Police raid home of Dallas Kirby

Rockcastle County Sheriff Darrell Doan confirmed Wednesday that the property of Dallas Kirby, 54, of Hwy. 618 at Quail was raided on Sunday by local and federal officers.

State police has turned the case over to the Drug Task Force, with local agent Barry Adams in charge of the investigation.

Doan said that officers did find marijuana on Kirby's property, and seized at least \$60,000 in cash. Other items, including vehicles, were also seized.

Kirby was not arrested and the case is pending in federal court. Doan said the marijuana was spotted on Kirby's property by helicopters.

Sheriff Doan recovering

Rockcastle County Sheriff Darrell Doan was at work on Wednesday, but under a limited work schedule, after a heart attack last week.

Doan said he began having chest pains on Thursday morning and went to the Rockcastle Hospital and eventually ended up at St. Joseph Hospital where a stent was placed in his main artery.

Doan, 47, was hospitalized for two days. "I would like to thank everyone for their concern," he said Wednesday.

The annual event will feature a parade, baby contest and the annual 5-K run.

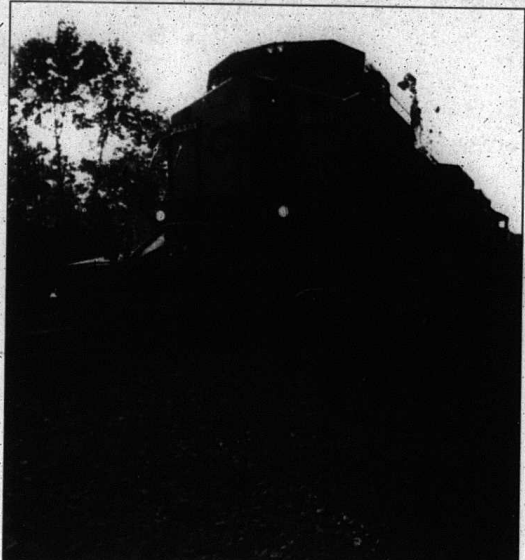

Sentenced

Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth's Attorney for Lincoln, Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties, announced last Thursday that Judge Jeffrey T. Bardette sentenced Barbara Singleton in Pulaski Circuit Court.

Singleton, 34, of Brodhead, was sentenced to one year in prison for receiving stolen property over \$300 value and one year for the offense of theft by unlawful taking over \$300.



Eric Cromer, 32, of Richmond and formerly of Mt. Vernon, was injured Thursday evening when he drove his truck into the path of a CSX train at Roundstone, according to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Mike Peters. Peters said Cromer was attempting to cross the track, which had no crossing guards, when the train, which CSX officials said was traveling at a rate of 32 miles per hour, hit his 1989 5-10 truck, pushing him at least a quarter of a mile. Cromer was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital where he was treated and released after three days.

No amount of money disclosed City of Mt. Vernon settles suit against former policeman

A lawsuit against a Mt. Vernon police officer has been dismissed after both parties agreed to settle out of court.

According to court records, the insurance company representing the City of Mt. Vernon and, at the time, police officer Tim Thacker, agreed to a settlement earlier this year.

Since the lawsuit was brought in December of last year, Thacker has been terminated from his position as a city policeman.

The suit involved two local men, Roger Mink and John Falin, and according to court records both instances occurred while Thacker was off duty.

The suit against Thacker and the city accused Thacker of threatening to kill Falin after he stopped him at gun point and the suit against Thacker by Mink accused Thacker of physically abusing the Mt. Vernon man in front of witnesses.

The city council took little time in terminating Thacker, on the advice of city attorney Jerry Cox, not long after the alleged incidents occurred.

The attorney for Mink and Falin, Willis G. Coffey of Mt. Vernon, would not disclose the amount of the settlement between the city and Mink and Falin.

There is still a lawsuit pending against Falin, which Thacker filed against him in a cross-claim suit.

Home With Pink Eye

Every parent dreads having his child come home from school with pink eye, but it is more common than most people think. Pink eye is a contagious disease and it spreads easily through schools and day care centers where there are numerous children in close contact. It is the most common eye problem among children.

With pink eye, or conjunctivitis, the white part of the eye becomes red, and yellowish matter builds up on the lid margins and eye lashes. Pink eye can be caused by infections such as bacteria or viruses, and also by non-infectious causes such as allergies or irritation from smoke or dust. Viral infections are the most common cause.

Doctors can not always tell from an exam which of these is the cause, but when there is a chance of a bacterial infection, it is usually treated with antibiotic eye drops. The eye generally improves in two to three days, but should be treated for a full week. A culture is seldom taken, unless the pink eye does not improve.

The matter from bacterial infections is rather thick and sticky, and in the morning the eyes are usually stuck shut. The child has to pry his eyes open or use warm compresses to help loosen the debris.

Viruses cause a discharge that is usually watery and thin. The eye does not feel like it is glued shut. Allergies also cause a watery discharge and mild redness and can appear very similar to a virus. A child with pink eye should stay home from school until the infection is cured. He should also use separate towels at home and the whole family should wash hands frequently—hand to hand contact is the most common route of spreading the infection.

