President Bush takes county nation

Jeff Burdette keeps seat as Circuit Judge

Nearly one thousand supporters celebrated Tuesday night at the Red Barn in Renfro Valley when Somerset Attorney Scott Lawless called current Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette, a Rockcastle County native and a county attorney here for ten years, to congratulate him on his victory.

They were probably celebrating at home on Wednesday when Mass. Senator John Kerry, the Democratic nominee conceded to the President, Wednesday afternoon.

"Twila and I would only say we are so thankful for the support we have received in this campaign," the Judge said.

"Because of the number of votes in Pulaski County we knew it would be an uphill battle, but with all of the support we received from family, friends and voters in other counties, we were able to hold onto the seat," he said.

Tuesday night's win made Burdette only the second Circuit Judge from Rockcastle County to be elected to the bench from 28th circuit, which includes Pulaski, Rockcastle and Lincoln County since Judge, Ed Denny, served in the 1940s.

Denny was appointed a United States Attorney and did not run for re-election to his circuit judge's seat.

Burdette will be in the circuit judge's seat until 2008, when he will have to run again.

Burdette defeated Lawless 17,451 votes to 14,820. Burdette carried all 18 precincts in Lincoln County, winning 4,369 to 2,084 and he carried Rockcastle County by 1,921 votes.

Burdette's biggest accomplishment on Tuesday may have been his small margin of loss in Pulaski County.

Burdette, 42, lost to Lawless, a former Pulaski County assistant county attorney by only 1,575 votes. Rockcastle and Pulaski District Judge Mike Henry will also be moving on after defeating Knox and Lau-

rel County Circuit Judge Rod Messer of London for a seat on the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

Henry has been a judge in the two counties for the past twelve years. The second division court of appeal's judgeship includes 27 counties.

Local attorney William D. Gregory, a former county attorney, and Somerset Attorney Norma Adams are on the nominating committee, which will present three names to the judicial nominating committee, a committee which will then present a name to Governor Ernie Fletcher for appointment.

Kentucky's Chief Justice Joe Lambert of Mt. Vernon is chairman of that committee.

"I hate to lose Judge Henry, but I am very happy for him, he has been a very good Judge to work with and I know he will do a great job on the Court of Appeals," said Rockcastle County Circuit Court Clerk Teresa Vanzant.

Henry will take office in January and will replace Tom Emberton, who stepped down in June with two years left on his term.

Henry won, although raising \$25,000 less than Messer.

Rockcastle and Pulaski County will also have a new district judge.

Former assistant Commonwealth Attorney David Tapp easily defeated attorney Bruce Singleton by nearly 7,000 votes. He will fill the unexpired term of Judge Walter McGuire.

Jackie Renner, a former council member, who made an unsuccessful run for Mayor two years ago will be one of the new members of the Mt. Vernon City Council. Write-in candidate Sharon Saylor defeated current council member Lonetta Daugherty 67-64, also a write-in candidate, will join incumbent members Betty Carter Bassell, Joe Mullins and Wayne Bullock on the council, along with Shelley Raines Lewis, another freshman member of the council.

Steve Renfro and Bryan Hinsel

did not seek re-election.

In Brodhead, Rick Branham, will join incumbent council members, Everett Albright, Johnny Wilkop and Larry Taylor. Jeff King lost to Branham by six votes.

At Livingston, Ed McHargue, Katha Carpenter, Charlie Newcomb and Bobby Phelps will serve on next year's council.

Longtime council member Todd Mink and Bobby Proper were defeated.

Locally, 6,425 of the 11,800 Rockcastle County voters went to the polls for a percentage of 54%.

Nationwide, the percentage was just over 70%.

President Bush carried the county 4,810 votes to John Kerry's 1,320 and incumbent U.S. Senator Jim Bunning won 3,956 to Ky. State Senator Daniel Mongiardo's 1,812.

Bunning was re-elected statewide

City of Mt. Vernon accepts insurance bids

At a called meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council last Thursday night, bids were accepted for liability and property insurance and employee health insurance.

Gallager/Scottsdale of London was the successful bidder for liability and property insurance, quoting a bid of \$36,171.32, a savings of \$16,262.27 over last year's premium with St. Paul, Public Entity Insurance.

This savings helped to offset the increase in the premium for employee health insurance. In January of 2004, the city went into the state health plan and Bluegrass Health got the bid for the city for 2005.

