Drug Money \$57,000 received by Sheriff

Since January of this year, the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department, in cooperation with the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration, has seized over \$57,000 in drug proceeds.

These seizures were a direct result of drug investigations conducted in Rockcastle county and surrounding area. Most of the investigations involved Deputy Dairy Adams with the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department, who is also assigned as a Task Force Officer with the DEA, out of its office in London.

The DEA-London office covers 23 counties in South and Southern, Eastern Kentucky.

Since coming to the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department in July 2003, Adams has been pivotal in many forfeited drug proceeds, according to Rockcastle county Sheriff Darrell Doan.

The forfeited proceeds can be used by the Sheriff's Department for equipment purchases.

Doan said, "Forfeited drug proceeds allow us to buy equipment, including patrol vehicles and offsets and repays eligible costs that do not have to be picked up by Rockcastle County Citizens."

Doan said he expects an even better year in 2004 for seized assets.

Judge Henry looking to move forward

Judge District Judge Michael L. Henry of the 28th Judicial, which includes Pulaski and Rockcastle, announced his candidacy last Wednesday for Judge of the Third Appellate District, Kentucky Court of Appeals. He is running for the seat vacated by the retirement June 2, 2004 of Judge Tom Emberton of Edmonson.

Judge Henry served as law clerk to the late Justice J. Calvin Aker at the Kentucky Supreme Court after his graduation from law school in 1980 and later worked as a staff attorney for the Kentucky Court of Appeals. He served as Assistant Commonwealth Attorney for the 28th Judicial District for a total of six years. Prior to his appointment as District Judge in 1992, he practiced law in the Somerset firm of Ham and Henry. Since his appointment, he has been elected three times without opposition.

Henry and his wife, Julie, live in Somerset with their two children, Lauren, a sophomore at the University of Kentucky and Christopher, a freshman at Somerset High School.

From Federal PRIDE Program Rockcastle to receive \$75,000

Rockcastle County cleanup efforts received a boost today. Eastern Kentucky PRIDE announced that the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and the City of Mt. Vernon were awarded 2004 PRIDE Community Grants totaling \$75,000.

The fiscal court received a grant for \$50,000 to clean up 12 illegal dumps. Mt. Vernon will use its \$25,000 grant to dispose of trash collected during community cleanup events this fall and next spring, and conduct a white-goods buy-back program.

Also benefiting the Rockcastle County area, the Kentucky River Watershed Watch program received a grant for \$6,500 to equip volunteers to collect water samples and then pay a lab to analyze the samples. Somerset Community College received \$21,799 for water-sampling equipment for volunteers and analy-

sis of water samples through the Upper Cumberland River Watershed Watch program.

Looking for "pot"

According to authorities, the chopper was hunting for marijuana and some very talented offenders were actually hanging from the chopper to photograph the pot patches.

All county schools make the grade

All Rockcastle County Schools received a passing grade from the state, according to Rebecca Isaacs, Assessment Coordinator for the Rockcastle County School System.

Mrs. Isaacs told members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education last week that all schools in the district had met all targets set by the federal regulations of the bill, "No Child Left Behind", which was enacted in 2001.

"These preliminary reports are based on the results of the multiple choice items and only from the Reading/Math portions of the Kentucky

Core Content Test (KCCT) that was given in April and from Accountability Index shown on the 2003 CATS, Commonwealth Accountability Testing System, report.

At Broadhead Elementary School, where 127 fourth and fifth graders were assessed, the students met ten of ten goals set.

At Mount Vernon Elementary, all twelve goals were met by the 213 fourth and fifth graders.

At Roundstone Elementary the nine of nine target goals were met. 90 fourth and fifth graders were

After state school board ruling

Dog now allowed on school buses

A Rockcastle County school girl who uses a dog trained to handle her epileptic seizures may now take the animal onto the school bus.

The Kentucky Board of Education granted a waiver Friday from a state regulation that prohibits live animals on school buses.

The waiver was requested by Rockcastle County schools Superintendent Larry Hammond, who made

headlines by initially barring Cheyenne Gilliam's service dog from Mount Vernon Elementary School.

Cheyenne is epileptic. Mikki, her 55-pound Weimaraner, is trained to sense the onset of an epileptic seizure.