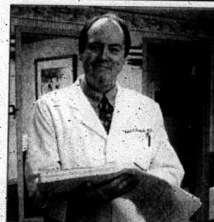

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, in partnership with Wal-Mart, Bishop's Sportsman's Store, Cummins Sporting Goods, Lake Linville Boat Dock, County Attorney-William Reynolds and the Rockcastle County Fiscal

Court, held the first ever Rockcastle County Bucks and Beards event in conjunction with a free fishing day.

"I would like to thank all the good folks who helped pulled this off," said Officer Stephen Isaacs of the KDFWR. "It was great to see so many business owners pull together to help make this event possible. Everyone that helped sponsor this event should be very proud of what was accomplished." Isaacs said.

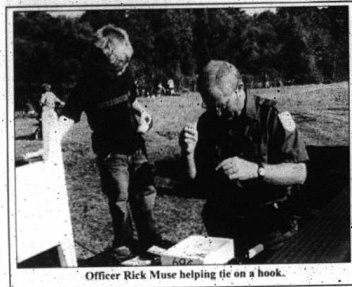
Over 100 children attended the free fishing day. "It was great to see so many young people standing along the lake shore fishing, but what was even better was seeing moms, dads, or grandparents standing there with them," stated Officer Rick Muse of the KDFWR.

Each child, 15 years or younger, received a brand new fishing pole from Lake Linville Boat Dock and Wal-Mart of Berea. There were 75 fishing poles given away the day of the event. "I had to have Wal-Mart ship fishing poles directly to some of the children's homes. How great is that? After the final count, there were over 100 children that showed up to fish," stated Isaacs.

After fishing for most of the morning, the youngsters were treated to free hamburgers, hotdogs and soda.

It's really nice to see this take place here at the lake and so many people show up and enjoy themselves," said Tommy Mullins, owner of the Lake Linville Boat Dock.

Once the youngsters had completed a great day of fishing, it was time to move onto the Bucks and Beards Event. There were over 125 people who attended and 41 mounted deer to be scored David Yancy of the KDFWR did the official scoring and was assisted by one of our local taxidermist, David Kiddie. The competition for the event was limited to legal harvested animals from Rockcastle County. "Wow! You really should have seen these animals for yourself to see just how impressive some of them are," Isaacs said. "I expected to see some nice mounts, but but I truly was impressed by the number and quality of the animals

displayed. Rockcastle County has a lot to offer sportsmen that are in search of a record book deer. We had several mounts make the Boone and Crockett score book as well as three that will make Pope and Young," Isaacs stated.

There were some real monster bucks that were scored, as well as a monster doe killed by Dany Smith of Mt. Vernon that sported a 13-point rack. "We had to go back to 1966 to find the record for Rockcastle County," Isaacs said. R.W. Gilbert of Lincoln County will hold the current record for Rockcastle County. "The animal was harvested in Rockcastle County on Copper Creek in 1966. It scored an impressive 188 and 1/8 Boone and Crockett points," said Muse. Gilbert is currently the County Judge/Executive for Lincoln County and he donated the animal to Cedar Creek Sportsmen's Club so that it can

be displayed.

The event had several winners in different categories. Some of the winners were Justin Barron for youngest hunter. Justin harvested a nice eight pointer. Danny Smith, for his doe with antlers, that scored 120 7/8. Two other animals joined the Boone and Crockett elite by scoring over 160 points. Those were George Bishop's animal from 1994 and Edwin Robinson's for his nice buck harvested in the 2003-04 season. Roscoe Kirby holds the record for the largest Pope and Young harvested in the county with a score of over 149 points.

"Overall, it was a great day. We got the opportunity to see some really magnificent animals and to enjoy some time as sportsmen and women reflecting on where this county has been and where we are headed. The opportunities are in-

creasing to not only harvest record book deer, but also Elk, Black Bear and other species are on the increase in Rockcastle County. What we protect today will be enjoyed tomorrow," Isaacs said.



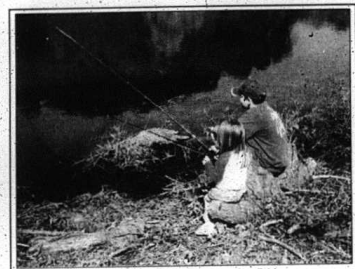

Teen USA visits Christ's Outreach

Thanks to people with great dreams, who are willing to sacrifice the finer things in life and step outside their comfort zone, mission director Greg Herriford is able to schedule hundreds of groups for Teen USA mission trips. Teen USA schedules mission trips for churches throughout the country, and they typically send two to three groups per year to visit Christ's Outreach for the Blind.

Centerville Christian Church made a five and a half-hour trip from Centerville, Indiana to Mt. Vernon, Kentucky with their team leader Brian Richmond. The team worked as diligently and faithfully as any group that has visited Christ's Outreach.