The city paid \$288.36 plus 60% of the plan chosen for 2004 and, with the increase, will pay \$385.64 per employee plus 60% of the plan chosen for 2005, an overall estimated increase of \$38,000.

Points East

Earlier this unbelievably warm, November afternoon, I went to the garden to scrounge for some tomatoes, the last few standing leaves or lettuce and spinach and a couple of both red and green bell peppers. Coarsely chopped along with a Grimes Golden apple, then liberally sprinkled with chopped chives, rosemary, parsley and basil from the herb bed, and finally dressed with three huge dollops of blue cheese dressing, lunch was nearly ready.

Self-served with a huge chunk of left over corn bread and a tall glass of V 8, my salad made the absolute perfect mid-day meal even though I dinced alone.

Actually this column is not about eating or gardening. I simply could not resist the temptation to make you salivate.

Upon stepping into the garden I heard a rattling behind a one or two overgrown tomatoe hook and took a step or two in its direction when out walked a long green red-tailed hawk. It was no farther away than ten feet and I say that it was startled by a huge understatement.

The hawk and I stood stock still for perhaps a minute or so sizing each other up. Given its size coloration I believe it was a male. It was tawnyish brown on back and wings, with brown flecks on its chest and had snow white leggings. I believe females are much darker this time of year.

Anyway, the hawk stood nearly erect and from head to toe, I would guess that it was around 30 inches tall. I took a step toward it and it took a step back. I backed up and it took one step forward, apparently content with the distance between us but seemingly unafraid and certainly not overly concerned about my presence or proximity.

I turned around and slowly walked back to the house, intent on getting a camera. The hawk turned his head over

sideways and watched me leave and seemed, as curious as I was about exactly what was happening here.

I glanced out the living room window after I had made sure the camera was loaded and equipped with a zoom lens. Holding the camera behind me I casually walked back to the garden, but I could tell that the bird's curiosity had turned to wariness. Sure enough, when I started to ease the camera up to my eye, he took a wing, but instead of immediately high tailing it to parts unknown, he made a 360 circle around the house no more than 10 feet off the ground and then flew directly over my head so close that I felt the air fanned by his wings.

He alighted in on a tree snag, several hundred yards up the hill in the back 40, but even with a 200mm zoom lens, he was too far away to fill much of the frame. Still he was recognizable as a bird of prey. I shot a couple of frames at that distance to go with the half dozen I attempted when he lifted off and flew away. I doubt that any of the latter will be focus but I can't wait to develop them.

In the meantime, I have searched around the spot where he was standing and there is no sign that he had made a kill.

A couple of nights ago I watched an hour long "Nature" program on KET that had to do with red tails nesting and raising young on New York City's Fifth Avenue. The hawks became basically fearless on humans. I can't help wondering whether or not my visitor was headed south from Central Park and whether or not he intends to stick around.

Point Link for the winter. I will certainly keep an eye out and keep you posted if he takes up here. In the meantime, I will worry about Chuckles the Chipmunk's well being as he scurries along the rock wall. As much as I admire raptors, I'd give in if Chuckles became a meal for one.

Before anyone writes to this newspaper to have me kicked off its pages, those are not my sentiments. CNN founder Ted Turner made such a statement in 1997 as he was receiving the Philadelphia Liberty Medal. He went on to say that, since most of the world is at peace, it is time to change, with the times. However, even as he spoke, a then mostly silent war was being waged against the United States, known well to those behind the scenes in intelligence circles.

Give Mr. Turner the benefit of the doubt. After all, he was probably under the impression the world had taken a turn for the better. But never, in the entire history of the human race, have peaceful people been free from those who seek to dominate or destroy them. Even today, three years after a devastating attack against us, two schools of thought remain. One, placate the enemy and do not act against them without consensus. Two, take the fight to the enemy on our terms. 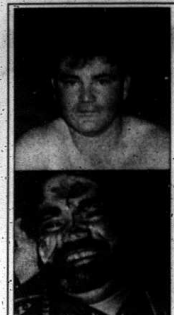

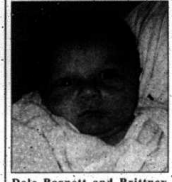

RHRCC adding 19 beds and at least 45 jobs

By early 2006, Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center will have a new 19-bed unit that will care for more people who are ventilator dependent. This \$2.3 million addition will bring the hospital's total number of beds to 105, with 79 designated for ventilator patients, making RHRCC one of the largest ventilator programs in the nation.

