



Construction has begun on low-income, elderly units

Construction has begun on a five unit housing complex off Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

Cave Valley Apartments, a 29 unit housing complex is being constructed on property formerly owned by Roland and Nancy Mullins.

The complex will contain 25 units for the elderly, 55 and older and there will be four housing units, which will be unrestricted and available for low to moderate income

people.

There will also be two handicapped units and a unit for the hearing and visually impaired.

Mrs. Tareena Whitley, of Homeland Construction, out of Letchfield, said each unit will be 948 square feet apartments and each will have two bedrooms.

Homeland also supplies the refrigerator, stove and dishwasher, as well as a washer and dryer hook-up.

The complex has been under construction for about a month and Mrs. Whitley said completion date has been set for December.

"We are looking forward to supplying housing in Mt. Vernon," Mrs. Whitley said.

"We have units in London and Corbin and this project fit in very well with our company's plans for the future," she said.

Mrs. Whitley said Homeland is very particular about the clientele who rent from the company she works for.

"Occupants can not have ever been evicted, had a house foreclosed on, a felony conviction, three misdemeanors in the past three years, any convictions on a drug related charge or been convicted on a driving while under the influence charge.

The project was approved several months ago by the Mt. Vernon City Council and at that time, it was indicated there may also be some single housing units on the property.

Mrs. Whitley said Wednesday; it was her understanding, that the Mullin's had retained the property for the single housing units and her company was not involved in any project except for the apartment complex.

Included in the apartment complex will be a community room, which will be located in a separate building.

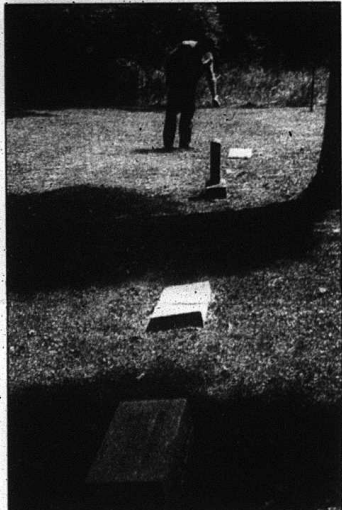
The City of Mt. Vernon has not obligated any money to the project, but Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby said Wednesday the city would take over maintenance of the water and sewer lines once the project was completed.

Rates have not been set, at this time, for the two bedroom apartments.

Tombstones erected for soldiers

The Rockcastle County Cemetery Board is in the process of placing headstones at the grave sites of all Rockcastle County soldiers who died in battles previous to the turn of the 19th century.

David Owens, historian of the local Cemetery Board, which was created by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court a few months ago, is heading the project.

Owens said on Tuesday, several tombstones will be set in the coming

202 Septic Systems installed

202 septic systems installed in Rockcastle County through PRIDE.

PRIDE will accept applications for septic system grants. Some Rockcastle County residents may be eligible for the PRIDE Homeowner Septic System Grant Program. Since 1997, PRIDE has invested \$695,301 to install septic systems or pay for sewer connections at 202 homes in Rockcastle County, according to Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolffis.

Anyone who needs a septic system or sewer connection and who meets the program requirements is encouraged to apply. Applications are accepted continuously, and grants are awarded throughout the year. Applicants will be required to provide proof of income, a copy of their recent electric bill and a deed for the property, as well as other documents if needed. Applications can be picked up at the local health department. Appli-

Marlow sentenced

A Mt. Vernon man entered a guilty plea to multiple counts of criminal possession of a forged instrument (checks) and theft of mail matter in Pulaski Circuit Court recently, according to a press release from Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth's Attorney for Lincoln, Rockcastle and Pulaski counties.

Sentenced was Michael Lee Marlow, 27, of Mt. Vernon. Assistant Commonwealth Attorney David L. Dalton indicated he would recommend a sentence of two years imprisonment on these new charges, but asked that Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette run this time consecutive to Marlow's other convictions, bringing his total sentence to ten years imprisonment. Judge Burdette set formal sentencing for July 15, 2004.

