## Ten sentenced in Circuit Court

Ten men, including seven from Rockcastle County, received terms of imprisonment in Judge Robert Gillum's Division of Rockcastle Circuit Court on March 23 and 28.

One man, Jeffrey Dillingham, 34, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to 17 years, after pleading guilty to Trafficking in Methamphetamine and Flagrant Non-Support. Dillingham was sentenced to seven years on these charges. This term will run consecutive to Manufacturing Methamphetamine charges in Pulaski County, for a total of 17 years. The sentence was a result of a dual plea agreement negotiated by Eddy F. Montgomery's, Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle County, office, in conjunction with charges prosecuted by UNITE prosecutor, David Dalton.

According to Assistant Commonwealth Attorney, Jeremy A. Bartley, several others will face terms of imprisonment as a result of plea.

Also sentenced from Rockcastle County were: Christopher Scott Jones, 29, of Brodhead, pled guilty to Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance, second degree. Gillum revoked Jones' probation, stemming from Flagrant Non-Support charges, and he was sentenced to a total of three year imprisonment.

Jeffrey Curtis Howard, 34, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to a total of five years, after pleading guilty to Flagrant Non-Support and his probation, from an Unlawful Imprisonment charge, was also revoked by Gillum on a motion by the Commonwealth.

Steve Stamper, 35, of Brodhead, was sentenced to five years on charges of Possession of Controlled Substances as well as being a Persistent Felony Offender, second degree. Stamper was found guilty in a jury trial.

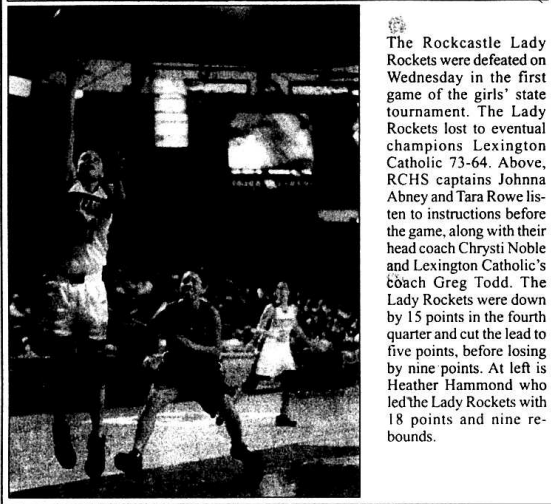
## Burley Burkhardt pleads not guilty

## Lady Rockets lose to state champions

 The Rockcastle County Lady Rockets put up a valiant fight in Bowling Green on Wednesday when they played the eventual state champions, the Lady Knights of Lexington Catholic.

Radio announcer and RCHS Guidance Counselor Dale Whitaker certainly hit the nail on the head last week when he said, "whoever wins the Catholic-Rockcastle County game will be the state champions."

The Lady Rockets lost to Catholic 73-64. The Lady Rockets led only twice in the game, both times in the first quarter. They were behind 30-24 at half-time and never regained the lead in the second half. In the fourth quarter, the Lady Rockets were behind by fifteen points but came back to cut the lead to only five before the eventual nine point loss.

Senior Sarah Parsons had six and senior Katie Parsons, who took only three shots during the game, added two.

## Adventures in Geocaching

 What is geocaching? "It's outdoor adventure. It's a little bit of exercise, it takes you to cool places that you're not likely to see otherwise and there is the 'reward' of collecting a trinket and signing a logbook proving you were there. In short, it's fun! When you get home, there's a final benefit realized; a sense of 'achievement' since you have increased, by one, the number of caches that you've successfully found. It's another notch on your gun belt," says Dean Henson, Naturalist at Pine Mountain State Resort Park near Pineville.

Geocaching (pronounced geocaching) is a modern day scavenger hunt open to anyone with the appropriate modern equipment. It works like this. The hunter first pins points a treasure (or "cache" as it is called) he would like to find on a computer website. The website gives the coordinates (longitude and latitude), and some other clues about the geocache sites. The hunter then plugs the coordinates for the site he has chosen into his handheld Global Positioning System (GPS) system to locate the hidden treasure. The treasure/cache is a box filled with trinkets. When the cache is found, a trinket is taken out and replaced with one of the hunter's own, and the logbook inside the cache is filled out.

