## School admits girl, her service dog

A seven-year-old girl was finally allowed into Mt. Vernon Elementary School Friday with her service dog, Mikki, after her doctor attested she needed the animal.

In a case that angered advocates for the disabled, Superintendent Larry Hammond prevented Cheyenne Gilliam from going to class Wednesday and Thursday with her dog, saying he was concerned about safety and liability issues such as other students being allergic to the dog or afraid of it.

Hammond said he would let the girl and her dog into school after Cheyenne's pediatrician sent him a letter confirming the girl's health condition and the medical need for the dog.

Cheyenne's doctor in Bowling Green faxed the letter Friday morning, and Hammond let Cheyenne and her dog into the school about 10:30 a.m., said her mother, Jennifer Gilliam.

"This should settle all of this," Gilliam said. "She's in school and will be every day from now on."

Gilliam said the short letter from Dr. Kelly Kries confirmed that she had treated Cheyenne and that the girl is on medication for a seizure disorder. Kries' letter said that, in her opinion, it was medically necessary for Cheyenne to have the dog with her.

The dog, a 35-pound Weimaraner, is trained to sense when Cheyenne is about to have a seizure and warn her by licking her hands so that she can lie or sit down. The dog then stays with Cheyenne to comfort and protect her during the episode.

There was one last bump Friday. Gilliam took Cheyenne and Mikki to school, as she had vowed to do every day until they were admitted, but Hammond hadn't gotten the letter yet and wouldn't allow the girl and her dog into class when school opened.

"What is wrong withme that they won't let me in here," asked Cheyenne, who was upset and crying, Gilliam said. Her parents assured her that the problem was not with her, but a lack of understanding about the dog, her mother said.

Later, Cheyenne was "ecstatic" about being allowed into class with her dog, her mother said.

"When they said she could go in,

she just smiled," Gilliam said.

Hammond said advocates for people with disabilities pelted him with critical messages. He said that he was not trying to hurt Cheyenne or her family, but that he has an obligation to make sure the school is safe for all students.

Robert Tierney, recognized by the U.S. Department of Justice as a specialist on accessibility issues for a wide range of clients, volunteered to help the Gilliams and went to school with them Friday morning to meet with Hammond.

Tierney, of Stanford, said the law is clear that people who use service animals are not required to show proof of their disability or need for the animal, or of the animal's training. It was "clearly out of bounds" to require such proof before allowing Cheyenne and Mikki into school, he said.

However, Tierney said, it is a good idea to provide such documentation, which the Gilliams were willing to do, in order to allay concerns.

Tierney said having Cheyenne in school with her dog will be a great example to other students. He also said he hoped the case will educate schools, businesses and others in the state about the law and use of service animals.

Mt. Vernon Elementary is the county's largest grade school with an enrollment of approximately 780 students.

## Protests against Lambert continue

The Somerset-based group that calls themselves "Concerned Citizens for a Better Family Court" took their protest of Family Court Judge Debra Lambert to Lincoln County last week.

With bright yellow picket signs, the protesters circled in front of, and sometimes blocked, the entrance to the Lincoln County courthouse in an attempt to garner support in their drive to remove Lambert from the bench.

The group's members accuse Lambert, of Mt. Vernon, of rude and abusive behavior, abusing her contempt power, communicating improperly with only one side to a proceeding, interfering with attorney-client relationship and filing or refusing to promptly dispose of judicial business.

Additionally, they accuse Lambert of traumatizing children through unnecessary removals from the home and placements in foster care.

Lambert, however, is not taking the accusations lying down, nor is she letting the drama created by the protesters affect her performance on the bench.

"I have worked hard and been totally fair with people who have come before me," said Lambert.

"A handful of disgruntled persons who have been disappointed with my

rulings have no right to overturn the result of an election.

"This is a democracy and a few extremists are misinformation if they believe I would ever consider resigning."

Lambert said she invites anyone to come and observe family court and talk with clerks, bailiffs, social workers and lawyers about the way she handles court.

Many of the group's members have appeared before Lambert in family court and had their children taken away from them, including the group's president, Carrie Schultz.

Schultz accuses Lambert of taking her kids away and placing them in foster care for two weeks because she was made at Schultz and her husband regarding their behavior over a custody arrangement.

She said it was then that Schultz decided to form "concerned citizens" with other people who felt as though they were wronged by Lambert's rulings regarding their children.

