## Rescue and firefighter volunteers speak out

There are apparent problems in Rockcastle County's 911 dispatching service. At least according to one local volunteer firefighter, Fire Chief Gary Hansel.

"We simply try to help the community, but we are not satisfied with the way things are going at 911," said Hansel on Monday night.

"There has been problem after problem since 911 went into service nine years ago and it seems to only be getting worse, the outspoken chief said.

Mt. Vernon firefighters and rescue workers respond to well over 200 calls a year and they are upset with the dispatching services they get.

"We had our own frequency for a reason because we are so busy, other departments were talking over us and that frequency was taken away from us on July 1, but when the new board went in it was given back," he said.

"We simply want to do the best job we can and dispatching is obviously the most important part of what we do, besides what we do on the scene," Hansel said. "If we can't get people to the scene of a wreck or a fire, then what good are we," he said.

Several firefighters and rescue workers from the Mt. Vernon department voiced their displeasure on Monday night as well and were wondering why Rockcastle County had not moved on to the enhanced version of the service.

911 Director Bonnie Kostk said on Tuesday, "Rome wasn't built in a day and it takes a long time to get everyone's physical address in the computer. We are working to get that accomplished and hope to have it completed in the next year," she said.

The 911 board consists of nine members, but are currently one short, after chairman and State Police Detective John Yates recently resigned, at the request of his Commander in the London Post.

"I asked the Post Commander to recommend another person, but to date he has not responded to my request," Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Bruce Carlfortis said.

Local director of the Emergency Management office of Rockcastle County, Hal Holbrook, has taken over as interim chairman of the 911 board.

The fiscal court has only one appointee on the board after the format was changed from 13 to nine members. When the board was first organized, each magistrate had a nominee on the board, but again that has been reduced to one for the court, that is currently Ann Gentry Taylor, a former board member who was nominated to replace Richard Dean, the magistrate's former appointee.

Carlfortis said he would appoint someone to replace Yates on the board as his appointee, "but the choice for chairman of 911 was absolutely up to the 911 board."

Each of the Mayors in Livingston, Mt. Vernon and Brodhead have one appointee, all fire departments to appointee, all the county's emergency management departments has one, the judge-executive has one appointee, ambulance service has one appointee, the Sheriff's department has one and the five magistrates have one together.

Currently, the eight board members are Sam Stallworth, for the fire departments, Harry Harmon for the ambulance service, the magistrate's appointee is Ann Gentry Taylor, the sheriff's department's nominee is Deputy Sheriff Rick Brummett, Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash's appointee is former vehicle enforcement officer Ronnie Bradley, Livingston Mayor J.C. Griffin's appointee is constable David Mason and Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarence Kirby's appointee is Terry Jackson.

Carlfortis said that it was his understanding that mapping the county for enhanced 911 was basically completed.

"Magistrates are responsible for naming roads. Some in the county still have many of the same names," Carlfortis said.

"If city roads in the county have identical names," the judge said.

No action has been taken on the road name changes by the magistrates, David Gibbs, district one, William Denney, district two, Bill McKinney, district three, Fred Mullins, district four and Ralph Allen district five.

"I have encouraged the magistrates to change the names of the identical road names, but have had no cooperation," the Judge-Executive said Tuesday.

The 911 budget is controlled by the fiscal court and last year amounted to approximately \$150,000.

The 911 board has a surplus balance of \$50,000 according to Rockcastle County Treasurer Joe Clontz.

911 is funded by a \$2.00 monthly fee on all residential and business telephone lines. Cell phone customers also pay the fee, but it goes to the Kentucky State Police Post in London.

911's annual budget is approximately \$185,000 per year.

Hansel encouraged concerned citizens to attend next month's 911 meeting. It is held on the first Thursday of each month in the Rockcastle County Courthouse at 6 p.m.

Mt. Vernon firefighters and rescue workers made over 190 runs last year and in 1994 they made 230 runs.

