Drug Money \$57,000 received by Sheriff

Since January of this year, the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department, in cooperation with the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration, has seized over \$57,000 in drug pro-

ceeds.
These seizures were a direct re-sult of drug investigations conducted in Rockscattle county and surround-ing area. Most of the investigations involved Deputy Barry Adams with the Rockscattle SheritT Department, who is also assigned as a Task Force of the County of the The DEA London office covers 23 counties in South and Southeast-ern Kentucky.

Since coming to the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department in July 2003, Adams has been pivotal in many for-feited drug proceeds, according to Rockcastle county Sheriff Darrell Doop.

The forfeited proceeds can be used by the Sheriff's Department for equipment purchases.

Doan said, "Forfeited drug proceeds allow us to buy equipment, including partly whiches and offsets and repays eligible costs that do not have to be picked up by Rockcastle County Citizens."

Doan said he expects an even bet-ter year in 2004 for seized assets.

Children suffer from second hand smoke in other ways, the most common one being infections. Children in homes where there is a smoker develop more infections of the cars, lungs, and smuses than children in non-smoking households, especially if the mother or primary care giver smokes. The children also have more trouble with wheezing and cough, ing. Smoke can even sum the growth of a child's lungs, prevening his fall potential for sports and vigorous activities and affecting academic

full potential for sports and vigorous activities and aircuiting academic performance.

Here are two theories why second hand smoke is so bad. First, the smoke which comes off the burning end of a cigarette has a higher concentration of the chemicals which cause cancers and heard disease than the smoke inhaled through the cigarette. Second, this smoke is composed of very small particles that are able to penetrate deeper into the lungs and thus take longer to clear out of the lungs.

The annoyance caused by second hand smoke is only one of the reasons why you should avoid it. The other reason is for your own health and the health of your loved ones.

Brad Durham, Billy Hines, and Donovan Pigg and freshman Scott Daughtery could play any position on the line at any point in the year, according to Larkey.

On the defensive side of the ball the Rockets should display some team speed mixed with some raw inexperience.

Five starters return from a 2003 defense that lost first team all-state defensive tackle Jason Leger.

Senior Graham Fay will take over Leger's anchor responsibilities.

"You can't replace a high school football player the magnitude of Jason Leger. But there is no doubt that Fay has the ability and the experience to get the job done at a high level," said Adam Coleman, the Rocket's second year defensive coordinator.
