They have one year from the date the new law was enacted (Dec. 16, 2003) to apply for restoration of Denicitis. If VA receives the application later than Dec. 15, 2004, restoration OTDC must be denied.

The one-year application period does not apply to other surviving spouses whose remarriage on or after attaining age 57 followed enactment of the law. VA officials are concerned that surviving spouses may not be aware of this change in law, or may over-look this benefit if their subsequent arriages have not ended. Fruits to avoid include apples, apricots, cherries, figs, peaches, pears de rasiuns. Citrus fruits should be limited to a half cup per day. Most vegetables are good, although it is wise to avoid olives, pickles, unerkratut, navy beans, lentils and large amounts of onions. Timing of meals is also important for a person with migraines. She tould east three balanced meals a day and on a consistent schedule. She tould eavid delaying or missing meals, fasting, and overeating. ### Yards to Paradise

Lawn Care in Fall
Yields a Green Spring
Grasses respond to spring rains
and sunshine earlier than most other
growing things. A few steps taken in
the fall will give the lawn a good start
next spring.

next spring.

A good suggestion for starters is to fertilize the lawn in the fall after bot weather is past. While being stressed by summer heat, a lawn should not be forced to put out rapid new growth. Fall and spring applications of fertilizers produce better results.

Justbehind

Just behind that suggestion, fall is, a great time to spread lime on the yard. Lime "sweetens% acidic soil—a soil test may be desirable. Powdered or burnt lime may be better applied in spring, but fall is generally fine, for it takes passage of time for most lime to become available to

for most lime to become ayailable to plants. Iron is an element that puts Iron is an element that puts Iron is any element colors in plants. A light application of lawn formulations containing iron can be applied most anyttime for a durker green color in both lawn grasses and in shrubbery. Fall is the ideal time to use herbicides to eliminate dandelions, clovers, chickweed, dock, etc. (Nects some products only work at certain temperatures 25 or coat the directions.) Seeding, aeration, plugging, even laying new soil, are all chords to do in the fall for a beautiful early spring lawn. (Seeding, can even be done during a snowstorm). As the show

With a bulb planter, or even a mattock, dig a planting hole, a little organic fertilizer high in phosphate (the middle number on a bag of bulb fertilizer), then drop in your new bulb and return the soil to not. 



#### Stumbo seeking payment for state's tobacco farmers

State Attorney General Greg Stumbo announced Monday that he will personally attend a bearing in Greensboro, NC on December 20th to help secure paymet of Phase II Tobacco Irust Agreement money to Kentucky Iarmen. Stumbo invited Governor Ernie Fletcher to accom-letter sent to the Governor. At issue is the effect of the fed-ral tobacco buy-out legislation

At issue is the effect of the fed-oral tobacco buy-out legislation on tobacco company obligations to make Phase II payments for 2004. The tobacco companies contend that they should not be required to make a fourth quarter payment of approxi-mately 110 million dollars and seek a refund of about 320 million dollars.

"We knew that payment of these funds could become an issue, Stumbo said," sent a letter on October 6th to Senator Mitch McConnell, Senator Jim Bunning and other drafters of the federal Jaw to caution them about this very problem. Unfortunately, the final legislation did not protect Kentucky taxpayers and farmers from this suit by the tobacco companies.

Stumbo's letter to Governor Pletcher identifies December 1,2004 as a critical date in determining whether the companies will be ordered to meet their obligations.
