## Several races on ballot General Election Nov. 2nd

There will be no replacement appointed to fill the unexpired term of District Judge Walter Maguire, who retired a few weeks ago.

Leigh Anne Hiatt, Public Information Officer for the Administrative Office of the Courts said last week, that because of the proximity of the election in November of 2006 and the time required to hold an appropriate meeting of the Judicial Nomination Commission no appointment will be made," Hiatt said.

Kentucky's Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Joe Lambert, head of the Judicial Nomination Committee, said members of the committee made the decision because of two facts: the election being so close and the fact that there are experienced Judges in Kentucky who can replace Maguire until one is elected.

Whoever is elected will serve until 2006. No one had filed for the Judgeship as of Wednesday.

The district judge's race will not be the only race on the ballot in November.

There will, of course, be a race for President of the United States, which will be between Democrat United States Senator John Kerry and incumbent Republican George W. Bush.

Powerful U.S. Representative Harold Rogers, of Somerset, is up for his 11th term in the House in the fifth district and Democratic Senator Daniel Claitor, of Hazard will try to beat incumbent Republican Jim Bunning of Northern Kentucky in the U.S. Senate race.

Bunning has nearly \$4 million in his re-election fund.

He has also not appeared in Rockcastle County since his election to the U.S. Senate several years ago.

Mongiardo also has not yet campaigned in the county.

Locally, there will be races for all three city councils, (Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston), and there will be races in school board divisions two, four and five.

Incumbent board member Martin Vanzant has already filed in division four, but board chairman Terry Burton has not filed for re-election, in division two, nor has incumbent board member Mike Burdette in division five.

Vanzant is the only person to file for school board to date, according to Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Hurdette and Burton are expected to file.

In the city council races, only two were filed. Incumbent Wayne Bullock and former council member Jackie Renner have filed in Mt. Vernon.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of former Rockcastle County Attorney Jeffrey T. Burdette also filed. He will be unopposed.

His predecessor was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Circuit Judge Dan Venters and will face Somerset attorney Scott Lawless in the General Election.

Whoever wins will serve until 2006 when all district, circuit and county races will be held. Burdette was Rockcastle County Attorney for ten years and was unopposed in the last two elections.

The filing deadline for the November Election is August 10th. Those wishing to change their voter registration have until October 5th.

### Earliest opening date ever

## School to begin in county August 4th

When students show up for school on August 4th they will be making history.

This year's calendar begins on July 27th when teachers will go for professional development through the 29th and the first day for students will be on August 4th when they will attend a half day.

This year will be the earliest starting date ever for the local school system.

Students will be released from the Rockcastle County High

School and Middle School 11 a.m., according to Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond. Grade school students will be dismissed as soon as buses arrive, Hammond said.

The first break for students will be Labor Day and the second will be September 30th through October 1st when students will be on Fall break.

The school system will shut-down two days for the General Election, November 1st and 2nd.

and then for Thanksgiving on November 25th and 26th.

Winter break will be from December 20th through January 2nd. The last scheduled day of school is May 27, 2005 with 13 make-up days included in the calendar.

Hammond said that obviously school would be dismissed earlier than the 27th, if less than 13 days are missed.

## Supporters speak out for Lambert, Family Court

A citizens group attempting to dislodge Judge Debra H. Lambert from Family Court has been vocal — going so far as to demonstrate in front of the Pulaski County Courthouse last week.

But there are others in the community who feel Lambert — and the Family Court system — isn't getting a fair shake.

"I feel sorry for Judge Lambert ... all of this seems so one-sided," said Angela Mesalam, who is the step-mother of two children involved in a case Lambert has presided over. "She needs to know there are people out there who do feel like she is doing a great job."

Mesalam's husband, Monte, has been in a drawn-out custody tug-of-war over his two children with his ex-wife, Sandra Morrow, who is the vice-president of Concerned Citizens for a Better Family Court — the group dead-set on ousting Lambert.

Morrow insists Lambert didn't listen to her side of the custody issue and took her children from her and placed them with Mesalam despite indication that the kids were floundering in school while with their father.

