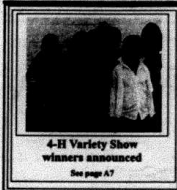

## In Mt. Vernon and Livingston PRIDE time begins Saturday

"A volunteer will be sitting in a Director's Chair after this weekend," Mayor Clarence Kirby said "since one will be given away after each clean-up event."

The schedule for cleaning up in the Livingston area is as follows:

April 9th, Piney Branch, beginning at 10 a.m.; Monday, April 11th and Tuesday, April 12th, South 25, beginning at 5 p.m. on the 11th and 4 p.m. on the 12th; April 13, Hwy. 490, 4 p.m.; April 16th, Sand Hill, beginning at 10 a.m.; April 18, Hwy. 490, 4 p.m.; April 19th and 20th, 1955, 4 p.m. and April 23, North 25, at 10 a.m.

Volunteers are also being recruited to clean within the city limits of Livingston every day.

## Rockcastle UNITE Coalition will sponsor "Neighbors United training"

The Rockcastle UNITE Coalition's Neighborhood Watch Committee has scheduled a "Neighbors UNITED" training for Rockcastle County residents, businesses and schools. It will be held Tuesday, April 12, at 7 p.m. at the Rockcastle County High School auditorium.

The training will be conducted by retired Kentucky State Police Captain, Paul Hayes, and other Operation UNITE law enforcement officials. Captain Hayes will also be sharing information and videos regarding the effects of meth on communities.

Besides residents and citizens of Rockcastle County, all county fire department, local police agencies and school bus drivers are encouraged to attend.

"Neighbors UNITED" is based on the "Neighborhood Watch" program. However, it is more than trying to catch your neighbor doing something illegal. It is based on the philosophy that individuals know the area they live in best. The program helps organize small areas, subdivisions, housing complexes, apartments, businesses, churches, schools, etc. and facilitates "neighbor to neighbor" communication. Structured watch groups serve to look out for each other's families and property, alerting law enforcement to any suspicious activities or crimes in progress, and work together to make their community a safer and better place to live.

It is a return to the days of neighbors helping neighbors.

"Neighbors UNITED" wants neighborhoods to be SECURE: Safe Educated Communities United Residents Residents Everywhere. The 3 Cs of "Neighbors UNITED" are: Care, Concern and Commitment. ## Cash gets prestigious Gatorade Player of the Year Award

A special recognition will be held Thursday, April 14 at 2:15 p.m. at Rockcastle County High School to announce the selection of Aaron Cash as the 2005 Gatorade Basketball Player of the Year for Kentucky.

The award honors America's elite high school athletes in 50 states and the District of Columbia. It is based on athletic ability, academics and character and is given to one boy and one girl in each state in basketball, volleyball, baseball, football, softball and track and field.

The selection process is administered by *Scholastic's Coach & Athlete Director Magazine*, which works with sport-specific experts and a media-advisory board of top sports writers to determine the state winners in each sport.

Past winners of the award include Peyton Manning, Marion Jones and, another "A-Rod," Alex Rodriguez.

From the pool of state winners in each sport, one winner will be named "Gatorade National Player of the Year." Aaron, the first student from Rockcastle County to receive this prestigious award in any sport, is also a candidate for Kentucky's Mr. Basketball. 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## Wagers pleads guilty

Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth's Attorney for Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski Counties, announced today that a London woman pled guilty to charges of Trafficking in Controlled Substances, First Degree, First Offense.

According to Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy A. Bartley, Melissa Wagers, age 38, of London pled guilty in Rockcastle Circuit Court on March 30, 2005. Judge Jeffrey T. Burdette, Circuit Judge residing over Rockcastle Division II, accepted the plea. The Commonwealth recommended a seven-year sentence of imprisonment for Wagers whose final sentencing will be sometime this month.

