About half the residents of Paint Lick, or so it seemed, set sail tonight on what promises to be an interesting eight week journey. Or maybe adventure is the better word.

Because we have so many new Latino residents moving into Paint Lick and the larger Garrard County community, a host of us gathered at Mount Taber Baptist Church for the first of 8 Spanish language classes.

Between classes we are encouraged to call each other and intermingling as much Spanish in the conversation as we can. By the time the course is over, we should be able to carry on simple conversations in Spanish, though heaven knows that I will never be able to trill those daddáááá and rrrrrrrs the way my Mexican neighbors do.

Actually most of them speak some conversant English but they are tickled when a gringo speaks to them in their native tongue because they are largely confined to using it in family circles or when they socialize among themselves.

The goal is to make our new neighbors feel more at home. And the sad fact is, that they are increasingly becoming essential to our agricultural economy. And Garrard County's economy is essentially based on agriculture.

Young people, however, are increasingly disinterested in working on the family farm and tobacco will

not cut and hang itself. Hay will not cut and bale itself. Silage does not pick itself up and get into silos.

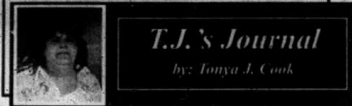
As tobacco diminishes because of market conditions, farmers will have to rely more and more on crop diversification. There is talk about wine grapes, fruit, vegetable and flower crops, new strains of livestock, and other innovations to agricultural diversification in the county. However painful (and change almost always is) the fact of the matter is that if the agriculture economy is going to grow and prosper, alternatives have to be found for tobacco.

And most of those alternatives require abundant strenuous labor, generally in unappealing conditions. Native laborers have found and continue to seek employment in factory or other indoor situations that are heated in the winter and air-conditioned in the summer. Mexican farm hands, on the other hand, thrive on being outdoors. In fact they seem to have a natural instinct for working the soil and they have no problem with long hours.

The bottom line is, without the Mexican labor force, agriculture has almost no chance of growing in Garrard County. So it behooves us to make our new neighbors feel as welcome as possible. Learning the language seems to me to be a logical way to do that.

At the end of this course, I hope to be able to write this column and then translate it into a Spanish version for the papers. By then Fatty Tarquinio, mine and Loreta's Colombian "adoptee" should be home from California to spend a month or so in our home. She can help me write the column. Unfortunately she is not going to be able to have phone conversations with her boy friends using the belief that I can't understand a word she's saying.

The days following a loved one's funeral are often the longest, most difficult days that we must go through. Often we are left with a sense of guilt, asking ourselves what could I have done to change things.

Watch For Teenage Depression

Teenage depression is more common than most people think. Teenagers have many social pressures and often other significant stresses in their lives. Changes in their personalities can not always be dismissed as "phases" they are going through.

The depression can appear similar to that of adults with symptoms of fatigue, changes in appetite, and sleep disturbances. At other times, it presents as rebelliousness or antisocial behavior with drug or alcohol abuse and sexual promiscuity. There will likely be a loss of interest in normal activities and a drop in grades.

If these changes occur in a teenager, it is important for him to consult his doctor. Medical problems, such as an abnormal thyroid, could be the cause. Whether it turns out to be depression or a medical illness, it is very important to treat it.

Teenage suicide is growing in frequency, and depression is a major cause. Girls are far more likely to attempt suicide, but boys more frequently succeed because they often use guns. The suicide rate for white males has doubled since 1970 and it is second only to accidental deaths in teenagers.

The depression can be treated with medicines which help restore the normal levels of certain chemicals, called neurotransmitters, in the brain. The new antidepressants are very effective and are much safer than the older ones.

Helping the teenager identify and understand his stresses and conflicts also helps him cope. A caring and concerned counselor can be very helpful, and the teenager should receive close medical attention during the period of recovery.

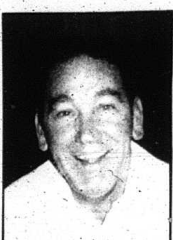
More than his job at TANK, he loved being with his large family. "With the grandkids, he always used to get down and wrestle with them," said his daughter, Gal. "He just loved life and people."