The Mt. Vernon Fire and Rescue Department makes more runs than all other departments in the county combined, partly due to the work they have to do on the interstate.

## On Superintendent's recommendation Student, football player kicked out of high school

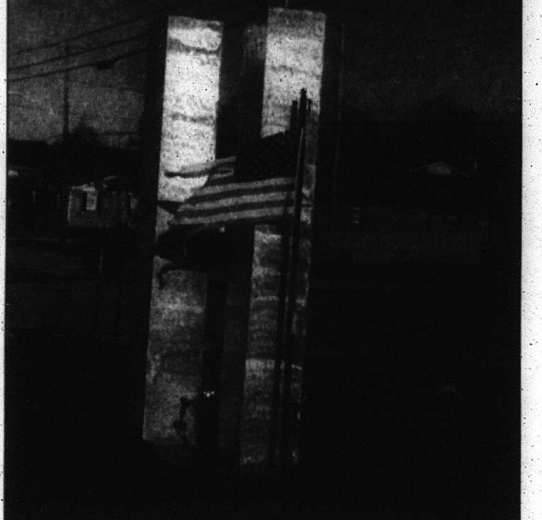
A Rockcastle County High School student was officially kicked out of school Monday night when the Rockcastle County Board of Education voted four to one in an open session to suspend the Rockcastle County senior.

The only vote was from board member Mike Burdette. The student was a starter on the RCHS football team. Before making their vote, the board was behind closed doors for a period of time. "We never like to recommend this and I'm

## Fiscal Court holds light meeting

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met in regular session Tuesday afternoon with, for a change, a very light agenda.

No visitors were present and the court primarily went over the claims for the month with a fine-tune comb.

The court did approve a deed of release for the John Northern property for the Daniel Boone Development Council. A claim on the property is now being held by the Rockcastle County Housing Authority.

In other action, Judge Executive Buzz Carlfortis told the court that he had held a meeting with Gene Epperson and Electric and county maintenance supervisor Gene Cromer concerning a claim by Epperson for work at the courthouse in November of 2003.

Epperson was called to the jail over the Thanksgiving holiday last year, because of a bad clog in the sewer line at the jail. After working for some time and getting a large "snake" caught in the sewer line, workers for Epperson decided they could not make the repair and Cromer had to be called to complete the repair. The original line had to be bypassed by Cromer in order to get around the equipment left in the line by Epperson.

Epperson then presented a bill for around \$1,200 for their "work" on the project and the court refused to pay.

## One arrested for writing bad checks

Last Wednesday, the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department arrested Rebecca Cameron, 23, of Mt. Vernon, on five counts of Possession of a Forged Instrument, 2nd Degree.

The arrest came after an investigation into a stolen checkbook led to Cameron, who had allegedly passed or assisted in passing at least five checks belonging to Paul McElroy of Mt. Vernon.

Cameron was judged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. The case will be presented to the Rockcastle Grand Jury later this month, according to Rockcastle County Sheriff Darrell Doan.

Epperson was informed of the court's problem with the bill but kept submitting it and adding interest charges.

However, Carlfortis said, after the meeting between him, Epperson and Cromer, Epperson said he would get back to them and he (Carlfortis) said it has been two weeks and he hasn't heard anything else, to date.

The court was also informed of the disallowing of a claim by their carrier KACo for damages claimed by Larry Adams of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon.

According to a letter to Mr. Adams from KACo, Adams attempted to pass the county's vehicles (tractor/mowers) on a rural road on a double yellow line and the county vehicles turned left into Adams' vehicle, causing damage to the right side.

KACo disallowed Adams' claim saying that he (Adams) was not following the rules of the road and improperly attempted to pass in a no passing zone.

Also, no action was taken on a claim by Juanita Davis for a \$722.64 damage to her vehicle in a collision with a road department supervisor.