Angela Mesalam, however, produced documents last week that indicated there were at least 11 domestic disturbance calls to 911 involving the Mesalam children while they were at their mother's residence. Morrow and her husband, Derek, also filed fourth-degree assault complaints against both of the children.

Angela-Mesalam also claims Morrow has failed to pay the monthly \$184 in child support Lambert ordered on two separate occasions in 2001.

"This has been a mess, but I think Judge Lambert did act in the best interest of the children in our case," Angela Mesalam said.

The *Commonwealth Journal* in Somerset learned last week that a segment of the protesters who took part in the courthouse demonstration were not from Lambert's judicial circuit and had never had a case in front of her.

The *Big Sandy News* reported that Kim and Richard Hardy, a Floyd County couple, took part in the Somerset demonstration because they were displeased with a decision handed down by Judge Julie Paxton, who removed their seven children and put them in the custody of the state.

Only a dozen people took part in the picketing. The citizens group claims to have over 100 members.

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"The Judge in Family Court only steps in when the parties are unable to resolve these issues themselves," Dalton continued. "For example, before children are removed from their home, a complaint is filed with the Court, a hearing is held, evidence is presented and the Judge has to make a decision as to what is in the best interest of that particular

child. In my experience, this is not a decision made lightly or alone. The Judge relies on the advice of social workers, school representatives and an attorney who is appointed specifically for the purpose of protecting the child."

Lambert last week called Family Court "a team effort."

"We take information from lawyers, social workers, the children's attorneys — and then you make the best decision you can based on the information you're provided," Lambert said. "To say that I don't hear both sides is ludicrous — I receive information from a number of sources. And I weigh it all."

Dalton admits the system isn't perfect — but "it's the best system possible, one that allows the focus to be where it belongs — on the children."

"It would be impossible to have a Family Court and expect everyone to be pleased with every outcome," Dalton said. "If the Court is asked to decide how the children will divide their time between two parents, both parties cannot receive a majority of the child's time."

"If the Court is asked to deal with a child who isn't attending school, then the child will be made to do something that he or she does not want to do. But in every case, the Family Court tries to put the best interest of the child first."

"As a daily practitioner in the Family Court, I see a constant effort, by all involved, to make the best-out of what has usually become a bad situation," Dalton added. "Until someone can find a way to perfect people, I retain faith in the people who pilot our Family Courts."

Local attorney Willis Coffey said Wednesday that he would come to the defense of Judge Lambert.

"If people realized the number of cases that the Judge has to deal with and the severity of some of them, they would realize, just how good a job she does," Coffey said.

"In any contested case there are going to be winners and losers and for what it is worth, I have always found Judge Lambert to be fair," he continued.

Lambert is the Family Court Circuit Judge for Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln Counties.

Her and her husband Kentucky Supreme Court Chief Justice Joseph Lambert and their two sons reside in Mt. Vernon.

Several different models are available, but all work alike. A finger or arm is punctured for a small drop of blood that is applied to a chemical strip that is then read by the device. It gives a digital reading of the blood sugar level. The small amount of pain from the blood test is minimal compared to the benefit of controlling the diabetes and decreasing the number of complications and hospitalizations over the years. And if the same finger is used all the time, a callus will form which will decrease the discomfort of the prick.

# Kentucky - Tennessee All Star Classic led to victory by RCHS football program

June 18th proved to be a big day for both the Rockcastle County community and the state of Kentucky as several individuals coached, played and cheered the Kentucky All Stars to a 28-23 victory.

Rockcastle County head football coach Tom Larkey was selected in 2002 to be the head coach for the Kentucky All Stars this year by the head coaches across the state. It takes 10 years to be eligible to coach the team, so the next possible time that this hook up of so many Rockcastle Countians would be in 2014. Larkey who is entering his 33rd year as an assistant on the team as Tennessee won in a barnburner 20-17 in Knoxville. He also got the honor to be the assistant head coach in 2003 as well, while Kentucky went on to defeat the Tennessee squad by the score of 28-14 in Lexington.