Statewide demand for the specialized care RHRCC provides prompted the facility to challenge the state's moratorium on new long-term care beds.

"It took several years and a lot of hard work, but we are pleased that the state has agreed to allow us to expand," Steve Estes, president and CEO, said. "We know that our care makes a big difference for people whose lives have been dramatically changed by injury or illness, and we are pleased that we can now help more people."

Along with new beds there is a need for more employees to staff the unit.

"We estimate that we will hire 45-50 new staff members when this addition opens," Estes said. "This includes respiratory therapists, nurses, nursing assistants and other support staff. These jobs will offer salaries that are higher than or comparable to others in Rockcastle County."

The additional staff members will make the organization the county's largest employer with approximately 540 employees at the hospital and Rockcastle Health and Rehabilitation Center.

Rockcastle Hospital is at the forefront of economic development in the county, said Joseph Lambert, chairman of the hospital's board. "It's a rewarding experience for this com-

munity to watch the hospital grow to meet our health care needs while providing more good-paying jobs."

One obstacle the hospital faces is finding enough qualified employees to fill the newly created jobs. That's why the hospital has teamed with Somerset Community and Technical College to make it easier and more financially feasible for local residents to become health care professionals.

Rockcastle Hospital is offering scholarships and providing financial assistance for nine people to enroll in and complete LPN (licensed practical nurse) and RCP (respiratory care professional) programs through SCTC. The four LPN and five RCP students will have jobs waiting for them when they graduate two years.

"We anticipate this new program will help us fill our staffing needs in the long-term as the hospital continues to grow," Estes said. "We also see the two-year respiratory therapist program offered at Rockcastle Area Technology Center as a plus for us. Anyone who's interested in a good education and a good salary can apply that in a relatively short time without leaving Rockcastle County."

Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. is a not-for-profit community hospital that operates inpatient and outpatient acute care programs, 60 long-term care beds for ventilator-dependent patients, a home health care service, the Medical Arts building and Rockcastle Health and Rehabilitation Center, Inc. The hospital was established in 1956, is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations (JCAHO), and treats patients from across Kentucky, Tennessee and several other states.

SCC upgrades Respiratory Therapy Program Rockcastle Hospital offers four LPN and four RT scholarships to SCC

The Somerset Community College Respiratory Therapy Program, which is located in Mt. Vernon at the Rockcastle Area Technology Center, will be upgraded to produce graduates who are Registered Respiratory Therapists beginning in 2005. Previously, graduates of the SCC Program were Certified Respiratory Therapists.

"It kind of like the difference between being a Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) and a Registered Nurse," said Carl Baker, the director of the SCC Respiratory Therapy Program. "A Registered Respiratory Therapist is qualified to provide a greater degree of care. For our graduates, the change is important because Registered Respiratory Therapists make more money than Certified Respiratory Therapists."

In order to complete the upgrade, students beginning in the program after Jan. 1, 2005 will need to complete two years and one semester in order to be ready to take their state-licensing exam. Previously, the Respiratory Therapy Program offered classes during the summer months, but that option has been eliminated.

One of the major additions to the program will be training in clinical sciences, which will be part of the state-licensing exam. Students will be required to do extra training at Rockcastle Hospital, other area hospitals and clinics in order to qualify for an associate's degree. However, the new program will allow students to specialize in several areas of respiratory therapy like Neo-natal and Pulmonary Function Testing.

The SCC Respiratory Therapy Program, like the entire health-care career program at SCC, is a selective admission program. That means that students are required to meet certain criteria before they can be accepted into the program. For example, one of the criteria for the SCC Respiratory Therapy Program is the successful completion of classes in Anatomy and either College Algebra or General Mathematics. Other factors for admission are scores on the ACT and Compass Tests, the completion of an observation session at Rockcastle Hospital and interviews with the faculty.

The May graduating class in the SCC Respiratory Therapy Program received a 100 percent pass rate for the state licensing exam, as did the SCC LPN and RN programs.

"We think our perfect pass rate is an indication of the high quality of our health-care programs and the faculty who teach at Somerset Community College," said Dr. Jo Marshall, the President of SCC.

Baker said that the job market for Registered Respiratory Therapists is

excellent. He said that Rockcastle Hospital would be seeking 15 new, full-time employees in the near future.

