Fiscal Court hears pitch for insurance for inmates

A representative of CorrectCare, Inc. of Lexington met with the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at their regu-lar meeting Tuesday to explain their program for health insurance for pris-

program for health insurance for par-oners lodged in the county jail. The program provides heavily-discounted medical care for immates

discounted medical care for immates who need treatment while lodged in the jail. The county still has to foot the hill but the bill is much less, escording to Lois Goins, with CorrectCare.

State prisoners lodged in the jail are covered under the state's blanket policy at no cost to the county. However, to cover the county prisoners can be covered at a cost of \$13 per month, per immate on a verage. Woodford and Grant counties are all-ready using the program for the

ready using the program for their county prisoners, Ms. Goins said. The court took no action on the program, which would cost the county an average of \$400 per

month, instead asking Jailer James Miller to provide information to CorrectCare on some of the previous expenses for medical treatment for immates for a savings comparison.⁷ Magistrate Billy McKinmey ex-pressed interest in the program if pre-

pressed interest in the program if pre-scription drugs were covered, noting a bill for over \$900 from a local plat-macy in the July bills to be paid by the court. For prescription drugs, the savings is only about 15% far less stain for other treatments and tests, Goins said. County Clerk Norma Houk was the bearer of some financial "bad news" for the court. Houk said that under the Help Americans Vote Act (HAVA), the county would have to upgrade all county precincts to com-

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

AAA and Mt. Vernon police challenge motorists to cut out distractions

Motor vehicle crashes pose the single greatest threat to the safety of children, ages 6 to 14 Children darting into the roadway resulted in 151 people of the control of th mm tollisions in Kennacky last year. Crashes resulting from driver intention are on the rise in Ken-tacky, up 31% in 2003 from 2002. With accidents resulting from driver distraction on the rise resulting from driver Crass Kennacky and the M. Vernon, Police Chief Terry Jackson challenge motorists to help achool children stay safe by avoiding distractions while driving.

Driver inattention is a factor in more than one million crashes in North America annually. In Kentucky, last year, there were 65,442 crashes caused by inattention. An additional 3,942 crashes were caused drivers an increase of

subditional 3,942 crathes were caused by distincted drivers, an increase of 12,4%. Crathes caused by cell phone use increased by 42,3% from 2002.

By challenging drivers to reduce their driving distinctions, AAA hopes to; reduce the number of children killed and injured in the roadway. Distractions cause drivers to react more slowly to traffic conditions or events. A task as simple as manipulating the climate controls can take up to four and eight-tenth of a seed and the control of the control of

road.

In a recent AAA study, researchers used in-car video cameras to see how 70-drivers behaved when they were behind the wheel of their own cars. All of the drivers were distracted at some point, 90% by something outside the car and 100% by something inside the car, Amprovinstative



By some estimates a man is the victim of domestic vic-ence 5% of the time. In 95% of the cases the woman is the victim. (The following story is true, but the names have been changed.) Joe and Lola went to the counselor for help with their marriage. At the be-

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gining of their-first session, Lola asked loe; "Are you going to tell him?" Joe said, "You tell him?". It finally fell to Joe to tell the story. "She shot me, "he told the counselor. In a fit of rage Lola had grabbed a pistol that they kept in the closet and shot him in the stomach. Her rage quickly disappeared and she called for help. The ambulance rushed Joe to the hospital where he was treated for his wound. He told the doctor that he had been cleaning his pistol when it accidentally discharged.

While there had been no further shooting incidents, Lola's anger had continued. She would go into a fit of rage for no reason at all, and Joe would bear the brunt of her attacks. This was the first time be had ever told anyone the true story about the shooting.

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