Part of Coach Larkey's duties as head coach this year included putting together a coaching staff. He selected Rockcastle County's own Coach

Tony Saylor to help put together a stellar defense. This season marks the 20th year that these two have coached together at Rockcastle County. Also selected was Coach Chris Larkey who helped with the offense, he has been coaching with the Rockets for 14 seasons. Not only was Rockcastle County privileged to have three coaches on the staff, but also last year's senior Jason Leger was selected to play in the game as well by the Kentucky Coaches Association. Leger was one of the top vote getters across the state after four dominating years playing defensive and offensive line. Leger was also selected as one of four team captains to represent the team. Coach Larkey also asked the RCHS Cheerleaders to cheer on the sidelines of Neyland Stadium. The cheerleaders were sporting new uniforms for the game as they wore blue and white outfits with the Kentucky logo, a few first for the game. During the game the Rockcastle County football staff was also able to assist on the sidelines, they included Adam Coleman, Scott Parkey, Josh Martin and Dackery Larkey. The two ball boys for the

All Star team also reside in Rockcastle County, Tanner Perkins and John L. Saylor.

"This is really something special, it is not everyday that such a small community has such a big part in representing the state of Kentucky on this large of a stage," Larkey commented. The annual game is held at both Commonwealth Stadium in Lexington and Neyland Stadium in Knoxville and alternates each year. Neyland Stadium isn't your average run of the mill college stadium either. The capacity of the stadium holds right around 107,500 people. "It was great to march into Knoxville and into their huge stadium and bring home the win to so many people from the county in attendance rooting you on," Larkey goes on to add.

The team spent 5 days practicing at the University of Kentucky, utilizing all their facilities and practiced 3 times a day to prepare for the game. Larkey stated, "we had 40 kids from 34 different schools across the state, teaching fundamentals wasn't an issue, we had to implement a defensive and offensive strategy quickly to get the kids familiar with the style of ball we would be playing, that was the hard part."

History can tell you that Kentucky has not had much luck beating the Tennessee team since the annual game started up in 1984. The Tennessee team still holds a commanding 14-7 series lead, however, Kentucky has won 4 out of the last 5 games and this years win continued the streak of 3 wins in a row.

This year's team not only beat Tennessee but they added a few pages to the record book as well. This team broke several game records including most passing yards gained with 297 yards, breaking the old record set by Tim Couch in 1996. They also scored more points than any other team in 1 half of play with 25 points, all coming in the 2nd half. That broke the record previously set by Tennessee in 1987 with 21 points. While the Kentucky team was lighting the air up with passes all of their points came from the ground. They tied the record with most rushing touchdowns in a single game with 4, tying Tennessee in 1988 and 1994.

The record for most touchdowns rushing for one player was 2 and the Kentucky team had two players tie that mark. Mason Coupy quarterback, Dustin Grutza and Danville's Charles Penix both ran for 2 touchdowns a piece. The Kentucky team was also just 2 yards away from breaking the all time record for total yards in a game with 444 yards. The current record is 445 yards set by Tennessee in 1994. (Game stats provided by your #1 Sports Source www.Bluegrasspress.com)

The team was able to have 40 players from across the state selected by coaches and the Kentucky Coaches Association panel. The Kentucky roster really looked good for the All Star team until Mr. Football Brian Brohm (Trinity) and All American tailback Joe Casey (Paducah Highman) were unable to participate in the annual rivalry. This scenario played out just right as the quarterback who ended the Rockets 2003 season, Dustin Grutza (Mason County) got the starting job to lead the Kentucky team to victory. While another rival quarterback for the Rockets was his backup, Al Holland Jr. (Perry County Central) Holland will be suiting up for the Demon-Deacons of Wake Forest in the fall as he hopes to have a long and suc-