A ten year sentence for burglary was also handed down during the session. Mark A. Alban, 33, of Somerset was sentenced to multiple counts of burglary and theft for a series of break-ins in 2002. Judge Burdette denied a defense motion for probation and followed Dalton's recommendation of ten years imprisonment. Alban was taken immediately into custody to begin service of his sentence.

According to bank officials, Smith resigned due to personal reasons.

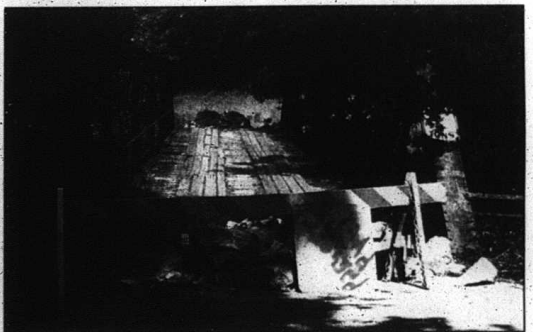
Smith had been with the bank since 1977, first as vice-president and he had been President and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) since 1997.

It's the last-minute rush for afterhaves, ties, and charcoal for the grill. Father's Day must be approaching. Father's Day doesn't have all the trappings and hoopla of Mother's Day, but don't let anyone tell you Old Dad doesn't enjoy all of the attention every bit as much as Mom.

I hope all of the Dads had a good day, and all of their children had a chance for a short visit. As I've observed, it seems as time goes by, time is the one most precious gift that a child can give a parent. You can never seem to spend enough time with a parent. Then one day when they're gone, how you wish you had spent one more minute with them.

In my case, I never got to spend a Father's Day with my father, W. C. Oxendine. It wasn't his fault or my fault either; it was just unfortunate, misunderstood circumstances. I met him only once, when I was eighteen. He came to my high school graduation, and stayed in town for two or three days. It was to be the first and last time we ever saw each other. He died not so long after that, but nobody on his side of the family notified me or Mom that he had died.

I went to an Oxendine family reunion about six or seven years ago and spoke to a cousin, Pat, who was at Dad's bedside when he died. His last words were about me, his only daughter. How I wish, especially as the years pass, that I had been the one at his bedside that day.

Often, I suppose, we opportunities make us to let our parents and other loved ones know how much we love them and would miss them if something happened to them. Sometimes we think that we have all of the time in the world, but just don't know when time may run out. It's in situations like this that I'm reminded of a story I heard once about a lonely widower and his children.

It seems there was an elderly, white-haired gentleman who had recently lost his wife of over fifty years. This was to be his first Father's Day without her. He lived alone in a little house out in the country where he and his wife raised five children, three boys and two girls. He always looked forward to Father's Day as he and the whole family would load up in the station wagon, take along a picnic lunch, and head out for a long day at the beach, lake or countryside. It was his special day he looked forward to

each year to enjoy and spend with his family. Since the children had gotten older, the all-day outings came to an end, but they would always come to visit and make a big fuss over him. In any case, this particular Father's Day, he got up especially early, as he knew the children would be coming along soon to share his day and comfort him in his grief. He ate breakfast and hurriedly dressed. He wanted to be ready when they all came. He didn't know what they had planned, but he just looked forward to seeing them. He didn't go to church that Sunday morning, as he usually did; he didn't want to miss the children.

Lunchtime came along. He waited to eat. He didn't want to ruin his appetite because his children would probably take him on a picnic like they used to do on Father's Day. Mid-afternoon came, and the children were running late, he thought. He decided to eat a little fruit, and drink some lemonade, and wait on the front porch. He sat in a back high-back rocker next to his wife's, that was now vacant. He waited and watched for their cars to come into sight, as he wanted to greet them as they came up the walk. Hour after hour passed. No children came.

Supper time was now at hand. He began to wonder what had happened to his children and his lovely grandchildren. He didn't want to call to see what had happened because he didn't want to be bother and over-anxious. He decided to make some supper for himself and the children, for when they came he knew they would be hungry. He kept the food on simmer and continued to wait. Dusk had arrived. The night air was now cool, so he waited in the living room in his favorite recliner, as the room continued to darken.