The charge arose from an investigation conducted by Detective Matt Bryant of the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department, along with Barry Adams, DEA Task Force Officer and Sheriff's Department deputies. Officers Adams and Bryant received information that Wagers was trafficking in methamphetamines. On January 2, 2004, acting on this information, the officers set up a controlled buy at a location in Rockcastle

County. The entire buy was captured on videotape. An arrest was made at the scene and several baggies of methamphetamines were seized. "This plea was made possible because of the airtight investigation conducted by Officers Bryant and Adams. Once again, these officers have demonstrated their dedication to eradicating drugs in the county," Bartley said. "I appreciate their efforts."

Montgomery added that he was extremely pleased with the work done by Sheriff Darrell Doan's office. Pointing to the seven year sentence for the first time drug trafficker, Montgomery added, "I think it sends a message that we are taking a hard line on those trafficking in drugs, particularly methamphetamines."

## Federal tobacco buyout payments begin in June

The first payments in the \$10.1 billion tobacco buyout passed by Congress last year will be made between June and September, starting annual payments that will end the program that controlled American-grown leaf for decades.

The Agriculture Department published the second of two regulations yesterday that will dictate how the buyout occurs. The regulation spells out formulas that will determine how much growers of each class of tobacco will be paid, and when the payments will occur.

Agriculture officials began registering quota holders and producers last month at local farm offices. Registration for the voluntary buyout will continue through June 17.

Last year, Congress passed legislation ending the Depression-era program that set price and production

controls on U.S. tobacco. The government agreed to pay quota holders over a 10-year period to compensate for losses incurred as the control system

The government will collect about

\$10.1 billion, primarily from annual assessments on tobacco manufacturers and importers. About \$9.6 billion will go to quota holders and producers, while the rest will pay off outstanding expenses, including loans taken out to buy quota tobacco in the past.

Beginning next year, the government will make annual payments every January. Quota holders will receive \$7 per pound of tobacco marketed under the quota in 2002.

Producers -- including landlords, tenants and sharecroppers -- will receive \$3 a pound, based on their share of the risk in the 2002, 2003 and 2004 crops of quota tobacco.

## Rockcastle native to make feature film in county

While loosely based on people and events from the area in which she grew up, Scarborough maintains the story is strictly a fictional one. *Nothing But Time* is a portrait of a life punctuated with struggles of identity, family, religion, responsibility and

love, Scarborough said.

Casting is ongoing, but currently, Scarborough will play Mary Jane, and several Los Angeles actors will portray various characters. More casting will occur locally in Lead (Johnny) will soon go out to actor Barry Pepper. Additionally the role of Brother Parks will be offered to actor Lance Henriksen.

A Somerset man has been named the new assistant County Attorney by County Attorney Billy Reynolds.

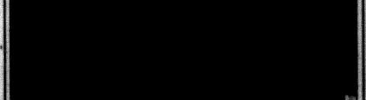
John Gillum, 29, a partner with the firm of Gillum & Gillum, was sworn in Monday by Circuit Judge Jeffrey Burdette.

### Pitch in during PRIDE Spring Cleanup

Spring in southern and eastern Kentucky means blooming flowers and red hot trees. The only way to make Spring prettier in our region is to clean the trash out of the scenery. To do just that, I invite Rockcastle County residents to pitch in during the PRIDE Spring Cleanup, April 9-23.

Your local PRIDE Coordinators have organized cleanup events for volunteers, as well as opportunities to dispose of the bulky trash you collected over the winter. PRIDE will provide the cleanup supplies and T-shirts for volunteers. It is up to you, Rockcastle County residents to provide the manpower to clean roadsides, hillslides, and waterways.

Volunteers can make a difference by joining Rockcastle County's Spring Cleanup team. Since PRIDE began in 1997, just look at what Rockcastle Countians have accomplished together: 1,176 volunteers worked 4,583 hours, 69 appliances collected, 2,652 tires collected, 4,119 bags of trash and 2,973 tons of trash collected.

Clearly, Rockcastle County is cleaner today, thanks to the people who have pitched in with PRIDE — Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment. ### Skin Changes in Pregnancy

A woman's skin may undergo some remarkable changes during pregnancy. The hormones of pregnancy will cause some women to develop a darkening of the skin of the forehead, cheeks, upper lip and chin. This is called chloasma or the "mask of pregnancy."