Help children develop peer relationships

Children benefit from sustained peer relationships. Friendships provide support and camaraderie during stressful times, supply loyal allies and confidants, create understanding of other people's actions, promote positive responses to conflicts, and are a source of exciting, enjoyable recreational activities.

Seeking peer relationships begins at an early age. Toddlers show interest in friendships as early as 18 months. By preschool age, they begin to initiate and maintain relationships with other children. The importance of peer relationships increases as children grow older.

Increases in single-parent homes and those where both parents work, mean children spend more time with peers, whose rejection can have severe consequences. Rejected children may be verbally and physically aggressive to their peers, are competitive and generally do poorly in school. These traits increase the likelihood that they will be peer rejected all their lives.

Parents and caregivers can provide support and encouragement to help children develop more positive behavior. It is important to recognize, reinforce and reward children's non-aggressive social behavior. Consistent caring guidance and positive disciplinary techniques help reduce aggression and foster cooperative behavior that helps children establish friendships with others.

Studies reveal that young children refer to aggressive behavior as an important reason they dislike others. Research also indicates that experiences in the home or school can either encourage or discourage aggressive behavior.

Adults can help young children express and understand their feelings and those of others, teach problem-solving approaches to conflicts, and help seek and obtain assistance during difficult times. Often children learn their skills in forming relationships through observing the behavior of the adults

in their families. If parents model healthy relationships with others, the child is more likely to be able to form healthy relationships. Aggression within the home increases the child's likelihood for aggressive behaviors.

To support young children's emerging interest in others, encourage play groups and regular social interactions. Provide regular opportunities for productive, sustained friendships by giving children regular access to potential friends, inviting others to play at home, and helping children maintain good friendships. Be sure these associations have executive supervision. Avoid excessive competitive situations.

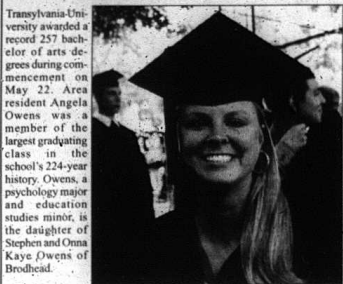
If children display aggressive behavior, encourage discussions about the anger and what is bothering them. To help them learn how to control aggressive behavior, provide outlets for hostile emotions. Age-appropriate physical activity is a good channel.

Some parents may need to re-evaluate their child-rearing practices. Research links some parenting characteristics with a strong association to children's anti-social behavior. These include poor supervision, parental disapproval, child rejection, coercive interaction, inadequate involvement in a child's activities, erratic and harsh discipline and failure to reward positive social behavior.

Inconsistent intervention in behavioral problems may reinforce aggressive behavior instead of eradicating it. When caregivers forcefully intervene sometimes and give in to the child's wishes at other times, the child learns that aggression pays off in achieving goals. This lesson extends to settings outside the home.

Bryan identifies with his father. He accepts that the one time Dad did hit him was his own fault. When he is certain Dad would never hit his sister, he understands Dad's capacity for violence. The lessons that he is learning may lead Bryan to see violence as an answer to life's problems. In identifying with the abuser, he might become an abuser himself.

What Jason does not realize is that he is also hurting himself with his anger.
 A recent study at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine found that students who became angry quickly under stress were three times more likely to develop premature heart disease and five times more likely to have an early heart attack. It is literally true that Jason's anger could kill him! (This study was reported in the Cleveland Clinic Health Newsletter in November 2002.)

What to do if you are an angry person? Develop a longer fuse and find ways to siphon off the anger. The Scriptural admonition to "Be angry and sin not. Let not the sun go down upon your wrath," (Ephesians 4:26) is good advice. Deal with each day's anger as it comes along. Do not store it for tomorrow or the next day. And do not take it out on those you love.