"I think the allure of geocaching is found in it's similarity to treasure hunting. It might be described as an Easter egg hunt for adults," Henson says. "The number of adults that can be observed 'helping' their children locate eggs on Easter Sunday is evidence that the latent desire is still there; the parents seem to care more about it than the kids. This new adventure sport may be an excuse to 'carry on' for a lot of people," says Henson, himself a geocacher.

14 people were indicted by a recent Rockcastle County Grand Jury on eight separate indictments.

Four were named in one indictment, two for manufacture of methamphetamine and two for complicity to manufacture meth.

Paul M. McNew, 37, of Mt. Vernon and Bobby J. VanWinkle, 28, of Berea were indicted for Manufacture of Meth. Essie R. Frederick, 38, of Rt. 6, Mt. Vernon and Jean Witt, 64, of Orlando were both indicted for Complicity to Manufacture Meth.

Also indicted on meth charges were: Billie J. Lunceford, 35 of Barnett Road, Mt. Vernon and Bobby L. Moore, Jr., 29 of Maple Road, Orlando.

Both men were indicted for the offense of Manufacture of Methamphetamine, first offense.

Named in the same indictment was David York, 42, of Brodhead, on a count of Complicity to Manufacture Meth. York was also indicted for Possession of a Controlled Substance.

Bobby Ramsey, 28 and Janice Bowman, 26, both of Ramsey Trailer Park in Mt. Vernon were both named in a co-indictment. B. Ramsey for the

offense of Criminal Abuse, first degree, on a person under twelve years of age and J. Bowman was indicted for Complicity to Commit Criminal Abuse, first degree.

Indicted on six counts was Richard Caudill, 34, of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon. Caudill was indicted on two counts of Wanton Endangerment causing substantial danger of death or serious physical injury to officers Steve Isaacs and Barry Adams; Fleeing or Evading Police, first degree; Resisting Arrest and two counts of Persistent Felony Offender.

Caudill's bail was set at \$50,000 cash/bond.

Frankie Lee Chestnut, 42, of Filler Plant Road, East Bernstadt, was indicted on three counts: Possession of a Controlled Substance, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and Public Intoxication.

Also indicted were: Melanie R. Campbell, 35, of Mt. Vernon for the offense of Bigamy; Darrell W. Lamb, Jr., 30, was indicted for Flagrant Non-Support in the amount of \$10,708.65 and

John Koenig, II, 27, of Village Drive in London, was also indicted for Flagrant Non-Support in the amount of \$10,139.50.

## Part of \$75 million to counties and cities County's share of road bonds will be \$409,719

Governor Ernie Fletcher announced last Thursday the award of \$409,719.64 in County Road Aid bonds to Rockcastle County and more than \$53,000 in Municipal Road bonds to three cities in Rockcastle County.

The awards are part of \$75,000 in County Road and Municipal Road Aid bonds being given to all 120 counties and 419 cities by Governor Fletcher and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet as part of the recently approved state budget. The money being announced will be awarded once the bonds are sold.

"The money being distributed to Rockcastle County and their communities reinforces our commitment to providing a safe and reliable transportation system for all our citizens," stated Governor Ernie Fletcher. "The award will allow local communities to make improvements to their roads and streets, including resurfacing and other needed repairs."

The awards to the three cities in Rockcastle County are: Mt. Vernon, \$34,281.52; Livingston, \$3,015.50 and Brodhead, \$15,778.49.

Including today's announcement, Governor Fletcher has directed an

estimated \$135 million to county and city governments from the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet's Department of Intergovernmental Programs since November 2004.

"Through the leadership and vision of Governor Fletcher, today's announcement is once again an example of the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet's commitment to improving the quality of life in our communities through improving their roads," said Bill Nighbht, Acting Secretary, Kentucky Transportation Cabinet.

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## Home With Pink Eye

Every parent dreads having his child come home from school with pink eye, but it is more common than most people think. Pink eye is a contagious disease and it spreads easily through schools and day care centers where there are numerous children in close contact. It is the most common eye problem among children.

With pink eye, or conjunctivitis, the white part of the eye becomes red, and yellowish matter builds up on the lid margins and eye lashes. Pink eye can be caused by infections such as bacteria or viruses, and also by non-infectious causes, such as allergies, or irritation from smoke or dust. Viral infections are the most common cause. Doctors can not always tell from an exam which of these is the cause, but when there is a chance of a bacterial infection it is usually treated with antibiotic eye drops. The pink eye generally improves nicely in two to three days, but should be treated for a full week. A culture is seldom taken, unless the pink eye does not improve.

