Storms hit Rockcastle

As with most of the state of Kentucky over the past week, Rockcastle County residents have no toes spared from the bad weather.

In the past since days, Mother Nature has dumped a record eight inches of rainfall and delivered high winds which caused some dangage to property. The storms also knocked out power in several areas of the county, according to Rockcastle County Weatherman Bud Cox.

Cox said precipitation was recorded at the weather station eight of the last nine days.

Environmental Fees Increase July 1

The Cumberland Valley District Health Department has approved fee increases for three programs in En-vironmental Health. The fee in-creases will be effective July 1 in Rockeastle, Bell, Clay, Jackson and Harlan counties.

The site evaluation fee for the on-site Wastewater Disposal Systems (Septic Systems) will increase from 850 to \$100, an increase of fifty dol-lars. rent fee of \$35. Existing systems are usually evaluated by the Health De-partment prior to an electrical hook-up or sometimes required by mortor to an electrical hoc times required by mo nies before completing
