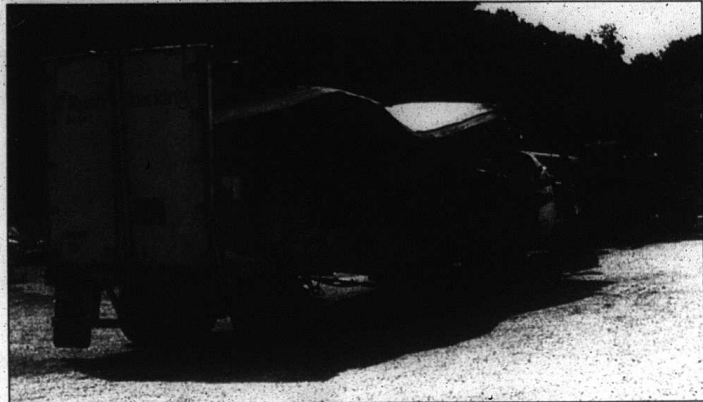

Students take part in National History Day competition Page B1



A Michigan truck driver was seriously injured on Monday night when he lost control of his tractor trailer on I-75 near the Renfro Valley exit. Police say the 61-year-old from Dandridge, TN, was traveling south when he hit a truck and then slammed into the rock embankment. David Thompson, of David's Tire Center, said the Kusch Truck was hauling parts for General Motors. The man was taken to Rockcastle Hospital after he was extricated by members of the Mt. Vernon Fire Department. He was later taken to the University of Kentucky Medical Center, suffering from a severe arm injury. The southbound lanes of I-75 were completely closed for two hours causing delays for morning travelers.

Rockcastle Fiscal Court accepts bids

In a called meeting Wednesday morning, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court accepted all bids received for culverts. The court received three bids with two of them identical, from Ky. Underground in Grayson and Benne Farm Supply in London and, locally, Lumber King who submitted the highest bid.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlolis said that all bids were accepted because when the county bought culverts by the truckload they could travel to London and get them at a cheaper price. However, when a small amount was needed, the purchase could be made locally instead of having the expense of driving out of town. The bid from Ky. Underground in Grayson was accepted because that is the only place that lipical site can be purchased.

Only one bid was received for blacktop -- from Elmo Greer & Son. In other action during the meeting, the court once again turned down participation in the hazardous duty pay program for Deputy Sheriff William Harrison who is presently working with Operation Unite.

At their regular June meeting, the court, on the recommendation of Sheriff Darrell Doan, decided not to participate in the program because it would give Harrison a 20 year retirement instead of 27 as other county employees have. Doan told the court he didn't "want to make a difference" in his employees. Harrison's pay and benefits are 100% reimbursed to the sheriff's office by the federal government. Should Harrison return to the sheriff's department as a regular deputy, his retirement would then revert to 27 years.

After a meeting with Paul Hays, Operation Unite Director for the region, Carlolis said Doan, the matter was placed on the agenda again for the called meeting. A motion by Magistrate Billy McKinney to participate

in the program died for lack of a second. According to Hays, Rockcastle is the only county in the region not allowing the hazardous duty benefit for their officer.

The court also approved the hiring of three co-op workers at minimum wage and a maximum of 20 hours per week.

Five from Tennessee Police make drug bust at Burr last week

Five people were arrested last week at Burr after a staff stop by Rockcastle constable David Mason. Mason was then assisted at the scene by Kentucky State Police Officer Jason McCowan and Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Mike Peters.

When all was said and done, four people from Tennessee were lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center, where they were held overnight. The next day, three of the accused pled guilty to the charges and one was still being held on bond.

Edward G. Trent, 24, of Thoburn, TN, was being held on several charges, including resisting arrest, carrying a concealed deadly weapon, receiving stolen property, knowingly possessing an ingredient which is used in making the now nationally known drug, Methamphetamine. He eventually made bond and will be back in Rockcastle District Court in September. Police worked at the scene of the traffic stop for several hours.

Mary Jean French, a college student at Lindsey Wilson and Heather Miller, a senior at Rockcastle County High School were both hired to work in Carlolis' office and Rose Prewitt, also a senior at RCHS, was hired to work in the sheriff's office.

