\$242,425 in road funds to be released

In a reversal of an earlier decision by the state, Governor Ernie Fletcher announced Monday the early release of \$240,425 in county road aid to Rockcastle County. The funds are part of the governor's decision to release \$33 million in county road aid and municipal road aid to eligible county and city governments.

Many areas of the Commonwealth have been hit hard by the December snow storm and the January flooding," Fletcher said. "The inclement weather has taken its toll on many roads and stretched city and county road department funds to the limit. The early release of these funds will allow Rockcastle County to start repairing roads and bridges damaged by snow, ice and high waters."

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlolitis, while happy over the early release, pointed out that "this is money collected from the tax on gasoline sold in the counties in the first place. We appreciate them (the state) giving us "our money" finally.

In years past, the county had received 80% of the county road aid funds in July, 10% in August, 7% in February and 3% in April. This year, the county was notified they would be receiving 60% of the funds in August and 30% in March and the remaining 10% coming at the end of the fiscal year.

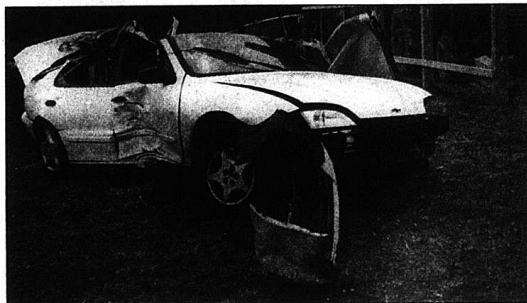
The funds are collected statewide from a percentage of the gasoline tax and put into a pool. It is then divided up and returned to the counties on a formula, based on road miles, gallons of gasoline sold and population.

According to the news release, since November 2004, Governor Fletcher has directed an estimated \$60 million to county and city governments from the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet's Department for Intergovernmental Programs. The early release represents \$28 million from the County Road Aid fund to those eligible counties in the County Aid co-op and 45 million from the Municipal Road Aid fund to those eligible communities in the Municipal aid co-op. The funds being released by Fletcher to Rockcastle County, which is 35% of their total allotment, were originally scheduled to become available in March 2005.

Through the leadership and vision of Governor Fletcher to provide a safe and reliable transportation system for all our citizens, today's announcement is further proof of our commitment to improving the highway infrastructure in Rockcastle County," said Maxwell Clay Bailey, secretary, Kentucky Transportation Cabinet. "Governor Fletcher is to be commended for his decision to release these funds early to help Rockcastle County deal with storm-related damage now instead of waiting until March."

Cromer pleads guilty to wildlife violations

Rockcastle County Road Supervisor Denton "Jack" Cromer has pled guilty to numerous wildlife violations, ranging from shooting from the roadway to illegal taking of White-tail Deer, according to County Attorney Billy Reynolds.

result of a month-long investigation by Officer Steve Isaacs of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "This case has been one of the more exhaustive that I've worked," Isaacs said. "It had several twists and turns that were quite unexpected. This was one of those cases that you hope only comes along once and regret that it happened at all." Isaacs added.

Cromer was fined \$275.50 by District Judge David A. Tapp plus he was assessed \$1,530 restitution to the state. The restitution figure is the cost of replacing two deer said County Attorney Billy Reynolds. Cromer also forfeited a .357-caliber Smith & Wesson pistol he had in his county truck and used to shoot at the deer.

According to a criminal complaint filed by Isaacs, the incident occurred November 18, 2004 when Cromer, in a truck furnished for his use by the county, stopped and shot at a white-tail buck. He and another employee looked for the deer to see whether Cromer had hit it, but apparently didn't find it.

However, later that day, Cromer killed a doe, loaded it into his county truck and took it to someone else with instructions to tag it and register the kill in the other person's name, according to the complaint.

Cromer also acknowledged shooting a second deer, failing to properly tag or register the first deer made both kills illegal, Isaacs said in the citation.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlolitis said Cromer had been county road supervisor for nearly 11

One for rape 18 indictments returned Friday

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury returned 18 indictments, last Friday, against 20 persons.

The indictments ranged from rape to flagrant non-support.

Ashley Jasper, 29, of Rt. 3, Brodhead, was indicted on three counts of second degree rape and one of third degree rape of a female less than fourteen years of age.