Schultz and other members said they made the decision to protest in Lincoln County after receiving calls from people in this area that were unhappy with Lambert's rulings.

The group has even gone so far as to file grievances with the state's Judicial Conduct Commission,

## Fiscal Court hears pitch for insurance for inmates

A representative of CorrectCare, Inc. of Lexington met with the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at their regular meeting Tuesday to explain their program for health insurance for prisoners lodged in the county jail.

The program provides heavily-discounted medical care for inmates who need treatment while lodged in the jail. The county still has to foot the bill but the bill is much less, according to Lois Goins, with CorrectCare.

State prisoners lodged in the jail are covered under the state's blanket policy at no cost to the county. However, to cover the county prisoners can be covered at a cost of \$13 per month per inmate on average.

Woodford and Grant counties are already using the program for their county prisoners, Ms. Goins said.

The court took no action on the program, which would cost the county an average of \$400 per

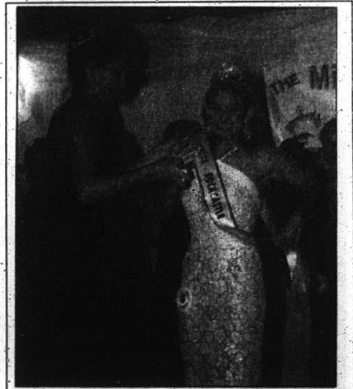
month, instead asking Jailer James Miller to provide information to CorrectCare on some of the previous expenses for medical treatment for inmates for a savings comparison.

Magistrate Billy McKinney expressed interest in the program if prescription drugs were covered, noting a bill for over \$900 from a local pharmacy in the July bills to be paid by the county. For prescription drugs, the savings is only about 15%, far less than for other treatments and tests, Goins said.

County Clerk Norma Houk was the bearer of some financial "bad news" for the court. Houk said that under the Help Americans Vote Act (HAVA), the county would have to upgrade all county precincts to comply with federal laws for handicapped voters.

Houk said parking facilities, push-button doors, wheelchair ramps and

# Points East

You've heard this sermon before but I feel a need to preach it again. Basically it's called "Sow and Ye Shall Reap," even if you plant in August.

Here are some tricks/suggestions for fall gardening that you might want to try if you like fresh vegetables, especially salad fixings, until way up in November.

Change is a hard thing to make happen among us gardeners. We plant peas in February. We sow lettuce and radishes as soon as the ground thaws. We can't wait to get started after months of frozen ground.

By the first of May we have beans and corn planted and we have set out every variety of every plant that will grow in the garden. We pride ourselves on having ripe tomatoes before the 4th of July. And by the end of July or the first week of August all our plants are dead or eaten.

We seldom think about a fall crop, maybe because we are tired of gardening or maybe because we believe it won't work. But I have news for you. A fall garden can be more pro-

ductive than anything you planted in the spring.

It's too late for sweet corn unless you want to take a chance on Earligro or another variety that comes in, in less than 70 days. Short little ears and very hardy unless we get a killing frost before mid-October. And so is the plant in the fall. But it's late to be sowing. Mine is already up.

On the other hand, you can have tomatoes' well past frost if you simply cut off suckers from your diving plants, dig planting holes in the garden, fill them with potting soil, put the suckers in and soak them with triple 20 Peter's Professional or Miracle Gro Grow-it exactly like the recommendation on the bag. You will need to water them daily for a week unless you live in Paint Lick where the rain will fall on a daily basis.

Go to your favorite Farmers Supply store and buy a roll of remax or whatever they recommend to cover tobacco beds and cover the plants on frost warnings. In the worst case you will have green tomatoes for frying.

...but just case you will have ripe tomatoes for Thanksgiving.

New is the time to plant some snow peas. But do it this week. Oregon Sugar Pod II can take a hard frost and still produce in abundance. Sugar Daddy's likewise. You won't get the spring harvest, but what you do will be extra crisp and extra sweet.

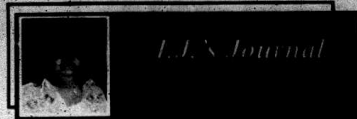
If you can find some Bluebell or Romall bean seed, they, too, will make excellent crops for you, even without the winter. Last year, even with an early killing frost, I had beans, galore until up in November. On several occasions, we have had fresh green beans out of the garden for Thanksgiving as well as tomatoes.

Cucumbers will still make it too, if you plant them to grow on the ground, but they have to be planted this week. And you have to have some cover for them no matter what is a frost warning.