When the group arrived, Elijah Alvey, age 13, admitted, "I was both nervous and excited, but I felt compelled to come on this trip to serve God as best I could." Samuel Alvey, brother to Elijah, shares his brother's desire to serve others and has seen God work with all of the group, helping them build a sense of teamwork and friendship. The boys' father, Rick Alvey, stated, "I wanted to use my skills to help others and wanted to share the experience with my two oldest boys." Selfless and with a motivation to serve seem to be a family trait for the Alveys.

Reflecting on the week's work, Molly Cochran, age 13, observed, "On the first day I was excited to help. Some of my thoughts were, 'I was really tired and wanted to stop, but then I just thought that I was doing this for the Lord and that gave me motivation. I feel really good now that I know I have accomplished something good and that I have helped.' Alan Hinchaw, age 14, marveled at the beauty of the views from these hills and said, "It is awesome to know I have helped and to see how much work is still needed to complete the camp." Josh Smith, 14, also appreciated the views saying, "God has shown himself to me through His

beautiful creation and showing me nothing is impossible." With this group the impossible proved possible as they labored to help bring Christ's Outreach closer to completion.

Teen USA also sends mission groups on trips all over the world. Thus, Teen USA's isn't only doing domestic trips, they are also taking the time to travel to foreign lands to help total strangers and to introduce them to the Word of God. Ken Henderson, the founder and executive director of Teen USA, was in the process of scheduling a mission trip to Brazil when Centerville Christian visited Christ's Outreach. That trip proved to be extremely successful, although the group experienced problems acquiring and retaining visas.

Not all of Teen USA's employees are paid by the organization. In the case of chikbird, they would chew on a few pieces of willow bark for relief. In generations to come, willow bark was discovered to contain most of the same elements as modern aspirin.

I remember when I was a child, there was an elderly lady who lived about a half a mile from us. We lived near an old country store and church, and at the time, it wasn't uncommon to see people in this rural area walk to the store and church. This elderly lady had arthritis and was quite drawn and in pain when she walked, and as we noted when she walked past the house. Gradually we noticed an improvement. She said that she had been eating honey every day for the past few months, and she had improved greatly. I've also heard that bee stings in a controlled environment to certain areas of the body was an aid in arthritis. Did you know that the basic ingredient of most creams and lotions of the Victorian era was beeswax?

What can we do for a burn? The best thing is cold water or ice followed by some aloe vera. What should you do for an insect bite or an unwanted bee sting? You should find some curly dock, wash it up in your hand until it's well-broken or mushy, and apply it to the site. It draws out the poison.

The ancient Egyptians were supposed to have used sugar quate often as a remedy for healing wounds and scratches. Wine was usually used to cleanse the area. In today's medical facilities, I've personally seen sugar mixed with Betadine, and the mixture applied to decubitus ulcers, commonly known as bedsores.

Green tea is currently making a comeback. Green tea has been a cure, all for centuries. Now it has resurfaced as a metabolism-booster for weight loss. Incidentally, mint, parsley, and even small amounts of charcoal have been known to aid in the digestion of food.

Here is a short list of various ailments and their remedy. Having problems sleeping? Try milk, honey,

or turkey before bed. Chocolate and oysters have a reputation for increasing the libido. Pumpkin and sweet potatoes are said to increase the chances of pregnancy and multiple births. Wine in moderation is good for digestion, various stomach problems, anemia, regulating blood pressure, and aids in sleeping. Any citrus fruit and zinc aids in the cure of the common cold and flu. Tomatoes combat certain kinds of cancer. Protein and vitamin E are good for healthy skin, hair, and nails. Sassafras tea was once said to fortify the blood, as do beets and rhubarb. Peas aid in healing, especially after surgery. Seafood is said to aid in the thought process.

These are a few of the old folk remedies I can think of just off the top of my head. This only scratches the surface, I'm sure. Again, I'm not recommending that anyone try these methods as I'm only discussing folk remedies. So here's to good health to all.

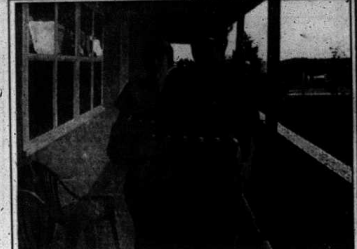

"He hit me and tried to choke me," she said, "and this is not the first time." That's when her mother advised her to go back.

Almost six months later the daughter left her husband and came home. This time the bruises were on her back and legs. After a few days her husband came to her mother's house begging her to come back and promising it would not happen again. He went to church and confessed and cried in front of the whole congregation. He promised he had seen the light.

Momma's advice this time was the same. "Give him another chance," she told her daughter. "He seems like he really means it this time. With God's help I know he can change and you can have a happy marriage."

The daughter went back to her husband, and for two months he was not abusive. At that point the verbal abuse began gradually to creep back into the relationship. He called her names and accused her of having a boyfriend. In another month the hitting began again. He tried to run over her in the driveway. He threw her clothes out in the yard and burned them. He threatened to kill her if she ever left him. "No other man will ever have you," he promised.

