## Protestors picket against Lambert in Mt. Vernon

A citizens group attempting to dislodge Family Court Judge Debra H. Lambert of Mt. Vernon brought their protest to Mt. Vernon on Tuesday.

The small group of protesters, picketed in front of the Rockcastle County Courthouse for most of the morning with signs demanding Lambert's removal from the bench.

The group, which calls themselves *Concerned Citizens for a Better Family Court*, had already held demonstrations in Pulaski County and Lincoln County, the other two counties Lambert presides over.

Vice President of the group, Sandy Morrow of Pulaski County was busy passing out pamphlets, as she also picketed, which explained the group's goals.

The obvious short term goal of the group is to have Lambert removed from the bench.

The pamphlet also outlined the long term goals of the group.

Their pamphlet says they want to help pass legislative bills which would enable family court to become fair and just.

Another goal stated in the group's pamphlet is to help family court become family friendly.

The pamphlet also gave information on the way citizens can file a complaint concerning family court.

Carrie Schultz, president of the group said on Wednesday that the group's next public protest would come next Wednesday in Frankfort at the Kentucky Supreme Court, but

directed at Chief Justice Joseph Lambert, Debra Lambert's husband.

"We've sent in between 30 and 40 complaints to the Judicial Conduct Commission and obviously nothing has happened because Debra Lambert is the Chief Justice's wife," Schultz said.

The Chief Justice oversees the Judicial Conduct Commission.

"We are hoping for a big turn-out on Wednesday," Schultz said.

Morrow has been in front of Judge Lambert and lost custody of her two children to her father.

In statements made to the *Commonwealth Journal*, earlier this year, Morrow claims Judge Lambert acted unfairly when she gave custody of her two children to her x-husband.

But all of those in attendance on Tuesday were not against Judge Lambert.

Several supporters gathered to form a prayer circle in support of Judge Lambert, many of whom work with the judge on a daily basis.

Employees with the local Community Based Services office in Rockcastle County, issued a statement on Wednesday.

"As concerned citizens we are in support of the Family Court System. We have witnessed first hand the benefits in the areas of safety, permanency and well-being to the children and families of Rockcastle County. We personally hold Judge Lambert in the highest regard. We have observed her to be keenly aware of the impact of the court's decisions on the

lives of the children and family members who go before her. Our personal prayers are with her and her staff."

Judge Lambert has repeatedly said she would not give into pressure from those unhappy with her rulings, "because of the severity of some cases, there will always be someone upset," the Judge said.

It should also be noted, that Judge Lambert won her office by a landslide over Somerset attorney Mike Dancan.

She was first appointed by the Governor and then had to run for office.

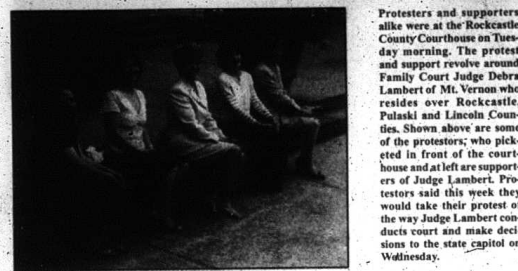
## Recorded High only 89 Rainy month

Rockcastle County weatherman Bud Cox summed it up on Wednesday, it has been a very wet Spring and Summer. In May, 7.76 inches of rain fell. In June, 5.00 inches of the wet stuff fell, in July 3.94 and in August 4.20 was recorded.

The recorded high for the year was 89 last month and the low so far this summer has been 55.

Cox said that other people may have recorded higher temperatures, but all temperatures recorded at the weather station are above grass and recorded as to National Weather Service regulations.

So far this month, precipitation has been recorded only two days which were the third day of the month and this Wednesday when 1.57 inches had fallen at press time.

# Points East

Aside from the normal potato bugs, Japanese beetles, bean bugs, aphids, slugs and those smelly stink bugs that wipe out cucumbers and squash overnight, gardening is pretty much a breeze for me. In terms of insect pests, at least.