On the other hand, lettuce, kale, mustard, spinach, radishes, will thrive and take a hard frost into early November. Turnips sown now, will be small, but obnoxious tender in November and produce an abundance of greens in March, next year. Ditto for Spinach. It's hard to find onion sets this time of year, but if you have onions in your pantry going bad, trot out to the garden and stick them in the ground. They will produce tender shoots and stay hardy till a killing frost. In fact, anytime an onion is going bad this winter, toss it in your garden and next spring it will be worth it's weight in gold.

If you can find some cabbage plants or cauliflower or broccoli, this week is the time to get them in the ground.

Bottom line is don't quit now. Gardening in the fall is easier than the spring. The veggies taste better and you don't have to fight the weeds. Try it and then tell me you don't like it.



The calendar says it's summer, but the air says it's fall. The temperatures have been perfect with those cool, low-humidity days and cooler, starchy nights. I love those "good-sleeping" nights. You can leave the window open to get a breeze across your bed instead of having to run the air-conditioner or fan. There are added benefits, too. You can hear all of the night creatures' voices such as frogs and various bugs. About sunrise, you can hear the birds begin to sing as they hunt for breakfast. City-dwellers just don't know what they're missing.

Another sure sign that fall is here is the beginning of school. School began in several local counties last week and the other counties will be opening soon. It will be the embarking of a scholastic career for those attending school for the first time and the closing of a chapter of other students' lives as they prepare for graduation in the spring.

It seems that school begins earlier each year. I remember that when I went to school, classes never started until almost the end of August. The weather was hot and sticky, and there wasn't any air-conditioning. The teacher opened the windows only to let in more hot air. In the winter, schools didn't close at the first snow flurry, either. I remember riding in an old rain-shackle bus that was at least twenty years old in all kinds of weather. It broke down about every other week.

The school system has changed

quite a bit since I attended school. The teachers felt free to discipline a child with a good old-fashioned spanking. It usually went a long way. The one receiving the spanking usually ally-ayed the rest of the way, and it put enough fear into the others to walk the straight and narrow. When the child went home that evening, their parents re-enforced this lesson with another spanking. The lack of discipline has not helped the children of America, and the following generations will have to pay the price. "Time out" just doesn't cut it. By today's standards, considering all the spankings the earlier generations got, it's a wonder that we're even alive.

Even the names of the grades have changed. Now there is what is known as a "middle school." One can only assume it is for the grades post-el-

ementary and pre-high school, therefore it's in the middle. I prefer the term junior-high, as in junior college. If middle school is correct by today's terminology, then can one assume that one might attend a "middle college"?

The kids in my generation didn't have to worry about the other kids laughing at each other because of the clothing being worn. We all wore Levi jeans, and what wasn't denim was polyester. You might see a pair of cotton clothing here and there. Shoes were a simple choice. It was black patent-leather for the younger girls, penny-loafers or saddle oxfords worn by the boys and the girls, and the converse high-tops for the jocks... the ones made of cloth... in black or white.

We didn't have to worry about being shot, or the teacher being gone down by insane students who have obviously been raised on "time outs." We weren't afraid to mention God's name in the Pledge of Allegiance, or to have a prayer before class, and the only drugs to be found was an aspirin or perhaps an antibiotic, if you were dealing with a case

## What Causes Ulcers?

Stress, coffee and spicy foods—that's what many people think cause ulcers. Stress certainly appears to play a role, but foods do not cause ulcers and even coffee is questionable. Spicy foods and coffee may make ulcers feel worse, but they are not likely to cause them.

A bacteria called *Helicobacter pylori* has been found to be an important factor in most persons with ulcers, and occasionally in persons with gastritis and other stomach symptoms. Studies have shown that killing this bacteria with antibiotics and antacid medicines will cure the ulcer most of the time.

A few other things are known to make ulcers worse. Cigarette smoking is one of these. Ulcers may be difficult to cure and are also very likely to return if a person keeps smoking. *Helicobacter pylori* infections have also been associated with smoking.

Arthritis medicines are a common cause of ulcers because they damage the protective lining of the stomach. Some people are more sensitive than others to ulceration from these medicines. Steroids are another type of medicine that will contribute to ulcers. In fact, any medicine that decreases inflammation tends to damage the protective defenses of the stomach.