Donald Roberts, 46, of Rt. 3, Brodhead, was indicted on two counts of sexual abuse, first degree, involving a female under 12 years of age; one count of sodomy, first degree; three counts of sexual abuse, second degree; three counts of sodomy, second degree and one count of deviate sexual intercourse.

Both men are lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail. As of Monday, no bond had been set for Jasper and Roberts is still under a \$50,000 cash bond.

Six were indicted for flagrant non-support of minor child/children. They included: Michael L. Spires, 31, of 1788 Mt. Vernon Road, Berea, in the amount of \$3,559.83; Michael Bullock, 31, of Rt. 1, Brodhead, in the amount of \$5,361.06; Sherry Combs,

Barnett receives shock probation

Andy Barnett, 40, of Cove Branch is out of jail on shock probation after a hearing in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Friday.

Barnett, owner of Barnett's Salvage Yard, was granted shock probation by Circuit Judge Robert Gillum.

Barnett's attorney Jerry Cox, of Mt. Vernon requested the probation and veteran state police detective Gary Lane told Gillum he had no problem with his decision.

Rockcastle Sheriff's Detective Matt Bryant was not happy with Lane, his co-worker. Bryant had presented the 40 plus cases against Barnett to the grand jury, which resulted in three separate indictments.

The indictment charges last year were for crimes ranging from receiving stolen property to dealing in illegal drugs.

On October 22nd, Circuit Judge Gillum sentenced Barnett to five years, after he pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance, first degree. That was in connection with a plea of guilty to receiving stolen property over \$300. That plea was entered September 24th.

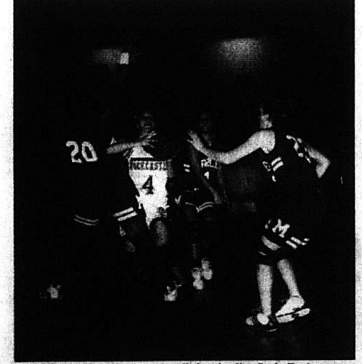
"Our department worked hard on this case and had solid evidence to present. I just don't understand the decision," Bryant said. "I also don't understand why, as lead detective, my recommendation was not sought in this case," Bryant added.

Some of the conditions attached to Barnett's release on shock probation include: not committing another offense; avoiding persons or places of disreputable or harmful character; working faithfully at suitable employment; reporting to probation officer as directed and obtaining a GED certificate within one year.

Barnett was released Friday, January 28th.

If you were an ambitious garden seed salesman; and that is what I invariably deemed myself to be this time of year from the mid fifties into the mid sixties; you went door-to-door, neighbor-to-neighbor over the course of Spring Branch, Doty Creek, Black Bottom, up Adams Branch and then along the railroad tracks nearly a mile to just outside of Isom where the "better off" Adamses lived there by the tracks.

You crossed the swinging bridge there below Bill and Janie's, hoofed another mile back down Highway 7, and back to the mouth of Blair Branch. You crossed the trestle bridge over Rock House Creek at Pat Cupps' place and then went on up the holler—peddling springtime, door to door. The entire trek was about nine miles

and it took all the daylight hours of a February Saturday. You worried, all the while, if you could still make change for a quarter from house to house. A pack of seeds just cost a dime and it was hard to keep from running out of nickels.

Normally you sold at least 144 packs of Black Seeded Simpson lettuce and a like amount of Detroit Dark Red beets, Carolina long-tapered carrots, Florida curly-leaved mustard, Cherry Bell radishes, Straight 8 Cucumbers, Connecticut Mangolds, Boston Zinnias, Maine Cosmos and various and sundry other stuff that would come up and grow if it was planted properly.

I was a grown man before I finally figured out why Beatrice Adams wanted New Zealand Curly spinach

seed. Nobody else did. But I made sure I had a couple of packs just for her. I'd never had it in a salad until I went to college. And now I just can't live without it once or twice a week.

I began this career when I was eight years old, and in the third grade, as I recall. I may have still been in second grade when the urge for entrepreneurship fell upon me like an iron glove and the only thing I could think of was ways to make money. I felt in constant and desperate need of a Daisy-Red Ryder BB gun, a bicycle, a Mitchell rod and reel combo and a pair of high-dollar-leather, insulated, water-proof, Browning, lace-up boots from the top of the line. I was way too tired of cold, wet, feet and frost bitten toes.