The young woman again turned up at her mother's house, this time with bruises over her entire body. "I couldn't stay Momma," she cried. "He's going to kill me."

This time Momma changed her mind. "He's never going to change," she told her daughter. "I know you are supposed to stay with him, but I can't stand by and see you get killed. You have got to stay away from that man. He is evil."

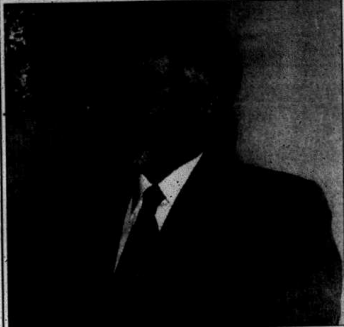
Again her abuser tried to talk his wife into coming home. He would come to see her when her mother was not at home. He started going to church again and attending AA meetings. "I have quit drinking forever," he told her. "You know I only hit you when I'm drunk, and I will never hit you again."

She listened and wanted to believe him. What her mother did not know is that she was pregnant. "That baby needs both of us," he told her. "Please don't let our baby grow up without a daddy!" He wept as he put his head in her lap. She left her mother a note. "I'm going home to try again. This time I won't hate me."

In a few months she was back at her mother's, this time with four broken ribs and a gash in her skull. This time Momma gave no advice. She just listened as her daughter told of the latest abuse that began only a week after she went back to her husband. "He choked me until I passed out," she told her mother. "I thought I was going to die. Then when I woke up, he kicked me in the side and broke my ribs." What should I do Momma, what should I do?"

"That's up to you, dear," Momma answered. "I can't tell you what is right or what you should do, but I promise I will be there to help you whatever you decide."

Momma has learned a lot.

County attorney warns of higher fines in school zones

The cost of going to school this fall may be a little higher for some families. In fact, the cost of driving by a school may increase for some drivers as well, according to Rockcastle county Attorney Billy Reynolds, who handles speeding tickets in Rockcastle County District Court.

A new law that took effect last month doubles the fine for motorists caught speeding in school zones.

"The actual cost of the ticket will be determined by how fast the motorist was driving in the school zone," Reynolds said. "But the reality is that the ticket will cost twice as much as an ordinary speeding ticket."

"The law was designed to make people think once more of the dangers of speeding in a school zone," Reynolds said.

In addition to following the posted speed limit, motorists should follow these precautions to help prevent accidents in school zones:

- Remain alert. Children may dart suddenly in front of cars without notice.

- Minimize distractions. Do not accept or make telephone calls; do not apply makeup; do not search for lost items or attempt to deal with children in the back seat while driving.

- Be prepared for stopped or slowed traffic. Motorists may experience delays or even sudden stops in school zones.

- Follow all posted signs and traffic lights.

- Always stop for a school bus that has stopped to load or unload passengers.

- When it comes to children, we all must take significant responsibility to help keep them safe." Reynolds said. "Being extra cautious and following traffic laws is a good place to start."

Grandparents raising their grandchildren

Well over seven million grandparents are raising their grandchildren. Some grandparents have full custody, while others serve as parents on a more restricted basis.

About 60 percent of grandparent caregivers are grandmothers and 40 percent are grandfathers. More than 75 percent are between 45 and 64 years old.

The number of grandparents serving as grandchild caregivers has dramatically escalated in recent years for a number of reasons. These include child abuse and neglect, parental immaturity, joblessness, poverty, death, drug and alcohol addiction, homelessness, incarceration and AIDS.

Raising grandchildren is not an easy job. It often brings unexpected and long-lasting lifestyle changes.

These suggestions will aid grandparent caregivers in the important and rewarding responsibility of caring for their grandchildren.

You and your grandchildren likely will have many emotional ups and downs so give extra attention to these feelings. Listen and learn from them.

Acknowledge that you did the best you could and are not responsible for your adult child's behavior or circumstances.

Do what you can to build a better relationship between grandchildren and their parents, keeping the children's interests uppermost.

Handle important things first, giving full attention to what you are doing.

To lighten your load, lower your standards. You do not have to create the "perfect home," or cook a

full meal every night. Set rules and limits for your grandchildren.

Do not give up every aspect of your life. Regularly make time to nurture yourself; you will feel calmer and more energetic and creative. Your grandchildren will pick up on these feelings and learn an important lesson about self-care and being at one's best.

Plan fun, relaxing times for your grandchildren and yourself. Reach out for help from good friends and other family members who understand the situation. Do not hesitate to ask for advice and assistance.

While raising grandchildren can be a difficult job, it also is filled with many rewarding times.

Emotional Intelligence

Talking about one's feelings is the most direct way to understand and control them. How many times have you asked your child, "How do you feel about...?" and you get the response, "I don't know." Your child's ability to put his emotions into words is a vital part of meeting his basic needs. Your child can learn to verbalize his emotions rather than act out inappropriate behaviors, such as having a tantrum or sassing a parent. In families in which feelings are openly expressed and discussed, children develop the vocabulary to think and communicate their emotions. Here are some ideas about how to promote this skill.

your child which emotion she thinks it expresses. Paste the picture on paper with the name of the feeling.