## School Board honored by KSBA

The Rockcastle County Board of Education met until 11 p.m. on Tuesday night, spending much of their meeting time discussing instruction and how successful the system had been last year in meeting their academic goals.

Tim Holt, a representative of the Kentucky School Board Association, presented the board of education with a plaque for the school system's top 15 finish in the state in test results for last school year.

District Instructional Supervisor David Pensol and District Assessment Coordinator Rebecca Isaacs gave a lengthy presentation to the board about the school system's results, following Holt's presentation.

The court decided to keep submitting it and adding interest charges.

According to a financial statement through November 9th given to the court by Joe Clontz, county treasurer all county accounts are in the black.

The general fund showed a balance of \$114,091.23 after receipts of \$199,206.69 and disbursements of \$106,882.83 for the month; the road fund has a balance of \$128,476.40 with receipts of \$15,658.50 and disbursements of \$53,979.84 and the detention center added slightly to its balance with receipts of \$79,600.25 and expenses of \$77,207.85.

Carlfortis also told the court that the purchase of two one-ton trucks is being considered with funds from the Jafer James Miller's commissary account. The trucks can be used for prisoner transport for the road and release program and can be converted to salt trucks when needed.

The court also acknowledged receipt of a gift from RTEC of a used passenger van.

Also, Rupert White, of White and Associates from Richmond presented the 2004 audit of the school system's finances.

As always in recent years, the board received an A+ report concerning the way their finances are handled.

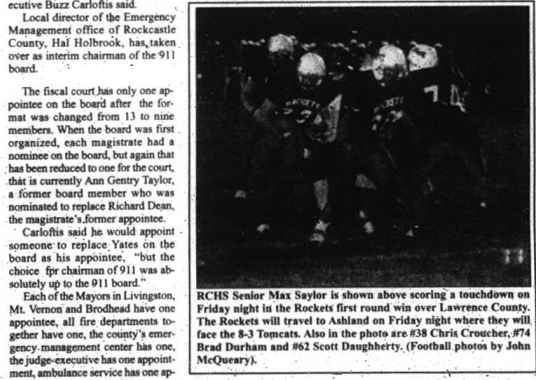
White told the board they should be some of the happiest board members in the state, taking into consideration the system's test scores, facilities and financial situation.

Currently the school system has a budget of \$22 million.

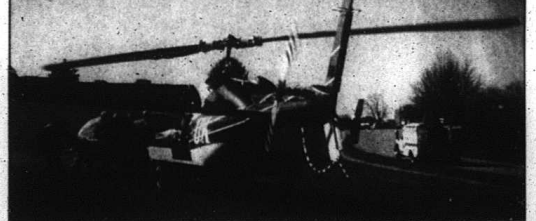
They also have a reserve of \$4 million.

The board also approved a bid for bleachers at the Rockcastle County Middle School for visitors for \$130,000 and voted to re-advertise for bids for a RCHS baseball/softball batting and pitching facility.

The board also approved the purchase of three new school buses at a total price of \$180,981.

# Points East

Last week's red-tail hawk story generated so much interest/feedback that I have decided to do another bird piece this week.

At least two and possibly three great blue herons live within a mile or so of downtown Paint Lick. When I say live here, I mean they are not merely passing through because we see them throughout the year. I have no idea what they do for food when the creek and farm ponds are frozen over but somehow they seem to manage. Perhaps someone is feeding them sardines or shrimp or whatnot.

The reason I know that there are at least two residents in the immediate vicinity is because I have seen both within a matter of ten-minutes though two or three miles apart. One of them pretty much has Lowell Branch as its domain and the other seems to be in charge of Paint Lick Creek from the bridge on 52 up stream to the bridge on 21.

Seldom do I visit any local farm ponds to catch a mess of bluegill that I don't see a great blue heron. It may be one of the aforementioned creekers but my suspicion is that it's

a third bird and between the three of them they have agreed upon territorial rights, the latter having control of the ponds.

