## Four of last five years. Rockets are headed to sectionals

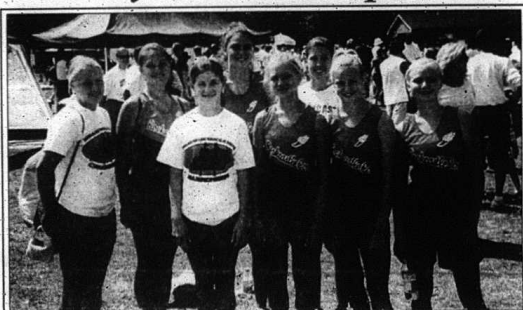

For the fourth year in five the Rockcastle County Rocket baseball team is heading to the state tournament. They won the 13th region title last Thursday and will play Ashland in the sectional tournament this Thursday in Ashland. The game will be played at Boyd County High School. Ashland is 23-10 on the season and the Rockets are 26-11. "I'm very proud of our young team for their accomplishments, but there is still work to be done," said fourth year head coach J.D. Bussell. "We have worked hard to get where we are and I know our kids are dedicated to going the distance," he said. Last week the Rockets won the 13th region championship with wins over Bell County, Whitley County and Middleboro. In the second game, the Rockets jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the first inning against Whitley County on Wednesday, with three runs in the first. They added two in the second, five in the third and two in the fourth. The Rockets would win 12-1 to advance to the finals against Middleboro. Junior Mikah Reams three a no-hitter, giving up five walks and striking out eight. He is 7-2 on the season for the Rockets. For the Rockets, senior Devon Bussell had two doubles in the game and senior Devin Taylor also had a double, as did junior Ben Graves and sophomore Colby Brown. For the game, the Rockets had a total of nine hits. Thursday night the Rockets defeated Middleboro 9-3, behind an eight hit performance by the Rockets and a complete game from pitcher Colby Brown. Brown gave up only two hits and the three runs the Yellowjackets scored were unearned. Brown struck out six batters and did not walk anyone. He retired the last ten batters he faced.

## Discuss changes in road aid formula County gets insurance rate hike information

It was "bad news/good news" time for the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday, but the "bad news" part was the most evident. That first came in the form of "greetings" from a representative of the county's insurer, KACO, who told the court that insurance premiums would rise 22.6% for the All Lines insurance and 22% for worker's compensation. Larry Denney, account executive with KACO, told the court that even though Rockcastle is "extremely profitable" for KACO (meaning a lack of insurance claims filed), the 22.6% increase was caused primarily by an increase in the value of vehicles owned by the county and the addition of 22 jail employees added to the law enforcement liability premium. Denney said that jail employees had arrest authority, and had never been included with other law enforcement personnel on the form submitted to the insurance company in the past because of confusion over where to list them. This addition caused an increase of \$4,600 in the premium. An increase of \$5,400 in the premium was due to an increase in the number of vehicles insured by the county from 46 to 50 and an increase in the value of the vehicles by \$192,000 - primarily due to the purchase of extra vehicles for the Sheriff's Department.

Another increase of \$3,040 was added to the premium because the employment practices liability (covering sexual harassment, wrongful termination, etc.) rate doubled from \$40 to \$80 per employee and the general liability rate increased 15% or \$1,100.

The total premium for the All Lines insurance will be \$85,845 - as opposed to \$70,018 for last year. The Worker's Compensation fund premium increased from \$34,285 to \$41,857. Denney said this increased

was caused by a rate hike averaging 17% and a slight increase in the total payroll and a drop from 25% to 15% in the schedule credits required by the reinsurance company. Denney did tell the court that he was trying to work out the placement of the county's insurance on their fire department vehicles with the Emergency Services Insurance Program and this should result in a reduction of the total premium which will be \$127,702 in 2004-05 as opposed to \$104,303 for the current fiscal year. ## Indictments

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury recently handed down ten indictments for alleged crimes ranging from possession of illegal drugs to illegal imprisonment. Mearrell Robinson, 41, of Crab Orchard, was indicted on two counts, connected with a January 1st break-in at the home of his estranged wife, Regina.