Night had come, but no children, not even as much as a call. It was now about bedtime; he turned off the simmering stove, and got dressed for bed. He has lost his appetite. In desperation, he paused a few more minutes, and listened one last time for a car to pull into his drive, or a knock on his door. Nothing but deafening silence filled the air. The little old man fell asleep that night, alone in the still darkness, waiting for the children. I guess they were too involved in their daily life, and were too busy with their own family or jobs, or maybe they expected that some of the other siblings would go and spend time with their father.

However, things turned out pretty good for the little old widower, after all. You see, later that night, he did have a visitor. He got an invitation from his Heavenly Father to join Him. I guess sometimes, every father becomes lonely for his children.

Heat Exhaustion—Give Fluids

In the hot days of spring and summer, heat exhaustion becomes an increasing threat to everyone, not just athletes and outdoor workers. Heat exhaustion results from a combination of elevated body temperature and dehydration.

The body normally compensates quite well for changes in the weather, but if a person works too hard and for too long in the heat, heat exhaustion can occur. The symptoms include marked weakness, dizziness, excessive sweating and occasionally vomiting. Excessive sweating may cause a 5-10 pound weight loss.

Several years ago salt pills were recommended, which can be of some benefit, but fluids are still the best recommendation. Cold water is the best and is absorbed most quickly. Sports beverages generally have some benefits over plain water, but they can slow absorption if they are too concentrated. As for salt, you normally get plenty in your regular meals, but during very hot weather you may want to add a little extra to your food.

Surprisingly, your thirst is not a very good indicator of how much you need to drink. Weighing yourself is a way to make sure your body has returned to normal after strenuous work or exercise.

If you begin to get symptoms, stop whatever work or sports activity you are doing, get in the shade and fan off. If possible, drink cool water and sponge off with cool towels to the chest and neck.

Prevention is the best treatment. Always pay attention to the humidity as well as the temperature—the humidity can be just as important.

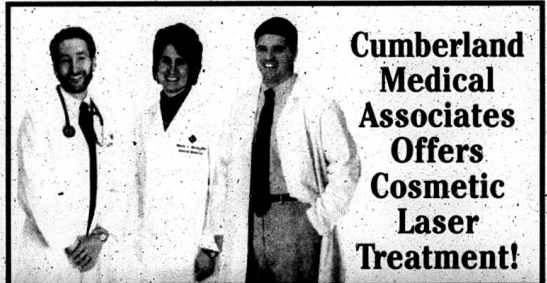

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The consequences of underage drinking
A person who begins drinking as a young teen is four times more likely to develop alcohol dependence than someone who waits until adulthood to use alcohol.

During adolescence significant changes occur in the body, including the formation of new networks in the brain. Alcohol use during this time may affect brain development.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among young ages 15 to 20, and the rate of fatal crashes among alcohol-involved drivers between 16 and 20 years old is more than twice the rate for alcohol-involved drivers 21 and older. Alcohol use also is linked with youthful deaths by drowning, suicide and homicide.

Alcohol use is associated with many adolescent risk behaviors, including other drug use and delinquency, weapon carrying and fighting and perpetrating or being the victim of date rape.

Good reasons not to drink
You want your child to avoid alcohol. Be sure to clearly state your own expectations regarding your child's drinking and establish consequences for breaking rules. Your values and attitudes count with your child, even though he or she may not always show it.

To **maintain self-respect**. In a series of focus groups, teens reported that the best way to persuade them to avoid alcohol is to appeal to their self-respect—letting them know they are too smart and have too much going for them to need the crutch of alcohol. Teens also pay attention to ways in which alcohol might cause them to do something embarrassing that might damage their self-respect and important relationships.

Drinking is illegal. Because alcohol use under the age of 21 is illegal, getting caught may mean trouble with authorities. Even if getting caught doesn't lead to police action, the parents of your child's friends may no longer permit them to associate with your child. If drinking occurs on school grounds, your child could be suspended.