We see them nearly every day, watching the shallows and intently peering into the water for minnows or crawdads. The Paint Lick birds are certainly no unique. Visit almost any body of water, standing or flowing, in central Kentucky during warm weather and you are apt to see a great blue heron. In fact there are a few much smaller species of herons that range in color from green to jet black and they are common sights on the Kentucky River and large impoundments. However, the only ones I see year round are the Paint Lick residents.

For instance, I fish Silver Creek in Madison County quite frequently. (Not nearly as frequently as I would have liked this year because the water was up and muddy pretty much all year.) Anyway, between May and the middle of October, there is a Great Blue Heron on one stretch of Silver Creek that will literally eat it's

## Rheumatoid Arthritis is Often Confusing

It used to be easy to tell when someone had rheumatism or rheumatoid arthritis. The wrists and knuckles were greatly swollen, the joints red and warm, and the fingers were bent to the side.

Doctors do not see these changes very often any more. The illness is treated much earlier these days, usually before any of the classic signs develop and even before blood tests turn positive.

Rheumatoid arthritis starts out with soreness and aching of the joints, stiffness on arising in the morning and other variable symptoms that often make the person think of Lyme disease or other illnesses first.

The most common presentation of rheumatoid arthritis is joint pain slowly becoming worse over a few weeks or months. Then one joint becomes swollen and red, then a few more joints become involved. It is most common in women—nearly three times as common as in men.

Stiffness that lasts an hour or more in the morning is a significant sign, and the activity of the disease can actually be measured by how long this stiffness lasts each morning. It is also common for people to have weight loss, fatigue, weakness and aching muscles.

The joints that are most commonly involved are the wrists, knuckles, first finger joints, knees, shoulders and hips. It does not normally affect the back.

Symptoms can also develop away from the joints, including nodules under the skin, lung disease, inflammation around the heart and a variety of eye problems.

Well, the patients and their families are given the support and information to make decisions at a challenging point in their lives, all while incorporating each family's values and needs. A team of caring professionals, medical director, primary care physician, nurses, nursing assistants, social worker, chaplain, pharmacist, and bereavement specialist then provides hospice care.

The success over the years with hospice care can also be attributed to volunteers, who assist families with errands, companionship, transportation, and often lead the way for communities to assist hospices with their vitally needed financial support.

The most remarkable part of this service might very well be the financial terms that allow for services to be provided. In most cases Medicare, Medicaid and private insurance covers the costs associated with hospice care. Yet patients with no insurance receive hospice care with the support of the community. No one is turned away because of an inability to pay, according to Hospice Care Plus, Inc.

Nearly 20 years later, there aren't enough words or actions to show appreciation for the special ways that organizations like Hospice Care Plus and Community Hospice touches people's lives.

## Pediatric Physical Therapy

As a pediatric physical therapist, I work with patients that have a variety of problems. Our department treats children with sports related injuries, cerebral palsy, spina bifida, autism disorders, and most commonly developmental delays. Pediatric physical therapy services are provided through the hospital on an outpatient basis, in the school systems, and in patient's home through First Steps. It is crucial that parents recognize developmental problems so they can begin treatment as early as possible.

Often parents are concerned about their child's development, and compare them to other children of the same age. Developmental milestones are predictable time periods that a child should be able to perform a skill. A developmental delay occurs when your child has not reached one or more of these milestones by the expected time period. There are four crucial milestones for infants including head control 3 months, sitting 6 months, crawling 9-10 months, and walking 13-15 months. Older children can have delays too, but these delays are sometimes more difficult to identify. A pre-school age child may have difficulty with skills such as balancing on one foot, walking heel to toe, wiggling his thumb, or copying a square.

Although you must be cautious when comparing your child to his peers, if your child is not learning a skill that other children of the same age are, it may be a warning sign that your child is at risk for developmental delays. Being able to recognize these milestones can get your child help as early as possible, but also prevent any necessary worry.