This increased pigmentation, varying from light brown to quite dark brown, occurs in women who have a genetic predisposition for it. The coloration usually begins in the middle of the pregnancy and becomes most prominent towards the end of the pregnancy.

It will gradually fade after delivery, but usually recurs with subsequent pregnancies. These pigmentation changes can also occur in women taking birth control pills. Treatment includes avoiding the sun and using sun screens. Bleaching lotions may help reduce the pigmentation.

A couple other changes most women will develop are red palms and spider angiomas which are tiny arteries that come to the skin surface and spread out causing a red spot that fades at the periphery. These are caused by the increased hormones and usually improve after the delivery.

Stretch marks are an unwanted problem of pregnancy—they do not disappear like most other changes. Limiting weight gain will help, but there is little that can be done to prevent or cure the changes. A rare skin disorder of pregnancy is called herpes gestationis, although it is not caused by a herpes infection. This results in blisters and intense itching and usually requires steroids and antihistamines.

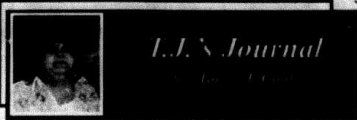

FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgment and knowledge and knowledge to make decisions.

**Urgent: Tobacco Transition Payment Program**  
All aspects of the Federal tobacco marketing quota and price support loan programs are ending. Beginning

with the 2005 tobacco crop this means, there are no planting restrictions, no marketing cards and no price support loans. Signing up for the Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP), commonly referred to as the "Tobacco Buyout" is the final and only opportunity to receive Federal payments related to tobacco production.

The Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP) provides payments to tobacco quota holders and tobacco producers in annual installments beginning in 2005 and ending in 2014.

Payments shall be made by way of direct deposit or check if the individual does not have a financial institution.

The FSA office will not make a lump-sum payment to an individual tobacco quota holder or producer, but a private party may. If a private party enters into an agreement where an individual is to receive a lump-sum payment the individual may sign the Successor-in-interest contracts beginning with the FY2006 payment.

Assignment and Successor-in-interest forms will be available from the local FSA office at the appropriate time.

CED, Warden Alexander, has sug-

gested the following schedule according to your last name be applied for Rockcastle County FSA when signing up for TTPP, however, the schedule is not mandatory.

A-G March 21-April 15  
H-R April 18-May 13th  
S-Z May 16-June 10th  
Remember: Those individuals who have not previously completed the SF-1199, Direct Deposit, form will need to bring a voided check to the office at the time for signing up for TTPP.

**Sales and Land Purchases**  
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership.

Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

REMEMBER: FSA's records are only as current as producers provide.

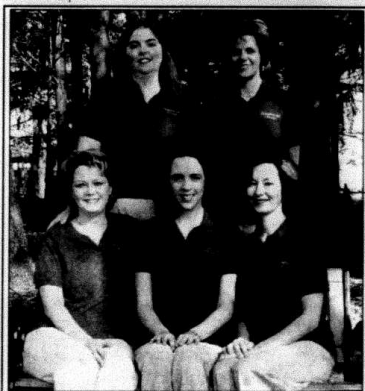

Vernon, Kentucky, is one of 91 adult education programs who met or exceeded their enrollment and performance goals in fiscal year 2004. As a result, these programs' counties will share nearly \$1 million in incentive funds. Forty of these counties, including Rockcastle, have earned incentive funding each of the four years it has been available.

The CAP Adult Learning Center provides invaluable training, skills and confidence to hundreds of local citizens with a desire to better themselves and improve their lives. As a result, Rockcastle County will be presented with an additional \$4,242 in funding, an amount that is projected to increase in the future as new students are referred to the program. "Meeting our enrollment goal means more to the staff than just receiving additional funds," states Bobbie Playforth, Director of the Adult Learning Center. "It is very rewarding to have helped 532 individuals in our community get a second chance at achieving their goals."

A record number of Kentuckians enrolled in adult education programs in fiscal year 2004 to earn a GED, upgrade basic academic or workforce skills, improve their English or learn as a family. The 120,051 enrollments surpassed the goal by 20 percent, according to officials from Kentucky Adult Education and the Council on Postsecondary Education.