Drinking can be dangerous. One of the leading causes of teen injuries and death is drunk driving. Alcohol is also a major factor in other types of fatal accidents among teens, such as drowning, burns, falls and alcohol poisoning from drinking too much, too fast. Drinking also makes a young person more vulnerable to sexual assault and unprotected sex. And while your teen may believe he or she wouldn't engage in hazardous activities after drinking, point out that because alcohol impairs judgment, a drinker is very likely to think such activities won't be dangerous.

You have a family history of alcoholism. If one of more members of your immediate or extended family has suffered from alcoholism, your child may be somewhat more vulnerable to developing a drinking problem. Your child needs to know that for him or her, drinking may carry special risks.

Six ways to say no to drink

1. No, thanks.
2. I don't feel like it-do you have any soda?
3. Alcohol's NOT my thing.
4. Are you talking to me? FORGET IT.
5. Why do you keep pressuring me when I've said NO?
6. Back off!



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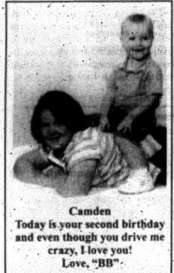

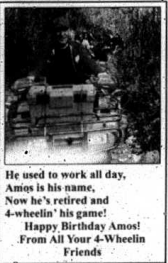

One of the greatest gifts parents can give to their children is the example of a healthy lifestyle. Good health is a lifestyle of balance. Healthy lifestyles include a balance of work and play, ice cream and apples, TV viewing and tag. You can help your children develop healthy habits at an early age by setting the example yourself.

Current recommendations state that children and adults should strive for at least 30 minutes of moderate exercise every day to balance out the many hours we spend sitting at work, school, in the car, or on the sofa. This goal can be met through a wide range of family activities that will provide exercise and enjoyment. If your kids see that you enjoy and value physical activity, they are much more likely to pick up the habit and they will enjoy the time spent with you.

With school out for the summer break, kids may be tempted to become couch potatoes. Here are some ideas for encouraging physical activity for kids and for families:
*Organize a basketball, volleyball, tennis, or softball game with your children. Be sure to emphasize fitness and fun rather than competition and perfection. Consider making this a neighborhood game; kids are more likely to want to participate if their friends are playing, too.
*If it is safe to walk or bike rather than drive, do so. Use stairs instead of elevators or escalators. Increase the distances you and your children walk.

*Give your children age appropriate chores that require physical exertion. Keep in mind their levels of strength, coordination and maturity. Mowing lawns, raking leaves, scrubbing floors, and taking out the trash not only teach responsibility but can be good exercise.
*Start a physical activity tradition. How about a Fourth of July family baseball or horseshoe game?
*Give gifts that encourage activity like a volleyball and net, or baseball and glove.

Activity options do not have to cost a lot of money to be effective. If your kids are resistant to the idea, start with a short activity such as walking the dog. Gradually increase the amount of time spent doing physical activities. Spending time with your children, setting a healthy example and encouraging physical activity are gifts that will last a lifetime.

If you are interested in starting an exercise program to improve your health, consider attending a series of classes offered by the Cooperative Extension Service. The 6-week course entitled "Weight: the Reality Series" will concentrate on exercise and nutrition to live a healthier lifestyle. This series of free classes will be taught at the Extension Office beginning July 8 at 5:30-6:30 pm. For more information, contact the Rockcastle Cooperative Extension Service at 256-2403.

Ryan Newman wins Michigan under caution

Ryan Newman passed Dale Jarrett after a restart with 23 laps to go in Sunday's 200 lap Nextel Cup race at Michigan International Speedway for his first win of the season, and the first since the October 3, 2003 Kansas race.

Once Newman was by Jarrett, he pulled away, but as the laps were winding down, Kasey Kahne made a strong run on Newman's No. 12 Dodge. Kahne had closed to within two car-lengths when the caution flag came out as the cars entered turn 3 on the final lap.