About an hour before dewfall in late afternoon/early evening, when I see an infestation of whatever insect plague on my veggies, I use an old quart jar-a big glass mayonnaise container with the paper seal removed from the lid and a bunch of tiny holes punched into the cap is ideal-- and I fill it nearly full of lukewarm water and then and I add about half a cup of Ivory Liquid unscented dish wash detergent.

I use a very small finishing nail and a ball peen hammer to make the holes in the cap. I turn the cap upside down, lay it on something solid, and go one lick at a time, hammer to nail, until I have twenty or so tiny little holes spread throughout the cap so that it looks and behaves like a sifter of sorts. Then, presto, I have a garden insect sprinker that will last all summer and far more functional than anything you can purchase at the garden store for less than ten bucks.

Once screwed on, I tightly cap the top of the jar with the palm of my left hand, with the mixture inside and shake it out of it. Then I go through the garden and shake a little detergent on top of any bugs or anywhere I think they might show up. Dew rises of the residue and whatever bugs the mixture didn't kill head for parts unknown. If you are terribly infected with slugs, add a little vodka to the mixture, or better still, put out a few, small bowls of beer and the slugs will come to them and promptly drown themselves.

So that gets rid of bugs and so forth, as environmentally efficient and correct as you would wish your dishes. If you are worried about getting cancer from dish detergent, you need professional help from a psychiatrist and you certainly do not need to be gardening. In fact, there are a number of institutions who can help you deal with hyper-phobia but they will probably keep you in a straight jacket in a little glass room. But that's another subject for another time and place.

Rabbits, on the other hand, tend to wait for me to sprinkle on the de-

tergent at the end of every day. Rabbits don't eat bugs, nor do terrapins. They eat the peppers and lettuce and carrots and spinach and whatever else we may be trying for the taking.

Terrapins feast on my tomatoes and cucumbers and late zucchini. Many hours after dewfall and often just before dawn when the beads of pure water are thick and heaviest, the rabbits romp through my detergent laden leaves and bath themselves before they feast. They douse them selves and then shake it off then run through the foxtail grasses where the dew is clean and pure and free of Ivory Liquid for a quick rinse. The

# A Closer Look

"Get Involved" by Alan L. Hammond

Unlike citizens of some other countries, we will not be persecuted, imprisoned or executed for going to the polls and casting a vote for any candidate we choose. That being the case, we should have to wait in line for hours at the polls instead of a few minutes, but we Americans simply do not vote. The thirty or thirty-five percent voter turnout in even the most highly contested elections is far below most every other free society.

One of the many reasons for this phenomenon is a sense of disaffection. "We have the feeling that our vote will not make a difference and as a result, we simply distance ourselves from the political process. Such rationale is not without merit, but giving up is no solution."

Senator Zell Miller (D-GA), in his book A National Party No More: the Conscience of a Conservative Democrat (Stroud & Hall, October 2003), described the political atmosphere in Washington, D.C. as one dominated by Political Action Committees (PAC's), each having deep pockets and a specific agenda. Senator Miller stated that each week, senate Democrats meet for lunch to discuss a variety of topics. All are then encouraged to attend a variety of fundraising brunches, luncheons and dinners presented by numerous PAC's. The senator recalled one occasion where a PAC offered the Democratic Party twenty thousand dollars for each senator in attendance at a luncheon. If each senator had accepted it would have meant a one million dollar contribution to the party. They all attended. It would be foolish to assume that the same does not occur on the Republican side of the aisle. It is a shame, but it is the norm.

It is understandable how Joe Voter can become disillusioned and put off by such happenings. In our attempt to be heard, we know the difficulty in trying to compete with organized groups with extensive, funding and unlimited access. Voters also know that state and local governments operate in the same manner, only on a smaller scale. A few legislators have attempted to break from this tradition of greed. Senator Miller has stopped attending the weekly lunches and has refused to accept money from lobbyists and their PAC's. He has paid the price for his actions and has been ostracized by his party. He is also not running for re-election.