Carlolis also told the court that 50% of the county's insurance premiums to KACO would be due August 1st -- \$42,922.50 for general insurance and a little over \$20,000 for workmen's compensation. Carlolis said later that other offices covered by the insurance would be asked to pay a prorated share of the premium, including the sheriff's department, jail, road department and library.

The court also voted to give \$150 to the winner of the Little World's Fair Beauty Pageant to help defray expenses of future pageants enroute to the Miss Kentucky Pageant.

Charges involve illegal drugs Arrests made in Mt. Vernon

Detectives with the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department made four drug-related arrests in the city limits of Mt. Vernon last Thursday, arising from two separate investigations.

In the first incident, Robert Alcorn, 25, of Mt. Vernon, was arrested for Trafficking in a Controlled Substance -- Second Degree and other drug charges, and Arthur Bailey, 26, of Mt. Vernon, was arrested for Possession of a Controlled Substance -- Second Degree.

In the second incident, approximately one hour later, Jerred Stevens, 19, of Wildie, and Brian Whitaker, 18, of Somerset, were arrested for Trafficking in a Controlled Substance -- First Degree and Second Degree.

At Christ Outreach for the Blind in Pine Hill

23-year-old Missionary dies in tragic accident

A 23-year-old missionary/volunteer died Tuesday in an accident at Christ's Outreach for the Blind at Pine Hill.

The tragic accident occurred around 3:30 p.m. when a group of volunteers, including the volunteer, Josh Teegarden, and his father were removing trees from the soon-to-be equine trail at the camp.

"Everyone is devastated by what happened," said Mike Gates, who along with his wife, Lori, run the camp. Gates, himself, was blinded in a hunting accident ten years ago. "We've had at least 1,000 volunteers here at the camp over the past

five years and we have never had an accident, especially one this tragic," he said.

"Our hearts go out to his parents, Bill and Pam (Teegarden) and the other members of their group," Lori Gates said Wednesday.

Josh Teegarden was pronounced dead at the Rockcastle Hospital by Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Dowell said Josh Teegarden was dead on arrival at the hospital.

"Josh no doubt died in his father's arms" said Mike Gates.

15 Indictments handed down

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down 15 indictments recently, ten against Rockcastle residents, for primarily drug charges.

Charged with the manufacture of Methamphetamine, complicity to manufacture Meth and persistent felony offender were Timothy L. Dillingham, 31, Jeff Dillingham, 33 and Rachel Cromer, 31, all of Mt. Vernon. Bond was set at \$20,000 cash or property each.

Chris Hurley, 21 of Livingston was indicted on two counts of possession of a controlled substance, first degree, for possession of Meth and Marijuana. His bond was set at \$25,000 cash or property.

Indicted on three counts was Ted Little, 30, of Brodhead. Little was indicted for possession of a controlled substance -- Oxycodone, possession of Alprazolam and operating a motor vehicle on a suspended license, second offense. \$25,000 cash or property bond was set for Little.

Thomas W. McCollum, 26, Carla R. McCollum, 24 and Sally M. Reed, 45, all of Crab Orchard were all indicted on ten counts dealing with cultivation of Marijuana, trafficking of Marijuana, possession of a controlled substance, receiving stolen property and possession of an open alcohol beverage in a motor vehicle. Bond was set for all three defendants at \$10,000 cash or property each.

Indicted on a charge of possession of a controlled substance -- Meth, was Natasha McClure, 19, of Brodhead. McClure's bond was set at \$5,000 cash, or property.

Brenda Johnson, 53, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted on three counts. Johnson is charged with possession of a handgun by a convicted felon; possession of drug paraphernalia and terroristic threatening.

Four indictments were handed down for flagrant non-support.

Michael McKinley, 36, of Berea, was indicted for flagrant non-support in the amount of \$7,678.70. His bond was set at \$7,500. Johnny Meadows, 29, of R.L. 5, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for flagrant non-support in the amount of \$3,183.87. Vanessa Meadows was indicted for flagrant non-support in the amount of \$3,188.87.

Abill's bond was set at \$7,500.