Hammond allowed the dog inside the school after getting a physician's assurance that Mikki's presence was a medical necessity for the girl.

In granting the waiver, the state board said Hammond should consider placing a monitor on the bus, which is already the case.

School system transportation director David Perkins said Wednesday that he did not think that Cheyenne or Mikki (the dog), had ridden the bus as of this week, but everything is in place whenever she and Mikki need a ride.

There is another group: those who can get minimal service that is covered under a Medicaid medical card, and they are quite often discharged from the hospital before they are well, along with those on Medicare. The remainder is the unfortunate middle class who are sitting around with little if any medical coverage, undiagnosed health conditions, pre-existing medical conditions that have to be left untreated, and their teeth literally rotting out simply because they can't afford substantial medical treatment, even with copay insurance. When will medical costs ever come down?

I don't go to the doctor very often because I figure it's just a waste of my time and the doctor's time as well.

I may be able to pay the office visit, but with the rising prescription costs, going to the doctor is basically a useless venture. Once I went to the doctor, about three years ago, to pick up some medicine the doctor had called in for my mother. The pharmacist didn't bat an eye when he told me the price was three hundred and ninety seven dollars, and forty-five cents. What kind of income would people have to make in order to afford this kind of expense? If I show up at the hospital or doctor's office, you can only assume the next step will be the funeral home.

If you're very sick, it takes quite an effort to get ready to go to the doctor's office, this making you much worse than you were had you stayed at home. Then, if you finally get there, you can usually look forward to a lengthy wait. I've waited so long on a few occasions, that I almost forgot why I went. (Did you ever hear the one about the pregnant woman who went to the doctor's office, and finally got to see the doctor, just in time for the baby's kindergarten physical?)

About two weeks ago, the national news reported a story of an elderly man in a major city who had gone to the emergency room, and was dying in the waiting room. He had decided to be dead about twelve hours later. The hospital staff assumed that

Avoid Second Hand Smoke

Studies have proven the health risk from smoking but there is a growing amount of evidence that non-smokers also suffer from other people's smoke. Experts estimate that many people die each year from illnesses caused by second hand smoke.

These experts state that many people suffer and die from emphysema, lung and other cancers, but the majority die from heart disease. The same chemicals that contribute to heart disease in smokers are inhaled by non-smokers. Lung problems such as asthma and emphysema are also made worse by second hand smoke.

Children suffer from second hand smoke in other ways, the most common one being infections. Children in homes where there is a smoker develop more infections of the ears, lungs, and sinuses than children in non-smoking households, especially if the mother or primary care giver smokes. The children also have more trouble with wheezing and coughing. Smoke can even stunt the growth of a child's lungs, preventing his full potential for sports and vigorous activities and affecting academic performance.

Here are two theories why second hand smoke is so bad. First, the smoke which comes off the burning end of a cigarette has a higher concentration of the chemicals which cause cancer and heart disease than the smoke inhaled through the cigarette. Second, this smoke is composed of very small particles that are able to penetrate deeper into the lungs and take longer to clear out of the lungs.

The annoyance caused by second hand smoke is only one of the reasons why you should avoid it. The other reason is for your own health and the health of your loved ones.

[It's God's will that we abstain from fornication. This term fornication refers to immorality in general. We in particular wish to address, the premarital sexual relationship that folks get involved in. It's rather astounding the percentage of high school age children that are sexually active in fornication. There is also a surprising number of people that just "black out" and "live together" in fornication. Yet, it still is a sin no matter how many do it! God will condemn to hell everyone who fails to repent of this wickedness, and find his forgiveness. Step-by-step, the small machine guides you through the process of taking your temperature, blood pressure, pulse, oxygen saturation levels and weight, all in the privacy and comfort of your home. Then, you respond with the touch of a button to "yes or no" questions about the ease or difficulty of breathing, heart palpitations or chest pain, swelling and other questions designed specifically for your condition. With the push of another button, all the information is transmitted to Rockcastle Hospital's Home Health office. There, a nurse sweeps you through questions to determine if a home visit or visit to your physician is needed.

Sound like a fantasy? Well, it's not. Rockcastle Hospital's Home Health now offers this service to its patients at no charge. All that's required is a phone jack.

