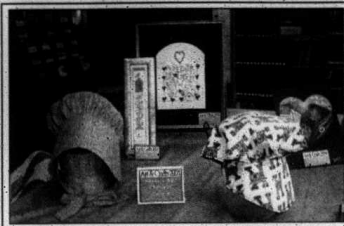

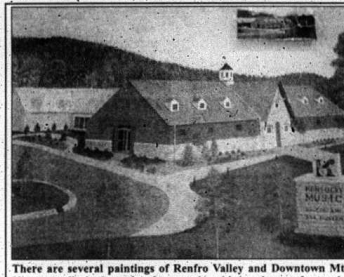

Camp Opens on Partial Basis Spring Turkey Hunt at Outreach for the Blind

In April of 2004, Christ's Outreach for the Blind sponsored a spring turkey hunt for the blind and physically disabled. This mini course was set up as an experiment to see how this program will run. George Montjoy, Assistant Supervisor of the Kentucky Hunter's Education under the Department of the Fish and Wildlife Resources, was on site April 13-14 to teach a hunter's education course to blind students under the age of 16. Nicholas Platt, 10 years old, and Andrew Essensmacher, 16, passed the hunter's safety course with flying colors. They received their hunter safety certificate and purchased their hunting licenses. Gates said, "How unbelievable it was to finally be able to open the doors. We have been dreaming about this for twelve years."

This year's starting line up... Wendell Frazier, a 32 year old, from London, KY who was blinded 4 years

ago in a hunting accident. This year Wendell bagged a 22 pound one. Andrew Essensmacher, 16, was able to experience his first turkey hunt ever. He also got his first tom. Andrew's dad, Al, was sure excited to be able to line his blind son. Andrew up on his first turkey. Andrew is from Algonac, Michigan.

Tom Benson, 54 years old, was blinded in a factory accident 6 years ago. He was sure thrilled to be able to participate in this hunt. Tom is from Morris, Illinois. Tom's guide, Tony Lloyd, was a missionary volunteer from Radford Baptist Church in Monetta, VA. Tony was an inspiration to Tom. Mr. Benson told Gates later that he believed that Tony was so good with a turkey call that he could have made the turkeys come out and "dance a jig" for them. They almost didn't get the shot because the turkey came from the total opposite direction than they expected - worst case scenario! Miraculously, they got the shot anyway.

Grant Neuhaus, Sr. from Fort Wayne, Indiana, was the last participant. Grant is a quadriplegic who was injured in a swimming accident at age 15. Grant started saving his money a year ago and praying that God would provide a place for him to turkey hunt. He wanted to be able

to share a hunting experience with his son like his dad had shared with him. Grant's son (Grant, Jr.) is blind in one eye. Grant found Christ's Outreach on-line and called Gates to find out how much it would cost. Gates told Grant that the cost was free! When Grant found out that he was coming to Christ's Outreach to hunt, he bought a video on how to call turkeys and a mouth piece and practiced for 4 hours a night for 4 months. Gates said, "Boy, that man can talk turkey!"

For the first three days of hunting season, Gates sat in a stand with Grant, Sr. During that time, Grant told Gates about his life. Every morning at 7:30 a.m., an aide arrives and gets him up, puts him in a wheelchair, gets him something to eat, then leaves for the day. At 7:30 p.m., an aide shows back up, gets him something to eat, and then gets him out of his wheelchair and cleaned up. Then the aide places him back in bed with the TV and VCR remotes. Grant is stuck there until the next morning.

On the fourth day of the hunt, Mike was tied up with volunteers from Radford Baptist Church and could not go with Grant, so Grant's dad, Harry, and Grant, Jr. set him up in a ground stand. They told Grant,

Sr. that if he got a shot at a turkey to wait until they came and not try to take his electric wheelchair across the field to retrieve the turkey.

At 7:30 a.m., Grant saw a huge coyote. By 9:30 a.m., Grant said that the woods came alive! He had turkeys all around. Grant got the shot and dropped the tom turkey. Grant's dad and son heard the gun go off even though they were a half mile apart! They hurriedly rushed to where Grant was hunting. As they were coming up to the field, they saw Grant, Sr. in his electric wheelchair in the middle of the field dragging a turkey in a head lock! Grant told Gates later that there was no way that he was going to leave that turkey laying there. Neuhaus said with a bit of determination, "I just knew that the coyote was going to come back and steal my tom."

When asked about the spring 2004 turkey hunt, Gates replied, "This is a dream come true. All of our hunts are totally safe and all of our participants are a long way apart. We send a guide with every participant. If a participant is blind, we send a sighted guide that looks over their shoulder at the sights on the gun and tells the participant 'Right, left, up, down, fire.' This sounds easier than it really is. Of course, any person who turkey hunts already knows that. We at Christ's Outreach sure have to give these guys credit for being pioneers in doing activities that most places wouldn't even allow them to try."

Christ's Outreach for the Blind extends a heartfelt thank you to Radford Baptist Church who brought in 27 volunteers this year during their second mission trip to the camp. What a huge praise the Lord for Christ's Outreach.

Daniel Wheeler, Radford Baptist's youth pastor, is a living testimony to what a youth pastor should be. For being such a young man, he is wise beyond his years. Nick, the pastor at Radford Baptist, is an awesome leader and has surrounded himself with godly men. Gates said that, "He has earned my respect. I have made friends at this church that will last me and this corporation a life time."

Also, thanks to foundations like the Farris Foundation for giving sponsorship so that kids and young adults can come and have experiences as described above. This support is what helps this corporation to succeed.

In addition, Christ's Outreach for the Blind is expecting another 300 volunteers this summer and is praying to open its doors in September. We still have so much to do but are so close to finishing.

Christ's Outreach for the Blind will be erecting the barn for 20 hours which will be approximately 18,000 sq. ft. and a 50 acre estate. This corral will take 300 oak planks to build. We are using these planks as a means to finish this camp. Anyone who wishes to donate a plank by making a donation of at least \$100, will have their name or business' names engraved on this plank or the plank can be done "in memory of."