Both Johnny and Vanessa Meadows' bond was set at \$3,000. Eric Payne was indicted on two counts of flagrant non-support in the amount of \$3,592.38 and \$2,614.43. Payne's bond was set at \$5,000.

January Adhill, 25 of Mt. Vernon was indicted on a charge of Retaliating Against a Participant in the Legal Process by "engaging or threatening to engage in conduct that would cause or intended to cause bodily injury to Anya Yates, who she believes to be a witness in a legal process against her in an official proceeding."

Abill's bond was set at \$7,500.

Graham tours Europe

Ryan Graham, son of Richard and Connie Graham of Mt. Vernon, was chosen to travel to Europe for twenty days in June as part of the "People to People Student Ambassador Program." This program, which gives an unparalleled opportunity for personal growth through an enriching program of educational and cultural interaction, was founded by President Dwight D. Eisenhower during his administration and eight U.S. Presidents have since served as Honorary Chairmen.

President Eisenhower believed that ordinary citizens of different nations, if able to communicate directly, could solve their differences and find a way to live in peace. This simple thought—that people can make the difference where government cannot—is People to People's foundation. Ryan was nominated, interviewed and accepted into the program, based on his initiative, maturity, recognition of personal responsibility, attitude, personal presence and enthusiasm for learning about other cultures.

Thirty students from all over Kentucky traveled with Ryan to England, Ireland and Scotland where they toured the British Isles together, staying in several homes and hotels. For Ryan, the experience was much more than a "tour." He enjoyed his first plane ride. He walked back into an enormous amount of history. But, most of all, he got to look and learn from other cultures through the personal exchanges of the home stays.

With the host families and guides, Ryan and his group explored all the

sights of London, including Hampton Court Palace on the River Thames, Buckingham Palace and the changing of the guards, Big Ben, the Tower Bridge, Westminster Abbey, the National Art Museum and much more.

Although the entire trip was fascinating, Ryan especially loved Pitlochry, Scotland, both for its history and its exceptional scenery. The group was introduced to the Scottish culture, history, clothing, and music as they made their way through the beautiful countryside.

In Bangor, Wales, the group enjoyed a full day of adventure and personal growth through interactive and challenging workshops. They got the opportunity to learn leadership skills, set personal goals and step outside their comfort zone—(by abseiling 70 feet off a tower wall at Penryn Castle).

In Ireland, Ryan was immersed in the Irish country life during a homestay with an Irish farming family. He also enjoyed other cities in Ireland, learning about traditional Irish sports, music and art.

Ryan's travels took him through the beautiful cities of Bath in England—Bangor, Wales-Edinburg, Scotland and others too numerous to mention. The castles, the landscapes and the people he met made a lasting impression on Ryan and he has high hopes of making a similar trip next summer to Rome. Eisenhower believed

strongly in the power of the citizen ambassador and he recognized the power of young people as future leaders. These face-to-face encounters with people of different backgrounds can be most helpful in creating a foundation for a better world.

Ryan will be a senior at RCHS this fall, where he will be president of the National Honor Society. He is also a member of Future Christian Athletes and is on the swim team at Cedar Rapids Country Club. He plans to attend Western Kentucky University after graduation and to major in preclinical science.

Bullock earns medical degree from UK

David Bullock of Mt. Vernon, Ky., was awarded a Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of Kentucky College of Medicine at the college's hooding ceremony May 15: The college's new dean, Jay A. Perman, and Emery A. Wilson, former dean, presided at the ceremony.

Bullock is the son of Glyn and Pat Bullock and plans to enter a residency at UK Chandler Medical Center in family practice.

"We are exceedingly proud of our graduates," said Perman. "We are confident that they will make meaningful contributions to health care in Kentucky and beyond."

U.S. News & World Report ranked UK College of Medicine's Rural Medicine program 20th in the country in the magazine's 2004 annual ranking of "America's Best Graduate Schools."

Forty-two students, or 48 percent of the class, went into primary care specialties including internal medicine, family medicine, pediatrics and medicine-pediatrics.