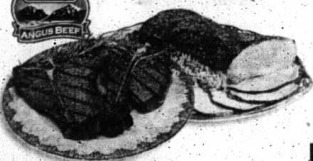

**Agricultural News**

**LDP-Beneficial of Interest**  
Are you a producer who harvested corn or soybeans? If so take note-you may be missing out on cash no doubt. Producers of corn and soybeans may be eligible for a marketing assistance loan or a loan deficiency payment (LDP) based upon the daily rate provided the producer has NOT LOST beneficial interest in the commodity in addition to other eligibility requirements.

A producer retains beneficial interest in the commodity if all of the following remain with the producer:

- Control of the commodity
- Risk of loss
- Title to the commodity.

For LD's the producer must retain beneficial interest in the commodity from the time of harvest through the date the LDP is received.

A producer is considered to have control of the commodity if the producer retains the ability to make all decisions affecting the commodity, including movement, sale and the request for a marketing assistance loan or an LDP.

Producers who deliver their commodity to a Feed Mill lose beneficial interest upon delivery. When beneficial interest in the commodity is lost by the producer, the commodity remains ineligible for a marketing assistance loan or an LDP even if the producer regains beneficial interest. FSA reminds producers who plan to move the commodity to a feed mill to file a CCC-709 with the local FSA office prior to the delivery.

LDP payments are made to the producer based upon the amount of commodity bushels times the daily LDP rate for which the LDP request is filed. An example of corn would be as follows:

- A producer harvested 3,000 bushels of ear corn and the LDP daily rate of pay is \$.35 per bushel; the producer would receive \$1,750.00 (3,000 X .35).
- A producer harvested 25 acres of corn silage and the LDP daily rate of pay is \$.35 per bushel; the producer would receive \$875.00 (25 ac X 100 bu. X .35).

Producers requesting a LDP payment must have a current CCC-502, Farm Operating Plan for Payment Eligibility, CCC-526, Payment Eligibility Average Adjusted Gross Income Certification and an AD-1026, Highly Erodible Land Conservation Certification of file.

## 4H Speech Contest

The Rockcastle County 4H Council will hold its annual speech contest at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, December 2, 2004, at Mt. Vernon Elementary School. Just as last year, the contest will be held as a joint project with the school. Through 4H, winning speakers will have the opportunity to advance to area and state competition.

Any boy or girl, age 9-19, may participate in the 4H Talk Meet Program. (The participant does not presently have to be enrolled in a 4H club.) Each representative for the county speech contest should be aware that if they win first or second place in their age category they will have the opportunity to go to the area contest which will be in April of 2005 in conjunction with the Area Demonstration Contest and Variety Show.

## Rockets defeat Bulldogs 42-20; will face Ashland Friday night

The Rockcastle County Rockets have once again advanced to the second round of the state high school playoffs after a 42-20 win over the Lawrence County Bulldogs on Friday night. The ROCK made an early statement being up 35-0 at half-time.

An unusually small crowd for a Rockcastle County football playoff game witnessed the win and although the Bulldogs scored 20 points they were never actually in the game.

The Rockets scored early and never looked back in their first round playoff victory.

Head coach Tom Larkey was complimentary of his team's performance. "I thought our team played very well - especially our offensive line - they gave Matthew (quarterback Matthew Burkhardt) lots of protection and he responded by throwing the ball well and our receivers did a good job catching the ball," he said. Burkhardt was 10-19 passing for 185 yards and three touchdowns. He did throw one interception. The junior also threw three touchdown passes and rushed for 47 yards on five carries. He also threw one two-point conversion to Shawn Childress.

Senior Derreck Hurst caught five balls for 102 yards. Two of those catches were for touchdowns.

Childress also caught one of Burkhardt's passes for a touchdown. On the night he had a total of three catches for 37 yards.

Bucky Skinner had 14 yards rushing on three carries and he caught one pass for 23 yards. He helped his team greatly by making four of five extra point kicks. "He works hard and he is a truly all-purpose player," Larkey said.