If you have had ulcers once from these medicines, you must be very careful with using them again. Fortunately, there are now medicines that help protect the stomach if you must use these medicines. Physical stresses such as severe burns and serious or chronic illnesses are also common causes of ulcers and gastritis. Spring and fall, for some unknown reason, are also associated with an increase in ulcers.

## Disaster planning tips

Disasters can easily disrupt a home without advance preparation for these emergency situations. To protect your family, develop a disaster plan and collect supplies for a crisis.

You can learn about disaster preparedness by visiting the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture "Healthy Homes" exhibit during the Kentucky State Fair Aug. 19 through Aug. 29. The interactive display will be open from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. in the South Wing of the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center. Other exhibit topics will include physical activity, home safety, indoor air quality and energy efficiency.

When developing a disaster plan, keep it simple and be sure everyone in the household understands it. The plan should include two meeting places. One site should be near the home in case of a fire and the second place should be outside the neighborhood in case you cannot return home.

Also choose a friend or family member as an emergency contact in case members of the household are separated during a disaster. The contact should live away from your home's immediate area.

Post emergency telephone numbers in a prominent location.

Discuss places to go and escape routes if you must leave your home.

Practice using your escape routes. At least once a year, you should review insurance policies to ensure adequate coverage.

Teach family members when and how to turn off utilities at the main switches or valves. Assemble alternative heating sources in case you are without electricity or gas. Since you may be confined to your home, or forced to evacuate it, prepare a disaster supply kit. Store it in a convenient location in air-tight, easy-to-move containers. Go through the kit annually to replace and update the contents.

The kit should include at least a three-day supply of non-perishable foods that require no refrigeration and minimal preparation or cooking. Consider such items as ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables, canned juice, milk and soup; dried foods and instant meals; high-energy foods and "comfort" items. Rotate foods every six months.

Having an ample supply of safe, clean water is a top priority during any emergency. Thoroughly wash storage containers such as food-grade plastics, glass, fiberglass or enamel-lined metal. Store at least one gallon per person per day in a cool, dark place that is easily accessible. Tightly seal containers and label them including the date filled. Rotate the water supply every six months.

Also assemble necessary supplies and tools including paper cups, plates and utensils, a manual can opener and utility knife, matches in a waterproof container, personal hygiene items and soap, hand sanitizer and disinfectant. Other necessary items include cash and change, a battery-operated

radio and flashlights with extra batteries and pliers and tape. For a basic first-aid kit, assemble adhesive bandages, two- to four-inch gauze pads, hypoallergenic adhesive tape, prescription medicines, antiseptic, scissors, tweezers and band-aids.

Clothing and bedding should include a change of clothes, rain gear, hats and gloves, blankets or sleeping bags and sturdy shoes or boots for each person.

Remember special items including baby food, formula, bottles and diapers, prescription medicines, spare eyeglasses and contact lenses and supplies, and pet food, and medicine and care items.

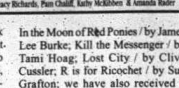
## Library News

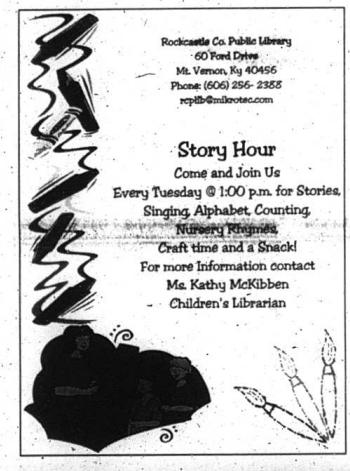

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## School's Open AAA and Mt. Vernon police challenge motorists to cut out distractions

Motor vehicle crashes pose the single greatest threat to the safety of children, ages 6 to 14 Children darting into the roadway resulted in 151 pedestrian collisions in Kentucky last year. Crashes resulting from driver inattention are on the rise in Kentucky, up 31% in 2003 from 2002. With accidents resulting from driver distraction on the rise, AAA Blue Grass/Kentucky and the Mt. Vernon Police Chief Terry Jackson challenge motorists to help school children stay safe by avoiding distractions while driving.

Driver inattention is a factor in more than one million crashes in North America annually. In Kentucky, last year, there were 65,442 crashes caused by inattention. An additional 3,942 crashes were caused by distracted drivers, an increase of 12.4%. Crashes caused by cell phone use increased by 42.3% in 2002.