The top specialties chosen by this year's students were internal medicine, 23 percent; family practice, 14 percent; emergency medicine, 7 percent; general surgery, 7 percent; and pediatrics, 6 percent. Nearly one out of three students in the class (31 percent) will stay at UK for their residency, with another 6 percent staying in Kentucky.

This class has performed exceptionally well during medical school, said Wilson. "These students have a perfect 4.0 grade point average throughout the four years, and all of these young physicians excelled in their care of others. We are very proud of them. The future of medicine is in good hands."

Busch gets second win of season at New Hampshire

Kurt Busch won Sunday's NASCAR Nextel Cup Siemens' 300 at New Hampshire International Raceway. The win was his second of the year, and it helps solidify his position as a contender for this year's championship. The other victory came March 28 at Bristol, TN.

Having to start the race from the 32nd position meant that Busch had to work his way up through the field in his No. 97 Irwin Tools Ford.

The race but turned over No. 8 Budweiser Chevrolet to Martin Truex Jr. during a caution period after lap 61. The transition of drivers was smooth, and when Truex returned to the track he was the last car on the lead lap.

A few laps later, however, he had a run-in with Ken Schrader on the track and had to pit several times for the team to correct the steering. Dale Jr. received credit for finishing 31st, two laps down.

Just last week, it was announced that Ricky Craven would not be in Cal Wells' No. 32 Tide machine next season.

His leaving is only the latest in a series of driver/team member changes. There are various reasons that people leave one team in favor of another, but rarely do either benefit from the move.

And what happens to the team when a veteran employee moves on? Andy Belmont is a seasoned ARCA Re-Max Series driver-owner that operates several teams. He has a nice business (Andy Belmont Motorsports) and also builds cars for other teams. He spoke out on his web site, after one teammember, very unceremoniously packed up and left.

"Part of being a small company in the wacky world of big time auto racing is dealing with the day to day shenanigans," said Belmont. "It's between sponsor calls and meetings; press releases and media relations, there is also a little issue of getting full bodied stock cars ready to race."

"What prompted this was a phone message this morning," he says. "Andy, this is Brian. Timmy brought the dialy back and I am going to work for you." "What thanks for everything." "Now what troubles me is the mindset. First and foremost, I have never stood in the way of someone bettering themselves. Most of them are pretty run, but we take them in and train them. They work for what we can afford and they get an education."

"Reality is that you have to send a guy on the road, but have a little respect. Drive my hauler while you are on the job picking up cars and fill out a job application? It never ceases to amaze me." "I have faith that the players that own these companies wouldn't want to be treated this way nor would they expect it from their own employees. It is a small world and what goes around comes around." "Just last week I had this conversation with another employer in our sport. He was lamenting about the same thing. The name was different, but the circumstance was the same."

"In between teaching him the proper way to install a gear or transmission or pack a bearing, you have to deal with the personal issues. Racing has come between him and his new wife. He gets phone calls and emails from the wife, and Certified Letters from our office. It was okay when you needed a place to live and we provided that. It was okay when you cried about your kids and we consoled you. It was okay that you wrecked our company truck and never paid for the damage."

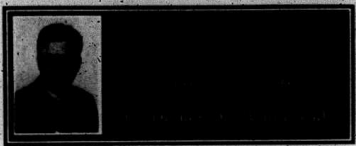

Child Find for Children with Disabilities in Need of Special Education or 504 Services

Child Find

The Rockcastle County School District keeps educational records in a secure location in each school and Board office.

The Rockcastle County School District obtains written consent from a parent or eligible student (age 18 or who is attending a postsecondary institution), before disclosing personally identifiable information to an entity or individual not authorized to receive it under FERPA.

For students who have been determined eligible for Special Education, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parents when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. The Rockcastle County School District may destroy the educational records of a child without a parent request seven (7) years after they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may later be needed for Social Security benefits or other purposes. The Rockcastle County School District may retain, for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance records, classes attended, grade level completed, and year completed.

Children eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have autism, deaf-blindness, developmental delay, emotional-behavioral disability, hearing impairment, mental disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, or visual impairment and who because of such an impairment need Special Education services.

