#### Snowfall causes havoc for local motorists

his or her bowel habits are quite well ingrained. They
do not change significantly for any period of time
unless there is a significant cause.

Colon cancer is one of the most common causes
of a persistent change in bowel habits. There are
about 165,000 new cases each year in the United
States.

Any change in bowel habits that lasts three weeks or longer should be evaluated by your physician. The change may be diarrhea, constipation, passing muicous or blood, or even symptoms such as urgency.

If you have any of these changes, your doctor will do a general exam, including blood tests which may indicate anemia. Anemia is a common sign in colon cancer because of the microscopic blood loss from the tumor.

For this reason, one of the most useful tests is to check for blood in the stool. If any trace of blood is found, you will need a look at the whole colon with an instrument called a colonoscope. This allows your doctor to see the lining of the entire colon. If it is perfectly clear, significant polyps are unlikely to develop in the next few year.





1. Tell her it's not her fault. You



Her eighteen year old beau Estill Mullins was from White Oak Branch. They walked from the church at Red Hill all the way to Mullins Station to catch the train. A noisy dog along the route almost exposed them (she remembers the first belonged to Dan Dar Mullins).

exposed them (she remembers the dog belonged to Dan Dart Mullins). But they made it, undiscovered, to Jellico, Tennessee where they were

married. When she returned to Red Hill her When she returned to Red Hill her parents were not suprised at the secret nuptials because the young couple had courted for some time. When asked why they eloped, Mullins chuckles like a teenager and says "for the fun of it."

The couple evidently were well matched, despite their differing political and religious views. Mullins, who is a Republican and went to the Baptist Church, reports that her thusband was a Democrat who went to

the Christian Church.

She thinks it was "his privilege" to believe differently than she did. Rather than quarrel they made jokes about their differences.

After they married but before they had children, they moved to Mullins Station. She considered it "the heart of the world." People from all over including Red Hill. Cave Ridge. Station. She considered it "the heart of the world." People from all over including Red Hill, Cave Ridge, Piney Branch and White Oak - came there to get the mail and meet the train. Her husband worked for the railroad there.

She had two children, and like most mothers, she believes her children were "the best." She remembers her son Julian Everett Mullins was born September 14, 1920, and

her daughter Pauline Pennington (named for Dr. Monroe Pennington of Mt. Vernon) Mullins Eaton was born November 18, 1924. The last time she spanked the chil-dren was a memorable event. Pauline

The last time sine spantage due chair-dren was a memorable event. Pauline and Julian were outside, quarreling over a fire place shoved and she spanked them. The family dog Rover saw this. The dog "got after" her, apparently believing that she had harmed the children. She says Rover "just about eat me up." It caused her to think "that dog has more sense" than she did, and thanks to Rover, she never spanked the children again. Her children went to grade school at Mullins Station, and then to Livingston High School. She recalls with pride that both Julian and Pauline were the valedictorians of

Pauline were the valedictorians of their respective high school classes,

raume were the valueatorians of their respective high school classes, and that they both went on to college in Lexington, Pauline to Eastern Kentucky University.

Mullins and her husband also ran the Grace Mullins Store at Mullins Station from the late 1930s through the 1950s. He was the postmaster for Mullins Station (Withers), and later worked as the bookkeeper and weighmaster at the quarry there.

The Mullins eventually left "the heart of the world" and moved to Pine Hill to live with daughter Pauline. He continued to work for the quarry un-

til his death in 1972.
Mullins decided to stay at Pine
Hill when Pauline remarried (the late
Johnny Eaton) and moved to Mount
Vernon in 1989.
She didn't stay there long. Johnny
Eaton spent one night in Mount
Vernon without his mother-in-law,
and decided that she should be in
town with them. He took some helpers to Pine Hill the next day, packed
Mullins up and moved her in with
them.

Her son Julian died in 1993, but Jean Smith of Manchester, whom she praises as a wonderful daughter-in-law.

These days, she still lives in town with Pauline. Though confined to bed, she is in good health (her only medication is one Advil per day), and

in good spirits.

As for the secret to her longevity,
Mullins will tell you it is that she has been "well taken care of" by her fam-ily. It is not hard to imagine that her "loves life" attitude is probably also

"loves life" attitude is probably also a key, as well as a caring spirit for others (she says that she and her fam-ily always shared what they had with their neighbors, and that she and her family "always got along with every-

raminy "aways got along with every-body"). She likes to keep up with the weather and listens to Brad James' daily weather report. She can also sing a few refrains from her favorite hymns "Amazing Grace" and "How Firm a Foundation." And of course, she can tell you what it was like to grow up at Red Hill one hundred years ago, and what it was like to live in the "heart of the world."