Patients receive the device based on medical need, and can complete the vital sign check in about three minutes each day.

"Each person will be evaluated to determine if his or her condition is a good fit for participating in the telemonitor program," Courtney Sumner, Home Health director, said. "The machines are very simple to use, and we will train people thor-

oughly on the process. The machine really does all the work for you."

The new system offers many benefits to patients and caregivers. By tracking vital signs at the same time every day, health care providers will have a complete and valid picture of a patient's condition. This daily monitoring helps eliminate the two to three-day gap in information that could occur between scheduled home visits.

Further, patients become more aware of their conditions and understand the effects diet, activity and other factors have on their health.

An added bonus to having the system in the home is that the machine automatically notifies the Home Health office if an alarm buzzes three times and a patient does not respond, allowing nurses to immediately check on him or her.

"Having regular contact with our patients is important," Sumner said. "We get to know them very well, and in some cases, become another member of their family. This system will allow us to know more about them and their health care needs with fewer intrusions."

One important aspect of the system is the graphing of data collected over time that can be used by physicians to help diagnose or monitor patient conditions.

"The new telemonitoring system is a wonderful addition to our Home Health service," Dr. Michael Hamilton, said. "This device will help the medical staff provide safer and more complete care in the comfort of the patient's home. It has its greatest utility for those chronically ill and disabled patients who have difficulty coming to the office, and in turn, should save health care dollars by eliminating ambulance and other transportation costs."

GED provides a second chance for students

High school students weren't the only ones donning caps and gowns in Rockcastle County this year. In a graduation ceremony held on June 8, 2004, the Christian Appalachian Project honored the achievements of 46 adults who took advantage of a "second chance" to earn their high school diploma.

The evening festivities began with music by the local group "Never on Time." Bobbie Playforth, Manager of the Adult Learning Center, welcomed graduates, families and friends to the ceremony.

Liville Rose, Assistant Director with the Christian Appalachian Project, provided the graduate address. He praised the group for the sacrifice and determination they demonstrated in pursuing their goals while juggling jobs, families and other obligations.

Student speakers shared how earning a GED has given them a chance to undo past mistakes. "We went back and took care of unfinished business," stated Linda Anderson, who dropped out of school 16 years ago. "The feeling of accomplishment is overwhelming."

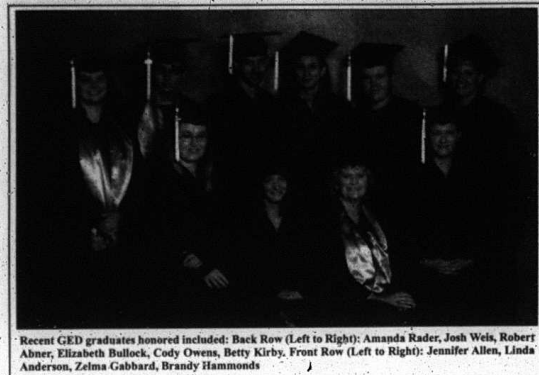
Betty Kirby, another of this year's graduates added that "a lot of people don't think earning a GED is a big deal. But when you go through hard times in your life, and things don't work out the way you wish, and then you get a second chance, it IS a big deal."

To earn their General Equivalency Diploma (GED), students must pass five tests that measure the essential academic skills and concepts of a traditional high school education. Tests

cover the core curriculum areas of writing, social studies, science, literature and the arts, and mathematics. The tests also measure an adult's ability to understand and apply information, evaluate, analyze, draw conclusions, solve problems, and express ideas and opinions in writing. Two special awards were presented during the ceremony - Josh Weis, for scoring 800 points (a perfect score) on the Social Studies area of the test, and Amanda Rader for the 2nd highest overall score on the test (822 points).

Casey Sterr, Vice President of the Christian Appalachian Project, ended the evening with a challenge to each graduate. "Each of you committed to and achieved the goals you set for yourselves. Understand where you want to go from here. Look for chances and opportunities and take advantage of them. Many doors are open to you now. Enter those doors prayerfully."