Rockcastle Sheriff Detective Matt Bryant said the estranged husband held his wife unlawfully and he was armed with a gun and knife. Robinson has made bond and will appear in Rockcastle Circuit Court later this month. Charles A. Hensley, 19, of Orlando was indicted on three charges of possession of a controlled substance. Police allege he had possession of Methamphetamine, (Meth) Fentanyl, Hydrocone and possession of drug paraphernalia in December of 2003. Three London men, Steven D. Eversole, 23, Darrell N. Eversole, 44, and Robert Harris, Jr., 19, were all indicted on two counts. One charge was a stolen property charge and the other was possession of materials (Cont. to A12)

night's city council meeting. Many other items of business were also discussed, including the fact that, according to some complaints from citizens, the city allows too many private yard sales.

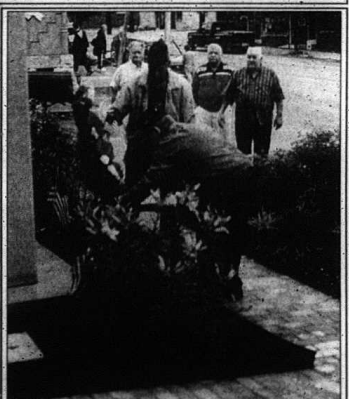
That discussion was spurred by Dr. Joe Henderson, a Mt. Vernon resident and former long-time dentist in Mt. Vernon.

## Atopic Dermatitis

Atopic dermatitis is one of our most common rashes. It occurs in about 8% of children and somewhat fewer adults. Atopic eczema is an allergy-related type of rash with a strong hereditary component. People with allergies and asthma are likely to have occasional bouts of atopic dermatitis.

In infants, the rash often consists of red, scaly or crusted lesions around the face. In children and adults it is more common on the arms and legs. A person with atopic eczema will often break out with a rash from relatively minor irritants to the skin. These include such things as wool clothing, nylon, perfumes, pollens, detergents, and simply scratching what itches.

A person must be careful with how he washes. Using strong soaps and washing frequently will remove the protective oils and leave the skin overly sensitive. A person should also avoid long baths, hot baths, and vigorous scrubbing and drying off. It is better to take brief baths with a soap substitute, such as Cetaphil.

Some bath water additives, such as colloidal oatmeal and cornstarch, can be soothing. Your pharmacist can help choose appropriate brands for your specific symptoms.

In more severe cases, medicines can be very helpful. When the rash is present, cortisone ointments will work well. Occasionally, treatment of a superficial bacterial overgrowth is all that is needed to cure the episode. Other moisturizers, lotions, and antihistamines can provide comfort and will be very helpful in resolving a flare-up of eczema, especially if they keep a person from scratching.

**Office Closures**  
Rockcastle County FSA Office and all federal governmental offices shall be closed on June 11, 2004 as a mark of respect for Ronald Reagan according to John Chot, Assistant to the Deputy Administrator of Field Operations.

FSA shall re-open Monday, June 14, 2004 at 7:30 am.

**2004 Crop Reports**  
All farms with an effective burley tobacco quota greater than zero MUST file a crop report by July 15th in order to attain planned, and considered planted credit history for retaining quota.

Producers are also reminded to report crops such as corn, soybeans, tobacco, hay and pasture for crop history by July 15th.

Crop acreage reports filed after July 15th will be required to pay a late filing fee.

**Burley Tobacco Market Closed**  
FSA has been notified that for the 2004-2005 market year the following markets will be NOT be receiving burley tobacco for market:

Warehouse # 31358- Home Tobacco Warehouse, Richmond, KY

Warehouse #31058-Burley Co-op Marketing Center, Cynthia, KY

Producers who designated tobacco to these warehouses will need to file a new designation form, FSA-806, by August 1, 2004.

**Farm Changes**

Dividing a farm into two or more resulting farms because of a change in ownership or operation is called a farm division. For FSA records to

divide a farm a farm reconstitution must be initiated. FSA defines a farm as tracts of land that have the same owner and operator.

Farm crop acreage bases are divided by three methods. Those being: estate, designation by landowner and default, applicable to base acres for farm divisions only.

Burley tobacco quotas are divided by five methods. Those being: estate, designation by landowner, contribution, cropland and history.

The estate method is the highest priority method. In this case, the base or quota/allotment is divided according to the directions in a will. This method may also be used if all heirs sign a written agreement designating the division of base(s) on the parent farm.

The designation by landowner method is the division of acreage base or quota/allotment in the manner agreed to by the parent farm owner and the purchaser. This method is used when part or all of a farm or tract is sold and all sellers and buyers sign the FSA-155 form.

The default method is used when the higher priority methods are not applicable. With this method of di-

vision, each resulting farm receives the base that is allocated to the tract of land associated with each farm.