Yards To Paradise

Create a Woodland Oasis
 Maybe there's a missing element in a romantic description of the act of transforming a lush patch of grass into naturalistic, earthy, rocky, mulch- or leaf-covered spreads of tree trunks, ivy, and an occasional chipmunk or spider among copious understorey bushes.

Could this country boy be protesting too much the time being spent in concrete jungles, motel rooms, and muddy construction sites? Or, just possibly, some of you are ready to plunge in, create a path, grow a spot of tree trunks, or put the hand to a shovel instead of to a lawn mower?

Let's look at the practical side of this proposition before we continue the beauty, the romance, the nostalgia of a woodland oasis in the city or suburbia.

Wouldn't cutting the lawn out (instead of "cutting the lawn") be nice? At least reducing it some would ease that weekly mowing chore.

Windows would be buffered by woodland areas with some understorey, whereas a lone shade tree will bear the brunt of a storm (or your house will).

Shady areas near your house can reduce summer heat (whereas paved areas collect and store heat that will keep an area warmer than normal well into the night).

Hours spent trimming in a wooded spot will be fewer than if the same area were in lawn or garden.

Trees and shrubs can screen the traffic, the neighbors, and unsightly views. (Beautiful views can be highlighted with a gap in the trees and bushes.)

I know you will think of other practical points, but let's focus back on the eye-appeal and the comforts of a more wooded outdoor living area.

After all, making a home paradise rather than taking a short vacation to some remote "paradise" has been the best of this column from its inception more than four years ago in Rockcastle County, Kentucky. During this time I know I have helped bring paradise to at least a few yards from the Bluegrass of Kentucky to the Piedmont of the Carolinas, and the hills and mountains in between.

So let's have a look for ways we can create some forested or bushy spots in our yards.

For the beauty, for the private moments a woodland oasis will allow us to enjoy.

A leisurely stroll in a private place with your sweetie (if you're fortunate enough to have one) is much more relaxing after a long day at work than a walk on the street or in some other public place.

A few moments spent on a patio or porch looking at wildlife, flowers, and lush woodlands instead of watching cars pass or watching the neighbors, such momentary pleasures are priceless and far too rare in our modern busy busy world.

In addition to the backyard entertaining, besides intimate family time, having a private nook, large or small, can facilitate a closer communion with our Maker.

Any yard can benefit from more greenery. And poor soil or pavement can be remedied with a few scoops of good dirt. (And for those with no yards, a potted tree on a balcony is better than no trees at all.)

Therefore, don't keep procrastinating or waiting on a round-tuit. Start thinking where a little woodland could be added to your property.

A wooded oasis could be yours to enjoy soon.

"We would like to further establish that you will see an increase in the number of checkpoints during the July 4th holiday. Kentucky State Troopers will be placing an extra effort to make sure motorists are wearing seatbelts and they have children properly restrained in child safety seats and intoxicated drivers are off the roads," he said.

Sutton also said the driver is responsible for those riding in his or her vehicle and if a passenger does not want to wear their seatbelt it is the driver's responsibility to make sure they do.

Kentucky law states that all children 40" and under must be in a child restraint safety seat.

Vernon for years. The GAR Post that met in the upstairs of what is now the Hart's 5 & 10 building, was named after him and was Post 119."

Two men from Brodhead road with the famous Confederate raider John Hunt Morgan. William B. Lunsford was a wagoner for Morgan's command. His wife Rachel Slusher Lunsford was the last living Confederate widow in Kentucky. They are both buried in Brodhead and neither have any stone whatsoever.

Jonas Brown, buried at the Rock Springs Cemetery was one of Morgan's cavalrymen and was captured with Morgan during his famous Christmas Raid of 1863.

Brown later escaped with Morgan from an Indiana POW Prison and rode with the Morgan Command to

the end of the war.

Owens also stated that there were actually two Civil War battles fought on Rockcastle soil.