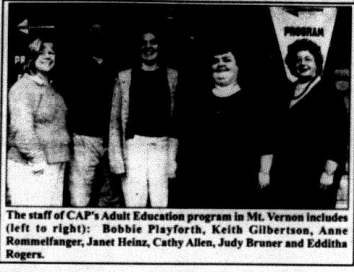
"Kentucky has made a significant investment in adult education, which

has led to a 135 percent increase in enrollment since 2000," said Cheryl King, vice-president for adult education. "But the most important return on this investment is educated Kentuckians who are more self-sufficient, more involved in their communities, more engaged as citizens, better role models for their children and better employees."

Significant enrollment totals were posted in workforce education and family literacy. Workforce education programs enrolled 51,388 employees and served more than 900 employers. Family literacy, in which parents and their children learn together, climbed to 4,397 enrollments. More than 11,000 students took advantage of online courses through www.kyvae.org.

Council President Tom Layzell praised the county programs for what he called remarkable success. "This is a significant achievement for our state and a remarkable success for the county providers who endeavor everyday to meet the needs of their communities," he said.

## Yards to Paradise

Coloring a Gray and White World

Your landscape may be gray and white and depressing now. (Or you may have a sparkling and lively yard -- but that would be the exceptional one.) Let's use this time we are spending staring out the window wishing for spring to dream up ways of satisfying that hunger for some color.

Skies are gray, trees are gray, grass is brown (unless white with snow). Perhaps your mood is colored blue. Even the copious red berries, born in abundance on dogwood trees last summer, have long since become a bird's lunch.

Unless you planned ahead and included items for winter color, or you are the benefactor or the genius of a former owner of your home, you're probably inside looking out and asking "how long before spring" with colorful blossoms and green leaves which will replace the current "black and white" world you see.

Let us use these cold gray days to plan on seeing not only the colors of springtime but also plan ways of adding color and interest to your yard before next winter.

Start with structure. Arbors, gazebos, waterfalls, stone walls, patios, paths, wishing wells, perhaps wild-life feeders. How about garden ornaments? Maybe some colored bulbs or lens for the outdoor lights? The easiest way to add color to the wintertime landscape is to add greenery. Here we're talking about planting evergreen trees, shrubs, ground covers, not seasonal decorations. But, first, let's talk about plants with colorful twigs, trees with colorful bark, shrubby that has berries of red or some bright color, and some plants which retain their leaves but whose colors change in cold weather.

Twigs may generally be described

as tiny branchlets at the end of limbs. It's usually the one-year-old growth that is colorful and so attractive in winter when the leaves are gone. Pretty colorful twigs may be found on willows; yellows, reds, purples. On dogwoods; reds and yellows.

Blueberries, itea (sweetspire), colecho and nandina domestica are more great plants which show off red twigs in winter.

Trunks of some shrubs and trees are especially attractive. During the wintertime is when they exhibit these traits most noticeably. Exfoliating bark can be found on sycamore trees, paperbark maples, parrotia, stewartia, crepe myrtles, birch trees and the seven sons tree. Mottled trunks of moosewood maples and smooth-trunks of service berries may catch the eyes in winter too. Black-trunked northern sugar maples also may stand out nicely on a snowy day.

Hollies of many kinds (so long as they are females and a boy is in the neighborhood) will bear lots of berries that will be most noticeable against white snow in the background.

Firethorn, sea buckthorn, barberries, hawthorns all have nice showy fruit. Nandina, chokeberries, some cranberries retain colorful fruits snow of the winter (unless eaten by wildlife).

Carolina silverbells, Kentucky coffee trees and snowbells retain attractive seeds. White fringe trees have clusters of blue-fruits as does the blue bean shrub. Mountain ash has nice orange berries. I recommend European, Korean and whitebeam mountain ash over the native ones except in the Appalachian and Blue

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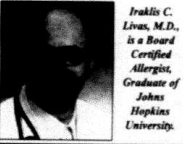

### Independent Auditor's Report

We were engaged to audit the statement of assets, liabilities, and equity arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as of June 30, 2002, and the statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in cash balances for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of Rockcastle County, Kentucky's management. During our engagement, we noted that the fiscal court had serious weaknesses in their financial reporting function. We were unable to place reliance on the public properties corporation's transactions or the general obligation bonds transactions. Their materiality, our inability to apply other auditing procedures to those accounts, and the high risk factor associated with the audits prevent us from expressing an opinion on the County's financial statements.

