Over the past few years, we have seen many representatives of our intelligence community giving an account of their actions in congressional hearings. Every word of their testimony, and much of intelligence operations in general, has been examined in the press. Such happenings raise an important question: What
ever happened to good, old-fashioned spies? The kind of spy that was secret, and did secret things? Anonymous people who obtained informamous people who obtained informa-

cret, and did secret things? Anonymous people who obtained information about our enemies, without the enemy knowing who they were or how they operated?

I suppose, with the fall of the Soviet Union we decided there was no longer anyone to watch in such secrecy. Back then, we knew they were watching us and they knew we were

Besides you own desire to stop, the most effective single thing is the emouragement of your physician. Talk to him. He can suggest helpful hints and perhaps prescribe medicines.

One of the most common ways to quit is by stopping cold narkey, preferably after cutting down to under a pack per day. There will be withdrawal symptoms, but seldom as bad as a person expects, and they last only a matter of days. The urge to smoke, however, lasts much longer than the withdrawal symptoms.

Recently, nicotine patches and prescription medicines have become available which appear to help some people break the habit. Consult your doctor about their use.

cines. Classes or support groups can help give you much-needed encouragement and incentive, and they will have many helpful educational tips. Regardless which method you may choose, classes are worth-while. Behavioral methods of quitting involve choos-

ing other activities over smoking. A person is taught new habits to replace the old. Biofeedback and re-laxation techniques can help people who respond to stress by reaching for a cigarette.







Men, it is time to speak out against domestic violence! It is time to stand up and say that the true definition of masculinity does not include threatening or hitting a woman.

Domestic violence continues to be a massive proluten for our society. Each week I talk with women who have been abused by spouses. Some of them have bruises on their faces, arms and legs. Others tell of being threatened with guns or knives. One woman reported that her husband held a knife to her throat while her daughter watched.

Many women are verbally abused by spouses or boyfriends. Being called names and told they are fat, stupid and ugly, these women find her self-esteem shattered. They no longer believe in themselves. They give up hope and remain in the abusive relationship.

For more proof of the scope of the

give up nope and termain in the acute sive relationship. For more proof of the scope of the problem, one has only to keep up with the news on television, radio and in print. Local news tells of beatings and killings that are the result of do-nestic violence. The abuser is almost always the male. Women have mobilized their re-sources to speak out about and to solve the problem of abuse. Now it is time for men to take up the cause. A cover from Sports Illustrated magazine reveals a part of the prob-lem.

The cover feature is an article on
"The NFL's Real Men," and that arited focuses on the toughest, meaniest men in the league. Identifying
masculinity with the ability to inflict
physical pain is a part of the problem. Some men perceive that prob-

lems can be solved with violence, and they live this out in their families. In some parts of society, hitting a woman is considered the man's right as her husband. This belief has a long

history. The phrase "rule of thumb" comes from the law that made it ille-

comes from the law that made it ille-gal for a man to strike his wife with any object thicker than his thumb. Hitting was acceptable, as long as the and did not use a big stick! History shows that often women have been considered as nothing more than the property of a man. The Ten Commandments lists women along with donkeys and servants.

along with donkeys and servants.

Part of the problem for Christian
men is that we have focused too
much on the "wives, submit yourselves unto your husbands" in Ephesians 5. We need to concentrate
ne Ephesians 5.25 in which husbands
are commanded to "love your wives,
even as Christ also loved the church
and gave himself for it."

We men need to focus more on
loving our wives and less on trying
to control them.

Abuse is all about control. Abuse
sive males are usually jealous, possessive and controlling. They are insecure and cannot tolerate a spouse
who takes control her own life, so

they attempt to take complete con-trol.

trol.

Men, we do not have to control the women in our lives. A strong marital relationship means each spouse gives up the idea of controlling the other.

Brothers, being masculine does not mean hitting a woman. It is time we spoke out.