—Stop the video!!! Ask your child to identify what a character is feeling. Discuss what events have led to his feeling this way.

—Have your child draw pictures of feelings. You can add these to his Feeling Dictionary.

—Use the Feelings Dictionary to play games where your child identifies the feeling and tells of a time when she experienced the feeling.

—Feelings License Tag! Spot a license with two letters of a feeling, identify it for him. For example, say "I see you are feeling sad" or "Boy, are you mad!"

Rockets lose season opener to Corbin

Take five turnovers and two touchdowns scored within a period of nine seconds in the first half and you've got problems.

The end result of the turnovers along with sloppy play at times by the ROCK was a 42-22 loss to the Corbin Redskins in their season opener on Saturday night.

The Rockets lost game in the annual Pigskin Classic, hosted by Corbin, who was behind 8-7, but things changed quickly for the ROCK.

"The five turnovers killed us, but even without them I doubt if we could have won because of the way we played," said head coach Tom Larkey.

Entering his 18th season as head coach at the ROCK, Larkey was none too pleased with the way his team simply didn't do the basic things it takes to win a football game, between two well-known and respected programs.

"We must improve blocking and tackling," Larkey said. "It boils down to basic fundamentals," the coach continued.

"We are very inexperienced in some positions and it showed on Saturday night," he said.

It doesn't get any easier for the ROCK this week when they travel to South Laurel in London for their annual contest with the Cardinals, who simply dominated Hazard last week in their season opener.

The Cardinals won 59-0.

Larkey, who lives in London and

is a former Cardinal coach, said his team will work hard this week to be prepared.

"Whenever you are playing a 4-A team you have your work cut out for you and South Laurel is a much improved team over the past years," he continued.

On Friday night the ROCK defensive unit gave up a total of 352 yards, 194 of that on the ground and 158 through the air.

Senior middle linebacker Chris Croucher led the Rockets defensively with eight tackles and assists. One of his solo tackles was a quarterback sack.

Seniors Ricky Sandusky, Josh Bustle and Trent Jones all had seven tackles and assists.

Senior Phillip Boreing had six tackles and assists with one sack. Sophomore Dusty Miller had four tackles and assists, while senior Graham Fay and junior Jamie Howard each had three tackles and assists. Fay also had one sack.

Senior Max Saylor and junior Charles Cunigan each had two tackles and assists.

Senior Derreck Hurst had one tackle as did junior Mike Denny.

Senior Gabe Guilfoill had a fumble recovery, which was Corbin's only turnover of the night.

Offensively, junior quarterback Matthew Burkhart was night for 15 passing for 128 yards. He scored two touchdowns, both on rushing plays. Jones caught four passes for 75 yards. Hurst caught one pass for six yards and rushed the ball twice for five yards.

Sophomore Shawn Childress caught three balls for 47 yards and Howard had 24 yards on seven carries.

Junior Bucky Skinner had 32 yards on three carries and he also

kicked two extra points.

Saylor rushed the ball three times for five yards and Miller rushed the ball seven times for 84 yards and scored one touchdown.

Sophomore Izak McQueary scored a two point conversion.

The Rockets do not start district play until September 24th when they travel to Clay County to take on the Tigers, a team who defeated Letcher County, 60-0.

"When we came out of the pits on that last stop, I was concerned about Mark, because he is an aggressive race car driver that always has something up his sleeve."

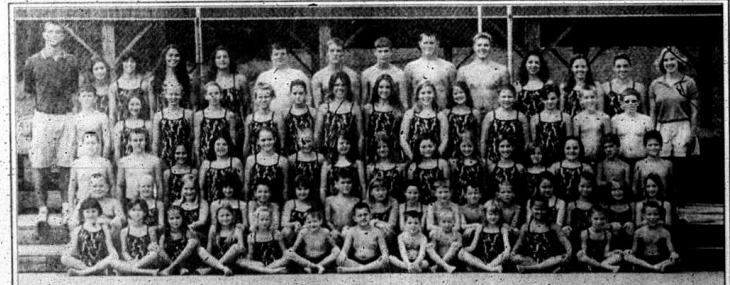
But two aces never beat a pair of four's.

Conversation with Rusty Wallace
Veteran Nextel Cup driver Rusty Wallace says he is having an unbelievable year. Currently, he is 18th in points, 781 behind the leader, and 294 out of 10th-place.

In other words, with just three races left before the championship chase begins, he has very little chance of making the field for the last 10 races. But still, the 48-year-old driver of the No. 2 Penske Dodge is upbeat about the season and his future. "My thought process right now, I've had an unbelievable year," said Wallace. "Yeah, we finally got back to victory lane, but I would have never thought we'd had this many DNS's with crazy things going on, but the good thing is the performance has been there. The car has been running great all year long. We just can't seem to close the deal. I don't know what it is."