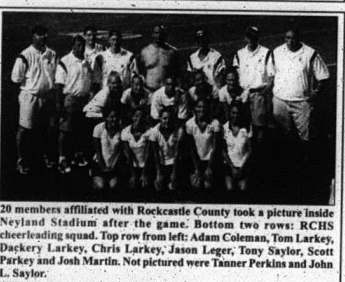

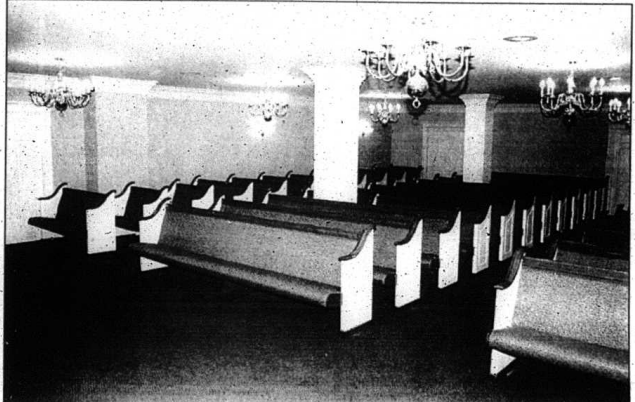
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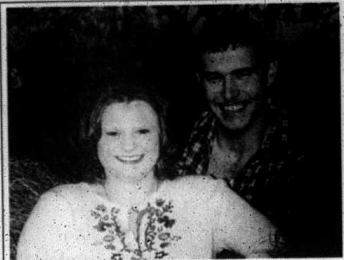

cessful career in North Carolina.

Kentucky looked to start the game strong launching the ball into the air only to have several big name receivers drop the balls. Kentucky, however, was the first to put up points when kicker Aaron Pettrey (Raceland) booted a 29-yard field goal. Pettrey is on a full scholarship to Ohio State and kicked all but one ball through the uprights on the kick-off giving the Kentucky team a great advantage with field position.

Pettrey also holds the state record for the longest field at 64 yards. Holland came into the game in the 2nd quarter and led the team over 70 yards down to the Tennessee 7 yard line where he was later picked off by a Tennessee defender that ran the interception back 96 yards for the go ahead touchdown.

After Kentucky struggled to catch the ball in the 1st half the Tennessee team took advantage and put another touchdown on the scoreboard this time on the Kentucky defense. Kentucky went into halftime trailing 14-3. At the start of the 3rd quarter Kentucky drove the ball down with numerous passes and ended a great drive with a rushing touchdown by Charles Pettix (Danville). The Kentucky team decided to go for the two-point conversion to cut Tennessee's lead to just 3, but the conversion attempt failed keeping Tennessee ahead 14-9. Kentucky then went on to score again after holding the Tennessee squad to minimal yards. This time it was Dustin Grutza using his lightning quick feet to score putting team Kentucky up 15-14. Grutza is headed to

the University of Cincinnati to backup former F.L. Thomas Highlands quarterback Gino Guidici. After several defensive stops by both teams the Kentucky team got on the scoreboard again in the 4th quarter as Grutza once again rushed for the touchdown. The two-point conversion once again failed but Kentucky was now up 22-14. After several calls went against the Kentucky defense Tennessee was able to get deep into the red zone and the game scored a touchdown cutting Kentucky's lead to two, 22-20. As soon as Kentucky got the ball rolling again on offense, they fumbled the ball away and Tennessee re-gained possession. On fourth down after the Kentucky defense had played tough not allowing a touchdown, the Tennessee team decided to kick a field goal. In suspense of the estimated 2,000 fans that were in attendance the ball hit the right upright, then fell onto the lower crossbar and bouncing back into the red zone. Grutza re-take the lead, 23-22, with a little over 6 minutes to go in the game. The Kentucky offense took off and drove the ball down the field and taking the lead on a 35-yard rushing touchdown by Pettix. The two-point conversion

failed once again and with 2 minutes left in the game, the Kentucky defense forced Tennessee back into their own territory and in turn Tennessee punted the ball away, allowing Kentucky to run the clock out with a couple of first downs. Despite turning the ball over 4 times the Kentucky team dominated the game offensively, defensively and on special teams. The Kentucky defense forced Tennessee to punt 4 times and forced an interception and a fumble recovery.

