## Wreck was June 7th

### Local woman dies Tuesday after accident

An elderly Poplar Grove woman died Tuesday at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington as the result of an auto accident.

The accident occurred on June 7th at the top of Green Fish Hill on U.S. 25, north of Mt. Vernon. Mrs. Bronieth Edith Childress Bullock, 84, who died on Tuesday was a passenger in a Ford Focus driven by Ms. Marie Robbins, also 84, of Mareburg, according to police.

Ms. Robbins is still recovering from her injuries at UK hospital.

The two elderly women had been shopping at Wal-Mart in Berea and were headed back to Rockcastle when the wreck happened.

Mike Bullock witnessed the accident and according to police it was a good thing. The car hit a tree and went over an embankment and landed in trees. Had Bullock not seen the wreck occur, the two women may not have been found for hours.

Mrs. Childress is at the Dowell & Martin Funeral Home where arrangements are incomplete.

### Brodhead council seals deal with Sheriff's office

During their regular monthly meeting on Monday night, the Brodhead City Council put the final vote on a contract with the Rockcastle Sheriff's office.

The contract will cost the city \$34,000 a year and will provide the city with a full-time police officer from the Sheriff's office.

The officer and officials will work from the former Senior Citizens building in front of the fairgrounds and as Chief Deputy Nathaniel Price said in an earlier meeting, "anytime more officers are needed, they will be at Brodhead."

### Storm victims urged to apply for federal/local disaster aid

A toll-free telephone registration line has been opened as a result of President Bush's June 10 disaster declaration for residents and business owners in sixty-six Kentucky counties, including Rockcastle. Those who suffered damage or losses (not covered by insurance) from severe storms, mudslides, tornadoes and flooding that began May 16 must call to apply for state and federal disaster assistance.

Affected residents and businesses are encouraged to begin the application process as soon as possible by calling 1-800-621-FEMA (3362) or 1-800-462-7585 (TTY), for the hearing and speech impaired. Staffed by employees from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the lines are open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. (EST and CST) seven days a week, until further notice.

Assistance can include grants to help pay for temporary housing, home repairs or other serious disaster related expenses. Low-interest loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration are also available.

Two recovery groups from Northside Baptist Church, SWAT (Servants With a Testimony), a group for recovering alcoholics and addicts and HOPE (Hearts of Peaceful Excitement), a family support group, will meet with UNITE that evening.

After the UNITE meeting, the SWAT Team and HOPE group will hold separate meetings at the high school. Those who are dealing with an alcohol or drug addiction or family members who need support are invited to attend. All pastors, government officials, community leaders, and parents who are concerned with the drug problem in Rockcastle County are urged to attend this meeting. United, we can make a difference.

### Bridge closed

The Hummel Bridge, over Roundstone Creek on Hummel Road, will be closed Friday, June 18.

The bridge will be closed for approximately three weeks, according to County/Judge Executive Buzz Carlotis, while reconstruction is taking place.

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Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash praised the Sheriff's office for their work in the city since the retirement of long-time chief Joe Bussell.

The council also accepted the resignation of councilmember Curtis Brown, who had been on the council for nearly a decade. He no longer lives in the city limits.

Mayor Cash and the council have 30 days from Monday night to appoint someone to fill Brown's unexpired term until the next council election which will be in November, when all members of city councils in the county run for office.

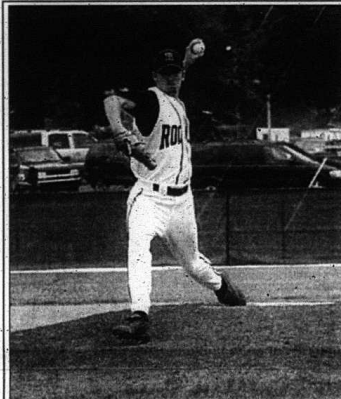
### On July 1st Gov. Fletcher's representative to be in county

## Two young girls die in crash on U.S. 25 Monday

### Rain slick roads blamed

A tragic two car collision on U.S. 25 claimed the lives of two young people on Monday.

Christa Lynn Phelps, 17, of Orlando and her 12-year-old first cousin, Rikki Kaye Allene Estep, 12, died instantly in a head-on collision at Conway, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Dowell pronounced both dead at the scene, after Miss Phelps lost control of her compact Chevrolet Geo Metro around 3 p.m.