Because we were unable to place reliance on the public properties corporation's transactions or the general obligation bond transactions and because audit risk is at an unacceptable level, the scope of our work was not sufficient to enable us to express, and we do not express, an opinion on the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated June 25, 2004, on our consideration of Rockcastle County, Kentucky's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our work performed.

Based on the results of our work performed, we present the accompanying comments and recommendations, included herein, which discuss the following report comments:

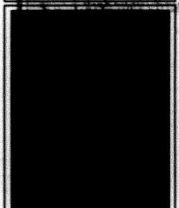

Ridge highlands. Blossoms and leaves that are colorful in winter may be found on lorapetalum. Witch hazels bloom November through February. In the upper south evergreen camellias bloom in winter. An evergreen perennial that blooms in the snow is the hellebore (Lenten rose). Heathers bloom in the snow. And the evergreen leaves of some azaleas and rhododendrons turn shades of orange, red, purple and almost black during winter.

Yucca, cactus, pampas and many other clumping grasses make charming winter displays.

OK-evergreens! Hemlock trees, spruce trees, fir trees in colder regions, deodar cedar and cryptomerias in warmer areas, cedars, false cypress and yews. Southern magnolias, hollies, English and Japanese laurels. Euonymus. Some viburnums. Indian hawthorns and cleyerias.

How about rhododendrons, azaleas, mountain laurel, pieris, leucothe, daphne? Or groundcovers like ivy, wintercreeper, pachysandra and mondo grass? Perhaps some bamboo would be neat.

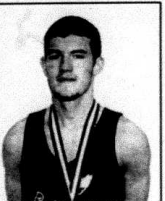
**Break four meet records**

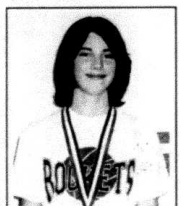

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# RCHS Drug Forum questions and answers

At a recent school/community drug forum held at the Rockcastle County High School a panel composed of representatives including police officers, judges, doctors, attorneys, counselors and county officials answered twelve questions generated by students of an RCHS Practical Living Classes which are taught by Darlene Martin and Carla Parsons.

The following answers are not direct quotes from any professional, merely notes from the overall discussion.

1 What is substance abuse? Substance abuse is the use of any substance for a reason other than what it was intended or use of a prescription medication by an individual other than who it is prescribed for. Substance abuse is the use of any substance until it causes physical, mental, or emotional damage—either temporary or permanent.

2 How can you help someone who is addicted to drugs? Gather as much information as possible from reliable sources. Become knowledgeable about the signs of substance abuse, addiction and help that is available. Communicate this information to your family and friends. Know where one can get help and encourage them to seek the help that is available. Be supportive of the process but don't provide excuses. Seek help yourself in order to deal with the pain of seeing someone you know struggling with addiction. Because the mind and the body of the addict is controlled by the substance, the addict may not be capable of taking an active role in obtaining help. Therefore, family, friends, and concerned professionals may need to forcefully intercede to provide help with or without the addict's cooperation. Intervention can be a turning point toward recovery. Many times, families are reluctant to help a family member get help they need because of fear of jail time. There are many agencies available to help with recovery.

Law enforcement agencies can help begin that process by getting the individual into a program that can help them.

3 What happens during a overdose? Overdose happens when the body is overloaded with a chemical. Vital functions and body organs begin to rewire with seizures, loss of consciousness, vomiting, impaired breathing and heart function, uncontrolled temperature, etc. It is very similar to an electrical overload. Something has to give. That can be permanent damage to vital organs, the brain and nervous system or death. A person suspected of having a drug overdose should be rushed to a hospital where medical attention is their only chance of survival.