I was already talking a five mile round trip to the Jeremiah, KY Post Office to pick up the mail on Saturday and hurry on back to the house when I talked my mom into letting me sell a few Grit's on the way home. Grit was the essential backwoods newspaper rag—a cross between outright lies, made up of unreal news stories, and western novels.

They played out, the western novels, serially, one chapter at a time. So if you had readers who got hooked on the story line, they couldn't wait to get the next issue to see how Long Arm had fared against the rustlers and how Betsy was feeling about marriage this week.

They used to make bets, there on Blair Branch, as to whether or not Betsy would say "yes" if she got asked. And the women would swoon if Bets got kissed by that rascal, swoon, no-good, drunken cowboy. And, of course, about every other issue, little Betsy got a passionate, wet-one right on the lips to keep the readers interested and dying to get the next paper. Half the time I got paid with pennies that the women had been scrounging for a week. I felt like Santa Claus, even on the hottest day of July, when I brought the paper by.

Grit found it's starving market niche long before radio or television reception were much available in the Appalachian Mountains, or for that matter, on the Great Plains or the rest of rural America. Kansas wheat farmers and Dakota prospectors and cattlemen read the same "national news" according to Grit, that we read there in the head of Blair Branch and throughout the coal fields. It was like Gospel and often laid beside the

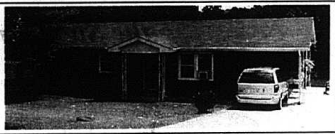

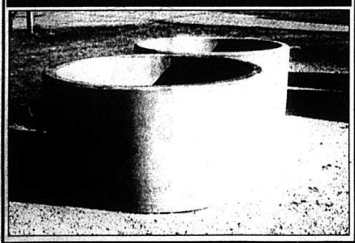

So I built up that paper line until, and at one time, I was selling over fifty Grits and sometimes grossing as much as \$5 a week. And keeping half the take.

Lots of people bought The Grit just for their privies because it was about the cheapest way you could go the sanitary thing when you had to go to the outhouse and wanted to be entertained at the same time. It's untelling how many people went blind trying to read Grit with a carbide miner's light. And back then there were no in-houses. If I had a penny a page for every Grit I sold that went dirtied and down into the hereafter of a toilet hole, I'd be a billionaire today.

Anyway, somewhere, early on, in the tenure of that newspaper venture, I became aware of the American Seed Company. I'm almost sure they had an ad in Grit, else I would have never known about them.

All I remember for sure is that they needed help getting the seeds to vegetable and flower gardeners all over the world. They proposed a modest profit if you wanted to take cash, but they also proposed eye-popping premiums if one sold enough seeds. Bikes, BB guns, chess and checker sets, cooking utensils and on and on.

All you had to do was send in a clipping from the paper and swear to God that you intended to sell however many packs of the garden seeds and if you sold out they'd send you a "prize" of your choice back in the mail when they got their money. I started out with 54 packs and by the time I gave it up, I was up over a thousand. American Seed Company (that's what I was a hero. I have a certificate here somewhere that proves it and for years, I wore the best pair of boots in Letcher County.

I actually talked people into buying eggplant seed, but I doubt that any of them ever ate it off the table. Blaine Blair used to say that it was pretty in the garden and the hogs liked it. His wife, Darlene, was the

only person on the holler who could get it to grow and she swore she liked it if it was fried just right. But I never tried it way back then.

Darlene also grew zucchini and golden crook-neck squash, unlike other Blair Branch gardeners in those days. My brother, Kester, used to say that even the hogs turned down a squash unless they were on the very verge of starvation. And to this day, he swears that a hog won't eat a cucumber. In the meantime, I grow about 30 varieties of vine crops every year and me and Loretta don't raise hogs. We just about live on squash and cukes and eggplant during warm weather, but that's another story.

Of course, the more seeds you sold, if you were in the business back then, the better the price because I once "won" a 13 speed Peugeot bicycle and they shipped it to the post office in three different boxes. It took my cousin, Little Steve Craft, a month to put it together and he was the handiest mechanic there on the holler, but he finally got it put together.

But two weeks after I got on the bike and learned to ride it, I had a blow-out on the front wheel. Neither Halstein Hardware nor Western Auto in Whitesburg could find another tire to fit that rim. But it was sure a pretty bike before I swapped it to a Caullboy on Doty Creek for a .22 rifle.

