#### Ten sentenced in Circuit Court

One man, Jeffery Dillingham, 34,


#### **Burley Burkhart** pleads not guilty

#### Adventures in Geocaching

What is geocaching? "It's outdoor iventure, it's a little bit of exercise, writa is geocatinity." Its outdoor adventure, it's a little bit of exercise, it takes you to cool places that you're not likely to see otherwise and there is the 'reward' of collecting a trinket and signing a logbook proving you were there. In short, it's fur! When you get home, there's a final benefit realized; a sense of 'achievement' since you have increased, by one, the number of caches that you've successfully found. It's another notch on your gun belt," says Dean Henson, Naturplist at Pine Mountain State Resort Park near Pineville. Geocaching (pronounced geocashing) is a modern day scavenger hunt open to auryone with the appropriate modern equipment. It works like this. The hunter first pin-points a treasure to' 'cache' as it is

points a treasure (or "cache" as it is called) he would like to find on a computer website. The website gives the coordinates (longitude and lati-

tude), and some other clues about the geocache sites. The hunter then plugs the coordinates for the site he has chosen into his handheld Global Pochosen into his handheld Global Peo-sitioning Saulleit (GPS) system to locate the hidden treasure. The tra-incess abox filled with train-kets. When the cache is found, a trin-ket is taken out and replaced with one of the hunter's own, and the logbook inside the cache is filled out. "It think the allure of geocaching is found in it's similarity to treasure hunting. It might be described as an Easter egg hunt for adults." Henson says. "The number of adults that can be observed "Helping" their children

be observed 'helping' their children locate eggs on Easter Sunday is evi-dence that the latent desire is still there; the parents seem to care more about it than the kids. This new adventure sport may be an excuse to 'carry on' for a lot of people, " says Henson, himself a geocacher.

#### County's share of road bonds will be \$409,719

Governor Ernie Fletcher announced last Thursday the award of 3409,719.64 in Country Road Aid bonds to Rockcastle Country and more than \$53,000 in Municipal Road bonds to three cities in Rockcastle Country.

The awards are part of \$75,000 in Municipal Road Aid bonds being given to all 120 country Road and Municipal Road Aid bonds being given to all 1210 counties and 419 cities by Governor Fletcher and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet as part of the recently

Fletcher and the Kentucky Transpor-tation (abinet a part of the recently approved state budget. The money being announced will be awarded once the bonds are sold. "The award will allow local communities to make improvements to their roads. to make improvements to their roads and streets, including resurfacing and other needed repairs."

pink eye, but it is more common than most people think. Pink eye is a
contagious disease and it spreads easily through schools and day care
centers where there are numerous children in close contact. It is the
most common eye problem among children.

With pink eye, or conjunctivits, the white part
of the eye becomes red, and yellowish matter builds
up on the lid margins and eye lashes. Pink eye can
be caused by infections such as bacteria or viruses,
and also by non-infectious easures, such as aller.

to these is the cause, but when there is a change as a bacterial infection it is usually treated with anti-biotic eye drops. The pink eye generally improves nicely in two to three days, but should be treated for a full week. A





Therefore, the roots do not grow through sidewalks and brick structures, septic lines, etc. destroying them. Also, their roots are not a problem for mowing around the tree. I learned you stay away from plums, water maples, willow trees, etc. because they cause problems such as the above listed. I know better myself because I know from my personal "taste test" of the raw water from the lake, cause I know fresh and without any detectable smell or aftertaste. Time will tell the runly.