By challenging drivers to reduce their driving distractions, AAA hopes to reduce the number of children killed and injured in the roadway. Distractions cause drivers to react more slowly to traffic conditions or events. A task as simple as manipulating the climate controls can take up to four and eight-tenths of a second, in which a car traveling 30 mph will have traveled roughly 211 feet. A few extra seconds to react can help

to avoid a crash.

People spend an average of one hour and 15 minutes in their vehicles every day. Performing other tasks such as eating or catching up on phone conversations can be tempting. However, throwing one more task in while driving takes eyes off of the road.

In a recent AAA study, researchers used in-car video cameras to see how 70 drivers behaved when they were behind the wheel of their own cars. All of the drivers were distracted at some point, 90% by something outside the car and 100% by something inside the car. Approximately one-third of subjects used a cell phone while driving and 40% engaged in reading or writing.

"Drivers need to be prepared for school kids to be added to the traffic mix," said Lilla S. Mason, Director of the Blue Grass Auto Club Safety Foundation. "Some kids will be in traffic for the very first time and don't understand traffic rules. It only takes one child darting out in front of you to create a tragedy."

AAA asks motorists to think about the types of distracting activities they engage in while driving and make a pledge against doing tasks that take their attention away from the road.

AAA offers the following tips to

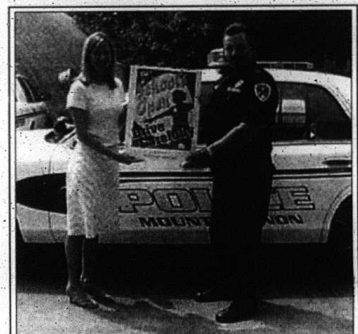
help drivers cut back on their distractions:

- Avoid talking on the phone while driving.
- Pre-set radio stations and climate control.
- Avoid smoking, eating, drinking and reading while driving.
- Do your personal grooming at home - not in the car.
- Ask a passenger to help you in activities that may be distracting.
- Pull over to care for children.

Men are also victims of domestic violence. Some wives and girlfriends are abusive to their partners. Rick (a fictitious character) is one of those men. Rick was hospitalized for depression after a suicide attempt. When his counselor asked him about his marriage, Rick was hesitant to talk about it.

"I guess we do OK," Rick said. "We have our fights just like any other couple, but I still love her."

"Tell me about the fights, Rick," his counselor asked. "She has quite a temper," Rick replied. "When I'm the mad, she just goes off and I can't get her to stop."

"What does she do when she goes off?" the counselor inquired. "She hollers and screams and she picks up stuff and throws it," Rick explained. "Sometimes she throws it at me and sometimes at the wall. Her aim is not really good but she has left bruises on me a couple of times."

"Has she ever hit you?" his counselor wanted to know. Rick was quiet for a while. "I wouldn't call it hitting exactly," Rick answered. "It's more like slapping. She also kicks a lot. Usually I just take it, but occasionally I try to stop her by grabbing her and holding her down. That only makes it worse."

"Why do you put up with being abused?" the counselor inquired.

"I hadn't thought of it as abuse," Rick said. "I know she is sick and I know she has had a hard life, so I give her the benefit of the doubt. I figure our kids need both parents so I will stick it out as long as I can."

Rick is unusual for a male victim of abuse in that he talked about the abuse with someone. Most male victims are very reluctant to admit that a female is abusive to them. It does not sound "manly," so they usually suffer in silence. By some estimates a man is the victim of domestic violence 5% of the time. In 95% of the cases the woman is the victim.

(The following story is true, but the names have been changed.) Joe and Lola went to the counselor for help with their marriage. At the be-

ginning of their first session, Lola asked Joe, "Are you going to tell him?" Joe said, "You tell him."

It finally fell to Joe to tell the story. "She shot me," he told the counselor. In a fit of rage Lola had grabbed a pistol that they kept in the closet and shot him in the stomach. Her rage quickly disappeared and she called for help. The ambulance rushed Joe to the hospital where he was treated for his wound. He told the doctor that he had been cleaning his pistol when it accidentally discharged.

This incident happened several years before they decided to get counseling. While there had been no further shooting incidents, Lola's anger had continued. She would go into a fit of rage for no reason at all, and Joe would bear the brunt of her attacks. This was the first time he had ever told anyone the true story about the shooting.