To be effective for the current fiscal year, farm divisions must be requested by:

- July 1st, for Tobacco
  - August 1st, for the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program
- Requests made for a farm division after the current fiscal year DCP payments have been made will be processed the following fiscal year.

Danny and Betty Jo McKinney have graciously consented to include their elegant and one of a kind home located on Highway 70 to the tour. The original residence, completed

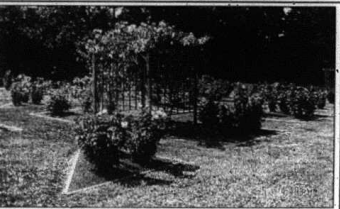

The event was held this past Saturday, June 5th at ASPI's demonstration center on highway 1329 at the river. Heavy fog shrouded the valley in the morning, but by the 12 noon starting time, it had burnt off and the sun was shining brightly.

Attendance was not what we had hoped for, but we were not surprised, considering the unprecedented number of major events we were competing with, both in the area, and statewide. We also hoped that more musicians would show up for the River Day Jam Session. Several pickers came by during the day, but not enough to keep the music going for more than a few short spells. We were, however, pleasantly surprised at the number of first time visitors from the area. Many new friends were made and many laughs and stories were exchanged.

Normally, the day would begin at 9:00 with a paddle on the Rockcastle River, but we discouraged paddlers this year due to the high water. The

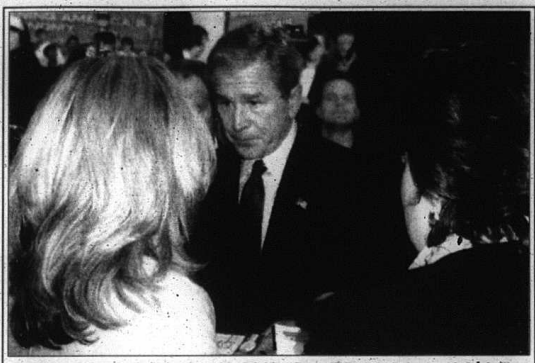
event began at noon with a delicious meal that was a combination potluck, cookout and dishes provided by local eateries, as part of our first "Taste of the Rockcastle". Everyone agreed that the "Taste of the Rockcastle" was a big success, so we plan to make it one of our new River Day traditions.

The meal was followed by tours of ASPI's solar home, cordwood construction home, and nature center, with it's newly built bird blind. The final event of the day was the 2nd Annual Rockcastle River Day "Rockathalon", our light-hearted version of the decaathlon. Due to the high water, we cut out the canoe race, river swim and rock skipping contest and limited it to horseshoes, volleyball, watermelon seed spitting and river cane tossing. This year's event

was won in dramatic fashion by Tom Dupree of Lexington, who edged out last year's winner, Berea's Damien Malen, by a single second. They were tied at 46 seconds after the last event, but Tom had been awarded 5 bonus seconds on the watermelon seed event, resulting in a time of minus 1 second for the event, thus giving him the victory.

2004 also marked the second year for our River Day silent auction. Through the generosity of many local-merchants, we raised over \$700 for our Nature Center and Appalachian Ecology Program, which offers free instruction, curriculum materials and nature center visits to schools underperforming on Kentucky standardized science tests. **Whereas**, the City of Mt. Vernon has determined it necessary to raise water rates to provide monies to operate, maintain, acquire, and construct the City's water utility and

**Whereas**, the wholesale water customers have agreed to rate to be set; and

**Whereas**, the rate must be approved by the Public Service Commission; and

**Now Therefore Be It Ordained**, by the Council of the City of Mount Vernon as follows:

**Section One:** That the City of Mt. Vernon does hereby revise water rate of \$2.05 per 1000 gallons of water metered between the City and the Wholesale Water Districts and Cities (Western Rockcastle, Eastern Rockcastle and Broaddus).

**Section Two:** That the City of Mt. Vernon directs the necessary information to be submitted to the Public Service Commission for approval of the new water rate as set out in the agreements.

**Section Three:** The Mayor is hereby authorized, directed and empowered by the City of Mt. Vernon to execute the amended agreements and application for a rate adjustment to the Public Service Commission, and to complete the necessary documents on behalf of the City of Mt. Vernon.