"Perhaps the most telling endorsement of the SCC healthcare career program is the announcement this week that Rockcastle Hospital will be providing nine new scholarships to students attending Somerset Community College. According to the Health Care Director of Public Relations for Rockcastle Hospital, the facility will be offering five scholarships in the SCC Respiratory Therapy Program and four scholarships to the SCC Licensed Practical Nursing Program. The hospital plans to offer the scholarship opportunities to students who will make a commitment to work for the hospital for two years following their graduation. The scholarships will provide for the cost of tuition and books. Shaffer said that additional financial aid might be awarded to scholarship students depending upon need.

"I think it's great," Baker said. "I think these scholarships are an indication of the confidence that Rockcastle Hospital has in our program. We appreciate the hospital's support."

Shaffer said that Rockcastle Hospital has already awarded the four LPN scholarships to SCC students currently in the Licensed Practical Nursing Program. The hospital hopes to award the Respiratory Therapy scholarship during January 2005.

Baker added that one or two slots are still available for the Respiratory Therapy Program beginning after Jan. 1, 2005. He urged anyone who would be interested in obtaining an associate's degree in Respiratory Therapy to contact him at (606) 256-4346.

Beginning in January 2005, SCC will admit 50 students into its expanded LPN program, while Rockcastle Hospital will be offering four full scholarships for students who will obtain their LPN license and agree to work at the hospital for two years after graduation.

SCC has completed plans to expand the LPN program. This spring SCC will admit 25 LPN students to the program at its Laurel Campus. However, SCC has added 50 additional LPN openings by expanding its program to the Somerset Campus.

Licensed Practical Nurses provide routine bedside care, evaluate patient needs, develop patient care plans and supervise care provided by nurses aides. Some LPNs work in private homes and prepare meals and teach family members simple nursing skills.

Rockcastle Hospital announced this week that it will add a 19-bed addition to its facility. The expansion will require approximately 47 new, full-time employees. Rockcastle Hospital specializes in the care of

patients with respiratory problems. Therefore, many of the new employees the hospital needs will be LPNs and Respiratory Therapy Assistants. Somerset Community College has a two-year program for both professions.

Battling for Camp Wildcat

Organizers of the annual Civil War re-enactment at Camp Wildcat were pleased with the visitor and re-enactor turnout, which brought several hundred people to the area. There were over 350 re-enactors complete with artillery, cavalry, and infantry units from all over the United States.

One of the organizers Shirley Landen, a member of the Laurel County Home Guard, which organizes the event, said attendance Friday was down from last year because of the wet cooler weather but that attendance picked up Saturday and Sunday. "We had units as far as South Carolina, Virginia, and Ohio and other states who have become regulars at the event."

Landen said Camp Wildcat has a reputation for treating participating re-enactors well and meeting their needs. "We treat them well with plenty of firewood that we haul for them, hay for the horses, good food and easy access to water."

The re-enactment always comes on a weekend close to the real battle date of 21 October 1861 when Confederate forces under General Felix K. Zollicoffer commanding East District #2 Tennessee Brigade consisting of the 11th, 17th, 19th, 20th & 29th Tennessee Infantry, 15th Mississippi Infantry, Company A 1st Tennessee Flying Artillery, and the 1st, 2nd, & 3rd Tennessee Cavalry attacked the Federal 1st Brigade of the Army of the Cumberland consisting of the 7th Kentucky Infantry, 14th & 17th Ohio Infantry, 33rd Indiana Infantry, Battery B 1st Ohio Light Artillery, 1st Kentucky Cavalry and Home Guards from Laurel and Rockcastle Counties. During the battle Zollicoffer had artillery fire placed on the Federal position and assaulted the mountain three times but failed to break the entrenched Federals.

Camp Wildcat occurred during the first year of the war (1861) and was the first Civil War battle fought in Kentucky and spelled "A dark and bloody" chapter of our states' storied history. Though the casualties were smaller as compared to later Kentucky battles such as Perryville and Richmond, the conflict at Wildcat was a significant historic event in that it occurred early in the war and denied the Confederacy a foothold in Kentucky when crucial political events were shaping Kentucky's role in the war.

Attention to details and a knack for historical accuracy makes the re-enactment one of the best in the state. Unit commanders are asked to inspect their units to ensure uniforms and weapons are period correct and worn properly. The event has become one of the fastest growing Liv-

ing History re-enactments in the country. A survey of re-enactors rated last year's Wildcat re-enactment as the second best event finishing only behind the Sacramento re-enactment in Western Kentucky.