Suffice to say that I got the best end of that deal even though I had to go right back to walking.

So, I'm sitting here at my desk with a stack of seed catalogs nearly knee-deep piled up all around me. My order to Totally Tomatoes, alone, is up to 30 bucks. I've already posted a check to an outfit in Oklahoma for onion sets that amounted to \$20.43. And I'm wondering why the hell I ever got out of the business. I sure could use a brand new pair of insulated boots right now.

I'm not in desperate need of a bicycle but I'd swap one, if I had it, if you have anything to trade on.

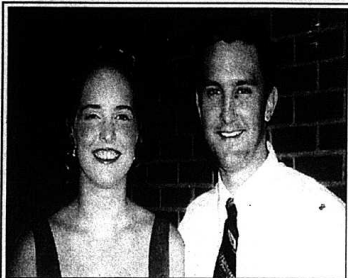

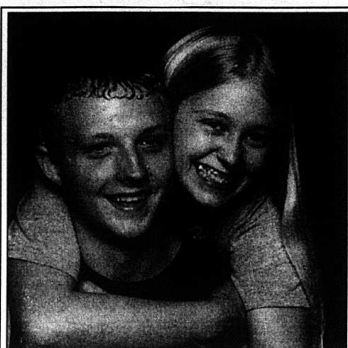

Agricultural News

Persons engaged in the production, feeding or slaughtering of lambs during 2004 are eligible to participate in a referendum under the Lamb Promotion, Research and Information Order, more commonly known as the Lamb Check-off Program. For the program to continue it must be approved by a majority of voters who also represent a majority of the volume represented in the referendum.

The referendum will be conducted January 31 through February 28, 2005 by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA).

Eligible persons may obtain Form LS-86 to vote in the referendum from their local FSA county office, either in person, by mail or by facsimile. Forms may also be obtained via the Internet at <http://www.ams.usda.gov/lsg/mp/rp/lamb.htm>. The referendum form LS-86, and accompanying documentation returned in person or by facsimile, must be received in the appropriate FSA office prior to the close of business February 28, 2005. Mailed returns must be postmarked no later than midnight February 28, 2005 and received in the FSA office by March 7, 2005.

The lamb check-off referendum is being administered by FSA. The lamb check-off assessments program is administered by the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS).

 The Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee (COC) will hold its monthly meeting the first Thursday of each month beginning at 8:00 a.m. The meeting will be held at the FSA office located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy 150 in Mt. Vernon, KY.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA at the local level by deciding the kind of program their county will have and how they will operate. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgment and knowledge and knowledge to make decisions.

Track Team competes at Wildcat Classic

The RCHS track and field team recently competed in the Wildcat Classic Indoor meet hosted by the University of Kentucky. Over 30 teams from across the state were on hand for the competition. RCHS had quite possibly its best indoor showing since their state runner-up finish at the Mason-Dixon Games Indoor State Championships three years ago.

RCHS junior all-star Kayla Hayes had arguably her best track meet performance ever. In the 1600-meter run Kayla blazed her way to a third place finish with an unbelievable new RCHS record in time of 5:33.7. This broke the mark she previously held by nearly 10 seconds. She also defeated the Class 3 cross-country state champion in the process. Kayla continued her success in the 800-meter run. She finished an impressive fourth in her second best time of 2:38.94. Kayla's final event was the 3200-meter run. Once again, Kayla ran extremely well and finished third in 12:32.13, her best two-mile effort in the last two seasons and a new RCHS indoor record.

RCHS all-star senior Brandon Cole had an awesome performance in the 1600-meter run. Brandon set a new all-time RCHS indoor record in the 1600 with an incredible effort

of 4:45.43. Brandon finished in 10th place overall in the event and nearly eclipsed his own RCHS outdoor mark of 4:44 set last outdoor season. RCHS junior Derrick Baker began his quest to become the top 800-meter runner in the history of RCHS track. Derrick got his record bid under way in exciting fashion with a great performance in the 800. Derrick finished an impressive 22nd overall with a new personal best indoor time of 2:18.98.

RCHS eighth grader Sarah McKinney started the meet off with a terrific performance in the 60-meter hurdles. Sarah finished an impressive sixth overall in 14:93 seconds.