There have been reports that Wallace might be leaving his driving helmet soon, but he denied them. "I'll tell you this," continued Wallace. "Right now, my mind is 100 percent on racing. If I do make that call, one of these days, you guys will be the first to know because I want to celebrate it in a proper way and have a good time. Right now, I'm not prepared to talk about retirement."

"This retirement thing from racing is going around in my head all the time. I guess the toughest thing I'll have to give up is the pure enjoy-

ment of racing. I love racing and I still love racing. I feel like I'm at the top of my game right now. You wouldn't know it from the poor finishes we have because of mechanical problems, but the performance of the car has been good. What will happen, I'll have to weigh what's going on. My kids are growing up. Steven is racing right now. I've got the car business. I'm heavily involved in."

"We're building a new state of the art new Penske race shop. I won't be more involved with that. There will be a time when it crosses. You think about things like that. Right now, I finally broke into victory lane at Martinsville and after that I knew I could win a lot more this year. I would have never thought I'd go to Talladega and get caught up in a crash. Go to California and get caught up in a crash, blow a motor there, blow a motor there."

"I never dreamed I'd be 17th or 18th in the points. I thought I'd be eighth or better easy, but it didn't happen. Right now I'm clawing my way back to the front. My main goal right now is to make hay out of every single year I can, but I don't have all the answers about the retirement

thing. It'll be something I'll talk to Penske, my wife, Don Miller and we'll have big discussions about it. I don't plan on quitting right now. I'll go for another couple of years, but I'm not guaranteeing anything after that. That 38-race schedule will wear a person down. There's a lot of life out there rather than living in a motorhome every weekend at a race-track."

Wallace's major league NASCAR career began in 1980 when he ran two races for Roger Penske. Through the 2003 season, he had 598 starts, with 54 wins and 36 poles.

August is World Breastfeeding Month

Babies who are exclusively breastfed are healthier than babies who are fed formula or a combination of breast milk and formula.

"Exclusive breastfeeding provides benefits to baby and mother that just can't be duplicated or replaced by anything else," said Becky Derfield, Breastfeeding Promotion Coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Public Health in the Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

During the month of August, Kentucky will join the rest of the nation and more than 120 countries worldwide in observing World Breastfeeding Month. Special activities are planned throughout the month in different regions of the state to promote breastfeeding and, specifically, exclusive breastfeeding, as a safe, sound and sustainable way to feed an infant.

In Kentucky, about 56 percent of new mothers breastfeed their infants, putting the state significantly below the national average of just more than 70 percent. Among Kentucky women who receive assistance from the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) nutritional program, breastfeeding has increased nearly 8 percent in the past year, from 34.75 percent in 2003 to 42.63 as of July 2004. The information does not reflect whether mothers breastfed exclusively or how many months they breastfed their children.

Derfield said while breastfeeding for any length of time is very much to baby's advantage, one objective of World Breastfeeding Month is to promote exclusive sustained breastfeeding for at least the first six months of life. Exclusive breastfeeding means the infant receives only breast milk and no other food or liquids except vitamin and mineral supplements or medication.

Experts agree that breast milk provides all the nutrition a baby normally needs for the first six months of life. The nutrients found in breast milk are of perfect quality and are easier digested than any other milk or food.

Breast milk also has properties which significantly strengthen infant immunity to infections at a time in life when they are most vulnerable. Artificially fed and mixed-fed infants do not have the same immunity advantages and tend to be sick more often with diarrhea, pneumonia and other infections.

Mothers also derive benefits from breastfeeding. Women who are breastfed are able to lose their preg-

nancy weight more quickly, reducing their risk of breast and ovarian cancer and decreasing their risk of osteoporosis.

When breastfed babies grow older they are also less likely to be overweight.

Governor Ernie Fletcher's Get Healthy Kentucky initiative calls breastfeeding and efforts to encourage and make breastfeeding easier for more mothers as key factors in reducing the rate of obesity and overweight in children.

"We're delighted World Breastfeeding month coincides so closely with the launch of Governor Fletcher's Get Healthy Kentucky initiative," Derfield said. "Getting children off to the best possible start nutritionally with breastfeeding really can have enduring, lifelong health benefits, including decreasing the likelihood that they will become obese or overweight."

Down with the dumps

Why you should be concerned about private property dumps

Private property dumps pose a threat to public health. These dumps serve as breeding grounds for animals that carry diseases such as rats and mosquitoes. These dumps also contaminate water quality because they leak farm or lawn chemicals, batteries, oil from filters, household cleaners and other materials that contain hazardous substances. Even small amounts left in empty containers may be dangerous. Dumps in sinkholes present an even greater threat to water quality, as the material leached from these dumps has almost immediate access to groundwater.

It is against Kentucky law to throw your garbage away on your property or to allow others to dispose of waste on your property. Fines up to \$5,000 per day may be assessed for operating a waste site without a permit, which is what such actions would be considered.