"We must stop exporting our young talent," is often heard from

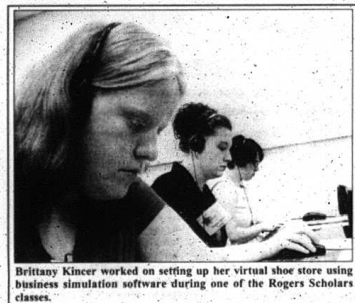

"We want to help the young people of our region develop confidence, skills and a deeper commitment to their hometowns and this

state," says Lonnie Lawson, president & CEO of The Center.

Rogers Scholars isn't about the ordinary - the Scholars themselves are extraordinary achievers in their schools and communities. So it's no surprise that the week-long program uses out-of-the-ordinary activities to teach leadership, teamwork, communication, entrepreneurship, community service, goal-setting and positive attitude. Scholars also get hands-on experience with different types of technology by exploring in-depth one of three "majors" - video production, engineering or information technology. Brittany was an IT major.

From ice-breaking games at the beginning of the program, to graduation presentations to parents and families on the last night, the Scholars' days were a whirlwind of activities, ranging from challenging teambuilding activities at the Teen Leadership Center in Wayne County to fun-filled evenings of prizes, swimming and games.

Early in the week, Scholars each built a "virtual" business with simulation software used by the Small Business Development Centers. The program allows entrepreneurs to make decisions using different scenarios, getting real-time feedback that shows the impact of those decisions on their business. This year's business was a shoe store and, as in the real world, some Scholars made a tidy profit, while others didn't fare so well. and universities. Creating and implementing a community service project in their hometown was another key component of the Rogers Scholars program. It not only taught them that leadership entails making a difference in their community but it's also a way to apply what they've learned upon returning home.

Over the course of the week, scholars heard from a variety of successful entrepreneurs and motivational speakers, all of who had an inspiring message. Eighteen at-large candidates are then selected to bring the total number of scholars to 60, half of whom attend the first week and half the second. All costs for the program, including students' housing and meals, are paid for by The Center, thanks to The Center's Founders Club member donations and the generous support of South Kentucky RECC, which sponsors an annual fund-raising golf tournament.

our waterways. These cleanups are expensive. Hopefully, when citizens see the price tag for cleaning up after a few irresponsible people, they will take a stand against illegal littering and dumping."

Since 1997, PRIDE has invested \$18,958,682 through the Community Grant and SuperGrant programs to tackle the region's solid waste problems. So far, PRIDE grants have been used to clean up 2,040 illegal dumps across the region.

The PRIDE Community Grant program provides up to \$30,000 to counties, cities, other public entities and nonprofit organizations for environmental improvement projects. Rockets fight to regain district supremacy

The mood in Rocket head coach Tom Larkey's office doesn't vary much from year to year.

Some may see his demeanor unconfident, overly modest or that of a sandbagger trying not to get caught.

Call it what you like, Larkey's approach to his profession is one that has proven to be a successful one.

He enters his 18th campaign as commander-in-chief on Rockcastle County's sidelines and; except for his first season on the job, has produced a team with a winning record every year.

The Rockets will open their 2004 season in the Cumberland Falls Pigskin Classic on Saturday, August 21st. It will mark the first time since Rockcastle moved to 3A that they've played Corbin. This year's opener could rekindle the rivalry between the Rockets and the Hounds that lasted much of the 1990's.

Larkey's Rockets will return four starters on offense and five on defense.

The offensive depth chart

will provide a good mixture of seasoned veterans to go with some green newcomers.

Larkey credits a lot of youth and inexperience on the offensive line to the basic two back offense he will begin the year with.

"We have some kids with a lot of potential that need to develop their work ethic and get better. I feel like we will be a much improved football team by district time," said Larkey.

Junior Matthew Burkhart will take the snaps for his second consecutive year. Senior Rick Sandusky will handle the back-up duties as Burkhart's younger brother, Zachary, develops as a freshman into the offense.

Larkey admitted that the Rockets air attack would be more aggressive than last year. Although you won't see a deep air raid; the ball should fly more than it did in the 2003 season. Screens and short out patterns will be at the forefront of the passing playbook.

Some very athletic receivers, and a quarterback with a year of experience under his

belt, will call for the passing game.

