

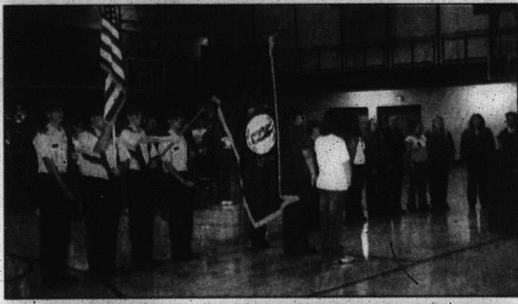
Subway, Godfathers robbed

No one has been arrested in a late night break-in at Subway and Godfathers, but the perpetrator was caught on film.

Jerry Pensol, an owner and the manager of the business, on U.S. 25 south of Mt. Vernon, said this week, the thief broke through the back wall after 1 a.m. on Friday morning. "Whoever it was was wearing a ski mask, but police are working hard to find the robber," he said.

"Because of our security tapes, police have leads," he said. Pensol declined to comment on the amount of cash taken from the safe, but authorities said it was approximately \$500.

Veterans graves being marked

Veterans graves are being marked by the Rockcastle County Flanders Coat's Cemetery Board of Directors. Rockcastle County has graves of veterans dating back to the Revolutionary War. The cemetery board, due to its ability to get grave markers from the Sons of Confederate Veterans, will mark this county's Confederate Veterans' graves with a ceremony at Elmwood Cemetery in Mt. Vernon immediately following this year's Mt. Vernon Christmas Parade on Saturday, December 4th. The ceremony will be held at the gravesite of Silas H. Martin, a member of Company A, 20th Battalion Virginia Heavy Artillery, who was married to Mary Elizabeth Cummins.

Those Confederate veterans who new grave markers are not in possession of the cemetery board's directors, and whose markers will be on display at the cemetery, are: William Beatty Lunsford (married to Rachel Slaughter); Martin Falin (married to Julia A. Falin); Charles Jefferson Lovell; Robert B. Hatcher (married to Mollie Mitchell); Jonas Brown; Marvel Coffey (married to Abby Jordan); Thomas Bullen (married to Nancy Wolfenberger); John Hamlin (married to Celia Hamlin); Joseph M. Oliver; Jefferson Williams; Richard Martin (married to Louisa Harris) and Martin Y.B. McReynolds. These grave markers will be placed later at their proper cemeteries located throughout the county.

"Everyone is invited to attend this ceremony that recognizes a part of Rockcastle County's history," said County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotta. If you are a descendant of any of these Confederate veterans, the cemetery board of directors asks that you attend the ceremony at Elmwood Cemetery so that you can be recognized. RCHS girls' cross country team finishes as state runner-up

The RCHS girls' cross-country team finished as Class 2A State Runners-up this past Saturday in the KTCOCCA Class 2A State Championships held at the Kentucky Horse Park.

Despite having no seniors, RCHS placed three girls in the top 12 and five in the top forty-four to take home the second place state runner-up trophy. Amazingly enough, the average grade level for RCHS is 7.7, meaning their best is yet to come.

Fl. Thomas Highlands won as many girls' state title in its thirty years. Lloyd Memorial, a former state champion team that had been ranked first or second the entire season, finished in third place overall, twenty points behind RCHS. Bell County finished fourth and former state champion Warren East placed fifth.

Course conditions at the Horse Park were not very favorable as the muddy low spots and turns, along with the cool air, slowed everyone down a bit.

Leading the way for RCHS for the third straight year was junior all-state runner Kayla Hayes. Kayla, the RCHS all-time record holder for 5,000-meters, ran an amazing race

and finished fifth overall with an awesome time of 20:26.56. She was second nearly the entire race before slightly fading in the last half mile. Most of her energy was spent early in the race trying to keep up with Mercy Academy's Carmen Mims, who won the meet for the third time in four years and broke the all-time state record in the event. Last season, Mims finished fifth just behind Kayla who came in fourth. This marked the third straight season that Kayla has finished in the top five at state.

Contract with Sheriff's to expire City of Brodhead taking applications for police officer

The City of Brodhead is looking for a certified police officer.

Applications will be accepted until December 3rd, and the starting salary will be based on qualifications, according to Mayor Walter Cash.

The City of Brodhead had contracted with Rockcastle County Sheriff's office earlier this year, after Chief Joe Bussell let go for not completing required training.

The City was attempting to save money, by contracting with the Sheriff's office, but apparently did not think they were getting proper patrols from the Sheriff's office. The Sheriff's office also apparently did not like the agreement, according to Brodhead City Attorney John Ford.

Rockcastle County Sheriff Darrell Doan, said on Wednesday that his department did not like the comments coming from citizens in Brodhead, about the job his officers were doing and decided to terminate the contract. "We worked very hard to patrol the city of Brodhead and apparently that wasn't good enough so we decided to give them notice that we would no longer be interested in doing that job," Doan said.