**Section Four:** This agreement shall take effect immediately upon passage.

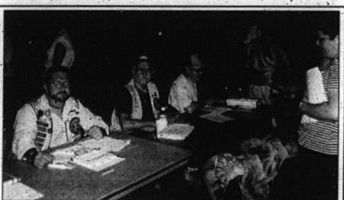

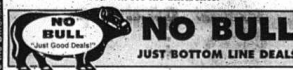
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**RCHS girls' track team places seventh at state**

# Heather Hammond wins three state championships

The RCHS girls' track and field team recently participated in the Class 2A State Track and Field Championships held at the University of Kentucky. Several RCHS track and field athletes qualified for state after the girls' team won their fourth Class 2A Region IV Championships title in the last five years. RCHS junior Brandon Cole represented the boys' team, having qualified in the 3200-meter run.

On Friday, preliminaries were held in many of the running events, with finals being contested in some field events. RCHS junior Heather Hammond got the day off to a great start for RCHS in the long jump competition. Heather and eighth grader Morgan Thacker both qualified for the event after finishing first and third, respectively, in the regional championships. Heather had her best performance of the season winning the long jump state championship with an awesome season's best jump of 17'11.75", nearly ten inches ahead of her nearest competitor. Heather also won last year's long jump state title. Morgan also jumped extremely well in her first-ever appearance at state. Morgan leaped an incredible 15'5.5" and finished eighth overall, earning a medal and scoring one point for RCHS.

RCHS senior sprinter Sheena Swinney qualified for the 100-meter dash state championship with her 3rd place performance at region. Sheena ran very well in the state preliminaries and easily qualified as one of the top nine for Saturday's finals in the event with a time of 13.57 seconds. Heather Hammond also ran preliminary races in the 400-meter dash and 300-meter hurdles, the seemingly impossible double that Heather successfully completed last season when

she won back-to-back state championships in the two events. In the 400-meter dash, Heather and 8th grader Katie Burdette both qualified after placing 1st, and 4th at the regional championships. Heather, who has practically dominated the event at state the past three years with two state championship titles and a runner-up title, coasted to an easy first place finish in her heat with a time of 1:00.03. Katie also ran a great race in her first-ever state championship appearance. She finished 11th overall with an exceptional time of 1:03.9. Earlier this season, Katie finished as state runner-up in the 400-meter dash in the middle school state championships.

Immediately after the 400-meter hurdle preliminaries. Once again, Heather got off to a great start in the race and cruised her way into first place in her heat with an exceptional overall of 48.31 seconds.

The last event on Friday for RCHS was the 1600-meter relay preliminaries. The team of Katie Burdette, eighth grader Courtney Bullock, freshman Morgan Kincer, and Heather Hammond had been ranked as high as first in the state in previous years. The girls' team ran a great preliminary race, easily qualifying for the finals in 4:22.15.

On Saturday, RCHS cross-country all-state athlete junior Brandon Cole represented the boys' team with an impressive performance in the 3200-meter run. Brandon, who finished as regional runner-up in the event, ran a spectacular race. He finished 15th overall against some very talented competition with an exceptional time of 10:42.

Saturday's girls' competition began with the finals of the 100-meter dash. State final competitions were familiar territory for former all-star Sheena Swinney who has participated in her share of them. Sheena ran a great race for RCHS and finished 9th overall with an impressive effort of 13.77 seconds.

Junior Chere' Embs qualified for the triple jump state championships for the third straight year after her runner-up finish at region this season. Chere' had a great series of jumps and finished ninth overall, just one place from scoring against the best field of triple jumpers in the last several years at state. Her leap of 32'9.5" was short of her personal best of 34'2". Last year she finished fourth at the state championships.

Sophomore all-state distance runner Kayla Hayes qualified for the 1600-meter run for the third straight season. Kayla ran an awesome race against some very tough competition and finished just out of scoring range

with a ninth place finish overall in 5:42.

Junior Heather Hammond went into Saturday's finals of the 400-meter dash and 300-meter hurdles hoping to make history. After last season's unprecedented back-to-back state championship wins in the two events, Heather sought to duplicate the feat while going after the 300-meter hurdle state record in the process.

Heather began her quest with the 400-meter dash finals. Her poise and maturity were evident throughout the race as she won the state championship in the event, which may have actually been her easiest win of her 400-meter dash state titles. Heather's time of 59.12 seconds was easily good enough to defeat her closest competitor from Boyle County (also from the same region). Heather went into the 300-meter hurdle state finals only minutes later, facing the daunting challenge of defeating the newly-crowned 100-meter state champion, Ehi Akojie of Paducah Tilghman, who just happened to be one of the best 300-meter hurdlers in the state.