"The sooner we can get the ball to our athletic playmakers in the open field, the better our offense is going to be," Larkey said of his talented receiving corps.

Seniors Derreck Hurst and Trent Jones and sophomore Shawn Childress will see the majority of action at the wide receiver position. They will be complimented by veteran seniors Phil Boreing and Ricky Sandusky who will also be in the rotation. Sophomore Izak McQueary could also see some action as a receiver.

Senior Max Saylor will return to the backfield for his senior season. Saylor will play tailback and fullback, depending on the down and distance situation.

Also seeing action at the tailback position will be talented youngster Dusty Miller. Miller enters his sophomore year with expectations of significant contributions.

Junior Jamie Howard will anchor the fullback position while junior Bucky Skinner

will see some action at both tailback and fullback.

Larkey said that any of the four backs could be in the game when he goes to a one back set.

The question pertaining to the offensive line doesn't deal with who will play where--the more logical question could be

who won't play in a specific position.

The offensive line will feature eight players who will all see significant playing time. The eight linemen-- juniors Mikey Denney and Travis Smith, senior Graham Fay, sophomores David Robbins,

Brad Durham, Billy Hines, and Donovan Pigg and freshman Scott Daughtery could play any position on the line at any point in the year, according to Larkey.

On the defensive side of the ball the Rockets should display some team speed mixed with some raw inexperience.

Five starters return from a 2003 defense that lost first team all-state defensive tackle Jason Leger.

Senior Graham Fay will take over Leger's anchor responsibilities.

“You can't replace a high school football player the magnitude of Jason Leger. But there is no doubt that Fay has the ability and the experience to get the job done at a high level,” said Adam Coleman, the Rocket's second year defensive coordinator.

To go along with Fay on the defensive line will be sophomore Donovan Pigg and juniors Mikey Denney and Jamie

Howard. Senior Gabe Guilfoil could also see time in the trenches.

The Rockets will return two-way starter Max Saylor at one defensive end while senior Phil Boreing will be performing the same chores on the other end of the ball. Sophomore Adam Hensley will be the next in line as their back-up.

Senior Chris Croucher will start for his third straight year at middle linebacker. Going into his final season, Croucher is already the all-time sack leader at RCHS with 30.5.

Senior Ricky Sandusky will also return at linebacker, giving the Rockets some much-needed experience at key positions. Senior Josh Bustle will be at the other outside linebacker with Charles Cunagin and Bucky Skinner backing them up.

The Rocket secondary was tagged by Coleman as being

the strong suit of the Rocket defense. Coleman credits their speed for their pre-season success.

Senior Trent Jones will play one cornerback while Dusty Miller will play the other. Senior Berreck Hurst will play safety and start on both sides of the ball. Sophomores Izak McQueary and Shawn Childress will back-up the secondary.

Coach Larkey has always been a head coach with the reputation of putting a lot of emphasis on special teams and the kicking game.

He will hold junior Bucky Skinner responsible for handling all of the kicking duties. Skinner will punt, kick off, kick extra points and field goals. Although Larkey said that their extra point team has been a little shaky in the pre-

season, he will still play the conservative game in going for the one point.

“I look forward to seeing the progression of the young guys and to seeing the leadership of the veterans as the season gets underway. This team has potential, but it still needs to work hard to improve if we want to succeed at the level that this program is accustomed to,” said Larkey.

ROCK opens season Saturday at Pigskin Classic

As with every season since Rockcastle County has moved from 2A to 3A, the 2004 Rocket campaign will have to travel through much of the southeastern part of the state to win football games.

For Rocket fans of the past and present, the season opener against the Redhounds of Corbin is the ultimate way to kick off a Rocket football season.

Rockcastle County and Corbin battled through much of the 1990's for the label of district supremacy. However, they haven't played since their last district match-up in 1998. The following year Rockcastle County's school enrollment required them to move up to 3A.

Coach Tom Larkey is excited about the opportunity to get back on the field with Corbin. “They are a state powerhouse and have been for a number of years. This game should provide a measuring stick for us in terms of where we are and where we need to go to get our football team where they need to be,” Larkey said.

Corbin is fresh off of a 10-3 season where they lost in the regional finals to Elizabethtown. In 2002, they finished as state runner-up in 2A. This was the

same year the Rockets accomplished the same feat in 3A.