Dowell blamed the accident on slick roads, caused by the recent heavy rainfall.

Dowell said the two had been to Wal-Mart in Berea and were headed

home.

The car Miss Phelps was driving collided with a Dodge Stratus driven by Marvin Martzall, 46, of Brodhead, who suffered only minor injuries.

Martzall told Rockcastle Sheriff Deputy Joe Rush he was going to Berea when the collision occurred. Rush is still investigating the accident.

Miss Phelps is the daughter of Richard Carl Phelps and Vicki Lynn Partin Hayes.

Miss Estep is the daughter of Ira Partin Jr. and Constance Gill Estep.

Visitation for the two victims was held on Wednesday night and services are being held Thursday (today), at the Marvin E. Owens Home for Funerals in Brodhead, at 2 p.m.

## Memorial Service held for President Reagan

On Friday, a memorial service was held on the steps of the Rockcastle County Courthouse in honor of the 40th President of the United States.

Ronald Wilson Reagan, who died last week, was honored at the request of the Rockcastle County Young Republicans Club, headed by Travis Burton.

Burton, Chairman of the Club, said he thought it was only fitting to honor President Reagan who he called, "One of the best Presidents in the nation's history."

Several citizens and officials took part in the ceremony, including Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis and former county attorney Jeffrey Burdette who is now Circuit Judge, as did his successor, current county attorney Billy Reynolds.

According to Judge Burdette, "It was an appropriate tribute to a man who changed the world when he put the Cold War completely out of the fears of the American public."

Roy Martin, owner of Dowell and Martin Funeral Home, made available a condolence book during the ceremony, which was later sent to the Reagan family. Many people

had signed the book before the ceremony.

A poem in honor of President Reagan, written by Wanda Burton appears in this week's Signal. It was read at the ceremony.

## Electrocution blamed for death of Red Hill man

Police were called to the home of Bobby Allen, 79, on Red Hill Road, after he was apparently electrocuted.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said on Wednesday that Mr. Allen had been dead for at least two days.

A neighbor, Lester Carpenter, found Allen dead in his basement on Friday evening.

Dowell said it was apparent he had been electrocuted because one of his arms was still in the electrical box.

Mr. Allen's obituary appears on page A-3 of this week's Signal.

## Conway man found dead

A Conway man was found dead on Tuesday in his home by a neighbor.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said he was ordering an autopsy in the case, but from all indications the 46-year-old man died of natural causes.

Dowell said Jimmy W. "Sonny" Lambert had been dead for at least three days.

Lambert, who lived alone, was found by Constable Roger Pigg who was called to Lambert's home by Bro. Gordon Mink, a neighbor. Mink told Pigg he was concerned because he hadn't seen Lambert for several days.

No funeral arrangements have been made, pending the autopsy, according to Dowell.

## Marijuana found by police

Deputies with the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department conducted a search of the residence of Terry Fultz on Rose Hill Road Tuesday evening.

"As a result of the search, deputies found 20 marijuana plants, a large quantity of processed marijuana, a large quantity of prescription drugs and other drug-related items, according to Rockcastle County Sheriff Darrell Doan.

Phillip Barnett, 47, of Mt. Vernon was also arrested at the scene for drug possession. Fultz told police that Barnett had not gotten the drugs at the residence.

Barnett has made a small bond and will appear in court August 11th.

Don't ever, as long as you live, order scrapple for breakfast unless you have a barf bag and you want to lose a lot of weight. And you are talking to a man who LOVES Hormel pickled pigs feet.

You want a real breakfast? Get off the interstate next time you are this way and visit Ma Agee here in

Ways to Quit Smoking

Most smokers do want to quit smoking and have tried to stop at least once. Succeeding is the hard part. The most important thing is having a real desire to quit. Without that, no amount of help from doctors, classes, or medicines will keep you from smoking.

Even when you decide to stop smoking it may take several attempts, perhaps trying different methods, before you succeed.

Besides your own desire to stop, the most effective single thing is the encouragement of your physician. Talk to him. He can suggest helpful hints and perhaps prescribe medicines.

Classes or support groups can help give you much-needed encouragement and incentive, and they will have many helpful educational tips. Regardless which method you may choose, classes are worthwhile.