The only way we can now turn the rising tide of pandering to such groups is to vote. Voter turnout of sixty, sixty-five, seventy or more percent will send a clear message that special interests are no longer the way to get elected. The voice of America will be heard and its will shall be done. No further need for the purely political rhetoric about campaign finance reform and soft money. The only thing we will then have to endure will be the campaign commercials.

# Avoid Decongestant Sprays

Nasal congestion is commonly caused by allergies as well as irritants, viral colds, and many other illnesses. One of the main causes is from allergies to pollen or dust mites.

Most non-prescription medicines, such as antihistamines and decongestants, work well for these symptoms and can be used on a long term basis, but the decongestant nasal sprays are good for only very short term treatment--less than one week.

If a person keeps using the spray for longer, he will develop a rebound effect where he will get opening of the nasal passages for a short while, which is followed by a more intense congestion than before. The person will end up using the spray more and more frequently with poorer results. Eventually he will have to use it constantly to breathe through the nose at all.

Not only does the spray lose its effect, it may cause side effects such as overstimulation of the heart, especially during exercise.

When a person develops this rebound effect, the best thing to do is stop "cold turkey." Replace the sprays with oral decongestants and antihistamines. If this is impossible, only use the spray in one nostril. The un sprayed side will eventually improve and then the other side can also be stopped.

If nasal congestion continues, you should have a full evaluation by your doctor to check for allergies, polyps, side effects of medicines, and many other causes of nasal congestion. Prescription nasal sprays may be used to treat both the underlying problem and the congestion caused by the decongestant sprays

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## Students discover rural Kentucky through AHEC

It's no secret that in Kentuckians like to talk about family, and they like to talk basketball.

Amy Pope discovered this immediately when she began attending the University of Kentucky Physician Assistant program two years ago.

"Everyone kept asking me if I was related to Mark Pope," recalled Amy, a native of Tallahassee, Fla. "I kept saying, 'Who is that?'"

It was puzzling for Amy, who recently finished training under Mt. Vernon's Kevin Rowe, M.D., a family practice physician at the Family Health Clinic.

Die-hard UK fans know that Mark Pope played for the Wildcats in the mid-1990s. Amy Pope now knows how popular basketball is in Kentucky. "It's one of many things she's learned since moving to the Bluegrass State, a place she's come to love."

"Before I knew the UK, I thought, 'Who would want to live in Kentucky?' Now I might actually end up staying," she said.

Pope, who grew up in an urban area, said she might consider settling in rural Kentucky. "The patients are very appreciative and warm. I really like it here."

"Things start clicking"

Part of the training of health professions students are real-world "rotations," in which they spend a period of time working under the supervision of a practicing doctor or other health professional who serves as a mentor or preceptor. The Southern Kentucky Area Health Education Center (AHEC) helps support that training by locating willing professional mentors and managing the housing of the students throughout the Southern Ky. AHEC's 15-county area.

AHEC also provides research and continuing education services to doctors and other health professionals.

community health education programs, and health career guidance for the region's young people. The Southern Kentucky AHEC program, which consists of a staff of six, is administered through the University of Kentucky and is located at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care, Inc.

A cornerstone of the AHEC's mission is the student training support, and it is invaluable to students.

"It's great because you actually see the disease and correlate it with the textbook," Pope said. "Things start clicking. Plus, you get the opportunity to interact with the patients."

She owes much of the value of the rotation to her preceptor, Dr. Rowe.

"He's great, really intelligent, and he has a wonderful bedside manner," Pope noted, "Plus, he's willing to teach, and that's so crucial."

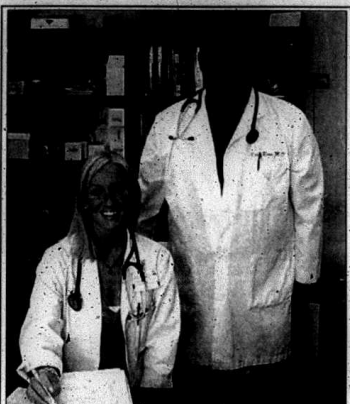
No one knows that better than Dr. Rowe himself. A Rockcastle native and 1990 graduate of the U of L School of Medicine, he did two AHEC rotations in the area during his training.