The Hounds' return senior quarterback Jeremy Brock. As a sophomore Brock led his team to the state runner-up finish. However, a near tragic traffic accident will probably keep Brock out of the season opener as he is still recuperating from his injuries.

According to the Corbin News-Journal, Brock was released to start jogging the middle of last week. This brings into question just how much Brock will be able to contribute early in the season.

To make the Corbin signaling situation even worse, their back-up quarterback broke his leg in summer practice.

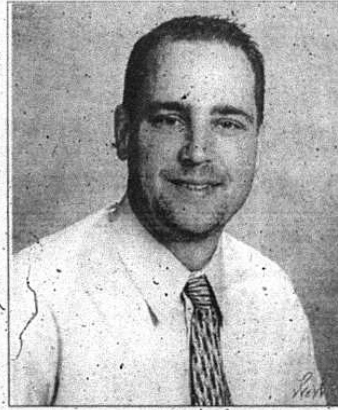
This string of unexpected events has forced the Corbin coaching staff to name 5'11 freshman Clint Cashen the opening game starter.

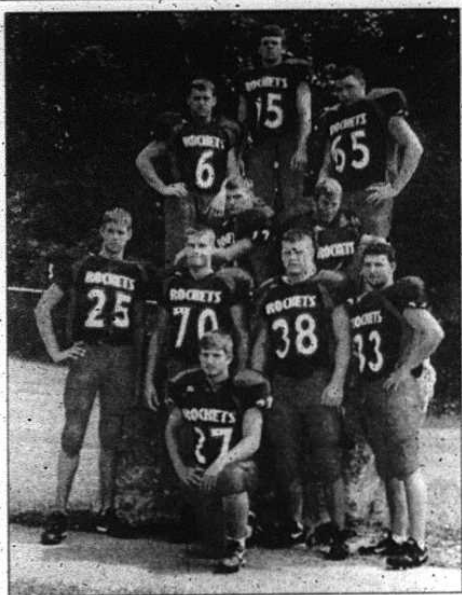

Rockets add Pikeville, lose Dunbar in 2004 schedule

The Rockets non-district schedule will be no less than challenging in the 2004 season. Considering the additions of Corbin and Pikeville and, considering the pre-season success of Pulaski Southwestern, it seems the Rockets will have their hands full.

On August 29th, Rockcastle County will travel to South Laurel. The border rivalry has occurred every year since the Rockets moved to 3A and revamped their non-district schedule.

The Rockets have won all but the first of those meetings. The last three seasons the Rockets have beaten the Cardinals a total of 130-7. However, South Laurel showed vast improvement from the 2002 to 2003 seasons. They had a very respectable 6-5 record in 4A last year and played district champion Lafayette close in the first round of the playoffs.

On September 3rd, Rockcastle County will play host to 1A state powerhouse Pikeville in the annual Renfro

Valley Jamboree Bowl.

Pikeville finished last season with a loss to Lynn Camp in the regional championship and with a record of 8-5.

The fourth regular season game features a short drive to a border county. The Rockets will travel to Stanford to take on the Patriots of Lincoln County. The Rockets and the Patriots have squared off each of the last 4 years with the Rockcastle County taking all four meetings.

September 17th Rockcastle County will host a very much improved Pulaski Southwestern football team. The Rockets won 14-0 in a defensive battle at Southwestern a year ago.

Reports say that Southwestern beat Danville in a scrimmage earlier in the pre-season. Danville is tagged by most as the pre-season favorite to win the 1A state championship.

County. Clay County posted a 4-6 record last season and failed to make the playoffs.

The open week for Coach Tom Larkey's Rockets couldn't come at a better time during the season once again. They will be off on the week of October 1st. The next week

the Rockets will face off against district rival Bell County on October 8th. In the last five years, no other team has captured a district title except for Bell or Rockcastle giving reason for the magnitude of the mid-season match-up. Bell County will have to travel to the Rock for the district meeting.