The first was fought August 19, 1862 when Confederate Colonel John Scott of the 1st Louisiana Cavalry captured Mt. Vernon and then ran into Union pickets of the 7th Kentucky Cavalry at Climax and pushed them all the way to Big Hill where the Union men broke and fled to Richmond.

Three of the Confederate soldiers were still buried at Climax where they fell in battle.

The second conflict occurred October 16, 1862 when the rear guard of Confederate General Braxton Bragg's army retreating from Perryville were caught by Colonel Sooy Smith's Union troops two miles south of Mt. Vernon near where the Chestnut Ridge Church of Christ now stands.

The battle involved artillery exchange from both sides, which lasted for some time, finally ending near McHargue's Branch when the Confederates fled trees across the road and retreated.

That battle was referred to as the Battle of Wild Woods by the northern troops. The soldiers that were

killed there were later reinterred, after the war, in Camp Nelson National Cemetery near Nicholasville.

A very sad affair occurred November 6th, 1862 at the mouth of Calloway Branch where it empties into Roundstone Creek near Livingstone, Rockcastle & Lincoln County Home Guards, led by William King, hung nine Confederate soldiers and a small child to retaliate for the hanging of 16 Union soldiers at Cumberland Ford—one of which was King's brother, Captain Herbert King of Crab Orchard.

"These are just a few of the accounts of the Civil War, but I hope it gives you some idea of the history we have in this county, which should be preserved," Owens said.

Mr. Owens stated the Cemetery Board welcomes anyone who would like to assist in their efforts to provide information regarding potential sites in the county which could be restored.

According to Owens' research, 115 Rockcastle men died in the Civil War — 13 from the Confederacy and 105 on the Union side.

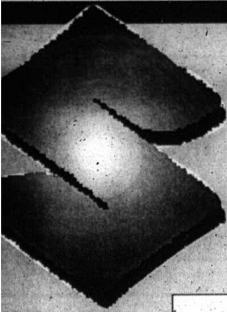

Agricultural News

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee (COC) will hold its monthly meeting Thursday, July 1st, beginning at 8:00 a.m. The meeting will be held at the FSA office located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy 150 in Mt. Vernon, KY.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA at the local level by deciding the kind of program their county will have and how they will operate. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgment and knowledge and knowledge to make decisions.

Leasing Deadline
All producers are reminded that July 1st is the deadline to have all signatures complete on the burley tobacco leases or the lease shall be disapproved.

Producers who have not leased

their tobacco and have no intention of growing tobacco are reminded FSA can NOT guarantee the entire quota to carry over to the next crop year.

Producers are also reminded you must have leased or marketed quota 2 of the past 3 years for P&CP credit in retaining the quota. So if you leased or marketed quota either 2002 or 2003 and did not lease or market quota in 2002 or 2003 then you must either lease or market quota in 2004 to retain your base.

2004 Crop Reports
All farms with an effective burley tobacco quota greater than zero MUST file a crop report by July 15th in order to attain planned and retained quota.

Producers are also reminded to report crops such as corn, soybeans, tobacco, hay and pasture for crop history by July 15th.

Crop acreage reports filed after July 15th will be required to pay a late filing fee.

Warehouse Designation
As a condition of price support, burley tobacco producers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse where they will market tobacco. This is required by completing the form FSA-808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Initial designation will end August 1, 2004.

After initial designation period ends producers will be limited to designating for the farm to any one day during regular re-designation periods.

The warehouse number will be indicated with a number on the marketing card and if a producer decides to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, the producer must return the card to the FSA office in a specific time period to request another marketing card.

Producers are reminded if they lease tobacco into the farm all leases must be approved before designating or those pounds leased will not be approved for marketing.

FSA has been notified that for the

2004-2005 market years the following markets will be NOT be receiving burley tobacco for market:
Warehouse # 31358: Home Tobacco Warehouse, Richmond, KY
Warehouse #31058-Burley Co-op Marketing Center, Cynthiana, KY
Therefore, producers who designated tobacco to those warehouses will also need to file a new designation form, FSA-808, by August 1, 2004.