4 What are some of the immediate effects of drug abuse? Long-term effects? Immediate effects may range from impaired judgment and behavioral choices or risk-taking behavior to the loss of consciousness and the possibility of long-term addiction. The long-term result of substance abuse not only affects the individual who is abusing a drug but also the family and friends who care for them. Husbands, wives, son, daughters, mothers, fathers and friends suffer from the result of an addiction. A part of the brain that registers caring and concern for the welfare of others is altered with drug abuse. The natural love and concern an individual has for their children and families is replaced with love for the drug. Families are destroyed, jobs are lost and the financial and personal loss may last a lifetime. Also the first high an individual gets from a drug can create a desire to repeat that experience. The individual is drawn back to the drug, a different drug, a stronger concentration of the drug, or a combination of drugs, anything just to have the experience again, which can never happen. A craving develops

that will take great effort to control for a lifetime.

5 Why is it legal to use marijuana in some states and against the law in other states? The general public often thinks marijuana to be a mild, non-addictive substance. Several states have passed laws that allow the use of marijuana for medical purposes to be used in a controlled environment such as clubs. Some supporters use the medical issue to challenge the drug laws of the United States to legalize marijuana for personal gain.

6 What is K.A.S.P.E.R.? Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting system is an electronic or computer system that connects pharmacy data systems. When a person has a prescription filled, it is recorded in a data system and an alert is made if a prescription is filled too many times or at different pharmacies. The use of this system began in Kentucky in 2000 and has served as an example for surrounding states that have developed similar tracking systems. The intent of KASPER is to track and stop the abuse of prescription drugs in Kentucky. The abuse of prescription drugs is one of the most serious and widespread of drug offenses. It is estimated one-third of drug abuse problems in the U.S. can be linked to drugs regulated by prescription.

7 Are drug users more likely to become a criminal? Why? Drug use and crime go hand-in-hand. Drug use costs money. As the need increases, the need for money to buy the drug increases. This leads to criminal activity. Recovering drug

users will say, "I did not care what I had to do to get the drugs I needed. I would steal from my mother. I would break and enter or whatever it took to get money for my drugs. I didn't care what it was." Statistics indicate 75-85% of individuals incarcerated were convicted of crimes that related in some way to alcohol and drugs.

8 Why do some people get addicted when they experiment with drugs and others don't? There are some characteristics that make some individuals more susceptible to addiction. Risk factors for substance abuse are:

- A family history of substance abuse
- Behavior disorders
- Poor self-esteem/low self-respect
- Lack of opportunities/poor academic performance
- Lack of positive role models/socializing mostly with friends who are substance abusers

9 How does addiction affect a person's family? The drug controls the individual's life. Nothing or nobody matters. The family must deal with a member who is not contributing to the well-being of the family. More than 70% of reported cases of personal violence involve alcohol and/or drug abuse. Jobs are lost because of loss of production time, damage to equipment and risk of injury on the job. Family income and resources may be drained in order to pay for drugs. Emotional pain from seeing a family member self-destruct can be unbearable. Increased medical needs/costs result from the cumulative effects of drugs.

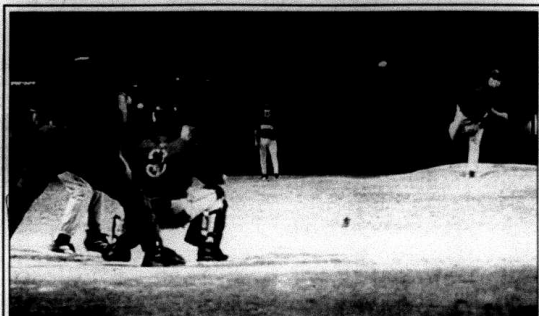

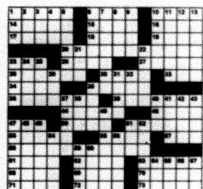

## For Lower Kentucky Watershed Sign-up begins for CSP

On March 17, 2005, Agriculture Secretary Mike Johann announced the sign-up period for fiscal year 2005 Conservation Security Program (CSP) participation. From March 28, 2005 to May 27, 2005, USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will accept applications at the local service centers within the Lower Kentucky Watershed.