The matter from bacterial infections is rather thick and sticky, and in the morning the eyes are usually stuck shut. The child has to pry his eyes open or use warm compresses to help loosen the debris.

Viruses cause a discharge that is usually watery and thin. The eye does not feel like it is glued shut. Allergies also cause a watery discharge and mild redness and can appear very similar to a virus.

A child with pink eye should stay home from school until the infection is cured. He should also use separate towels at home and the whole family should wash hands frequently--hand to hand contact is the most common route of spreading the infection.

Terri Schiavo, a 41-year-old, brain-damaged, NO brain-damaged Florida woman who, until Friday before last, was nourished and hydrated through a feeding tube, is at this writing, into her twelfth day of a court-ordered starvation and dehydration period, with her family birth is allowed only to stand by and watch.

Her husband said after seven of her 15 years of being brain-damaged and kept (by his wishes and a supportive judge) at skilled facilities, that she would not want to be kept alive by artificial means. According to a source at The Family Foundation of Kentucky, if this woman could have been allowed to live at home with the feeding tube along with a family ready and willing to care for her needs. Then such a sad state of affairs might not be something causing such great moral, legal, and ethical battles discussed by an often biased, pro-death, media.

Those concerns we can now have just as surely for our justice system, which has denied at every turn this woman's family their desire to help daughter while she has been unable to care for herself and has been denied her legal right to representation. A report this morning from The Associated Press says that Schiavo's (the husband's) attorney has stated they will hold an autopsy after Terri's death to show the extent of her brain damage.

According to some, apparently a majority according to the mainline broadcasts) of Floridians, such sought-after evidence is justification that this woman should be handled in this barbaric manner in order to make her die.

## Is flushing lines a temporary fix...?

Dear Editor,  
Well, we've supposedly been successful in improving the quality of water supplied by the City of Mt. Vernon.

Now we've started flushing lines to get the old bad tasting water out of the lines. That's good! Some places tell me their water is not as bad as it was. That's good! But, are we still treating the symptoms and not the cause?

I still feel and stand firm in my belief that we're treating the symptoms. My friend who helped me perform the "taste test" (see Signal, Feb. 24, 2005 and "Could low water pressure create health problems" March 17, 2005) was no ordinary auto technician. He was the main technician for Mercedes Benz and they flew him to other states to diagnose and solve their most complicated problems. So, naturally, he became well known by other engineers and they became known by him. He got to know an engineer, and it still friends with, Doug Brown, who has done everything from restoring antique aircraft to laying water lines underneath the ocean for long distances. My team mate spoke to him recently about our water problem. Mr. Brown stated that his best guess was that the old water lines were rotten and outdated and needed replaced, if they were more than 25-30 years old. And that flushing out all the contaminants would improve the taste for a while, but was only a temporary fix. I did not personally talk to Mr. Brown myself nor do I know him.

I however talked to a janitor at Dairy Delight in Brodhead. He stated that the water problems were growing through and around the pipes bursting cracks in them. Laugh if you will!

I never heard the "signs of the moon" stated in any of my agriculture and horticulture science classes at EKU or UK. However, it is known by all agriculture and horticulture majors that day length effects many plants. Onions are a good example. Vadaia onions do best in Vadaia, GA. Therefore, when you order onion sets, you can select from short day varieties, long day varieties or day neutral varieties. A certain agriculture teacher in this county grew Poinsettias to sell before Christmas to make money for the Ag Dept. They did not bloom! I was doing my 401 time, observing Ag and Hort. classes at different schools. When he asked me why they weren't blooming, I told him that I would ask Dr. Black at EKU his opinion and have him an answer when I came back. It was very simple. Poinsettias are short day bloomers and there was night lights around the greenhouse and the Poinsettias were getting light 24/7. That was an expensive lesson! I told him to check the average day length about three weeks before and until the Poinsettias estimated sale date and put a dark shade cloth over them for the rest of the time or just simply cover at night. This same problem could exist if there was a full moon during the time frame.