The city of Brodhead was paying the county \$34,000 a year for their help.

"The Sheriff's office gave the city of Brodhead a notice in writing that they would stop patrolling under the contract in ninety days. That was in October," Doan said.

Doan also said in the notice that his department they would assist as much as possible until a full-time officer was hired.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotta has made his appointment to the Rockcastle County 911 board, after his original appointee, chairman John Yates, a Kentucky State Police Detective stepped down at the request of his post commander. Judge-Executive Carlotta has one appointment to the board.

There are eight board members and local Emergency Management Director Hal Holbrook is the current interim chairman. He was appointed after Yates resigned.

Yates' replacement is State Police Lt. Robbie Massey, who was recommended by the post commander.

"He wanted me to appoint someone from out of the county who is impartial and has no ties to the county and I took his recommendation," Carlotta said.

The other eight board members are Livingston Fire Chief Sam Stallworth, ambulance service director, Harry Harmon, Ann Gentry Rick Brummett, Ronnie Bradley of Brodhead, Constable David Mason, and Mt. Vernon Police Chief Terry Jackson.

The 911 board meets the first Thursday of each month at 6 p.m.

Funeral services will be conducted Friday, November 19, 2004 at 10 a.m. at the Marvin E. Owens Home for Funerals chapel.

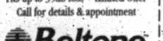

How to reclaim lost medals

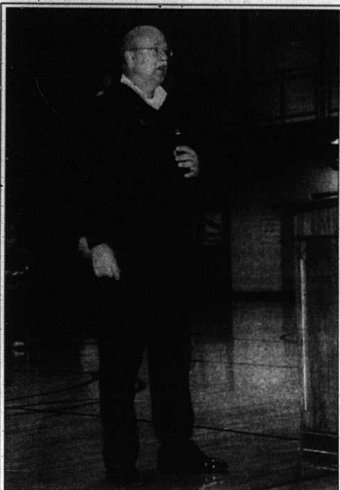
After losing his service medals in a house fire, Oscar Chasteen's daughter found a way to replace the lost medals.

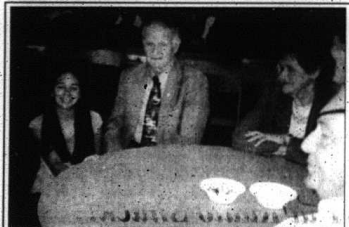
"My father is very proud of his medals. My family and I are very proud of him and of his medals," Ms. Parrott said.

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LHS reunion honors Charles B. Parsons

A large crowd of former students, teachers and friends recently attended the Livingston School Reunion. The evening's events began with the presentation of colors by the RCHS JROTC Color Guard and singing of the National Anthem by Douglas Dell Ponder. Former students from each graduating class from 1948 through 1972 enjoyed the celebration.

Special recognition was given to members of the classes of 1944, 1954 and 1964. Following a long time tradition, Preston Parrett read a selection of his poems dedicated to Livingston, including "Bingham's Cafe," and "Livingston High."

A highlight of the evening was the recognition of Charles B. Parsons as the 2004 LHS Hall of Fame inductee. The program included a slide presentation of Mr. Parsons; personal and professional life and a poem by Mr. Parrett entitled, "Salute to the School Chief."

Mr. Parsons, known to many as "Charlie B." is the son of Clarence and Lena Smith Parsons. One of eight children, Mr. Parsons was born in the Blair community and attended Mt. Vernon High School. He began his teaching career at a rural one-room school at Well Hope when he was 19 years old. From Well Hope, he went to teach at other one-room schools at Long Branch and Mareburg and was then "promoted" to a two-room school at Negro Creek, followed by a similar school at Fairview. Each transfer took him to a slightly bigger school and community. He finished the teaching portion of his career at Broadhead High School.

Like many of the teachers of his day, he attended college during the breaks from school. When he had completed two years of college at Sue Bennett in London, he transferred to Eastern Kentucky University. Over the next several years, Mr. Parsons continued his academic studies, completing his bachelor's degree and Master's degree as well as certifications for principal and superintendent at Eastern.

Mr. Parsons met his future wife, Bonnie Berry, when his family

moved to Brindle Ridge. They were both seniors in high school, she at Broadhead and he at Mt. Vernon. After graduation, Charlie B. started teaching and Bonnie went to Indiana to work. Soon after he began teaching, Charlie B. convinced Bonnie to return home and start college at Sue Bennett. When she qualified to begin teaching, she joined Charlie B. at Fairview. They were married February 13, 1948 and their only child, Randy, was born in 1953.