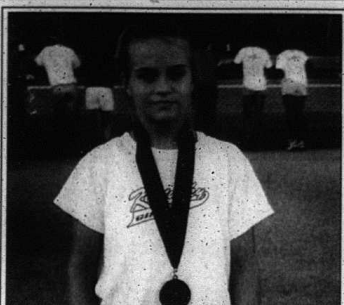

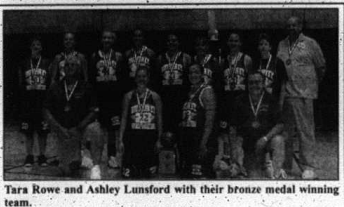

In the quarterfinals, the girls beat Indiana Mofu Magic 89 to 78 and then lost their first game of the tournament, in semi-final action, 80 to 78

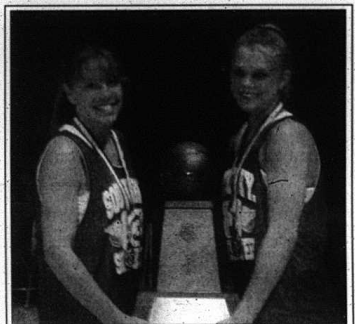
in overtime to the Southwest Texas Express.

# Gordon wins Brickyard

Jeff Gordon dominated Sunday's Brickyard 400, as he led 122 of 161 laps to get his fourth career Brickyard victory, and the fifth win of the season.

Only three other drivers--A.J. Foyt, Rick Mears and Al Unser Sr.--have won four Indianapolis 500s at this memorable facility. Gordon has now won its stock-car race four times in 11 years.

Gordon, who spent his teenage years racing in the Midwest while living in nearby Pittsboro, Ind., won the inaugural Brickyard 400 in 1994 and had won it again in 1998 and 2001. Even though Gordon clearly had the dominant car, he had a scare on lap 142 when he hit a piece of debris on the track. It knocked a hole in the fender of his No. 24 Dupont Chevrolet, but did even more damage to Matt Kenseth's Ford, which had been running behind in second.

"I thought it was all over. I thought we were done," Gordon said later. Gordon was leading when the race's last caution came out on lap 155 after Ryan Newman and Brian Vickers got together, and Newman went up against the outside wall. The finish was to be NASCAR's first green/white/checkered finish. The green flag was given on lap 159. As soon as the white flag was displayed, meaning one lap left, there was another accident.

NASCAR put out the yellow flag again, freezing the field. "I can't even describe the emotions going on now," said Gordon. "This is such a big, big win. It feels so incredible, especially the way the car was during practice. The entire team has done an incredible job."

"I don't get cheered very often, and to hear the support of these fans is wonderful."

Dale Jarrett, winner of two Brickyard 400s was able to hold his teammate, Elliott Sadler off to finish second.

"You always want to win, but Jeff had the best car," said Jarrett. Elliott Sadler, Casey Kahne, and Tony Stewart rounded out the top-five.

Outside polesitter Ward Burton's day ended on lap 73 when he was involved in an eight-car accident.

Point's leader Jimmie Johnson lost an engine in his No. 48 Lowe's Chevrolet and now leads teammate Jeff Gordon by only 97 points. Dale Earnhardt Jr. was caught up in a last-lap accident and finished 27th.

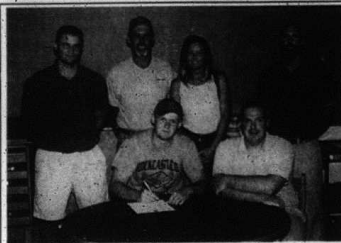

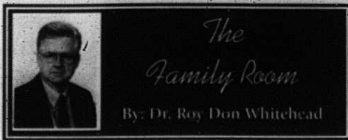

## The Family Room

Happiness is a warm puppy, the saying goes, but what if you have no dog? Can you still be happy? And what makes people happy? Why are some happier than others?

"Money can't buy happiness. That old saying was given some new currency recently in a study by two economists, one from Dartmouth College and one from University of Warwick in England. They found that having more money did not make people nearly as happy as having more sex did.

According to these two researchers, increasing sexual activity from once a month to once a week brings the same amount of happiness as getting an additional \$50,000 a year in income. (Their conclusions come from analyzing data from 16,000 people.) A happy, lasting marriage causes the same amount of happiness as an extra \$100,000 per year in income.

A study by Dr. Ronnie Janoff-Bulman compared the well-being of lottery winners to accident victims who were paralyzed. After the initial euphoria wore off, the lottery winners were no happier than the accident victims.