In Professor Tom Knight's class at EKU, "Deciduous Ornamental Trees and Shrubs," I learned "why" certain trees were recommended or were not recommended in the landscape. While Professor Knight was going to school at UT, and afterwards, he worked as a Horticulturist and its maintenance for the city of Knoxville, TN. He gained a lot of hands-on experience before becoming a teacher. I have the highest respect for Tom Knight's knowledge and experience in the area he's teaching. It was there that I learned why the Sugar Maple is the most popular shade tree in the U.S. It's due to its beautiful variation of fall colors, medium growing rate and deep root system. Therefore, the roots do not grow through sidewalks and brick structures, septic lines, etc. destroying them. Also, their roots are not a problem for mowing around the tree. I learned why you stay away from plums, water maples, willow trees, etc. because they cause problems such as the above listed. They also cause greater problems for power lines during windy weather and ice storms, due to their brittleness.

The ends of the roots give off carbonic acid, which dissolves any-

thing in its path that causes resistance. This is why the roots can grow through a concrete wall, sidewalk, sewer pipes, water pipes, etc. However, I don't know the exact depth of the tap roots of these "bad trees," and I know that Ralph Isaacs laid the water lines deep, 38" or more. Therefore, I can't say the janitor is right but if I had the health and equipment, I could find out first hand for myself. Regardless, every house has a water line running from their meter or someone's meter and these are the twigs of which are a part of the overall "tree" that makes up the total water supply network.

I totally agree with the engineer who stated that algae is the problem. Anyone who has working taste buds can taste the algae that comes out of the faucet. However, I would disagree with any man or woman who says that the highly contaminated and filthy source, Lake Linville, is the problem. I know better myself because I know from personal "taste test" of the raw water from the lake, and I know that Ralph Isaacs laid any detectable smell or aftertaste. Time will tell the truth!

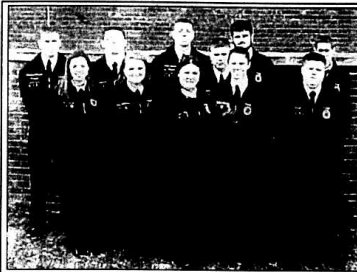
Forward in the Fifth's CyberParents program strives to connect parents to resources. Through

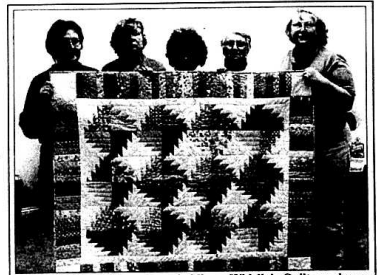

**Independent Auditor's Report**

We were engaged to audit the statement of assets, liabilities, and equity arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as of June 30, 2004, and the statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in cash balances for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of Rockcastle County, Kentucky's management. During our engagement, we noted that the fiscal court had serious weaknesses in their financial reporting function. We were unable to place reliance on the public properties corporation's transactions or the general obligation bonds transactions. Their maturity, our inability to apply other auditing procedures to those accounts, and the high risk factors associated with the audit prevent us from expressing an opinion on the County's financial statements.

Because we were unable to place reliance on the public properties corporation's transactions or the general obligation bond transactions and because audit risk is at an unacceptable level, the scope of our work was not sufficient to enable us to express, and we do not express, an opinion on the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated June 25, 2004, on our consideration of Rockcastle County, Kentucky's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our work performed. Based on the results of our work performed, we present the accompanying comments and recommendations, included herein, which discuss the following report comments:

## Variety adds spice to life - good for your health too

Serving a variety of orange and leafy green vegetables spices up mealtime, gives many needed minerals and vitamins and provides substances that may prevent some chronic diseases.

In addition to their variety of colors, vegetables can be served many ways including fresh, steamed, wilted, braised, poached and stuffed.

Most leafy green and orange vegetables are high in vitamins A and C, calcium, iron and other nutrients necessary for good health. The darker green vegetable leaves are, the more nutrients they contain. Many vegetables also contain phytochemicals that scientists have indicated may reduce the risk of certain cancers, high blood pressure and heart disease.

People should eat vegetables in the cruciferous family at least two to three times a week because they are especially high in phytochemicals. Members of this family include all types of cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, kale and broccoflower. Other vegetables containing these substances are spinach and turnip and mustard greens.