Mr. Parsons was teaching at Broadhead when Mrs. Neuse Miracle selected him for the Principal's position at Livingston High School. Mrs. Parsons also transferred to a teaching position at Livingston. Mr. Parsons served as principal at Livingston from 1954 - 1968. He learned that he would succeed Mrs. Miracle as Superintendent of Rockcastle County Schools when Mrs. Miracle called to congratulate him on his appointment. He continued in the role of Superintendent until 1987 when he retired.

After his retirement from the school system, Mr. Parsons joined Don Foster Realtors as a realtor. He worked as a realtor for ten years and is now enjoying full retirement.

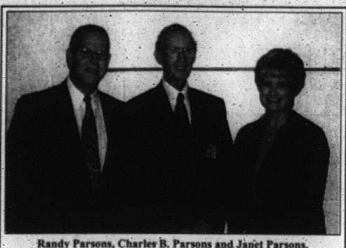

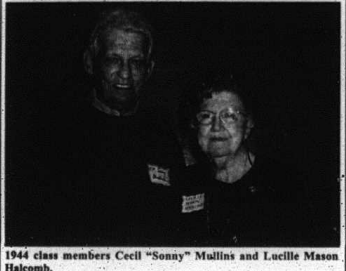

I worried some about that, but he was quick as lightning and I was not overly concerned.

911 board as an independent agency, free of political interference? Does not the law give the 911 board the power to hire and fire the board of directors and to "generally do all things necessary and proper to provide for a proficient and efficient dispatching service..." in KR3 65:75 and Ordinance 17?

Shouldn't the members of the board be the ones who oversee 911? If so, should votes made by 911 board members be subject to political repercussions? What is wrong with members of 911 observing the day to day operation of 911? Isn't this exactly what they should be doing?

Isn't it true that only two of the nine members of the board voted against disciplining the current 911 director? If so, why are the representatives of the fiscal court out over the board while the other members are still in it? What exactly did former

911 board member Richard Doss do other than vote opposed to how some other voters felt him to, that made it necessary to discipline him?

Equally important, I have questions about the operation of 911. Are the criteria for employment at Rockcastle 911 the same for low level employees as they are for those in charge? Do low level employees receive the same chance at explaining concerns as those in charge?

How many employees have been fired, quit or forced out under the current 911 director? How many need to be before such a problem is addressed? How many 911 board members have been forced out in the same time? Why does the 911 director get a hearing before the board if 911 board members are dismissed without any chance to be present? Is there really a consistent standard for all employees of 911 or are those in charge and another for those at the bottom?

Has the 911 director used 911 recordings in an attempt to discredit employees? Did the 911 director lie to the board about this matter? Did the 911 director use 911 discipline records? If so, why hasn't this decision been followed? Is it because of concern about potential litigation? How can an official vote of 911 be changed without a subsequent vote overturning it? When anywhere or anytime in the history of governing bodies, have individual members been allowed to "rescind" a vote taken by the entire board? Did the 911 board issue a written reprimand to the 911 director?

Why does 911, as a public agency, ignore state law regarding open records and open meetings? Why does there seem to be so little willingness to answer basic questions about their operation. Why is access denied to public meeting minutes, employee disciplinary records and the final votes of the 911 board, despite state law requiring these votes to be public?

Finally, let me say that I do not

know the answer to most of these questions. However, I do know that these are questions that deserve to be answered.

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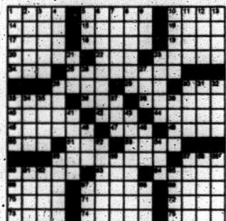

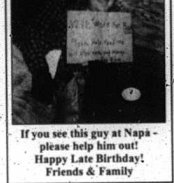

Ashland comes back from 20-0 Rockets lose in second round of play-offs to the Tomcats

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team's season ended on Friday night when they lost to the Ashland Tomcats, 34-27 in double overtime, in the second round of the regional play-offs.

The Rockets had a 20 to nothing lead with 34 seconds to go in the third quarter, when Ashland scored their first touchdown of the game.

Ashland obviously wasn't fin-

ished - they would score three more times to send the game into overtime.

Both teams scored in the first overtime, but the Rockets could not finish the deal in the second overtime.

It was only the fourth loss of the season for the Rockets, a team which notched eight wins in their 2004 campaign.

Ashland will now face Bell County in the regional final, a team which soundly defeated the ROCK-

ets in regular season and who was district champions. Bell County will have to make the long drive from Middlesboro to Ashland for the regional final.

The winner of that game will probably face heavily-favored Highlands in the class 3A sectional championship. Highlands will play Covington Catholic.

"I was proud of our team's performance, although we allowed the points in the fourth quarter, our kids played well," said head coach Tom Larkey, "who in his 20 years as head football coach has had only one losing season. The only losing season Larkey has had was in his first year when he went four and six."