There were a few locals that participated in the event including the Rockcastle County JROTC that supervised the parking of vehicles, Pastor Mike Bryant and his two sons who portrayed 19th century parsons and also conducted the period worship service on Sunday. The Laurel County Home Guard for his long association with the event presented Pastor Bryant with an art print depicting a Civil War Chaplain. Re-enactor Bobby Wilson presented as a soldier.

Historian and author David Owens had a 10x10 terrain model of the battle displayed for a visual aid where he gave lectures concerning how the battle developed. He also signed copies of his supernatural novel "Where Frankie Met Glory: The Hunt of Hoosier Knob" that is set during the battle.

Landen said something the organizers would like to see is more local people getting involved with the event. Laurel and Rockcastle had only a few grade school classes to attend the Living History events and no social studies classes at all while other area schools were well represented. The schools that did come observed a very educational and entertaining event while teachers were provided with teaching guides to use in their classrooms to access the activity. "There's a lot of neat stuff in these lesson plans," noted one visiting teacher. Three particular events were extremely popular when re-enactors presenting as Presidents Lincoln and Davis debated the constitutional rights of slavery and succession while other re-enactors portraying doctors demonstrated 19th century medical practices and blacksmiths showed how everyday items from yesteryear were made.

But the most interesting and educational event was the battles fought on Saturday and Sunday. The artillery guns opened up first and then the Rebel cavalry charged (supported by the infantry) the Federal position but was unable to break the boys in blue and were pushed back by the Federal infantry. One Confederate re-enactor said after the battle on Sunday, "Dag-gone it, we never can whip them Yankees up yonder." Referring to the battle scenario that requires the Federals to win the re-enactment, as did the real Union Soldiers.

Don Dawson from Middletown Ohio who portrays one of the Field Surgeons said it best, "This is a nice event! It gets better every year."

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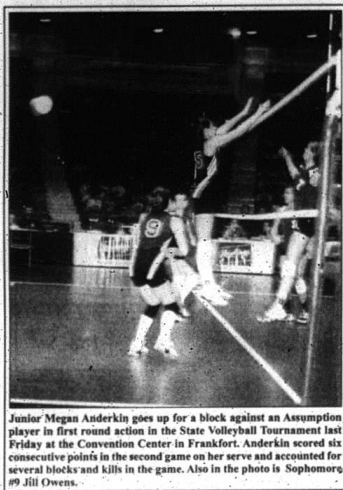
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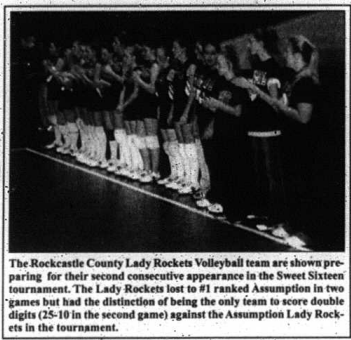

Bucky Skinner was a perfect four for four in extra point kicks.

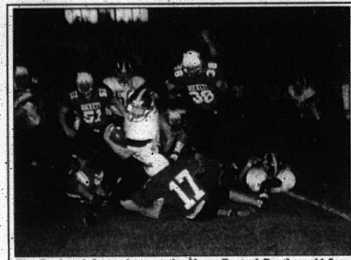
Defensively the Rockets were led in tackles by middle linebacker Chris Croucher with 12 tackles and assists.

Hendrick Motorsports Chevrolet, took the checkered flag over Mark Martin, the atmosphere changed dramatically.
"This win is dedicated to all the Hendrick Motorsports family and

employees that lost their life last Sunday," said Johnson.
For most fans, it was a sigh of relief, as this week has been one of mourning for the 10 people on board a Hendrick airplane that crashed last Sunday near Martinsville, Va.

Johnson was the winner of that race also, but he did not participate in the normal victory lane celebration. "This week, almost all the Hendrick team employees were waiting for Johnson, including Jeff Gordon, Terry Labonte, Brian Vickers, and all the crew chiefs and other team employees.

"It's incredible," continued Johnson. "I didn't think about it until I got the lead and then I got goose bumps. This has been the worst week possible to have to come back and race.

"To be able to win the race last week where our friends were lost and then come back this week is awesome."
Johnson did not lead the most laps, that honor went to Mark Martin, the second-place finisher.