Heather was certainly up to the challenge and ran an awesome race. She led from start to finish and edged up slightly at the finish to win her second straight 300-meter hurdle state championship and third title of this year's state finals. She also broke her own RCHS record from the regional finals with a new record time of 45.51 seconds, missing the state record in the event by only twenty-two hundredths of a second.

Over the past four seasons at RCHS, Heather has established herself as one of the most successful athletes to ever compete for RCHS and has helped to further establish a program quickly gaining recognition as one of the state's best. This year's incredible state championship performance continued a career blessed with excellence. Heather's three wins at state give her eight high school state championship titles overall.

She has won 14 regional championship titles since her eighth grade year. Her three state wins will ensure her at least three team all-state selections, giving her an unbelievable twelve for her career. Heather has also been named KTCCCA Middle School Track and Field Athlete of the Year and KTCCCA Class 2A Female Track and Field Athlete of the Year. She stands an excellent chance of winning the award this season. The girls' 1600-meter relay team ran an unbelievable race in the state finals, despite the youthful composition of the team. Eighth grader Katie Burdette got the race off to a great start with a fast-paced first leg. A great baton exchange to 8th grader Courtney Bullock put RCHS in contention early on. Courtney ran superbly and finished her leg with a nice exchange to freshman Morgan Kincer who ran an exceptionally fast

third leg. A great baton exchange to anchor leg Heather Hammond kept Rockcastle close. Heather ran a brilliant final leg pulling RCHS up to fifth place at race's end. The team finished with a season's best time of 4:12.88, shattering their previous best time set at regionals by nearly five seconds.

With the brilliant performances by many RCHS individuals, along with that of the 1600-meter relay team, the RCHS girls' team finished with a total of 35 points which placed them 7th overall. Even more amazing is the fact that Heather Hammond's individual point total of 31 would have ranked her in ninth place in the team standings by herself. This marked the fourth year in a row that the RCHS girls' team have placed in the top seven at state with a second and two fourth place finishes in each of the three state seasons.

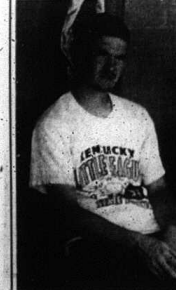

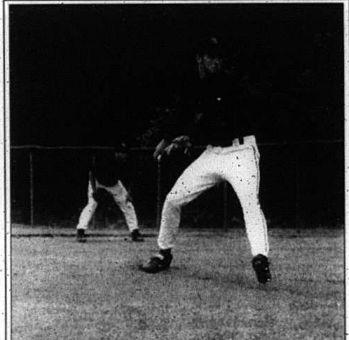

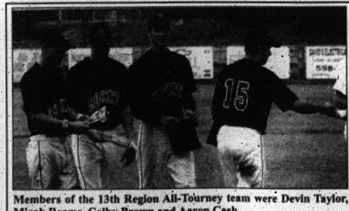

## The Family Room

"I am miserable without Joe," Jane told me. (All characters are fictitious.) "Since he left, I can't eat or sleep. I think about him all the time. It is all I can do to take care of my kids. I guess I really do love him if I miss him so much."

Norm told a similar story when his wife left. "I can't live without her," he told his counselor. "You have got to help me get her back. I love her so much that I don't see a life without her. Can you help me? Will you talk to her? I've got to have her back."

Both Jane and Norm are making a common mistake. They are equating emotional dependency with love. They both believe that because they need someone therefore they love that person. This is not true.

Popular music, television and movies contribute to this myth that emotional dependency is the same as love. One of the worst offenders is that old country song by George Jones entitled "He Stopped Loving When They Placed a Weath upon his Door" and "carried him away." Some would see that as a shining example of true love. Instead, it is a prime example of emotional dependency carried to the extreme.

Abusive males are often emotionally dependent on the women they abuse.

This may seem odd, but it is at the root of their abuse. They abuse and degrade the women in order to beat down their self-esteem and put so much fear into them that they will not leave. Abusive males whose wives have left can be some of the most pitiful creatures one has ever seen. Strong, powerful men break down and sob. They go from friend to

friend begging anyone to help them talk her into returning. "I love her so much," they say. "I can't live without her."