Children eligible for 504 services include those children who have a current physical or mental impairment that currently substantially limits some major life activity which causes the student's ability to access the school environment or school activities to be substantially limited.

The Rockcastle County School District has an ongoing "Child Find" system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education or 504 services. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly mobile such as children who are migrant or homeless; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education or 504 services.

The Rockcastle County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who qualifies for Special Education or 504 services, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided appropriate Special Education or 504 services at no cost to the parents of the child.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Rockcastle County School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. The District needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child; the name, address, and phone number(s) of the parents or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education or 504 services are needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Rockcastle County School District collects the information needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education or 504 services.

"Child Find" activities will continue throughout the school year. As part of these efforts the Rockcastle County School District will use screening information, student records, and basic assessment information if collects on all children in the District to help locate those children who have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. Any information the District collects through "Child Find" is maintained confidentially.

Written Policies and Procedures have been developed which describe the District's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information and "Child Find" activities. Notification of FERPA Rights

Distribute this notice annually to parents and students.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and "eligible students" (students over 18 years of age or students who are attending a postsecondary institution) certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

1) **The right to inspect and review the student's education records within forty-five (45) days of the day the District receives a request for access.**

Parents or eligible students should submit to the school Principal/designee a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The Principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the record(s) may be inspected.

2) **The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the student's privacy or other rights.**

Parents or eligible students may ask the District to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of privacy or other rights. They should write the school Principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of their privacy or other rights.

If the District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise him/her of the right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3) **The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.**

One exception that permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A "school official" is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the school Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his/her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his/her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the District shall disclose education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll or to other entities authorized by law.

4) **The right to prohibit the disclosure of personally identifiable information concerning the student to recruiting representatives of the U.S. Armed Forces and its service academies, the Kentucky Air National Guard, and the Kentucky Army National Guard.**

Unless the parent or eligible student requests in writing that the District not release information, the student's name, address, and telephone number (if listed) shall be released to Armed Forces recruiters upon their request.

5) **The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA.** The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:



Local students compete at National History competition

Five Rockcastle County students competed at National History at the University of Maryland in College Park, Maryland June 12 through June 17.

The trip would not have been possible without special funding from GEAR UP, Rockcastle County Middle School Youth Services and Rockcastle County Middle School and Jason Cogger, principal.

John Mark Davis, Tyler Ingram, Jessica Simmons, Holly Brown and Stephanie Barnett not only represented Rockcastle County Middle School but also the state of Kentucky at NHD. Both projects, *Music of the Mountains: Exploring Bluegrass Music From Its Roots and Corps of Discovery: the Beginning of Exchange* received excellent scores from all judges, with special recognition for choosing a local topic with bluegrass music.

While competing at NHD, the students, along with parent chaperones, Pat Brown and Elizabeth Barnett, and teacher, Melissa Singleton, were able to do some educational sightseeing in Baltimore and Washington, D.C. One of the first things the group did was tour the many historical monuments, including the Lincoln, Jefferson and Washington Memorials and war memorials. The group met several Korean War veterans and had their picture taken with them. The students placed flora arrangements on the war memorials, including the new World War II memorial, as well as placed flowers on the grave of John F. Kennedy while visiting Arlington National Cemetery. They also got to the "changing of the guard" at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers. They visited the Memorial to Women in War at Arlington, where Holly Brown was able to view her third cousin's contribution to the display. Finally, the group visited one of the newest monuments in Arlington, the memorial to the Navy Seabees. Their bus driver, John Pietrowich, is a 16

year naval veteran who served in Desert Storm. The students also met Senator Jim Bunning and toured the Capitol Building with one of his staff.

Another stop, while in Washington, was the National Cathedral where the group saw the place where Ronald Reagan's casket stood and viewed the tomb of Woodrow Wilson. They learned that among those buried in the cathedral are Helen Keller and her teacher. The group toured several of the Smithsonian museums with a special stop to see the Hope Diamond and took time out of the hot afternoon to cool off in one of the many fountains found along the Smithsonian Mall. Although security was very tight, the students were able to see and take pictures of the White House.

