

Nasal congestion is commonly caused by allergies as well as irritants, viral colds, and many other illneises. One of the main causes is from allergies to pollen or dust mites.

Most non-prescription medicines, such as antihistamines and decongestants, work well for these symptoms and can be used on a long term basis, but the decongestant nasal sprays are good for only very short term treatment—less than one week.

If a person keeps, using the spray for longer, he will develop a rebound effect where he will get opening of the insael passages for a short while, which is followed by a more intense congestion than before. The person will end up using the spray more and more frequently with poorer results. Eventually he will have to use it constantly to breathe through the nose at all.

only does the spray lose its effect, it may cause fects such as overstimulation of the heart, es-

e effects such as overstimulation of the heart, es-itally during exercise. When a persoin develops this rebound effect, the best thing to do is to 9 'cold turkey." Replace the sprays with oral decongestants and anti-tamines. If this is impossible, only use the spray in one nostril. The sprayed side will eventually improve and then the other side can also



Among rock listeners, Exile is re-membered as the one-hit wonder re-sponsible for 1978's number one small Yking You All Over. How-ever, in the early 80s, the Kentucky-berd band retrivented itself as a coun-try outfit—and a hugely successful one at that. Exile was actually formed all the way back in 1985 in Berea, KY. by singer/guitarist J.P. 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