Martin, driver of the No. 6 Roush Racing Ford led 227 laps, and appeared to be on the way to his second win of the season.
After a restart, late in the race, Martin was leading, when he was challenged by teammate, Carl Edwards. Another teammate, Greg Biffle, who was a lap down, decided he was going to race with the two, and as the three raced side-by-side, Johnson was able to slip under Martin for the lead.

After the race, Martin refused to place blame on either of his teammates, saying, "Circumstances cost

us that race, and no one on our team had anything to do with it."
Edwards finished third, and Biffle wound up 10th.

personal check to clear.

Under a new federal law aimed at streamlining banking, personal checks now may be electronically transmitted between financial institutions. This means funds can be zapped out of your checking account within a matter of hours, instead of days. And, with banks charging up to \$30 for a bounced check and many retailers doing the same, the practice of writing a check today on funds that won't be deposited until tomorrow, or later, is about to get riskier.

Additionally, the practice of returning canceled checks to account holders, already being phased out at many banks, eventually will cease altogether under the new law.

In Rockcastle County, both banks will continue to provide images of your checks in statements, except for purchases made with your debit card on stores that take your check and process it as a point of purchase item.

At Old Navy for example, when a check is used to pay for a purchase, the check is run through a scamper

which takes off the pertinent information needed and the check is returned to the payor at the time of the purchase. This is a point of purchase transaction and your account is debited within hours of the transaction. Check 21 will also withdraw the funds from your account within hours but the actual check is either destroyed or filed at the bank where the check is deposited by the payee.

According to Tammy Howard at Citizens Bank, 9/11 was the catalyst for the new law. When that catastrophe occurred more than \$40 billion in checks sat in limbo for the three days that air transportation was grounded.

Actual implementation of this new procedure will be gradual, with many banks holding off until next year. But consumers should assume their checks will clear within a day or less, because there's no way of knowing if the bank receiving their checks will clear it instantly or not.

Lisa Lee Freeman, deputy finance editor of Consumer Reports magazine, complains that the law benefits banks more than consumers. While accounts will be debited swiftly, banks may continue to impose waiting periods before clearing checks deposited to their customers' accounts.

In that way, financial institutions may continue to enjoy "the float,"

while customers must have cash on the barrelhead.

The Check Clearing for the 21st Century Act, or "Check 21" allows banks to digitally scan the check and use that electronic image as a legal document. That, in turn, can be transferred between banks in a matter of minutes, at far lower cost than tracking and jitting the paper checks around the country.

But, in creating the electronic scan, the original paper check can be damaged or destroyed. In any event, they will be physically sent back to the issuing bank.

So customers wanting copies of their checks will have to rely on "substituted" copies, copies of the digital scan. Banks may charge extra for these.

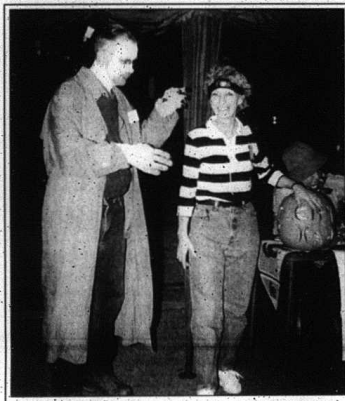

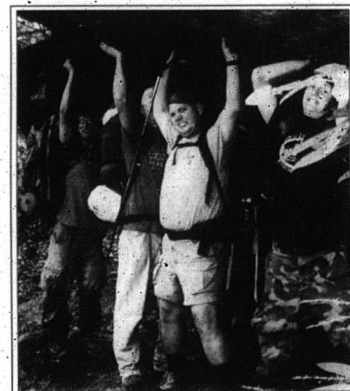
began raining about dark.

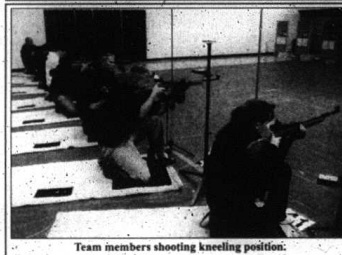

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Rockcastle ATC students build replica of World Trade Center

The Rockcastle Area Technology Center is finalizing the replica of the World Trade Center to be displayed on the front lawn of the school. The public is invited to attend a dedication of the structures on Veterans Day Nov. 11th, at 1:30 p.m. The two towers, made of aluminum, will stand almost 14 feet high, which is 1/100th of the size of the World Trade Center towers.