Yet strong relationships are not built on need but on choice. It is better for two people to be together because they choose to be rather than because they have to be. "I need her so much that I can't live without her" is not love, it is emotional dependency. "I love her and choose to spend the rest of my life with her" is love.

One way to distinguish love from emotional dependency is to ask "whose interest does the lover put first?" Love is always concerned with what is best for the loved one. Love wants what is best for the partner even if that might mean losing him or her.

Emotional dependency is not concerned about the needs of the other. The emotionally dependent person always puts his needs first. "I want her with me no matter what" means he wants her with him even if being with him is detrimental to her health and happiness.

The emotionally dependent person is so caught up in her own needs that she cannot see the needs of her partner. The dependent one uses the word "I" repeatedly. "I need him" and "I miss him" are some of her favorite sayings.

The cure for emotional dependency is to develop strong self-esteem.

Knowing that he can make it without her allows him to go on with his life when she leaves. Certainly he will be sad and will grieve, but it will not mean the end of his life. His life is more than her.

Being emotionally independent is not easy. Most relationships include some degree of emotional dependency. The healthiest relationships are those where each partner maintains some degree of emotional independence and where the two of them choose to be together rather than being locked together by intense dependency.

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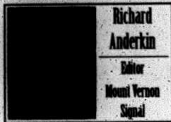

# President Reagan will be remembered



He was part of a long line of Presidents who helped end the Cold War but was, no doubt, the one that actually was diplomatic enough and strong-willed enough to make peace, and war if needed.

Many mourners spent 15 hours this past week waiting to view the President's casket. He was deserving of the homage.

When you are always obligated to put out some kind of publication on a Wednesday, which is the day our family has put out the best we have for over 38 years, those are the days you remember above all others.

My parents were always very informative with us children about what was going on in the world, and especially in the United States. In 1975, when Jimmy Carter was elected President, it was a slow slide to the high school that morning with dad putting forth his considered opinion that, "the country had made a mistake."

In my opinion, and for what it's worth, Carter will not be remembered as one of the best Presidents this country has had.

However, the 40th President, Ronald Reagan, will be remembered as one of the best Presidents and, to our generation, possibly the best President ever.

My dad and mom were none too happy on that Wednesday morning after Carter defeated President Gerald Ford, but on that Wednesday in November of 1979, they were happy campers.

Reagan took office facing 20% inflation and almost the same in interest rates.

He took office with Iran holding over 50 hostages, taken from our embassy in that country. They were released the day of his inauguration, possibly in a political-slap at Carter or possibly because they feared forced repatriation from a Reagan administration.

Reagan was also very responsible for the fall of the former Soviet Union and he was also tough enough to take a bullet, from John Hinckley, Jr. and to survive.

The actor-turned-politician, who was Governor of California before he was elected President, was the oldest person to ever be elected President at age 69 and certainly the oldest to be re-elected when he turned 73 in 1984.

changes, similar to possible changes in the premium for fire department vehicles.  
The court got another bit of bad news when County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotis told the magistrates that a change in the formula used by the state Transportation Cabinet to disburse county road aid funds to counties had been changed.  
"If you think things are tight now, you ain't seen nothing yet," Carlotis said as he told the magistrates that the state would now be disbursing only 60% of the funds in July or August, instead of the usual 80%. The next disbursement will come in the ninth month (March) of the fiscal year and the balance (7%) will not be disbursed under August of the next fiscal year. 3% of the funds are retained for an emergency fund for the county. In the past, Carlotis said that after the initial 80% disbursement, 10% more was disbursed in December and the balance in the spring.  
The problem with the new formula, Carlotis said is that since Rockcastle's tax base is not high, road funds are used in other county accounts until tax money is received and the funds are then transferred back to the road fund.  
Carlotis told the court that all road projects were going to have to

be looked at "very carefully" in order to work within the framework of the new formula. He also said that most major projects could not be funded without additional assistance from the state which, in the past, sometimes amounted to as much as 200% of the original road aid money. Of course, these additional funds are not guaranteed.

In Rockcastle, Carlotis said, there is approximately \$700,000 spent on 500 miles of road each year while in Laurel County, \$7 million is spent on 1,000 miles of roads. Of course, Carlotis added, Laurel has a much larger tax base and can use money from the general fund for the road department.  
The county road aid funds come from the 18.3 cents per gallon of gas paid by motorists. The money is placed in a fund and disbursed by 120 counties on a formula based on population, road miles to maintain and the number of gallons of gas sold in the county.  
The "Good News"  
The only bright spot in the meeting for the judge and magistrates came in the form of a check from the Sheriff's Department in the amount of \$43,900 which totally represents the county for vehicles bought by the county for the Sheriff's Department earlier in the fiscal year. Chief Deputy Sheriff Nathaniel Price said later that the check came from a grant of \$902.50 which totally represents purchasing items for the department from some small forfeiture checks already received, rather than from general funds from the department.