The game's MVP was awarded to Charles Pettix. Pettix will be playing football for the Colonets of Eastern Kentucky this coming year.

Jason Leger will be headed to the University of Kentucky this fall in hopes of landing a spot high on the depth chart. Leger was originally scheduled to gray-shirt this season, which meant he could practice with the team but would have a 5th year of eligibility but head coach Rich Beardsley and the Wildcats decided to throw him right in the mix this year. Leger had a dominating performance in the All Star game recording several tackles and was in on several sacks, many of which were on his own. Leger also got the chance to

line up on the backfield on the goal line and punished defenders as the running backs ran behind him. Leger also recovered a fumble on defense.

Since the implementation of the All Star game in 1984 Rockcastle County has had four players dress for the team. Slade Calhoun (1997), Derrick Russell (2001), Marty Reagan (2003) and Jason Leger (2004).

The All Star coaching staff featured 7 head coaches from across the state and 3 assistants all selected by Larkley. The staff included head coach Tom Larkley, lead assistant David Buchanan (Mason County), assistants Tony Taylor, Chris Larkley, Mike Holcomb (Breathitt County), Larry Harrison (Metcalfe County), Mike Campbell (Whitley County), Chris McNamee (Pikeville), David Mitchell (Lynn Camp) and Larry Parker (Lynn Camp). Game directors were Jimmie Reed and Rick Wood; the trainer was Sheri McNew and the two equipment managers included David Coogle and longtime manager M.H. Raddell of Tates Creek High School.

**SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS**

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action. Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
4. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrangements.
6. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
9. Do not block aisles in any way.
10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
15. Report any damages to the bus.
16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
  - a. Use of profane/foul language
  - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
  - c. Fighting on the bus
  - d. Destruction of bus/property
  - e. Defiance of driver's authority
  - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
20. **Disciplinary Action:** Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.



## Parents & Teacher School Bus Safety

A child's clothing can be dangerous when getting off the bus. A number of children have been injured or killed when their clothing became caught when exiting the bus.

**Dangerous clothing that can get caught in handrails, doors or other areas include:**  
 Jackets or sweatshirts with drawstrings  
 Backpack straps  
 Scarves or other loose clothing

**Please talk with your children about these Safety Rules:**

Stay away from Danger Zones around the bus

If you drop something near the bus, don't pick it up. The driver may not see you. Tell the driver & follow his/her instructions.

Remember that motorists don't always stop for the school bus. Use extreme caution when getting on or off the bus.

**Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal.**

**Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.**

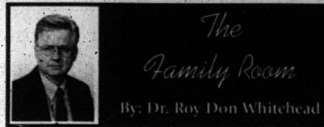

The reasons that people give for getting divorces are many. What are the reasons for staying in a marriage?

Much advice is available for someone who is contemplating divorce. Family, friends, pastors, counselors and many others will offer words of wisdom. One word of wisdom came from a minister to the wife whose husband abused her.

"Stay in your marriage no matter what," he told her. He assumed that God would want this woman to remain married to a man who physically and verbally abused her. To tell someone to stay "no matter what" is a risky piece of advice to give. Some people have been killed by their husbands. Should a woman stay even at the risk of her own life?

"No matter what" covers a multitude of situations, some of which might be fatal.

"Stay for the children's sake" is another bit of advice that is often heard. Certainly the ideal is for a child to grow up with two mentally healthy parents who love that child and who provide for her physical and emotional needs.

Unfortunately this is not always the case. What if Dad is an alcoholic who comes home drunk and terrorizes the family? Will the child be better off with two parents or with one who is emotionally stable? What if Mom spends her time chasing boyfriends, leaving the children alone? Are the children better off if Dad stays with Mom or if he leaves and takes the children with him?

"Give him another chance," some tell the wife of a man who has been unfaithful. "He is sorry for what he did and has apologized." I think he

really means it." What the advice-givers cannot know is that she may already have given him a second chance and a third and a fourth.