It is nutritionally desirable to maintain the bright green colors of spinach, Chinese cabbage and Swiss chard. Cook these vegetables the least time possible and close to mealtime to prevent over-cooking. Also, use a minimal amount of cooking liquid to keep nutrients from leaching out and to maintain superior texture, flavor and color.

Use a variety of mixed greens, particularly darker varieties to prepare a tossed salad that is full of minerals. Try something out of the ordinary by adding butternut squash, sweet potatoes or beets.

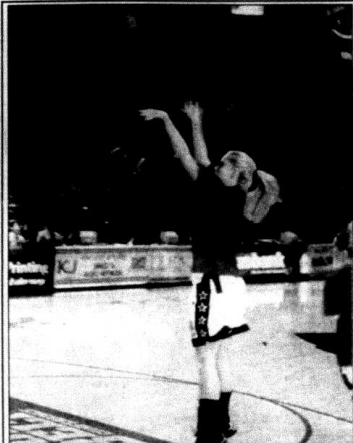

### "It is Written"

trial, prosecuted by Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley. Stamper will also serve three years as a result of his probation being revoked.

Gillum revoked Stamper's probation from a previous Possession of Controlled Substances charge, making him serve a total of eight years.

Ryan Kensington, aka Robert Sandusky, 19, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to one year imprisonment on a charge of Possession of a Methamphetamine Precursor. This term of imprisonment will run consecutive to five years he was already serving on charges of Receiving Stolen Property, Possession of Controlled Substances, Fleeing and Evading and Criminal Mischief for a total term of six years.

Judge Gillum also heard a motion made by Bartley, on behalf of the Commonwealth, to revoke Jason Burkhart's probation. Burkhart, 29, of Orlando, was on probation from 2001 charges of Theft by Unlawful Taking over \$300 and Criminal Possession of a Forged Instrument, second degree.

While on probation, Burkhart was indicted by a Rockcastle Grand Jury on charges of Burglary, first degree and Burglary, second degree.

After hearing from several witnesses, including Kentucky State Trooper Jason McCowan, Judge Gillum revoked Burkhart's probation and imposed his four year sentence. The current charges of Burglary remain pending.

Commonwealth Attorney Eddy F. Montgomery applauded the efforts of all law enforcement officers involved in the cases. Montgomery remarked that both the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department and the Kentucky State Police, assigned to Rockcastle County, have done an excellent job on these cases.

Montgomery noted about the 17 year sentence imposed in the Dillingham case, "This plea agreement was the result of a deal effort by Bartley and UNITE prosecutor David Dalton. It demonstrates just how severe the penalty can be for those making and selling the drugs that are so devastating to our communities." Montgomery expressed his appreciation to the UNITE Program in helping make the plea agreement possible.

**"Geocaching"**

It should be noted that many geocache sites are located in state and federal parks, and that those areas do have rules geocachers should be familiar with.

To learn more about this activity, I went along with a local man on his first geocache outing. This person wants to remain anonymous so we'll call him "Bob." He learned about geocaching on the internet, and had just purchased a GPS.

Bob prefers computers to hiking, and hasn't camped since high school. Those who know him consider him navigational challenged. He once traveled to Louisville for a concert that took place in Cincinnati. In short, Bob did not fit the assumed profile of those who would be interested in this activity in that he is not "outdoorsy" or "adventurous" or "able to read a map that would lead to treasure."

Instead, Bob is attracted to geocaching because he likes electronic gadgets and computers, and because he wants to lose fifty pounds. He believes geocaching will get him outside and moving, while giving him an excuse to buy another electronic device (GPS) to go along with those he already has (MP3 player, car dvd, and digital camera).

Sometime before the day of the hunt Bob decided on three cache sites he wanted to find. He printed the coordinates and information about the sites from the internet.

The first geocache was in Rockcastle County, and was the only one in the county he found on the internet. He calibrated his GPS, before we left, and entered the coordinates for the first site. I had to drive to because he "needed to navigate." His two year old daughter accompanied us. On the way we stopped at Hiatt's 5&10 in Mt. Vernon and the toddler picked a pink bouncy ball to leave in the cache.

Bob was impressed with his new handheld GPS, which is about the size and shape of a cell phone but with a larger

"screen." On the drive to the first site, after consulting his GPS, he advised "at this speed, we will reach the site in 4:39 minutes," and proclaimed the GPS capable of miracles ("I'll never be lost again!").