"The AHEC rotations give students the opportunity to experience rural medicine, which is good because almost all medical schools are in urban areas," Rowe said. "It's educational for me."

Mentoring also allows preceptors to stay up to date. "As a preceptor, you get the chance to review medicine," Rowe said. "It's educational for me to hear what they're teaching here now because it's amazing how fast medicine changes."

"Plus, the teaching process gives you a little more confidence in what you're doing. If you can explain it well to someone else, it helps you understand it better."

Pope says Rowe's explanations are crystal clear. "Now if someone can just explain to her who Mark Pope is."

September is National Cholesterol Education Month and the theme is "Know your cholesterol numbers, know your risk." For all of those wondering about their cholesterol levels, now is the time to find out.

Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. is offering free cholesterol screenings at the Rockcastle Medical Arts Building the week of September 13th through September 17th. Cholesterol Screenings will begin at 9:00 AM and will end at 12:00 PM each day. No appointment is necessary, but participants should fast at least 12 hours before their test. Cholesterol is a fat like substance that builds up in the artery walls. Dietary fat and genetics determine blood cholesterol levels. High cholesterol is among the top four risk

factors for heart disease. Other risk factors are smoking, high blood pressure, and lack of exercise.

There are two types of cholesterol, low density lipoprotein (LDL) and high density lipoprotein (HDL). LDL is considered "bad" cholesterol because it moves slowly through the arteries causing buildup. HDL is considered good cholesterol because it not only carries away cholesterol from the arteries and back to the liver, where it is removed from the body, but it also removes bad cholesterol.

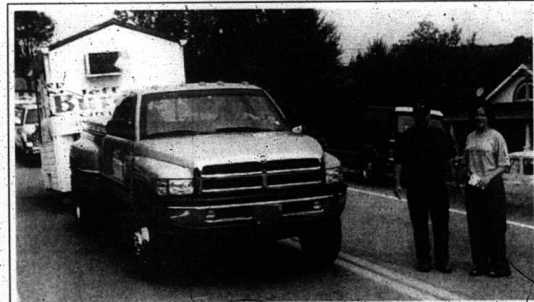

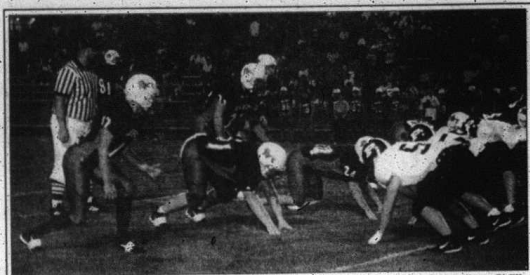

The Rockcastle County Rockets pitched a shut-out on Friday night when they held Pikeville to 162 yards of total offense and came away with an 18-0 victory.

"I was extremely pleased with the way our team played against Pikeville," said head coach Tom Larkey.  
"I believe Pikeville will be a contender for a state championship in class A this year," Larkey continued. Last year Pikeville lost in the regional championship to Lynn Camp.

The ROCK defense stopped Pikeville three times inside the 20 yard line, which was the key to Friday night's victory.

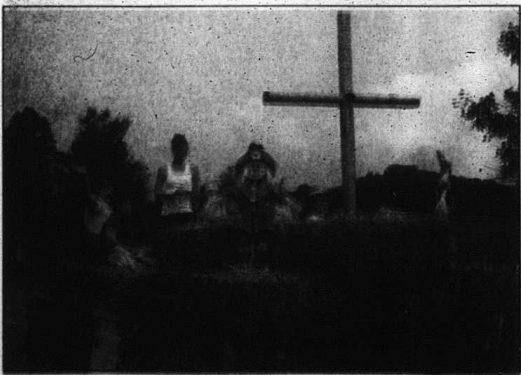
The float from Pine Hill Holiness Church was the first place winner in the float competition on Saturday at Livingston.