It appeared Kahne might get his first career win, but NASCAR officials put out the yellow flag after P. J. Jones hit the wall hard in turn 2, freezing the field. And for the fourth time in his career, Kahne had to settle for second.

Newman got a lap down earlier in the race when he had overheating problems caused by a piece of paper that lodged in his grill. After pitting during lap 22 to remove the paper, he returned to the track.

He battled his way up through the field and on the lap 17 restart, he was able to get by Jarrett, and go on to his 10th career Cup victory.

"To win this thing on Father's Day was a big thing," said Newman. "Happy Father's Day to my father and all the other fathers out there. It was a great victory for our entire team."

"We had to fight our way back because we got caught with a bunch of stuff on our grill in the first part of the race. We got a lap down, then got it back. We knew we had a fast car and just had to work our way forward."

Kahne tried hard, but the caution with less than a mile to go meant he had to settle for second...again.

"I don't know if we could have caught him if the yellow hadn't come out," said Kahne. "It would have been a great finish, but I would have probably finished about a car length back."

Dale Jarrett, driver of the No. 88 UPS Ford, finished third, his best of 2004.

"We ran good all day and gave ourselves a chance to win," said Jarrett. "We finished in the top-5 with both of the cars, Elliott (Sadler) and myself, so it was a really good day for us."

Pole-sitter, Jeff Gordon had an engine let go in his No. 24 Dupont Chevrolet during lap 59 and wound up 38th.

Gordon's teammate Jimmy Johnson had transmission problems for most of the race, but still managed to finish fourth and take over the Nextel Cup points lead.

Environmental fees increase July 1

The Cumberland Valley District Health Department has approved fee increases for three programs in environmental health. The fee increases will be effective July 1, 2004 in Rockcastle, Bell, Clay, Jackson and Harlan counties.

The site evaluation fee for the On-site Wastewater Disposal Systems (Septic Systems) will increase from \$60 to \$110, an increase of fifty dollars. The site evaluation fee is payable at the time of application, prior to the environmentalist conducting the site evaluation. Once the site evaluation is conducted, no refund is allowed. The on-site wastewater permit fee of \$140 will remain the same.

The fee to evaluate an existing septic system will increase to \$50, a \$15 increase from the current fee of \$35. Existing systems are usually evaluated by the Health Department prior to electrical hook-up or sometimes required by mortgage companies before completing a loan application.

Finally, the food handler card fee will increase to \$5 per person. The fee is currently \$3 per person. Any person who works in a food establishment is required to obtain a Food handler card before working or handling foods. Food Handler classes are normally scheduled for the first and third Tuesdays at 9:30 a.m., and the second and fourth Tuesdays at 3 p.m. Call the Health Department to verify the class schedule and to pre-register.

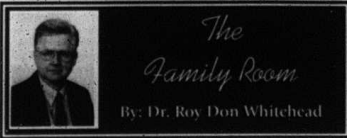

Her need for Oxycontin had become uncontrollable. (All characters are fictitious.) If she did not get a pill each day, the sickness of withdrawal made her miserable. Each pill cost \$50 on the street. Her money soon ran out, as did that of her boyfriend. They began stealing to support their habit. First, they stole from friends, next from family. When those possibilities were exhausted, they began robbing stores at night. Soon they decided to go after the pharmacies, "since that is where the Oxycontin is," and cut out the middleman. It was on one of these raids, that they were surprised by the police. Still in the store with pills in hand, they were unable to lie their way out of this one.

Methamphetamine is not stolen from pharmacies because it is not a legal drug. It is manufactured in illegal "meth labs." One couple cooked enough meth for themselves and then began to sell it. Finding this a good source of income, they involved others in dealing the drug. They were finally caught when one of their dealers told the police all about them. Their operation was shut down and they ended up doing jail time.

Oxycontin was developed as a painkiller for cancer patients. It is a timed release medication that, when taken as prescribed, can be very useful.