Senior Max Saylor had 65 yards on eight carries and he scored one touchdown rushing.

Sophomore Dusty Miller had an interception for a touchdown and he also rushed for one touchdown. Senior Phillip Boring had 23 yards on one catch and the workhorse of the night on the ground was Gabe Stallworth who had 72 yards on 17 carries. Senior Chet Croucher had 22 yards on five yards.

The Rockets had 249 yards rushing and 185 yards through the air.

The Rocket defense performed just as well, holding the Bulldogs to just 242 yards of offense. The ROCK defense held the visitors to minus three yards on the ground, but they did give up 245 yards through the air.

Defensively, Dusty Miller had two interceptions and a total of seven tackles and assists. "Our defensive unit played probably one of their best games of the season," said defensive coordinator Adam Coleman. "Our players did a very good job of under-

standing when they were supposed to be in every situation," he said.

The all-time leading tackler at RCHS, middle linebacker Chris Croucher, had 14 tackles and assists and one sack.

Saylor had three tackles and assists. All of his tackles were for sacks.

Sophomore Izak McQuerry had five tackles and a fumble recovery. Childress also had a fumble recovery and four tackles.

Graham Fay had seven tackles and assists, Mike Denny had four, Skinner had five, Charles Cunnagin picked up four, Donovan Pigg had one. Boring added four. Hurst picked up three and Lynn Miracle added two.

The Rockets will travel to Ashland on Friday night to take on

Ashland-Paul Blazer, an 8-3 team, that easily defeated Perry Central last week.

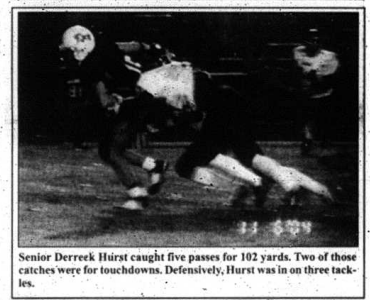
Rocket fans who make the two and half hour trip to Ashland should take 1-75 to exit 95 and go to Winchester. Turn left at the second stop light.

## RCHS girls' cross-country team wins third straight Regional Title

The RCHS cross-country teams had a great showing at the Class 2A Region IV Cross-Country Championships held this past weekend at Anderson-Dean Park in Mercer County. Anderson-Dean Park is regarded as one of the most challenging courses in the state, with times usually ranging from a minute to a minute and a half slower than most other courses due to the terrain.

The RCHS girls' team had an awesome meet. Seeking their third straight regional title in the past three seasons, the girls totally dominated the competition and lived up to their top three state ranking. They defeated runner-up Boyle County, who was also ranked 10th in Class 2A, by 43 points on their way to the easy regional win. The girls' total of 18 points was only three points away from a perfect score of 15. The top five finishers' places in a cross-country race determine the team score with the lowest score winning.

RCHS junior Kayla Hayes led the way for RCHS with another awe-

some individual performance. Kayla captured her third straight individual regional champion title with an unbelievable effort of 21:37.82. Kayla currently ranks third in the state in Class 2A. Each of the past two seasons, she has finished fifth and fourth respectively in the Class 2A State Championship finals. MVES fourth grader Michaela Hunter ran quite possibly the best race of her cross-country career. Michaela stayed very close to Kayla and finished as regional runner-up with an effort of 21:42.55. Michaela is the youngest competitor ever to finish in the top two in the Region IV Championships.

RCHS seventh grader Laura Dollins ran the entire race with Kayla and Michaela. Her awesome performance earned her a third place finish overall with an impressive time of 21:53.09. RCHS junior Jessi Asher, currently ranked 12th in Class 2A, ran a great race. Jessi finished 6th overall in 23:10.5. RCHS sixth grader Sara Hammond ran an excep-

tional race and finished eighth overall in 23:32.32. This was the first time in RCHS girls' cross-country history that the team had five runners make the top ten. RCHS sixth grader Kristen Bullock was very close to her teammates, finishing 11th overall with an awesome performance. Kristen covered the 3.1-mile course in an impressive 24:16.09. RCHS freshman Courtney Bullock also ran a spectacular race and finished 17th overall in 25:03.49.