At the first site, within about eight minutes Bob found the cache: a rectangular tupperware container with a blue lid, somewhat smaller than a shoe box. It contained a key chain, a rock, a small ball, a tiny toy revolver, and other assorted toys and trinkets. Bob chose to take a small stuffed animal with a tag on it. The stuffed animal was a "travel bug" which means that Bob will have to put it in the next cache he finds. The tag has a number he will log on to a web site so the stuffed animal can be tracked as it moves from site to site. Bob left the pink bouncy ball (much to the consternation of the toddler, despite the new "toy"), and the container was returned to its hiding place. In all the excitement of finding this first cache and looking at all the treasures contained therein, Bob forgot to sign the log book.

The next two cache sites Bob wanted to find were in London. Although he chose to "navigate," he failed to instruct the driver/reporter to take his preferred interstate exit (despite having the miraculous GPS he still believes exit 61 is closer to anywhere on I-75 no matter where he is in the county or whether he is going north or south). This led to a discussion, which in turn led to the toddler singing loudly, which ended the discussion.

When we arrived in London, Bob decided to eat at the King Buffet Chinese Restaurant. Although it occurred this

reporter that this step did not fit in with Bob's stated weight loss goals or the idea of getting out and moving around, and it occurred to this reporter that London sites were chosen because of their proximity to this restaurant, these issues not mentioned for fear of starting another discussion and more loud toddler singing. At least one of our fortune cookies promised "You won't be bored for long! New adventures are on their way."

After lunch the GPS led us to downtown London. This site was described as a "cache and dash" (meaning easy to find, no hiking required) on the website, and was supposedly located near a downtown restaurant. Cooks and flower store employees watched Bob pace around outside their windows, suspiciously searching and alternately looking down at the GPS hanging around his neck. After a while he said he wanted had waited to eat at this restaurant because the food smelled so good. "I could eat again, really," but this reporter looked at him in such a way that idea was abandoned. After about thirty minutes of searching, he gave up on finding cache number two.

The GPS directed us to a spot one-quarter mile from London's Main Street for the third and final search. "Can't I have just a little bit of fun?" said the toddler as she looked longingly at a playground we drove past. Luckily for her, the third cache was in or around the playground. We passed it because we were discussing where to park. Bob searched while I took pictures of the toddler on the playground equipment. He commented, "I should have printed off the

coordinates of these places on the website" as he scanned a rock covered embankment for the third time.

After an hour of looking for the third cache, he gave up, and I drove him home. There he logged onto the computer and learned that the two sites in London were "micro" caches, not recommended for first time geocache hunters. "Micro" means the containers are the size of 35mm film canisters; Bob was looking for shoe-box-size tupperware.

The web comments by other geocachers about the ease in which they found the two London sites were disheartening. Other geocachers proclaimed the London sites were "easy to find" and "found it right away." There were no more hints about where these film canisters were located.

Bob must not have been too disheartened because he is now prepared to hike (yes, hike) to the next location, described on the website as "up a hillier" in Pulaski County. The computer promises this one is not a micro cache. He also purchased another gadget (a \$20 walking stick - "look, it has a compass on top!" he exclaimed) for this purpose.

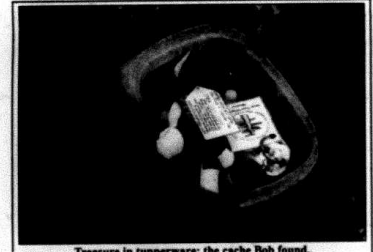
Was Bob disappointed that he found only one of the three caches? Not really. "At least I didn't sit around watching television all day," he responded. But the two year old captured the true spirit of this modern day treasure hunt when she hugged me and said "mommy, let's go on another adventure."

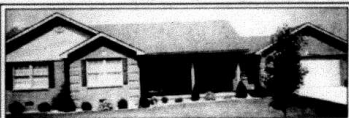

  6. In the event that the plaintiff is the successful bidder and the sale price does not exceed the amount of the plaintiff's judgment, no deposit or bond shall be required.

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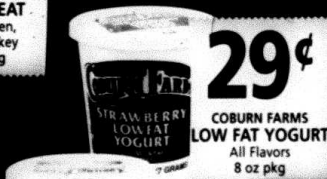
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