Behavioral methods of quitting involve choosing quiet activities over smoking. A person is taught new habits to replace the old. Biofeedback and relaxation techniques can help the person who respond to stress by reaching for a cigarette.

One of the most common ways to quit is by stopping cold turkey, preferably after cutting down to under a pack per day. There will be withdrawal symptoms, but seldom as bad as a person expects, and they last only a matter of days. The urge to smoke, however, lasts much longer than the withdrawal symptoms.

Recently, nicotine patches and prescription medicines have become available which appear to help some people break the habit. Consult your doctor about their use.

The property had a natural slope to begin with and that's what drove the design of everything. A beautiful pond and naturalistic waterfalls is the crown jewel of this serene landscape. Mossy rocks and lily pads add

to this peaceful scene. A gravel path flanked by shade loving perennials leads to a rustic pergola complete with comfortable seating. Visitors can view large goldfish and koi swimming in the pond while enjoying the soothing sound of water as from a mountain stream. 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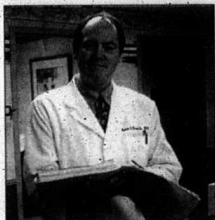

# Lightning kills, so play it safe

You're having a picnic one fine Saturday summer afternoon. The weather is wonderfully warm and sunny. Off in the distance you hear a rumble of thunder. You're having a fantastic fun when suddenly -- a blinding flash of light -- and your life is struck as family and friends are killed and crippled. Lightning has struck!

Lightning Safety Awareness Week is 20-26 June 2004. More information is available at [www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov](http://www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov).

Lightning is the second leading cause of storm-related deaths in the United States, killing more than tornadoes or hurricanes. Only floods kill more.

But deaths are only part of the lightning story. Only about 10% of those struck are killed; 90% survive. However, many of the survivors suffer devastating life-long severe injuries. The injuries can be so severe that the person is debilitated and can't earn a living. These injuries are primarily neurological, with a wide range of symptoms, and are very difficult to diagnose. Lightning also causes about \$5 billion of economic loss each year in the U.S.

While lightning strike frequencies are high in the Southeast, Midwest, and the front ranges of the Rocky Mountains, all states have some lightning threat. Fortunately, most lightning deaths and injuries can be easily avoided. Remember, no place outside is safe near a thunderstorm!

Public education is the key! The vast majority of lightning casualties can be easily, quickly, and cheaply avoided, if people only knew what to do. People heed increased awareness of the lightning hazard and increased knowledge of lightning safety. Lightning Safety Awareness Week is a good opportunity to learn about lightning safety. This year, the event is 20-26 June 2004. More information is available at [www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov](http://www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov).

Lightning safety is easy, but it is also inconvenient. It requires diligence and continual reinforcement and encouragement. Your level of safety around thunderstorms will be strongly linked to your ability to plan ahead and your willingness to be inconvenienced should a thunderstorm develop.

**No Place Outside is Safe Near a Thunderstorm**  
**PLAN AHEAD:** If you are planning to be outside, listen to the latest weather forecast for your area and know your local weather patterns. Schedule your outdoor activities to avoid the lightning hazard. You can get the weather forecast from your local National Weather Service office. The Lightning Safety Awareness Week website can guide you to the website of your local office: [www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov](http://www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov).

While the National Weather Service doesn't issue weather warnings specifically for lightning, anytime the word thunderstorm is used in the forecast there is a lightning threat.

**WHILE OUTSIDE:** If you have to be outside, monitor the weather conditions and stay in a safer location. Use the 30-30 Rule, to know when to seek proper shelter. Adults must be responsible for the lightning safety of children in their care. Coaches and referees of children's outdoor sports must be especially aware of lightning safety. Fight the urge to finish the game or get in just one more play. When the lightning safety rules tell you to go to a safer place, do so immediately. Hesitation could lead to your children being killed or injured for life.

**30-30 RULE:** While outside, use the 30-30 Rule, to know if the lightning is close enough to be a danger. When you see lightning, count the number of seconds until you hear its thunder. If that time is 30 seconds or less, the thunderstorm is close enough to be a threat, go inside immediately. If you can't see the lightning, then a good back-up rule is to go inside the moment you hear the rumble of thunder.