Advice giving is fraught with danger in the best of times. Being unable to walk a mile in the shoes of another, advice-givers may not understand the feelings involved. Advice-givers do not live in the home with this woman and do not know what goes on behind closed doors. A couple may look perfect in public, while being very dysfunctional in private.

Advice-giving takes the power of decision making away from the other person. A dependent person may take the advice instead of learning to make her own decisions. She may simply replace the husband who controls her with friends who control her without taking the responsibility for her own life.

Whether or not to stay in a marriage is one of those decisions that can only be made by the one who is facing that choice. She is the only one who knows the inner workings of her marriage, and she is the one who has to live with the consequences of her decision. Anyone else is being very presumptuous to think he knows what is best for her.

A good friend can help her think through her options by asking questions: "Realistically what are the chances that he will change? What is the effect on the children of staying or leaving? What will life be like in ten years if you stay? If you leave?"

This is a decision best made with a sober mind, much support and very little advice.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord, My name is Kathleen. I am writing to you today to tell you how the Lord answered my prayers. As you read this letter, you will see I am "A Walking Miracle." I am not writing to boost my ego but to lift up the name of the Lord. I pray this letter will encourage everyone who reads it.

On February 5, 1993, I was diagnosed with Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (CLL). I went to several doctors, including the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, hoping they would have a cure.

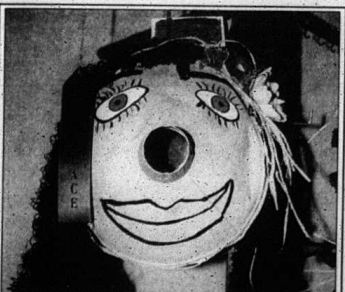

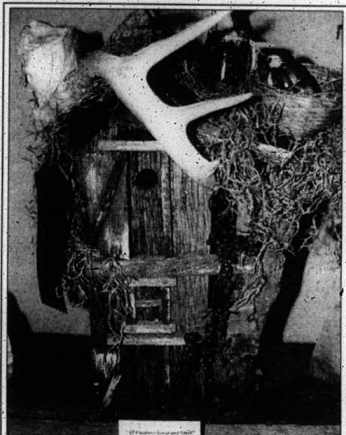

Tammy Cox, of Cox Florist, took home a first place for her Creativity in decorating a bought birdhouse featuring a "Winter, Spiritual Retreat".



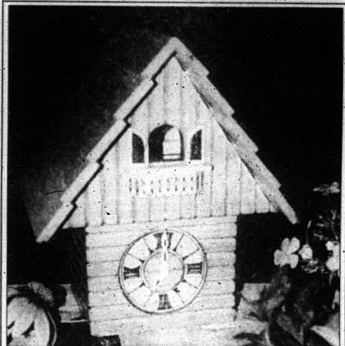

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## Agricultural News

### Warehouse Designation

As a condition of price support, burley tobacco producers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse where they will market tobacco. This is required by completing the form FSA-808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold. The 2004 burley tobacco initial designation periods ends August 2, 2004.

After initial designation period ends producers will be limited to designate for the farm to any one day

during regular re-designation periods. The regular re-designation schedule is as follows:

- September 24, 2004 through October 1, 2004
  - November 1, 2004 through November 5, 2004
  - November 29, 2004 through December 3, 2004
  - January 3, 2005 through January 7, 2005
  - January 31, 2005 through February 4, 2005
- During re-designation periods

marketing cards will be effective 10 days after the re-designation period ends.

The warehouse number will be indicated with a number on the marketing card and if a producer decides to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, the producer must return the card to the FSA office in a specific time period to request another marketing card.

Producers are reminded if they lease tobacco into the farm all leases must be approved before designating or those pounds leased will not be approved for marketing.

FSA has been notified that for the 2004-2005 market years the following markets will be NOT be receiving burley tobacco for market: Warehouse #11358- Home Tobacco Warehouse, Richmond, KY Warehouse #10158-Burley Co-op Marketing Center, Cynthiana, KY

Therefore, producers who designated tobacco to these warehouses will also need to file a new designation form, FSA-808, by August 2, 2004.