Friday night, quarterback Matt Burkhart had a good game, throwing for 221 yards on 15 completions of 28 attempts.

He also rushed for 13 yards on 13 carries, scored three times on the ground and he threw one touchdown pass to Gabe Stallsworth. He also threw one two point conversion.

Senior Phillip Boreing was on the receiving end of the touchdown pass and Stallsworth caught the two point conversion pass.

All total the Rockets had 292 yards of total offense.

Other offensive stats: Derreck Hurst caught three balls for 43 yards, Shawn Childress caught three balls for 63 yards and he rushed once for two yards.

Bucky Skinner had 16 yards on five carries and he caught two passes for a total of ten yards. He also kicked an extra point.

Senior Max Saylor had seven yards on four carries.

Dusty Miller gained 36 yards on 16 carries and caught two passes for eleven yards.

Other than his touchdown reception, Starstworth caught two other balls for a total of 17 yards.

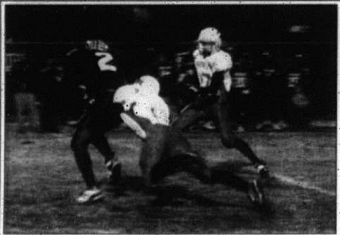
Boreing's touchdown reception and one other catch amounted to 77 yards.

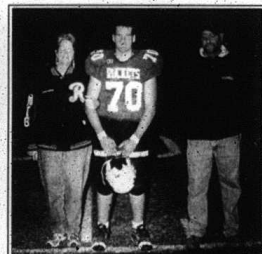

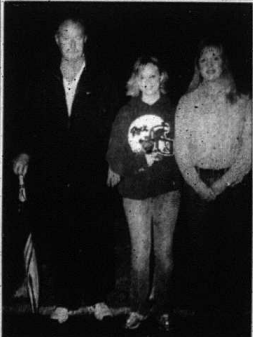

Turkey for the holidays

Holiday meals, especially Thanksgiving, often go hand-in-hand with turkey. In fact, it's probably safe to say that more homes will be serving turkey on the major fall and winter holidays than any other item. Many family cooks have prepared this favorite for years and years with recipes and instructions that have been lovingly handed down through generations and which they, in turn, will hand down to their children. Others, however, might not have this expert guidance. Whether you've cooked turkeys for the last 50 years or are just beginning a new tradition this year, it's a good idea to look at some of the latest safety updates as well as shopping tips.

Thawing a frozen turkey is best done in a tray in the refrigerator. Plan on 24 hours for each five pounds of weight. Another option is to use cold water immersion. In order to do this, place the wrapped turkey in the sink and cover it with cold water. Change the water

every 30 minutes. Stuffing is almost as essential as turkey at a holiday meal. To prepare, get the ingredients ready a day in advance. Store dry items at room temperature. Keep the produce in the refrigerator. Stuff a whole bird immediately before cooking, but remember, dressing expands, so don't overstuff. The stuffing should reach an internal temperature of 165°F.

To roast, place the bird breast side up on a rack in a shallow pan. Cover it with a loose-aluminum foil tent. Insert a meat thermometer through the foil into the inner thigh muscle. Cook in a 325° F oven; do not cook at low heat. Remove the foil during the last 30 to 30 minutes for browning. Cook until the meat thermometer reads 180° F. When finished cooking, remove the bird from oven and let cool for 20 minutes. While it's cooling, remove all of the stuffing. You can now carve the bird with-

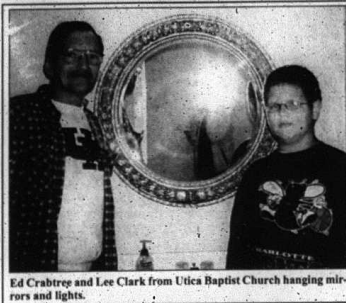

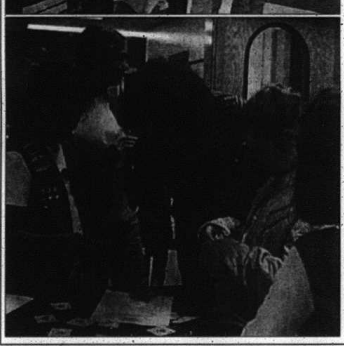

Countries like Japan are requiring proof that BSE does not exist in U.S. USDA has initiated a BSE national surveillance plan through the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). Cattle 30 months old or older are the target population. Cattle that cannot get up (non-ambulatory), showing signs of injury, emaciation, or central nervous system disorder such as staggering and excessive nervousness are candidates. Dead animals over 30 months old are also candidates provided they have not been dead several days. Samples of brain and spinal material would be collected by USDA, Federal Veterinarian, Christopher Craig, DVM. Mr. Craig indicates that funds are available to assist farmers in disposing of such animals provided the BSE sample can be collected.