Don't go outside until 30 minutes or more after hearing the last thunder. Also, while outside, watch the skies for locally developing thunderstorms. If thunderstorms are brewing nearby, go inside even

before the first lightning flash. **SAFER LOCATIONS:** While no place offers 100% guaranteed safety against lightning, some places are definitely safer than others. When lightning threatens, don't hesitate, seek shelter immediately!

The lightning casualty stories are full of events where people were about to make it to safety when they were struck; if they would have just started a minute earlier, they could have been safe. The best shelter commonly available against lightning is a large fully enclosed building with wiring and plumbing, e.g. a typical house.

Once inside, stay away from any conducting path to the outside. Stay off corded telephones. Stay away from electrical appliances, lighting, and electric sockets. Stay away from plumbing. Don't watch lightning from windows or doorways.

In large buildings, inner rooms are generally better. If you can't get to a house, a vehicle with a solid metal roof and metal sides is a reasonable second choice. If parked, close the windows, lean away from the door, put your hands in your lap, and don't touch the steering wheel, ignition, gear shifter, or radio. Convertibles, seats with fiberglass or plastic shells, open framed vehicles, motorcycles and bicycles offer no lightning protection.

**MYTH:** Cars are safe because the rubber tires insulate them from the ground.

**TRUTH:** Cars are safe because of their metal shell. **IF YOU MUST BE OUTSIDE:** If you must be outside, at least avoid the most lightning dangerous locations and activities.

Avoid elevated places. Avoid open areas, including sports fields. Avoid all isolated objects like trees, poles, and light poles. Avoid water-related activities: boating, swimming (including indoor pools), and fishing. Avoid golfing. Avoid open vehicles with open cockpits like some farm tractors, open construction vehicles, riding lawnmowers, golf carts (even with roofs), etc. Avoid unprotected open structures like picnic pavilions, rain shelters, and bus stops. Avoid long metal objects like fences and bleachers.

**Do Not Go Under Trees To Keep Dry During Thunderstorms!** If Lightning is About To Strike: Use This as a Desperate Last Resort Only

If you've made several bad decisions and are outside far away from a safer location and lightning threatens, proceed to the safest location possible. Get away from elevated places, open areas, tall isolated objects, and out of or off of water. While on your way to the safest spot you can find, look for the signs that lightning is imminent.

Sometimes lightning will give a very few seconds of warning. Sometimes your hair will stand-up on end, or your skin will tingle, or light metal objects will vibrate, or you'll hear a crackling or "ice-kee" sound. If this happens and you're in a group, spread out so there are several body lengths between each person. That way, if one person is struck, the others may not be hit and can give first aid.

Once you've spread out, use the lightning crouch: put your feet together, squat down, tuck your head, and cover your ears. When the immediate threat of lightning has passed, continue heading to the safest spot possible. Remember, this is a desperate last resort; you are much safer having followed the previous steps and not gotten into this high-risk situation!

A common myth is that metal attracts lightning. The three factors that dominate where lightning strikes near a thunderstorm are height, isolation, and shape: a tall pointy object alone in a large open area is the most likely point to get struck by lightning.

The object's composition has virtually nothing to affect it being struck. After all, mountains are often struck by lightning, yet they are made of dirt and stone. Therefore, don't waste time removing glasses, jewelry, backpacks,

etc. from your body. Get to the safest place you can as fast as possible. However, you do want to avoid large metal objects like metal fences or bleachers. If lightning does happen to strike them, they can conduct the deadly electricity a long distance to you.

**MYTH:** Metal attracts lightning. **TRUTH:** Height, isolation, and shape dominate where lightning will strike near a thunderstorm.

**LIGHTNING FIRST AID:** All deaths from lightning are cardiac arrest and by the stopped breathing that follows. The recommended first aid is to have someone call 9-1-1 to get professional help and immediately apply CPR or rescue breathing, as necessary. Only about 10% of lightning victims are killed.

The short-term medical impacts of lightning can include light skin burns, concussive injury, temporary deafness, and even temporary flash blindness for nearby lightning strikes.

Long-term medical impacts are mostly neurological, with devastating and intensity of symptoms can vary widely, some of the most common symptoms include pain, especially headache, chronic fatigue, memory difficulty, and difficulty concentrating. Sometimes the injuries are so intense that the survivor is debilitated and can't maintain employment or previous relationships, with devastating impact on themselves, family, and friends.

