school, then the child will be made to do something that he or she does not want to do. But in every case, the Family Court Judge tries to put the best interest of the child first.

"As a daily practitioner in the Family Court, I see a constant effort, by all involved, to make the best-out of what has usually become a bad situation," Dalton added. "Until someone can find a added." added. "Until someone can find a