Invest in the future. Dispose of your trash properly. If you have a dump on your property, pick it up and take the waste to a landfill or transfer station. Seminary class visits Northside Baptist

Dr. Art McPhee, a professor at the Associated Methodist Biblical Seminary in Elkhart, Indiana, brought thirty seminary students to Northside Baptist Church, July 23, during a one-week summer class entitled "Turnaround Strategies for Local Churches." The course description offered "help for small churches that are plateaued or declining and also for those who want to maintain their church's vitality. The approach is based on new ways of understanding local churches and how they function, and from data from churches that have recovered and regained vitality."

Dr. Larry Martin, Missions Growth Team Leader for the Ky. Baptist Convention in Louisville, Ky., gave the class at Northside an overview of a prayer movement in Kentucky that began in 1996. "That year," Martin said, "participants at a Mountain Missions Conference in Owsida were still on their knees crying out in desperation to God two hours after the meeting was scheduled to end." He said that no one knows exactly how the prayer began.

"Five years ago," Martin said, "Eastern Kentucky had four ministry centers to distribute food and clothing and building materials. At last count, 43 ministry centers, from food closets to large ministry centers like in Lynch, Ky., are operated throughout Kentucky by local people. God is doing the humbly impossible and it is happening through prayer."

Shirley Cox, Missions Service Corps missionary, introduced speakers Barbara Adams, Jewel Hansel and Mike Gates from Mt. Vernon. Cox told the story of Northside Baptist Church which had dwindled to 30

active members four years ago. She related how new ministries are emerging in the church which has grown to 400 members. This year alone, the church has baptized over 100 new converts.

Cox also told about a ministry in Jenkins, Ky. that began as a diaper ministry and has grown in the past year to include a ministry center for programs for literacy, computer training and drug and alcohol counseling. Mission Service Corps missionaries, Bessie and Lester McPhee, who operate the center, have coordinated mission teams from several states during the past two years. The ministry has received donations of two 15-passenger vans, a 16' truck and ice cream truck this past year. Missions Mosaic magazine will feature an article about the McPhees' ministry, written by Cox, on the October cover.

Adams presented "Battered to Beauty," an award-winning film about domestic violence that she produced as a Berea College student and spoke about God's dramatic transformation of her life.

Hansel spoke about an ongoing prayer movement in Mt. Vernon which began four years ago and listed specific answers to prayer. "God is moving in a way that I have never seen before," she said. "With God lies all power and dominion and I feel He is showing Himself faithful and true to His word."

Gates told the class about Christ's Outreach for the Blind, a 900-acre camp for the blind and disabled, located three miles south of Mt. Vernon. Mission teams from across the nation have traveled to Mt. Vernon (pop. 2,400) to help with camp construction during the past

three years. The camp, scheduled to open in 2005, will accommodate 600 campers each year. Camping activities will include horseback riding, hunting, fishing, swimming, hiking, gardening and independent living skills. Equestrian Ministries International has designated Christ's Outreach an international training center. Asbury College in Wilmore, Ky. will send students who are called to equestrian ministry to the camp for two month internships. Gates and his wife, Lori, are also Mission Service Corps missionaries.

The next day, the seminary class visited Meridzo Center, a multi-faceted ministry in Lynch, Ky. that includes food and clothing, home repairs, child care, equestrian, literacy and job training. Besides coordinating the work of thousands of mission volunteers, Mission Service Corps missionaries Lonnie and Belinda Riley have reopened a church. Over 1,500 professions of faith in Christ have been made during their work there in the past four years.

The class also visited a church in Louisville which was down to 12 members before the all-white church merged with a predominantly African-American church called Temple of Faith Baptist Church. "Members of both groups expect that God is doing a new thing among them, not only helping them to thrive as a multicultural congregation but enabling them to demonstrate to their community that God's kingdom has no racial or class barriers," McPhee said.

After attending an additional five days of morning and evening classes on campus, the seminary students, who represented eight states and six countries, were eligible for three hours of credit. The group consisted of pastors, lay leaders, their spouses, college and seminary students (including students from Asia, Africa and Europe), denominational leaders and consultants and special guests.

One result reported from the tour and classroom experience is from a church in Beatrice, Nebraska that has begun a new prayer group. Student evaluations for the class were very high and Dr. McPhee has received calls asking if the course will be repeated next year.

2. The bond shall bear interest at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per annum until paid in full. The bond shall have the force and effect of a judgment and shall be a lien upon the property sold as additional security for the payment of the purchase price.
3. The full satisfaction of any liens for delinquent ad valorem taxes assessed against the real property shall be paid from the sale proceeds.
4. The full satisfaction of the judgment of the plaintiff granted herein shall be paid from the sale proceeds.
5. The purchaser shall pay the 2004 local, county and state property taxes.
6. The purchaser shall have possession of the real property upon compliance with the terms of the sale.
7. In the event that the plaintiff is the successful bidder and the sale price does not exceed the amount of the plaintiff's judgment, no deposit or bond shall be required.
8. The sale shall be made subject to all easements, set back lines, restrictions or covenants of record or otherwise and shall be sold as is.

USDA creates register to reach minority producers
Agriculture Secretary Ann Veneman has announced that minority farmers and ranchers may now join a new voluntary register to receive information from USDA.