Unfortunately, few physicians have experience in treating lightning injuries. It is important that lightning survivors seek out proper medical care and/or learn about the medical

aspects of lightning. A good source of information on lightning injuries for physicians, and survivors and their families is [www.aic.edu/lightninginjury](http://www.aic.edu/lightninginjury).

It is also important for lightning survivors to seek support from their survivors.

**MYTH:** Lightning victims are electrified. If you touch them, you'll be electrocuted.

**TRUTH:** It is perfectly safe to touch a lightning victim to give them first aid. No lightning safety guidelines will give 100% guaranteed total safety, but following these easy procedures will help you avoid the majority of lightning casualties. 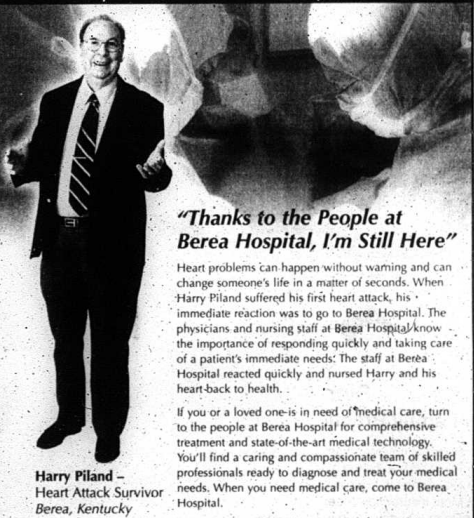

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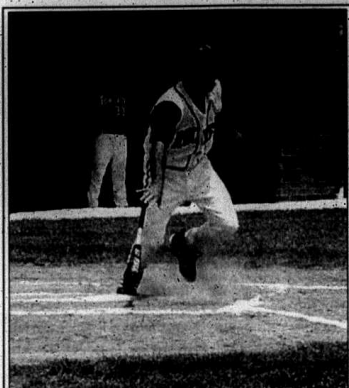

**Johnson wins weird ending Pocono race**

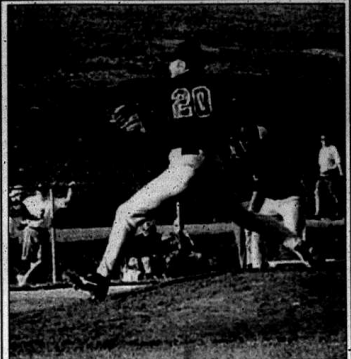

Jimmie Johnson battled back from another NASCAR snafu that left him pitting a lap after the rest of the field to win Sunday's Pocono 500 under caution.  
 The win was Johnson's third of the season and ninth of his career. Johnson's No. 48 Lowe's Chevrolet Monte Carlo was the dominant car. But after NASCAR officials opened the pit road one lap too early after a caution came out on lap 154, then, closed it, there were a lot of anxious feelings for Johnson's team.  
 Johnson almost lost the advantage of his strong car, but by lap 174, he had regained the lead.  
 NASCAR would only say p/y John Hendrick, the team owner of car 48, that they would talk about in post-race discussions.  
 In addition, fans threw debris on the track after NASCAR decided to end the race under yellow after the 10th caution came out near the end of lap 195.  
 For Johnson, the win was especially sweet. He led 500 of the 600 miles of the Coca-Cola 600 at Charlotte only to lose. Last week at Dover, he got caught up in a huge wreck after he was poised to win.  
 "This was not an easy win because of the miscue on pit road," said Johnson. "We were just doing what NASCAR told us the rules would be during the drivers meeting. There was a mistake by the flagman, and luckily, it cycled itself out for us."  
 "For a while there, I was pretty nervous."  
 For the second-place finisher, Jeremy Mayfield, it was his third consecutive top-10 finish.  
 "Jimmie was strong all day," said Mayfield. "We had a good race car, that came on strong at the end of the race, but whatever he could have got by him if it had stayed green, I don't know."  
 Kevin Harvick and Matt Kenseth had several bump-and-goos. Kenseth bumped Harvick under the green flag. When a caution came out on lap 195, Harvick spun Kenseth. One lap later, Kenseth caught up with Harvick and turned his No. 29 around.  
 Both were summoned to the NASCAR trailer after the race ended.  
 During lap 158 Rusty Wallace cut into the back of Michael Waltrip, causing both of them to spin out and hit the outside wall.  
 Waltrip said afterwards, "he couldn't imagine any rational driver doing such a thing." Wallace replied, "I had no brakes. It was that simple. I lost my brakes."