Money really does not buy hap-

pinest! Sadness seems to be a common occurrence. According to a government survey whose results were released recently, Americans report spending an average of three days per month feeling "sad, blue or depressed." The more days of sadness people reported, the more likely they were to engage in risky behavior such as drinking too much or not wearing seatbelts. Other risky behaviors include having unprotected sex with strangers and driving too fast.

Persons who are depressed are more likely to turn to their addictions in order to feel better. The thrill of risk taking, whether drinking too much, gambling all the paycheck or having an affair, provides short term relief from the depression. The high that risky behavior brings is very attractive.

In his book *What Happy People Know*, Dan Baker tells the story of his own climb out of despair. When his infant son died of a lung disorder, Dan went to the depths of depression. After a lengthy healing process he found happiness again.

"Happy people are hugely resilient on the whole," he writes. "One thing happy people know is that they don't get to be happy all the time. They can appreciate the moments, the little victories, the small miracles and the relationships with one another."

Dr. David Myers says that we are genetically programmed for a certain range of happiness.

"It's rather like our cholesterol level genetically influenced, yet also influenced by our habits and attitudes."

While you may never be as happy as the neighbor who inherited more "happiness genes," you can add to your happiness by using certain strategies.

1. Nurture relationships. It is still true that the most lasting happiness comes from relationships with others. Keeping those in good shape makes for a better chance of happiness.

2. Get physical. Movement (including exercise and sex) is an antidote for depression.

which, to date, has found no evidence of wrongdoing on the part of Lambert. Members of the group say no action was taken against Lambert because of her husband's position as Chief Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court.

Lambert responded to this by saying it was ridiculous to attack her because of her long-term marriage or to play to the media because of her husband's position.

"Joe and I have been married for 21 years, before either of us were judges. The Judicial Conduct Committee is entirely independent. It is created by our state constitution and the Chief Justice does not, and cannot, influence its action."

Lambert added that she has not violated any rules or procedures and

videotapes are maintained of all proceedings.

"When those tapes are reviewed, the complaints are found to be false," Lambert said.

The group also has accused Lambert of infringing upon their civil rights by attending meetings (open to the public) and harassing attendees.

Lambert said she attended the first meeting because she believed they were sincere in their desire to improve court procedures but found she was subjected to bitter and false attacks.

A social worker, who did not want to be identified but appears in Lambert's court regularly, said the "protesters are simply unhappy with the way their cases turned out and their protest is nothing more than a classic example of sour grapes."

"I've seen her work firsthand and she is leaps and bounds above the rest," he said. "She cares - she focuses on both victims and perpetrators - and requires them to get help in order to break the cycle of abuse."

In spite of all the turmoil surrounding her, Lambert said she is proud of the work she is doing and realizes that sometimes you have to endure through bad times as well as enjoy the good.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said Wednesday that he thought Judge Lambert was a very fair judge. "I have been before Judge Lambert and have the upmost respect for her and the way she conducts her court," he said.

Betty Russell and Joe Mullins all filed, along with Shelley Ranes Lewis and former member, Lonetta Renner. However, incumbent Lonetta Daugherty did not file but has indicated that she will file as a write-in candidate. Anyone wishing to file as a write-in candidate has until October 22nd.

In Broadhead, incumbents Everett Albright, Johnny Wilcox and Larry Taylor all filed, along with newcomers Rick D. Branham and Jeff King. There are four seats on the council.

In Livingston, incumbent council members, Todd Mink, Kathi Carpenter, Charlie Newcomb and Ed McHargue filed along with Bobby Prosper and Bobby Lewis Phelps.

Somerset attorneys Bruce W. Singleton and former assistant Commonwealth Attorney David Tapp will face off for the office of District Judge, left vacant by the retirement of Walter Maguire.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Jeffrey T. Burdette, will run unopposed.

Burdette was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Circuit Judge William T. Cain. He will face Somerset attorney Scott Lawless in the General Election. Whoever wins will serve until 2006 when all district, circuit and county races will be held.

Burdette was Rockcastle County Attorney for ten years and was unopposed in his last two elections.

Other races on the ballot include that for President between incumbent Republican George W. Bush and Democrat John Kerry and a challenge by Democrat State Senator Daniel Monjardo of Hazard to incumbent Republican Jim Bunning of Northern Kentucky Jim Bunning in the U.S. Senate race.

U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers of Somerset is unopposed for his 11th term in the house in the fifth district.

Four candidates, Roy Reynolds, Joe C. Bullen, Jack B. Dailey and Jack D. Martin have filed for the four seats on the Soil Conservation Board.