RCHS freshman Morgan Thacker led all RCHS competitors in the 60-meter dash. Morgan ran a very fast 8:59 and placed an impressive eighth overall out of a stellar field of nearly eighty competitors. RCHS senior Chere' Embis ran a spectacular race and finished 15th overall in 8:82 seconds. Freshman Tiffany Smith also ran very well and finished 34th overall in 9:23 seconds.

Both Chere' and Tiffany also excelled in the 200-meter dash. Chere' finished 16th out of over 80 competitors with a spectacular time of 2:39.76. Tiffany ran an awesome race as well and finished 31st in a personal best time of 30.97 seconds.

RCHS junior Ashley Bullock ran very well in the 1600-meter run. She finished 22nd overall in 7:40.22, a new indoor personal best. Ashley ran even better in the 3200-meter run. She finished an impressive 11th overall with an indoor best time of 15:01.69.

RCHS eighth grader Tamara Blanton led all Rockcastle competitors in the 400-meter dash. Tamara ran an awesome race and finished fifth overall with a new indoor per-

sonal record time of 1:04.84. Freshman Katie Burdette was very close behind. Katie finished a spectacular race in eighth place overall with a personal best indoor effort of 1:05.16. Freshmen Courtney Bullock and Morgan Thacker also recorded personal indoor best times in the event. The girls ran very well and finished 19th and 20th respectively in 1:08.26 and 1:08.49.

Later in the afternoon, the same four girls captured first place in the 1600-meter relay with an unbelievable team performance. Tamara Blanton got the race off to a great start with a fast lead leg. Morgan Thacker kept it close through her second leg of the race. Courtney Bullock tightened the race with an exceptional third leg. Katie Burdette took the race home with a great surge in the final 100-meters of the race. The girls finished with a new RCHS indoor record time of 4:27.21.

RCHS next competitors on February 19th in the University of Kentucky Invitational, a national meet featuring many of the states best athletes and teams.

The Rockcastle Track Club, which is made up of several RCHS athletes that compete on the varsity team, attended the USA Track and Field Indoor Championships held at the Farnham Dudgeon Civic Center in Frankfort. The team enjoyed many outstanding performances, most of which were in the top three in each event of the competition.

Seventh grader Samantha Smith had a spectacular meet, winning four gold medals out of the four events that she competed in. 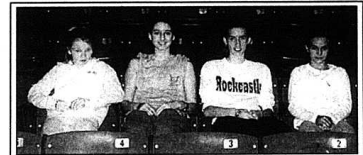

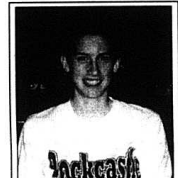

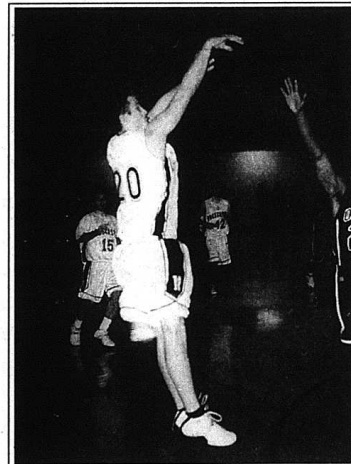

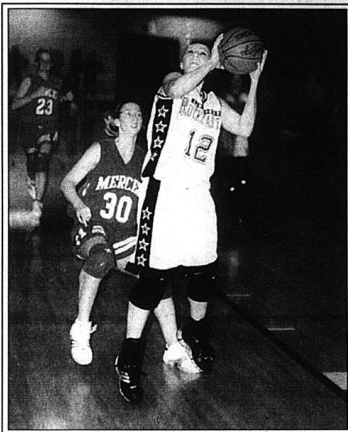
Lunsford had eight, Sarah Parsons had eight and Jessica Asher two.

The Rockets lost in Saturday's Louisville Invitational Tournament to fourth ranked Louisville Christian Academy 52-39.

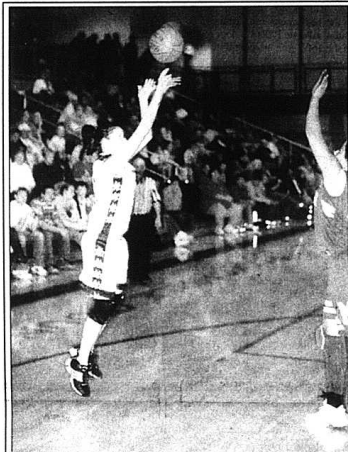

"I want to thank the county attorney, Judge Carlotfis and the county magistrates for their patience and cooperation throughout the duration of this investigation," Isaacs said.