Rockcastle County leads Bell County 3-2 in the district series since they joined the same district in 2000. Last season, the Bobcats and the Rockets early district match-up turned out to be the eventual district championship game. 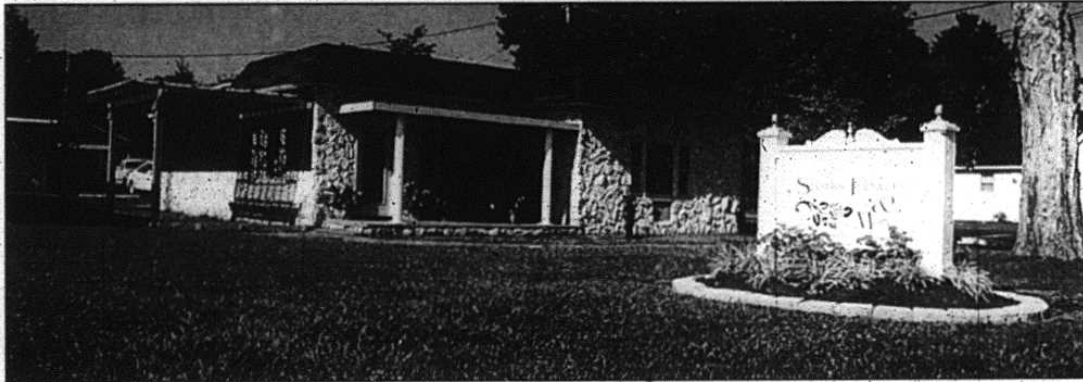

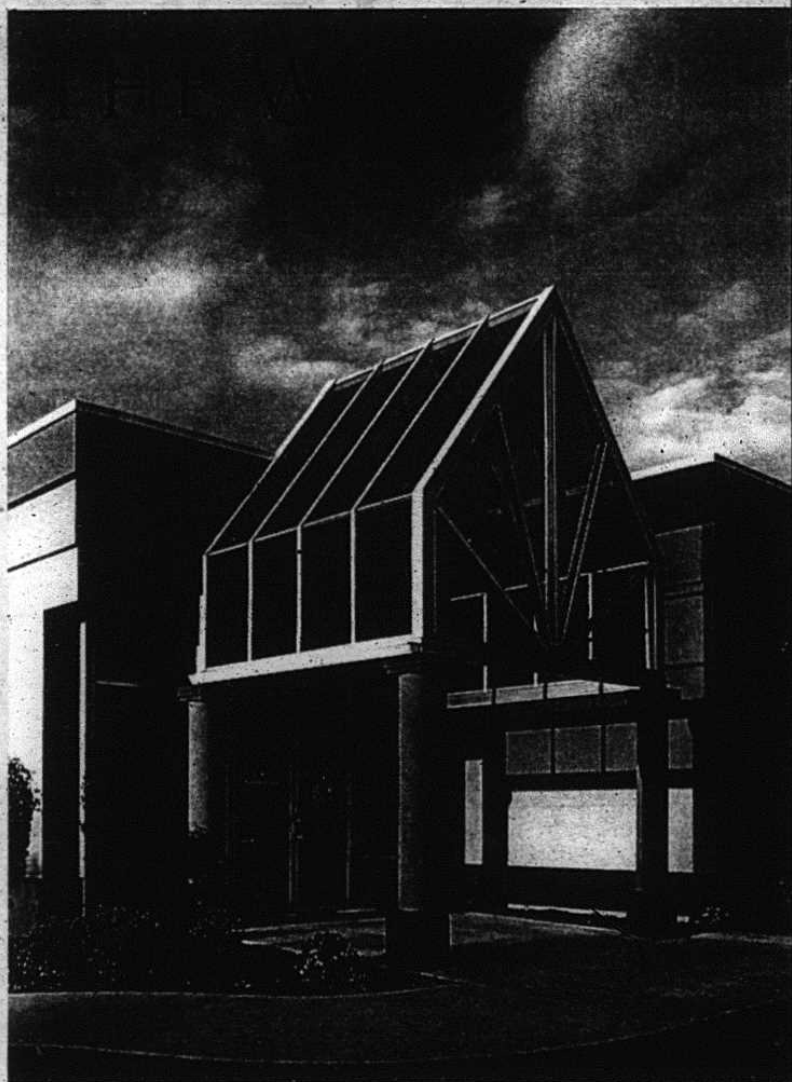