### Proposed rule to change burley designation

The Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) proposes to rescind the price support eligibility provision that requires the producer to designate the auction warehouse(s) where they will sell their tobacco and burley tobacco farmers to designate all locations where they will sell their tobacco, both auction warehouse(s) and the central buying points, non-auction sales. Currently price support loans for producers of those kinds of tobacco are available for eligible tobacco only at designated auction warehouses. If this rule is abolished

FSA would not take designations for burley tobacco.

Whether the rule is abolished or not is very dependent on the comments received from producers. 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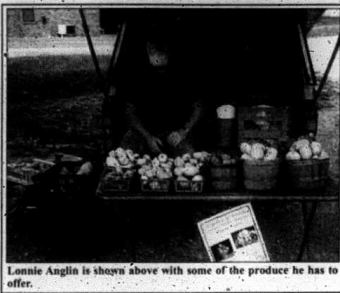

## Build a healthy life from 5-A-Day

With the abundance of fruits and vegetables available now, it's easy to choose a variety of nutritious foods to build a healthy base for life and health. The phrase "five a day" is a reminder to eat a minimum of five combined servings of fruits and vegetables daily.

Vegetables and fruits are an integral part of a healthy lifestyle. Eating a variety of these foods provides many vitamins such as A and C and minerals like folic acid necessary for prolonged good health. Many fruits and vegetables contain fiber that aids digestion and might remove excess cholesterol from the body. In addition, they also contain components that can help reduce the risk of certain diseases like cancer and heart disease.

Eating five servings of fruits and vegetables a day may sound like a lot, but it's really easy to incorporate them into your daily diet. Simply spread the servings out over the course of a day, including meals and snacks. For instance, have one serving each for breakfast, lunch and a snack and two for the night-time meal.

To be sure you receive the most nutritional value from fresh fruits and vegetables, remember to properly handle and store them. These suggestions will help you gain the most nutrients from "five a day."

Select fruits and vegetables with a fresh-looking appearance. Avoid those that are bruised, shriveled, moldy, slimy, or have a bad smell.

Buy only as much fresh fruit and vegetables as you can use in a few days. The nutritional quality of fresh produce begins to decline within three days of storage. If you

cannot use fresh fruits and vegetables within this time frame, buy frozen or canned items instead. The nutritional value is equal.

Handle produce gently in the store and at home to avoid bruises that deteriorate quality. Keep fruits and vegetables at the top of your shopping cart to keep from bruising these by putting groceries on them.

Read and follow produce labeling instructions, such as "keep in the refrigerator" and "use by" dates.

If fruits and vegetables should be put in the refrigerator, do it promptly. Put them in the crisper which has a slightly higher humidity to maintain better quality.

Discard fruits and vegetables that have been kept too long. Tell-tale signs include mold, slimy appearance, bad odor, or an expired "use by" date.

Wash most produce just before you plan to use it. Rinse it well with cold water only. Do not use a detergent because soap residue might remain on produce or be absorbed by porous items.

Only leafy greens such as lettuce should be rinsed before refrigerating to maintain crispness.

Lightly scrub produce such as potatoes, carrots, apples or pears if you want to eat the skin. It is high in fiber and nutrients.

Eating at least 5 servings a day of fruits & vegetables can help you lose weight and reduce your risk of diabetes, cancer, and heart disease. Besides, shopping for fresh, delicious Kentucky produce is a fun experience for everyone in the family.

Fresh vegetables are available through the Farmer's Market at the Broadhead Fairgrounds on Wednesday mornings and at Remfo Valley Festival Grounds on Saturday mornings.

## Saylor earns Communication Disorders Degree at UK

Jeremy Saylor of Broadhead, Ky., son of Vall and Cheryl Franklin, was recently awarded a bachelor's degree from the communication disorders program of the University of Kentucky College of Health Sciences.