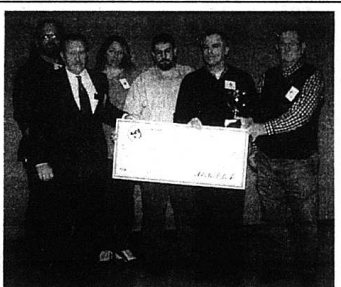

eration during the roadside cleanup campaign.

"Congratulations on this remarkable achievement," Rogers said. "Your victory required leadership and lots of teamwork. You showed the whole region what can be accomplished when our local officials and citizens come together for the greater good. I want to thank everyone who participated in the 2004 Roadside PRIDE competition. Keep up the good work."

The Roadside PRIDE program uses friendly competition among the region's communities to clean up roadside litter. Throughout October 2004, cities and counties organized volunteers to pick up trash along

roadways. Points were awarded based on the number of trash bags, appliances, and tires collected; the number of volunteers that participated; and the number of miles cleaned along roadways. The PRIDE organization paid to dispose of the garbage and also provided cleanup supplies.

To ensure a level playing field, cities and counties were divided into classes based on population. PRIDE awarded 1st Place and 2nd Place in each class.

For the second year in a row, the City of Mt. Vernon earned 1st Place in Class 3, which includes cities with populations between 1,500 and 3,000. The city beat out the competition with 215 volunteers collecting 1,405 bags of trash along 36 road miles.

The City of Livingston earned 1st Place in Class 1, which includes cities with populations less than 500. The city reported that 50 volunteers collected 482 bags of trash along 50 miles of roadway. Livingston came in second in Class 1 last year.

Rockcastle County took home its first Roadside PRIDE Award this year. The county earned 2nd Place in Class 2, which is for counties with populations between 10,000 and 20,000. The county won with 165

volunteers cleaning 31 road miles, netting 515 bags of trash.

Rockcastle County and Livingston received \$1,000 for cleaning the most road miles within a scenic byway. Together they cleaned 51 miles along U.S. 25, which is part of the Wilderness Road Heritage Highway, one of the region's three National Scenic Byways. The Southern and Eastern Kentucky Tourism Development Association sponsored the cash awards.

"Roadside PRIDE grew by 1,000 volunteers this year, so people seem to enjoy the competition," said Richard Thomas, PRIDE executive director. "Really, it's a win-win situation. Communities have fun 'talking trash,' a few of them take home trophies, and we all benefit from cleaner roadsides."

Eastern Kentucky PRIDE - Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment - serves 38 counties in southern and eastern Kentucky. Rogers and the late James Bickford, former Secretary of the Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, started PRIDE in 1997 to provide government resources to local citizens as they work to clean up the region's environment. PRIDE is funded by grants from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

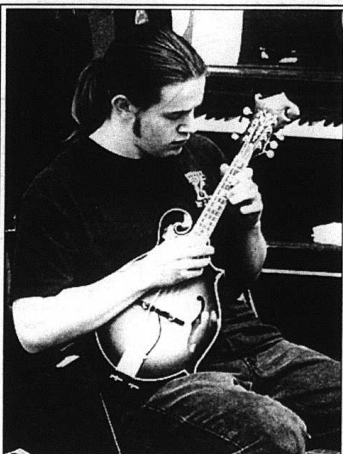
Mullins conducts residencies for KY Music Hall of Fame

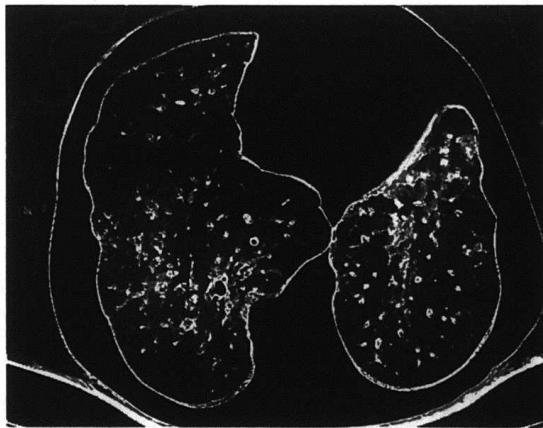
