Black Moles May Be Cancer

Presented by Dr. David Brabon
One of the warning signs of cancer is a change in
row, bleed or change color may indicate the more
erious kind of skin cancer called "black moles," or

serious kind of skin cancer called "flack moles," or melanomas. The more common skin cancers develop as a bump or an uleer, grow slowly and rarely spread, while these black melanomas spead very easily and are very resistant to treatment. In women, melanomias are most commonly fould on the legs and inmen on the head of neck-the areas of greatest sun exposure. Lieng-term sunexposure and sumburns are causative factors. Most melanomas actually begin in normal skin with only a quarter originating in moles. Their identification can be very difficult, so most inoles that are removed by your doctor are sent to a pathologist to check under the microscope. Usually melanomas are tarber dark compared to normal moles and they usually are irregular in shape. There may be variations in color, with red and light-colored areas with the blick background. They are usuallypainless and occur most commonly in middle-aged people.

the black background. They are usuallypainless and occur most commonly in middle-aged people. If a person has a mole that has changed or that is suspicious in appearance, the treatment is to remove it and examine it under the microscope. Early discovery of this cancer is extremely important since it is very difficult to treat once it has spread. Also, just because a black mole has not changed for a year or two does not always mean it is benign. Melanomas may remain in a "inactive" stage for years before spreading. There is no need to remove all moles to prevent the risk of skin cancer. Fortunately, ordinary moles rarely turn cancerous and just watening for changes in the mole's size, shape, color or bleeding, especially in the high-risk areas, is usualty enough.







Child Find for Children with Disabilities in Need of Special Education or 504 Services

The Rockcastle County School District keeps educational records in a secure location in each school and Board

The Rockeastle County School District obtains written consent from a parent or eligible student (age i8 or who is attending a postsecondary institution), before disclosing personally identifiable information to an entity of individual not authorized to receive it under FERFA.

For students who have been determined aligible for Special Education, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parents when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. The Rockeastle Courty School District may destroy the educational records of a child without parent request agram (2) years after they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may later be needed for Social Security benefits or other purposes. The Rockeastle County-School District may retain, for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance records, classes attended, grade level completed, and year completed.

Children eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have autism, deaf-blindness, developmental delay, emotional-behavior disability, hearing impairment, mental disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, or visual-impairment and who because of such an impairment need Special

Children eligible for 504 services include those children who have a current physical or mental impairment that currently substantially limits some major life activity which causes the student's ability to access the school environment or school activities to be substantially limited.

The Rockcastle County School District has an ongoing 'Child Find' system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (g) to twenty-ope (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education or 504 services. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly inoble such as children who are migrant or homeless; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education or 504 services.

The Rockcastle County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who qualifies for Special Education or 504 services, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided appropriate Special Education or 504 services at no cost to the partners of the child.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Rockeastle Cointy School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education or 500 services. The District needs to know the name and age, or date of brith of the thild; the name, address, and phone number(s) of the parents or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education or 504 services are needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Rockeastle County School Disgret collects the information needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out, if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education to 50s a services.

As part of these efforts the Rockcastle Co School District will use screening information, student records, and basic assessment information if collect all different in the District to help locate those children who have a disability and need Special Education or services. Any information the District collects through 'Child Find' is maintained confidentially.

Written Policies and Procedures have been developed which describe the District's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information and "Child Find" activities. Notification of FERPA Rights

Distribute this notice annually to parents and students.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and "eligible students" (students over 18 years of age or students who are attending a postsecondary institution) certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within forty-five (45) days of the day the District receives a request for access.

Parents or eligible students should submit to the school Principal/designee a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The Principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the record(s) may

The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the student's privacy or other rights.

Parents or eligible students may ask the District to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of privacy or other rights. They should write the school Principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is rate, misleading, or in violation of their privacy or other rights.

If the District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise himther of the right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure

One exception that permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A "school official" is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support ataff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel), a person-serving on the school Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to reprint a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, of therapist) (or la parent or student serving, on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing hisher tasks. official in performing his/her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his/her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the District shall disclose education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll or to other entities

4) The right to prohibit the disclosure of personally identifiable information concerning the student to recruiting representatives of the U.S. Armed Forces and its service academies, the Kentucky Air National Guard, and the Kentucky Army National Guard.

Unless the parent or eligible student requests in writing that the District not release information, the student's name, address, and telephone number (if listed) shall be released to Armed Forces recruiters upon their request.