United States Attorney's Office/EBON for the Western District of Kentucky where he assisted in the investigation, prosecution and related forfeiture actions in numerous federal drug, pornography, gambling and health care crimes. "Before relocating back to Kentucky, I worked as a criminal investigator with the Organized Crime Strike Force in Honolulu, which was part of the prosecutor's office," Tapp stated.

"But even prior to that, I was working within the justice system. I started out as a Deputy Sheriff in eastern Kentucky and also worked as a pre-trial release officer. My entire professional life has been devoted to public service. I believe in our system of justice. People sometimes criticize particular cases, but compared to any other system in the world, this system works! Even when those rare mistakes do occur, we fix them—and we're always trying to improve the system. That's why I want to remain involved."

In addition to his work experience, Tapp has also channeled his education toward the justice system, graduating from Morehead State University and obtaining a Master's Degree in Criminal Justice in 1990 from Chamblaine University. Three years later, Tapp received his law degree from the University of Kentucky.

Tapp and his wife, Patty, have three children. Their oldest, Beth, attends Morehead State University. Both Adrian and Morgan attend Southern Middle School. Tapp, an avid outdoorsman, is also active in the community. Most recently, he served on the Governor's domestic

violence litigation council. He has also been active in community drug abuse awareness programs and has taught law enforcement classes at Somerset Community College.

voting machines equipped for braille and with headphones and other special equipment would all have to be in place by January 1, 2006.

In addition to the expense to upgrade facilities, Housk said the special voting machines would cost a minimum of \$4,000 each and about ten would have to be purchased if four of the county's fourteen precincts were housed at Mt. Vernon Elementary. She said the Conway and Roundstone precincts might be housed together, saving another special voting machine.

There is some federal money to put HAVA into effect, Housk told the court. The money will be given to the states and then the state will dole it out to the counties. "How much would trickle down to Rockcastle County isn't known," Housk said. The court also declined to take the 4% increase in the tax rate for the 2004-05 tax bills. Taking the 4% increase would have garnered a little over \$5,000 in additional revenue for the county. This year's tax rate is 7.3¢ per \$100 valuation of real property. With the 4% increase, the rate would have been 7.5.

In other action, the county approved a KACO lease for the Rockcastle Ambulance Service for the purchase of a new ambulance in the amount of \$50,000.

Approved a contribution of \$150 for expenses for Bucks and Beards Day and Fish Fry on August 14th at Lake Linville Boat Dock and

Approved the transfer of \$10,000 from General Fund to the Fairgrounds account to pay for the new building which was built this year to house the Farmers Market and events such as this year's Miss Rockcastle County Beauty Pageant. \$12,000 of the approximate \$21,000 cost will be reimbursed from the tobacco settlement.

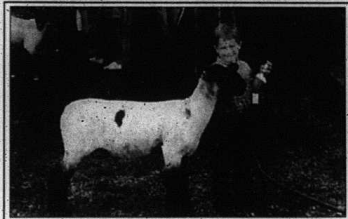

**It's time for Canning!**  
 Submitted by: *Zayda Flannery*  
 This year has been the most exciting year for me waiting for tomatoes to ripen! I came across this recipe for preparing safe home-canned foods. It is adapted from the USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning. It sounds good to me and worth a try!

**Spaghetti Sauce Without Meat**  
 30 pounds tomatoes  
 1 cup chopped onions  
 5 cloves garlic, minced  
 1 cup chopped celery or green pepper  
 1 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced (optional)  
 cup vegetable oil  
 2 tablespoons salt  
 2 tablespoons oregano  
 4 tablespoons minced parsley  
 2 teaspoons black pepper  
 cup brown sugar

**YIELD:** About 9 pints  
**Caution:** Do not increase the proportion of onions, peppers, or mushrooms.  
**Procedure:**  
 Wash tomatoes. Dip in boiling water for 30 to 60 seconds or until skins split, dip in cold water. Slip off skins, remove cores, and quarter. Boil 20 minutes, uncovered, in large saucepan. Put through food mill or sieve. Sauté onions, garlic, celery or green pepper, and mushrooms in vegetable oil until tender. Combine sautéed vegetables and tomatoes; add salt, spices, and sugar. Bring to a boil. Simmer, uncovered, until thick enough for serving. At this time the initial volume will have been reduced by nearly one-half. Stir frequently to avoid burning. Fill jars, leaving 1 inch of headspace. Adjust lids and

process.