The new Minority Farm Register is an outreach tool to underserved farmers and ranchers who are not currently enrolled in USDA loan, farm or conservation programs. The register is intended to create a shared outreach list that will help USDA, community-based organizations and minority-serving educational institutions to communicate with minority farmers and ranchers.

People wishing to join the register must sign and date an application that provides their name and address. Providing phone numbers, e-mail address, race, ethnicity, gender and farm or ranch location will be voluntary, although the additional information increases the producer's opportunities for receiving appropriate assistance.

The Register application is available at USDA Service Centers or from approved USDA outreach partners. Completed applications may be mailed to: Minority Farm Register, USDA Stop Code 0503, 1400 Independence Avenue, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20250. The sign-up information is also available on the FSA's Web site at www.forms.sc.gov/usda.gov/

eforms/main/servlet, and on the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights' (ASCR) Web site at: www.usda.gov/ or FSA and ASGR are jointly administering the register. Sign-up forms will be issued in Spanish and English. The register is planned to be ready Sept. 3, 2004.

County Committee Election Reform Proposal
Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman has proposed new guidelines to ensure that Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Committees fairly represent agricultural producers, especially minorities and women.

The proposed guidelines were prepared with advice from community groups and leaders, as well as an inter-agency working group convened by the Secretary. Adopting the definition set forth in 7 U.S.C. 2003, the 2002 Farm Bill defines socially disadvantaged (SDA) producers as a group whose members have been

subject to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice because of their identity as members of the group, without regard to individual qualities. 7 U.S.C. 2003 (e) (1) states that SDA producers have, generally been defined to include: African-Americans, Hispanic Americans, Native Americans; and women. By statute, USDA must solicit nominations for County Committee positions from organizations representing the interests of SDA groups.

The public has 30 days to comment on the proposed guidelines published in the Aug. 17 Federal Register. The guidelines will not be final until USDA has received and considered public comments.

Individuals may nominate themselves or others for seats on County Committees. In addition, eligible candidates can be nominated by community based, faith-based or other organizations in the county. Nominations and elections are open to all eligible candidates and voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, marital status or disability. FSA is committed to promoting diversity on its local

county committees so all producers have a say in how the Agency's programs are administered locally.

The deadline for submitting nominations is September 3, 2004. Nomination forms (FSA-669A) can be obtained from the local FSA County Office or online at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/ky>. Producers can expect to receive their ballots during the week of Nov. 7, 2004 and must mail in or return their ballots to their local FSA office by Dec. 6, 2004.

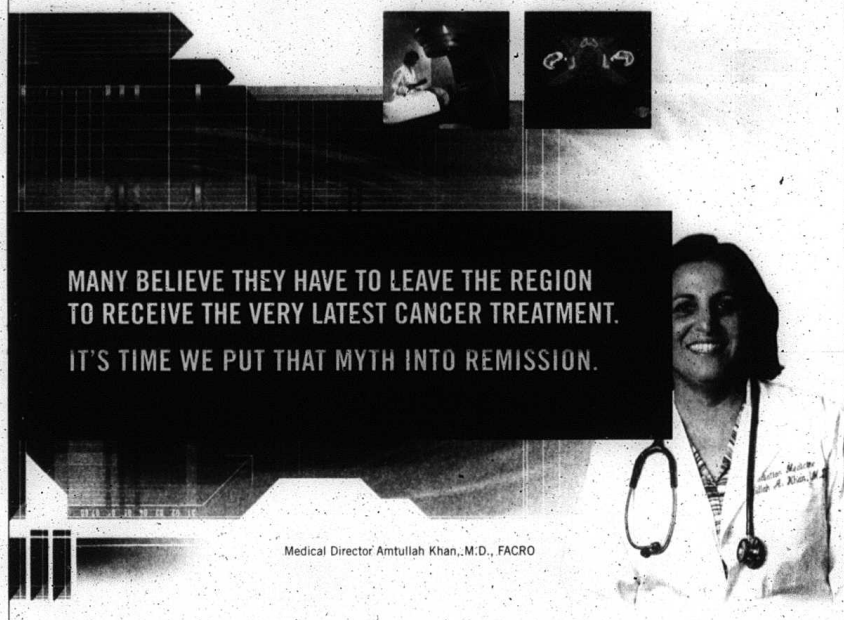

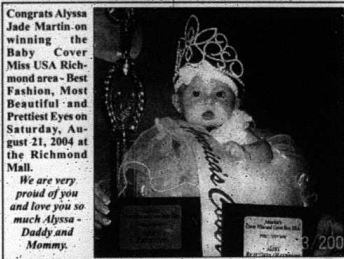

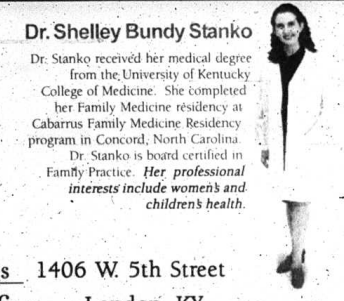
