Last year, Congress passed legiston ending the Depression-era pro-gram that set price and production

ntrols on U.S. tobacco. The gov-ament agreed to pay quota holders er a 10-year period to compensate losses incurred as the control sys-

Beginning next year, the government will make annual payments every January.

Quota holders will receive \$7 per pound of tobacco marketed under the quota in 2002.