This project utilized the work of all educational programs that are available at the area technology center. Ralph Baker, Principal of the Rockcastle Area Technology Center, said the welding class began the project by planning, drawing and fabricating the towers. The metal part of the construction is complete. The electricity students completed wiring an external lighting source to shine on the replica during the nighttime. Business and office students will contribute by making brochures to pass out to community members explaining the project and advertising the dedication ceremony. The Health

Science students conducted research about September 11; they investigated death tolls, injuries and disabilities that were a result of the attack. The Automotive Technology students looked at the traffic problems that ensued after the attack, which inhibited the movement of fire trucks and other emergency vehicles.

"We wanted to do something to recognize people and families that were affected by September 11 and to cultivate a spirit of patriotism," Baker said. He hopes the students involved have gained a sense of pride in their work and in community involvement. Some students went on a field trip to give them inspiration concerning the project. They traveled to Cumberland College to see a 10-foot beam from the World Trade Center wreckage. The beam was dedicated to the college in honor of a corner from the Williamsburg area that went to New York City to help identify bodies after September 11. Baker said the students got to see a video

of Cumberland College's memorial for September 11 and it gave them an idea of what they were about to undertake. "It was a good learning experience," said senior Adam Hensley, a welding student.

Welding teacher Sherman Cook said the students have worked hard to construct the two towers. He said normally students are excited about a project then get bored with it in a couple of days. This has not been the case for this project. In three weeks, students in the advanced welding class built a skeleton of the towers with aluminum piping. After covering it with aluminum sheets, they hammered and welded the seams for a smooth finish. "They have worked really well," Cook said.

Last year seniors Adam Hensley and Josh Burke did a lot of the welding on the replica. Hensley said the most challenging work was making sure all the pieces fit together. Burke said through the project he has learned how to make accurate measurements and has enjoyed tackling the pieces together. Hensley realizes what goals this project has. "We are doing something good for the community. It's for everybody in the United States, not just us," he said. This year advanced Welding class has completed all the welding and are now polishing and making final preparations on the towers.

Cook said this process has not been without challenges. Between the first pricing of the sheets of aluminum, the price almost doubled six months later when it came time to order materials. This threw off their estimations of costs. The initial plan of cutting the 1,700 windows in the towers and using internal lighting was foiled when they found it exhausted their consumables at a fast and expensive rate. Students put a swift design up the tower walls to replace the windows.

Though the project will be complete by Nov. 11, Cook hopes the project will leave a lasting impression on the students. He summed up the goals of the project saying, "I hope the whole time students work, they keep in mind what happened to bring this project about. I hope it keeps them from forgetting September 11 especially since we are a good piece away from New York."

We want to thank EST Tool in Brodhead for making some fixtures for the project. Ms. Jean Towery, and Woodmen of the World for donating 2 American flags. Also, Marvin E. Owens Monument Company in Brodhead donated a granite marker to identify the projects purpose and dedicate it to the people who were killed or injured by the terrorist. The money for supplies, welding consumables and student field trips was given by a School To Careers Grant by Forward In The Fifth from Berea Ky. The students will get to take a trip to Frankfort in January to showcase their work to Kentucky School Leaders and Government Officials at the Tech Prep showcase.

Just a reminder for the public to come by the school and see the towers either on Veterans Day at 1:30 p.m. for the ceremony any time after that they will be on display on the school lawn.

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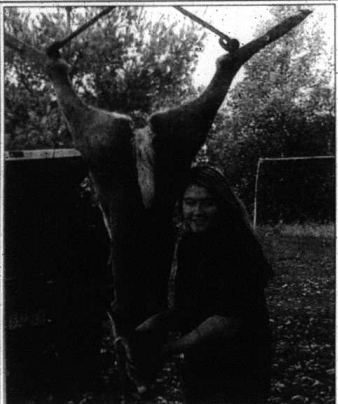

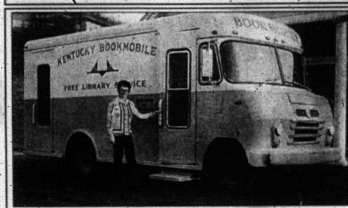

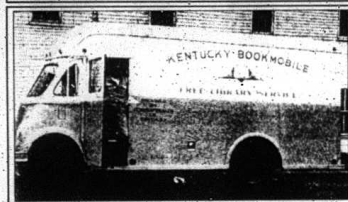