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## County Attorney warns of scholarship service schemes

While college costs are rising three times faster than the median household income, college-bound students are scrambling to find scholarship and financial aid. Some of those students and their families may be lured into purchasing services offering "free money" or guaranteed scholarships.

"Families need to be aware of bogus services," Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said. "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

According to Reynolds, these schemes are preying on students and their families by making untrue

promises.

"Filling out a scholarship application is like doing your homework," Reynolds said. "If you're going to get anything out of it, you're going to have to work at it." Reynolds said.

Even though there are some legitimate search services, Reynolds said time may be better spent researching actual financial aid information. No search service can truthfully guarantee someone a scholarship.

Reynolds said students should be wary of any scholarship search service that advertises the following:

- For an up-front fee, the service will guarantee you a grant or schol-

arship. "The service does not find you a grant or scholarship, it will refund your money."

"The service will do all the work for you."

"The service has special access to scholarship information."

"The service knows of millions of dollars in unclaimed scholarship money that is available on a first-come, first-served basis."

"These scholarship search schemes often provide scholarship information to their customers, but the information has expired, is false or has conditions that are impossible to meet," Reynolds said.

Operating a scholarship scheme such as these, which would create a false impression with the intent to deprive a person or their money may be punishable as a Class A misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to \$500 and/or imprisonment for up to 12 months.

Those who suspect they have been victims of these schemes should contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Line at 888-432-9257.

Honored to pass by the casket. Of our 40th President "Reagan," held on from vigor to great.

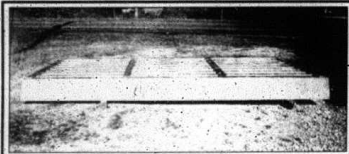
So many people to show respect, What's left to say? Honored to pass by the casket. Of our 40th President "Reagan," What an honor to have known this man.

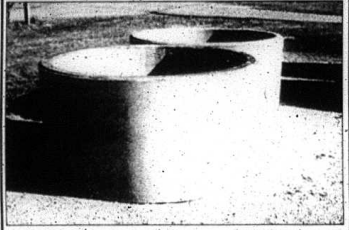

Men, if you have been looking for ways to ruin your marriage, your search has ended. I can help. Here are some ways to guarantee that you will soon be single.

1. Don't listen to your wife. Most of her opinions are wrong anyway. There's nothing you can learn from her.

2. Spend nearly every day or night out with the guys. It doesn't matter if you fish or golf or play softball, just as long as you are out of the house and away from her.

### FATHER'S DAY

In 1972, President Richard Nixon proclaimed Father's Day to be a nationwide holiday. Until that time it was celebrated only in scattered areas throughout the United States.

The concept of having a day to honor fathers was the idea of a young girl in Spokane, Washington, Sonora Smart Dodd sat in church on

Mother's Day listening to a sermon, which was a fitting tribute to women who had become mothers. Sonora

and her five brothers and sisters had lost their mother years earlier. Her Dad raised the family and in Sonora's mind, nobody could have done it better.

She decided there should be a special day honoring all the fathers in the country.

She went to see her minister, and then began writing to politicians, editors, and anyone else she thought might help. It wasn't long before petitions were being circulated. The people in Spokane endorsed the idea and on June 19th, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane.

Washington. Clergymen took the lead sponsoring this day for fathers, but many used it as a reason to remind fathers of their responsibilities, rather than praise them for their efforts. As a result, Father's Day never spread outside of Spokane, and even there it pretty much died out by the late 1920's.

In 1938, the idea was revived by a group of men's clothing retailers who recognized the sales value of such a holiday. They began to campaign to promote Father's Day with the slogan, "Give Dad Something to Wear!" The promotion worked and was loved every day thereafter, meeting with mild success. Only after President Nixon's announcement did the day become a retailer's dream in addition to a day when Dads everywhere received a loving, well-deserved, pat on the back.