The RCHS boys' team also had a very successful regional meet, despite being one team member short of a full squad. After qualifying for the state championships a year ago with a fourth place team finish, the boys sought to qualify for state individually. In order to do this, a runner must be one of the top seven individuals not on a qualifying team.

RCHS senior Brandon Cole led the way for the boys with an outstanding performance. Brandon led the race in the grueling 5,000-meter race and held on to finish in fourth place overall, easily qualifying for state competition. Brandon's time of 18:45.76 established a new RCHS boys' record for the course at Mercer County. RCHS senior Bill Burdett ran an awesome race as well. Bill finished in the top ten placing 10th overall with an incredible effort of 19:45.46. Bill also easily qualified for the state championships. RCHS junior Derrick Baker followed in the footsteps of his senior teammates with a superb performance of his own. Derrick finished 21st overall in an impressive 21:14.22. Derrick also earned a berth in the state championships with his stellar performance. RCHS seventh grader Blake Parsons narrowly missed state qualification with an awesome varsity race. One of only three seventh graders that competed, Blake ran a great race and finished 36th overall in 22:16.41.

of my hand.  
 I fish with live bait, minnows and crawdads that I capture with a 4"x6" bait seine.

Most folks fish with artificial bait, but I prefer larger minnows and hard crawdads that the smaller fish can't handle because my mind is generally set on getting a limit of keepers for the frying pan. So I carry my bait in a two gallon bucket that is bright blue on one side and deep yellow on the other so it can be easily spotted if it drifts away during a daydream.

The Silver Creek Heron pays no attention at all to fly or artificial bait fisherfolk but whenever I am on the creek in warm weather he or she is within ten feet of me, usually before I have finished catching bait. Anytime a minnow or craw dies in the bucket, I toss it to the Heron who catches it in mid air and swallows in a single gulp. Ditto for when a bait

dies on the line.  
 This bird knows my fishing habits. I usually fish the same five holes that lie within a stretch of water about half a mile long. When I pick up my bait bucket, the heron flies downstream a hundred yards or whatever to the next hole and waits for me to arrive. When it stands erect its head is above my waist line and it will take a minnow out of my hand, a stunt that I thought cute before it took a sizeable chunk of flesh out of my thumb along with the dangling minnow.

Anyways, I have never seen the Silver Creek Heron before the red-buds are in bloom nor after the first killing frost in October. However, I'm positive that I have been accompanied by the same heron for the last five years because it has a distinct patch of shorter and darker feathers on its neck that have grown out of spring tick tissue; an old wound perhaps caused by a turtle, muskrat, otter or even a big crawdad that was much more than a mouthful.

I'm not sure where he/she goes in cold weather, but I assume the climate is warmer, and the fishing is better than it is on Silver Creek after the leaves have fallen.

In the meantime on a trip to Berea this morning, just after sunrise with the temperature in the low 30's, I saw both the Lowell Branch and Paint Lick herons wading the creeks, oblivious to passing traffic and perfectly intent on marning breakfast.

I intend to stock up on bait shrimp and frozen herring and make their lives a little easier when the ice comes.

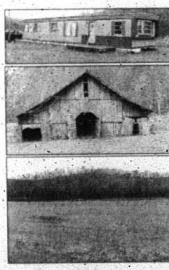

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on radio stations and three television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVLC (FM 93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5) WKQQ (FM 100.1) WKDP (99.5). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6:00 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m.

Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. 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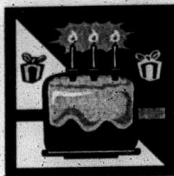