Kilty Fridemore's float finished second at the Livingston Homecoming.



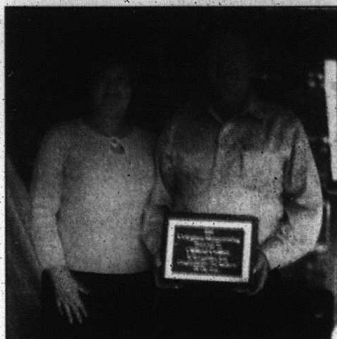
The float from Bible Baptist Church placed third in Saturday's Livingston Homecoming parade.



There was an Old Time Religion float from Pine Hill Missionary Baptist Church in Saturday's Parade at Livingston.

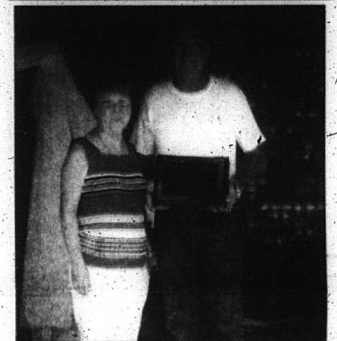
### Business of the Year

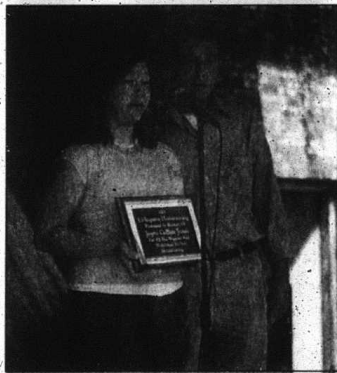
### Oldest Business in Livingston

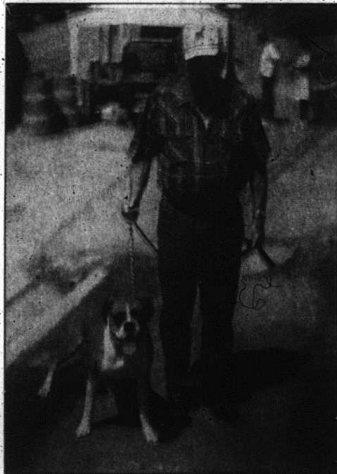
### Joyce Jones honored

## Agricultural News

### Conservation Reserve Program

General sign-up for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) began Aug. 10 and will run through Sept. 24, 2004. CRP is the country's largest conservation program on private lands with 329,929 acres in Kentucky under contract.

CRP protects fragile cropland from erosion and improves the nation's natural resources. By reducing water runoff and sedimentation, the program safeguards surface water and helps improve the condition of lakes, rivers, ponds and streams. Acreage enrolled in CRP is devoted to resource-conserving vegetative covers, making the program a major contributor to more abundant wildlife populations.

CRP participants voluntarily remove environmentally sensitive land from agricultural production by entering into long-term contracts for 10 to 15 years. In exchange, participants receive annual rental payments and a payment of up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing conservation practices.

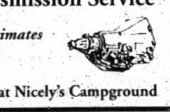

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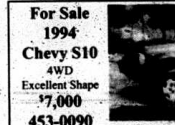
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## "Hall of Fame"

Rockcastle County has one of the finest BINGO Halls around. Located right next to I-75 on the North bound side at exit 62. Valley Bingo is on top of the hill next to Curry's Shell Mart. They have 7pm sessions Monday thru Saturday with midnight sessions on Friday and Saturday. The Kentucky Music Hall of Fame & Museum (LIC # 0001415) is one of four non-profit organizations that benefits from Valley Bingo. The others are: Rockcastle Co. Tourism (LIC # 0001414), Rockcastle Col Youth League Football (LIC # 0001410) & Rockcastle Co. Little League Baseball (LIC # 0001327). Each session conducts ten games with a possible \$5,000 jackpot. Children may attend all sessions except the Fri. & Sat. midnight sessions, and smokers are welcome. For more information you may call Valley Bingo Hall at 606-256-5939, the KY Music Hall of Fame at 1-877-556-3263, Rockcastle Co. Tourism at 606-256-9814.