Price also told the court that a final decision on a contract with the City of Broadhead for the sheriff's department to provide law enforcement services for the town, would be made in the next few days. The signing of the Town Board. Price said the Sheriff's Department, if the contract were approved, would be paid \$35,000 a year for providing the service.  
**Constables asks for help**  
The meeting began with the court hearing a request from Constable David Mason for help with gas expenses while serving papers for the Sheriff's Department and County Attorney's office. Mason said that he often had to make several trips to serve one set of child support papers, etc. and only received \$10 for the service.

Price and County Attorney Bill Reynolds both spoke in support of Mason's request with Reynolds telling the court that while the Sheriff's Department served the majority of the papers, Mason was good at "rooting out" people and that "knowing Mason had run out a tank of gas, in the past, looking for one person. Reynolds also said that when these papers get served, it is "a help to everyone in the county."  
Price said that his son and Constables Roger Pigg and Stanley Payne has a big help with burglar alarm calls and other investigations, particularly since, for different reasons, there is presently only one state trooper working in the county.  
Carlotis did not recommend action by the court at Tuesday's meeting, rather he asked the magistrates to talk to the Sheriff's Department and Reynolds and make a decision at a later meeting this month.  
**911 Ordinance Amendment**  
The court also heard the first reading of an amendment to the 911 Ordinance which changes the jurisdiction on the 911 Governing Board from the present 13 to 9. Under the amendment, five members would be appointed from the law enforcement community as required for Enhanced 911. The amendment will take effect July 1st.  
**New Ambulance**  
Approval was also given by the magistrates for the securing of "a lease" in the amount of \$50,000 to help the RCAS purchase a three-wheel coach ambulance. The ambulance service, which will pay part of the \$70,000 cost of the ambulance from their own funds and from grant money, will repay the lease at approximately \$500 month.  
As a last item of business, Jerry Penson was appointed to the tourism commission for a three year term.

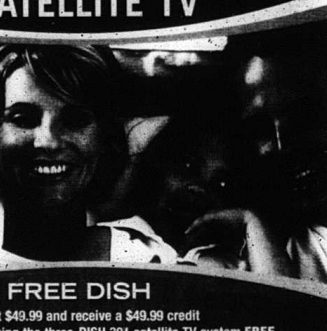

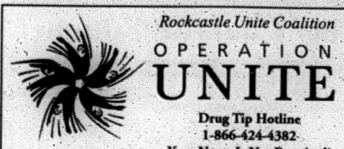

## Is your kid on drugs?

Methamphetamine is a very strong stimulant that is referred to as "meth," crack, crystal, ice and glass" on the street. It can be taken orally or snorted but is most often smoked or injected. Methamphetamine can be a white, yellow or off white in color and can appear in the "rock" form, which is similar in appearance to rock candy or rock salt. The high on methamphetamine is intense and can last up to sixteen hours. The symptoms are increased nervousness, irritability, hyperactivity and paranoia with repeated use. A person who uses methamphetamine "back to back" may have been awake and active for over thirty two hours. Paranoia may be very pronounced in the individual and the user can become very violent. The effect on the body from repeated or long term use is nearly always significant weight loss and an "unkempt" appearance. Long-term use can

cause damage to the heart, liver lungs, brain and kidneys. Methamphetamine users are considered among the more violent categories of users who choose to commit crimes. Methamphetamine users are poor planners, which nearly always causes complications during crimes, such as a robbery. This leads to more stress and fear. The user may misinterpret actions or responses and become violent. Signs of Methamphetamine use: Weight loss Hyperactivity, can't stop talking Cracked lips Sweating, Strong chemical body odor Dilated pupils Depression Paranoid behavior Discoloration or loss of teeth Unkempt appearance Insomnia

This church cleared trails, weed-whacked, mowed lawns, bush-hogged, landscaped, fixed HVAC units and much, much more. Gates stated, "We made the best of a bad week. It seemed like all it did was rain. And these churches decided not to let this beat them and worked in the mud." P.T.L. (Praise the Lord!)