Taken as directed, it is seldom addictive. When crushed and snorted the medication produces a quick high, much like the high of heroin, hence its nickname "Hillbilly Heroin." When used this way or when diluted with water and injected, Oxycontin is highly addictive. Fortunately (or unfortunately, depending on one's point of view), a generic version of Oxycontin is on its way to pharmacies. This may make the drug cheaper and more accessible on the street.

Meth comes in many forms and can be smoked, snorted, taken orally or injected. It produces a rush or high that can last for up to twenty-four hours. Long term use may result in dependence, paranoia, mood disturbances, stroke and weight loss.

Why would someone take a drug that he knows may be addictive and may cause harm to his body? The high is so powerful that addicts are willing to risk almost anything to get it.

Once addicted, they are driven by the need to feel the craving and will do whatever it takes to satisfy that need.

"Normal" people who would never think of breaking the law find themselves stealing and lying to get pills. Some become dealers, spreading the misery around in order to pay for their own habits.

The major problem in breaking the addiction cycle is denial. Many addicts say, "I don't have a problem, I only do it because I like it" or "I can quit anytime."

As one wise wag said, "Denial is more than a river in Egypt." It is what drives the addiction cycle and keeps the addict hooked.

Narcotics Anonymous is a support group for those having problems with Oxycontin, methamphetamine and other drugs. There is no charge and meetings are confidential. Only first names are used.

The toll free number for NA is 818-773-9999. Counselors will help a caller find meetings in his local area.

The first visit for a drug abuse victim should be to his or her physician. The doctor can diagnose the problem and provide help. There are some instances in which a drug is available that will help the user through the withdrawal period.



Leasing Deadline

All producers are reminded that July 1st is the deadline to have all signatures complete on the burley tobacco leases or the lease shall be disapproved.

Producers who have not leased their tobacco and have no intention of growing tobacco are reminded FSA can NOT guarantee the entire quota to carry over to the next crop year.

Producers are also reminded you must have leased or marketed quota 2 of the past 3 years for P&CP credit in retaining the quota. So if you leased or marketed quota either 2002 or 2003 and did not lease or market quota in 2002 or 2003 then you must either lease or market quota in 2004 to retain your base.

Burley Tobacco Market Closed
FSA has been notified that for the 2004-2005 market year the following markets will be NOT be receiving burley tobacco for market.

Warehouse # 31158 - Home Tobacco Warehouse, Richmond, KY
Warehouse #31038 - Burley Co-Op Marketing Center, Cynthiana, KY
Producers who designated tobacco to these warehouses will need to file a new designation form, FSA-808, by August 1, 2004.

Farm Changes
Dividing a farm into two or more resulting farms because of a change in ownership or operation is called a farm division. For FSA records to divide a farm a farm reconstitution must be initiated. FSA defines a farm

as tracts of land that have the same owner and operator.

Farm crop acreage bases are divided by three methods. Those being: estate, designation by landowner and default, applicable to base acres for farm divisions only.

Burley tobacco quotas are divided by five methods. Those being: estate, designation by landowner, contribution, cropland and history.

The estate method is the highest priority method. In this case, the base or quota/allotment is divided according to the directions in a will. This method may also be used if all heirs sign a written agreement designating the division of base(s) on the parent farm.

The designation by landowner method is the division of acreage base or quota/allotment in the manner agreed to by the parent farm owner and the purchaser. This method is used when part or all of a farm or tract is sold and all sellers and buyers sign the FSA-155 form.

The default method is used when the higher priority methods are not applicable. With this method of division, each resulting farm receives the base that is allocated to the tracts of land associated with each farm.

To be effective for the current fiscal year, farm divisions must be requested by:
• July 1st, for Tobacco
• August 1st, for the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program
Requests made for a farm division after the current fiscal year DCP pay-

ments have been made will be processed the following fiscal year.

2004 Crop Reports
All farms with an effective burley tobacco quota greater than zero MUST file a crop report by July 15th in order to obtain planted and considered planted credit history for retaining quota.

Producers are also reminded to report crops such as corn, soybeans, tobacco, hay and pasture for crop history by July 15th.
Crop acreage reports filed after July 15th will be required to pay a late filing fee.