I mentioned the group Exile earlier. You can see an exhibit on these Kentucky boys here at the Hall of Fame & Museum. I have a few high lights of their career that perhaps you would like to read.

Among rock listeners, Exile is remembered as the one-hit wonder responsible for 1978's number one smash "Kiss You All Over." However, in the early '80s, the Kentucky bred band reinvented itself as a country outfit - and a hugely successful one at that. Exile was actually formed all the way back in 1963 in Berea, KY, by singer/guitarist J.P. Pennington, the son of Ossie and Countess Creek Girl Lily May Ledford. At that time, they were a rock & roll combo known as the Exiles, and got their first exposure by playing some Kentucky dates during 1965-1966 with the Dick Clark Caravan of Stars package tour, which featured pop stars like Brian Hyland, Tommy Roe, and Freddy Cannon.

The group relocated to Lexington, KY, in 1968 and switched musical styles several times, also recording singles for labels ranging from Columbia to smaller local imprints. Their name was shortened to Exile in 1973, at which point the group featured lead singer/guitarist Pennington, lead singer Jimmy Stokley, keyboardist Buzz Cornelson, bassist Kenny Weir, and drummer Bob Jones. That same year, they issued a self-titled album on Wooden Nickel, and their strong regional popularity eventually led to a deal with A&O in 1977, when they scored their first pop-chart entry with the minor hit "Try It On."

Exile then switched to Warner Bros., with a lineup that now featured Pennington, Stokley, Cornelson, second keyboardist Marlon Hargis, bassist Sonny LeMaire, and drummer Steve Goetzman. Their 1978 label debut, "Mixed Emotions," produced an enormous hit in the disco-tinged pop number "Kiss You All Over," which topped the charts and also proved to be their only major success. After a

few follow-up singles flopped, Exile returned to the clubs of Kentucky and completely revamped their sound, especially when lead singer Stokley departed in 1980. He was replaced by singer/guitarist Les Taylor, who helped spearhead the group's transformation into a country band with a strong Southern rock flavor. In the meantime, some of their songs were covered for hits by major country artists like Janie Fricke ("It Ain't Easy Being Easy") and Alabama ("The Closer You Get," "Take Me Down"). Helped by this exposure, the new Exile signed with Epic in 1983, and soon notched their first Top 40 hit on the country charts with "High Cost of Leaving." By this time, Cornelson had left the group.

Over the next few years, Exile continued with an astounding streak of chart-topping country hits. 1984 brought "Wake Up in Love," "I Don't Wanna Be a Memory," and "Give Me One More Chance"; 1985 duplicated that success with "Crazy for Your Love," "Hang on to Your Heart," and "She's a Miracle," with Lee Carroll now in place of Hargis. Through the

next three years didn't find the band topping the charts with such regularity, they did score several more number ones: 1986's "I Could Get Used to You" and "I'll Be Me," 1987's "She's Too Good to Be True," and 1988's "I Can't Get Close Enough." Les Taylor subsequently left the group for a solo career (replaced by Mark Jones) and had a couple of minor hits on Epic; Pennington found the same on MCA when he also departed in 1990. The remainder of Exile replaced him with Paul Martin and attempted to soldier on with Arista. They actually did land a couple of Top Ten hits in 1990 with "Nobody's Talking" and "Yes," both co-written by Sonny LeMaire and producer Randy Sharp. However, their success was fleeting, and Arista dropped them after their second album. The group disbanded in 1993, playing a farewell concert in Lexington with numerous past members rejoining. By 1996, Pennington and Taylor had reunited to tour the nostalgia circuit with a new Exile lineup. Take care, and drop in for a visit at the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame & Museum in Rockcastle County.
