# \$242,425 in road funds to be released

In a reversal of an earlier decision by the state, Governor Ernie Fletcher amounced Monday the early release and the control of the governor's decision to release \$33 million in county road aid and municipal Toad raid to eligible county and city governments. "Many areas of the Common-wealth have been hit hard by the December snow storm and the January flooding." Fletcher said. "The inclement weather has taken its toll on many roads and stretched city and county road department funds to the limit. The early release of these funds will allow Rockeastle County to start repairing roads and bridges damaged

be receiving 60% of the funds in August and 30% in March and the remaining 10% coming at the end of the fiscal year.

The funds are collected statewide from a percentage of the gasoline tax and put into a pool. 

# 18 indictments returned Friday

A Rockeastle County Grand Jury returned 18 indictments, last Friday, against 20 persons. The indictments ranged from rape to flagrant non-support. Ashley Jasper, 29, of Rt. 3, Brodhead, was indicted on three counts of second degree rape and one of third degree rape of a female less than fourteen years of age. # **Barnett receives** shock probation

Andy Barnett, 40, of Cove Branch is out of Jail on snock proba-tion after a hearing in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Friday. Barnett, owner of Barnett's Sal-

vage Yard, was granted shock pro-bation by Circuit Judge Robert

bation by Circuit Judge Robert Gillum.

Bamett's attorney Jerry Cox, of Mt. Vernon requested the probation and veteran state police detective Gary Lane told Gillum be had no problem with his decision.

Rockcastle Shernff's Detective Matt Bryant was not happy with Lane, his co-worker Bryant had presented the 40 plus cases against Barnett to the grand jury, which resulted in three separate indictments. The midictment charges last year were for crimes ranging from receiving stolen property to dealing in illegal drugs.

On October 22nd, Circuit Judge Gillum sentenced Barnett to five years, after he pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance, first degree. That was in connection with a plea of guilty to receiving stolen property over \$300. That plea was entered September 24th.

"Our department worked hard on this case and had solid evidence to present. I just don't understand the decision," Bryant said. "I also don't understand why, as lead detective, my recommendation was not sought in this case," Bryant added. Some of the conditions attached

Some of the conditions attached to Barnett's release on shock probation include: not committing another offense; avoiding persons or places of disreputable or harmful chracter, working fathfully at suitable employment; reporting to probation offerer as directed and obtaining a GED certificate within one year.

Barnett was released Friday, January 28th.

# Cromer pleads guilty to wildlife violations

Rockeastle County Road Super-visor Denton "Jack" Cromer has pled guilty to numerous wildlife viola-tions, ranging from shooting from the roadway to illegal taking of White-tail Deer, according to County Attor-ney Billy Reynolds. The wildlife charges were the result of a month-long investigation by Officer Steve Issaes of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "This case has been one of the more exhaustive that I've worked," Issaes said. "It had several wists and turns that were quite unexpected. This was one of those cases that you hope only comes along once and regret that it happened at all," Issaes added.

Cromer was fined \$275.50 by District Judge David A. Tapp pilus he was assessed \$1,530 restitution to the state. The restitution figure is the cost of replacing two deer said County Attorney Billy Reynolds. Cromer also forfeited a .357-caliber Smith & Wesson pistol he had in his county sult of a month-long investigation by

also forfeited a .357-calibles Smith. & Wesson pistol he had in his county truck and used to shoot at the deer. According to a criminal complaint filed by Isaacs, the incident occurred November 18, 2004 when Cromer, in a ruck furnished for his use by the county, stopped and shot at a white-tail buck. He and another employee looked for the deer to see whether Cromer had hit it, but apparently didn't find it.

However, later that day, Cromer killed a doe, loaded it into his county muck and took it to someone else with instructions to tag it and register the kill in the other person's name, ecording to the complaint.

Cromer also acknowledged shooting a second deer, failing to properly ago or register the first deer made both kills illegal, Isaccs said in the citation.