Curtis Marshall, pastor of Orrs Baptist Church, was quoted as saying, "A desire for the people of Orrs to be actually on mission for our Lord led him to Christ's Outreach for the Blind." Alfred Revels, also from Orrs Baptist Church, was quoted as

saying, "A call from God to serve brought him on this trip."

After work for the first three days, our groups got cleaned up and went to Northside Baptist Church where Chad Burdette is the presiding pastor. These four churches interacted with Northside Baptist Church to do a survey and a prayer walk in Rockcastle County. In three days, four people were saved - three from Rockcastle County and one young man from the mission group. Ted Hodges said "Wow! What a privilege. We came to work, but the real reason we were here was because of these people who got saved." Jimmy Gladden and Mike Brenda, were inspirations to his wife Gates. Jimmy was quoted as saying, "We saw four people saved during a prayer walk and community survey, and had a great service with the people of Northside Baptist, and God is always at work through His people."

Christ's Outreach for the Blind will be erecting a barn for 20 horses, which will be approximately 18,000-sq. ft. and an 80-acre corral. This corral will take 3200 oak planks to build. We are using these planks as a means to finish this camp. ## Stay Cool this Summer

When it is hot outside, our bodies also become hot, especially when working or playing outdoors. By taking some simple precautions, we can reduce the possibility of overheating and other health problems caused by the combination of high temperatures and humidity. Adults normally need about 64 ounces of liquid a day, more during warmer weather. During strenuous activities, drink one-half to one cup every 10 to 15 minutes, and continue to consume fluids afterwards to replace what you lost in perspiration.

Water is an ideal drink to cool your body. When choosing other fluids consider the caffeine and sugar content. Sweetened drinks add calories and the sugar draws fluids away from the muscles where they are needed.

Alternatives are fruit juices, decaffeinated iced tea, herbal tea or coffee, carbonated water and unsweetened sports drinks. Drinking water is the best way to replace fluids unless you are under strenuous exercise or conditions. Another way to increase your fluid intake is to choose foods with high water content such as lettuce, pears, tomatoes, oranges, apples, green beans, corn and bananas.

Perspiring is one way the body loses water. Dehydration occurs when we lose more fluids than we consume. Common symptoms include fatigue, headaches, dry nasal passages, cracked lips and overall discomfort.

Dehydration may occur more rapidly in elderly people. It is a leading cause for hospitalization of people older than 65. You still can enjoy the great outdoors by taking some simple precautions. When possible, reduce or eliminate strenuous activities, or schedule them for a cool time of day. Dress to help your body maintain its normal temperature. Lightweight, light-colored clothing reflects heat and sunlight. Remember, alcohol contributes to dehydration. If you drink an

alcoholic beverage, chase it with a large glass of water.

Sunburn makes heat dissipation more difficult and is a high-risk factor in skin cancer development. If you must be outside, use a sunscreen with a skin protection factor of at least 15 and wear a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses.

Air conditioning markedly reduces the danger of overheating so spend more time in air-conditioned places. If you must be outside, stay in the shade as much as possible.

If you are interested in starting an exercise program to improve your health, consider attending a series of classes offered by the Cooperative Extension Service. The 6-week course entitled "Weight: the Reality Series" will concentrate on exercise and nutrition to live a healthier lifestyle. The series of classes will be taught at the Extension Office at 5:30-6:30 pm, starting on July 8. For more information, contact the Rockcastle Cooperative Extension Service at 256-2403.

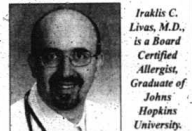

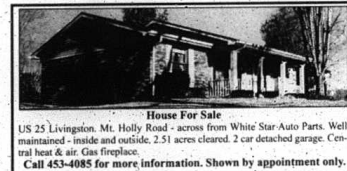

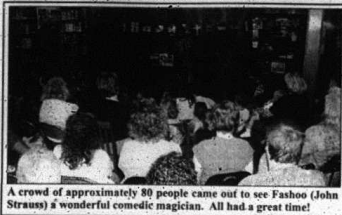


## Summer Reading kick-off at the Rockcastle Library

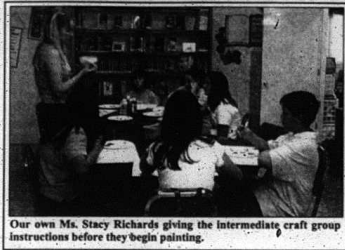