Equitable Relief
Burley tobacco harvested during the 2004 calendar year and sold prior to the end of the 2003 marketing year (Sept. 30, 2004) counts against the 2004 marketing quota for the farm. Producers that acted on previously disseminated information may be eligible under equitable relief to permit the marketing of 2004 harvested tobacco on the farm's 2003 marketing card.

Producers who wish to market on the farm's 2003 marketing card must:
• Request equitable relief on Form FSA-321 by July 15, 2004.
• Provide a written statement that states, based on previous misleading information, you believed you could plant a burley tobacco crop in 2004 and market a portion of that crop before Oct. 1, 2004 in order to recover lost 2003 undermarketings.

• Provide evidence that shows you adjusted your tobacco plantings for 2004 or took other action based on previous misleading information to grow and market a portion of the 2004 tobacco crop before Oct. 1, 2004 in order to recover lost 2003 undermarketings.

• By July 15, 2004 file FSA-578, Acreage Report, and indicated the tobacco fields that will be harvested and marketed before Oct. 1, 2004.
• Designate the location where the tobacco will be marketed by filing a manual FSA-808, Designation of Burley Tobacco Sales and Request for Marketing Cards.
• By Oct. 15, 2004 producers must return 2003 marketing card, provide proof of tobacco grade by USDA/AMS by submitting Form TB-85, Inspection and Classification Certificate and provide copy of sale bills.
Burley tobacco harvested during the 2004 calendar year to recover lost 2003 undermarketings MUST be verified by FSA by an on site farm visit.
Failure to meet any of these conditions will result in applying the sales to the 2004 marketing card for the farm.

Mike and Lori Gates have a real vision for the future here." Brenda Venhuizen, the coordinator of OPCR, always does such a remarkable job. Brenda commented that God "enabled us to work well together, to enjoy the work and each other." In this day and age when so many people are out for themselves, it is a breath of fresh air to see a group like this come and give so selflessly of themselves and their time.

The group transformed the Prayer Garden into a beautiful sanctuary, prompting Mike to say, "Christ's Outreach is starting to look like something that should be in Better Homes and Gardens. We have been so blessed." Members of the group even purchased some of the flowers to beautify the garden. Though

weather in the surrounding areas proved unpredictable, it did not once rain during the day here at Christ's Outreach. Diligent prayer and infinite blessings can be thanked for this good fortune. Hank Loerop said, "I have seen God work in providing friendly weather, a caring atmosphere, a desire in young people and old to help one another and give of themselves to help accomplish the goals of Christ's Outreach for the Blind."

The Orland Park volunteers remained committed to their work projects throughout the week. Since Orland Park CRC has a large congregation, not everyone in the group knew each other. This did not, however, dampen the spirits of anyone, least of all Carol Bosma who noted, "I was excited to work together with people I know and meet people I've never met. To work together for the same common goal - to make this a great place for those I will never know." Though the work was often difficult, everyone, including the young people, appreciated the impact they were making. Rebecca Kamp, commenting on the week, said, "I was a little nervous, not knowing what to expect to do. I was hot, tired, and a little homesick. Now I feel like I really helped someone and accomplished a lot for Christ."

Christ's Outreach for the Blind works erecting a barn for 20 horses - which will be approximately 18,000-sq. ft. and an 80-acre corral. This corral will take 3200 oak planks to build. We are using these planks as a means to finish this camp. 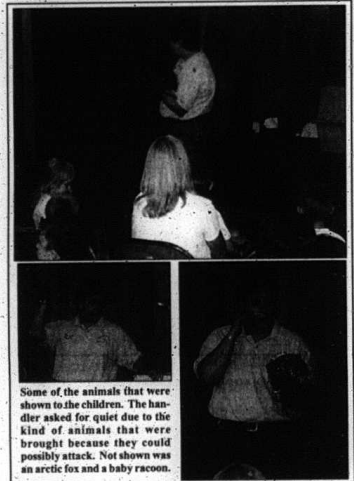
