Fiscal Court raises employee health insurance coverage

Bucking the trend of government and health insurance coverage for employees, the Rockcastle County Fiscal-Court voted Tuesday, at their regular meeting, to up employees coverage and to absolo the additional \$10.35 per month premium increase. The court went with the same company, CHA, but chose CHA 13 set he plan that would be used for the 37-39 employees covered under their group plan. Under the old plan, an individual had to meet a \$500 deductible for office visits in matter. group plan. Onder the old plan, an individual had to meet a \$500 deduct-ible for office visits, in-patient and out-patient services, diagnostic testone to other visits, in-patient and out-patient services, diagnostic testing and emergency room visits and then pay 25% of the charge. Under the new plan, the deductible does not apply to office visits or to diagnostic testing, only a \$20 co-pay will be made at the time of the treatment.

set. As people who own property reach the age of 65, or become dis-abled, they become eligible to have \$28,000 exempted by the PVA-office from the amount of taxes they have to pay. 