While in Baltimore, the group visited the pier at Chesapeake Bay and saw the USS Constellation, one of the last wooden battleships and a 1950's model diesel submarine. The group finished their afternoon in Baltimore with dinner at the Hard Rock Cafe and a trip to Fort McHenry, site of the writing of the *Star Spangled Banner* and saw the Flag Day ceremonies with a huge fireworks show to top off the evening. They even met "Uncle Sam."

On the final day of NHD competition, all Rockcastle County students were honored to carry the Kentucky State flag and Kentucky NHD banner in the opening Parade of States of the awards ceremony. The entertainment included a performance by the U.S. Naval Color Guard, the same group that escorted Ronald Reagan's casket while in Washington. Although neither entry placed in the top ten, both competed against more than 100 entries. There. Excellent scores were a great compliment to our schools and the dedication of our students.

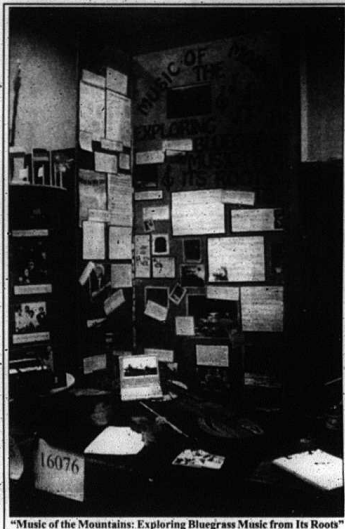

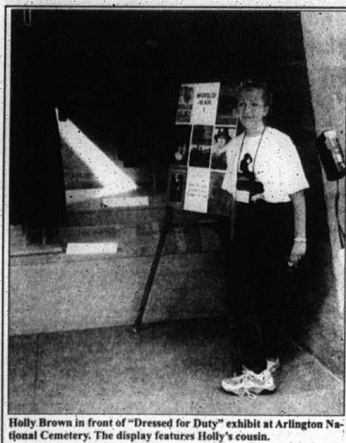

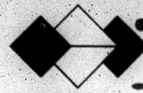

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Credit repair: A matter of time

Do not be taken in by promises promising to repair a bad credit report by erasing accurate negative information from your credit file. No one can legally remove accurate and timely negative information from your credit report. Only time and a deliberate plan to repay bills will improve your credit history.

Also be cautious about advertisements that seem to offer quick fixes. Although these ads may promise "debt relief," they rarely reveal that the relief is spelled "bankruptcy."

Some companies may encourage you to violate federal law by giving you instructions on how to develop a new credit identity by engaging in "file segregation." In "file segregation," the "credit repair companies" encourage you to replace your Social Security number by getting an Employee Identification Number or an Individual Tax Identification Number in violation of federal law.

Do yourself a favor and save some money, too; do not believe these types of ads. Credit repair companies cannot legally do anything more for you than you can do for yourself.

Accurate negative information may stay on a credit report for seven years, usually starting from the date the infraction took place. If you ever have filed Chapter Seven or Chapter 13 bankruptcy, this information will remain on your report for 10 years.

Although no one can legally remove accurate and timely information from your credit report, you can request a reinvestigation of information you dispute as inaccurate or incomplete.

Your first step toward improving your credit history is to develop a budget by preparing a realistic assessment of how much money you earn and the amount

you spend. List income from all sources; then write down fixed expenses, those that are the same every week or month, such as mortgage or rent, car payments and insurance; finally list expenses that vary such as entertainment. Listing all expenses, even those you consider insignificant, will help you track spending patterns, identify necessary expenses and prioritize those that are unnecessary.

If you have trouble paying bills, consider the following suggestions:

Talk to creditors about developing a modified plan to reduce payments to a more manageable level. Do not wait until your account has been turned over to a debt collector because at this point the creditors have given up on you.

Contact a credit counseling service about working with you and your creditors to develop a debt repayment plan. These plans require you to deposit money monthly with the counseling service that then pays your creditors. Many non-profit organizations charge little or nothing for credit counseling services.

Declaring bankruptcy should be your last resort because it has a long-term impact on your creditworthiness and can hinder your ability to get credit, a job, insurance and even a place to live. Bankruptcy has significant consequences and requires very careful consideration.