Prior to applying, landusers must complete a self-assessment workbook -- available on the web at <http://csp.sc.egov.usda.gov> or at your local NRCS office -- to determine their operation's eligibility requirements and qualifications. This process is completed using a self-screening questionnaire.

The Lower Kentucky Watershed encompasses over 3,000 square miles and includes more than 10,000 farms. All, or portions of the following counties, are within the watershed: Anderson, Boone, Boyle, Carroll, Casey, Clark, Fayette, Franklin, Gallatin, Garrard, Grant, Henry, Jessamine, Kenton, Lincoln, Madison, Mercer, Owen, Rockcastle, Scott, Shelby, Trimble and Woodford. For exact boundaries, please contact the local NRCS office in the above-mentioned counties.

CSP is authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (2002 Farm Bill) and is a resource-based enhancement program. Producers are eligible to enroll all types of agricultural operations. At a minimum, specific soil quality and water quality criteria must be met on at least part of an operation to be eligible for CSP. Although landusers offer entire operations, it may be determined that not all fields on the operation are eligible for the program. In these cases, landusers may be eligible for a CSP contraction part of their operation. Only one application per sign-up is allowed and a landuser may have only one contract

at any one time.

David G. Sawyer, State Conservationist said, "This year, the Lower Kentucky Watershed area landusers and producers will have the opportunity to experience the Conservation Security Program. This program offers conservation enhancement payments and incentives to those who meet the highest standards of resource conservation."

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# Using Urea Nitrogen as a fertilizer in Ky.

Agriculture and Natural Resources

Solid granular or prilled Urea (46%N) has become the dominant nitrogen fertilizer in Kentucky. Even bagged or blended fertilizer, such as 19-19 and 20-20 are mixed with Nitrogen as the Urea form. When applied to a field, Urea is transformed to ammonium N soon after application. The rate of transformation is greatly increased by urease, the enzyme found to varying degrees in soil and on plants and plant residues. Due to the chemical reactions involved as urea nitrogen undergoes transformation, there is some degree of volatilization for volatilization loss of some N. Whether such a loss will occur, and how much N is lost if it does occur, relates to temperature, moisture, degree of contact with soil and pH of the soil.

**\*Effect of Temperature**-Enzymes which convert Urea to ammonium are not very active until the weather warms, in the upper 70's. Research in Kentucky indicates that it will usually be early April before this rate of transformation will be great enough that risk of volatilization is economically important.

**\*Effect of Moisture**-there are two thoughts to keep in mind about moisture: 1) If soil plants or residue onto which Urea is applied are moist, enzymatic activity will be increased and Urea will rapidly convert to ammonium, assuming the temperature is warm enough and 2) If applied onto soil, plants or residues and enough rain occurs within 1-2 days to soak the Urea into the soil, volatilization loss will be minimal.

**\*Degree of Contact with the Soil**-As Urea converts to ammonium, the ammonium will react strongly enough with soil to minimize volatilization. The less soil contact with Urea when the N is applied, the greater the risk for volatilization loss of N. When surface applied to bare soil and there is little or no rain, the soil pH is above 6.5. When surface applied to no-till corn, the risk can vary from great where there are enough residues to prevent much soil contact, to slight where residues are thin enough that most of the N contacts the soil. When top-dressed onto grass sod where there is little initial contact with soil, risk is great after mid-spring.

**\*Effect of Soil pH**-This has little effect on N loss except where Urea is spread onto bare soil and not

worked in. Under such conditions, risk of volatilization can be great if surface pH of soil is above 6.5. If using starter fertilizers which have been blended using Urea, do not place the fertilizer in contact with seed since concentration of ammonia remaining from urea breakdown can be toxic to germinating seed. Solid Urea (46% N) contains 920 pounds of actual N per ton of material; ammonium nitrate (33.5%) contains 667 pounds actual N per ton of material. Carefully consider the price per pound of actual N when deciding which source of N is best for you.

Keep in mind that Urea is the best buy at this time. Currently Urea is 20% cheaper per pound of N than ammonium. Also keep in mind that most fertilizer, like 19-19-19, is mixed with Urea as Nitrogen source.
