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## In Cumberland River Wildie man's body found Tuesday

A Wildie man's body was found Tuesday in the Cumberland River, after he apparently drowned in a boating accident eight days earlier.

Lowell McDowell, 54, was salvaging a boat from the river Monday evening and was last heard from around 6 p.m. Monday April 4th by his wife, Joy Durdette McDowell. Mrs. McDowell said her husband was talking to her on a cell phone when she lost contact with him.

Rescue workers found McDowell's truck off the side of the road and the boat he was trying to salvage was found wedged in a low water dam on the river, but it was fisherman who found McDowell's body Tuesday morning.

Mrs. McDowell said rescue workers had searched for her husband's body every day since the accident.

His body was found about a half mile below the dam. The body was sent to Frankfort for an autopsy and officials said dental records would be used to confirm identification of McDowell's body.

McDowell was a contract mail carrier for the U.S. Postal Service. McDowell's body will be at Bowling Funeral Home in London, where arrangements are incomplete.

## Complaint against another One arrested for criminal littering

A Buffalo man will appear in Rockcastle District Court Monday to face a charge of criminal littering.

## Some instructional assistants at MVES will lose their jobs

Several Mt. Vernon Elementary School instructional assistants attended the Rockcastle County Board of Education on Tuesday night, held at Roundstone Elementary, to inquire about the possible loss of instructional assistant jobs at the school next year.

The instructional assistants, who are paid through the federal Title I program which is a federal grant program designed to help elementary students in remediation, would be the only people affected.

Title I funding has not been increased for several years and, because of salary increases which are "banded out across the board to all

school employees each year, there has become a significant shortfall in funds.

Currently 96% of the \$921,000 is consumed by salaries and related costs, such as health insurance, according to local school system finance officer Richard Bry.

There are also many certified employees paid through the program and, without the non-renewal of contracts for seven instructional assistants this year, the Title I program would have a deficit of \$110,000.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond told the group that the local administration had known for years that the upcoming action was inevitable, but the sys-

tem had managed to not lay-off anyone by better managing the money received and keeping a very close eye on the situation. Title I funding has

## UNITE spearheads effort 16 sought in drug bust Wednesday

Police began rounding up sixteen Rockcastle Countians early Wednesday morning after indictments, handed down by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury, were unsealed.

Two teams of seven officers from the local Sheriff's department, Kentucky State Police and Drug Task Force Agents with the Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment and Education Task Force (UNITE), began rounding up suspected drug dealers around 8 a.m.

UNITE spearheaded the operation, which was based at the Rockcastle County courthouse.

A total of 16 indictments were unsealed and, as of 9:30 a.m., ten

people had been arrested. The first arrested was Terry Fultz, 53, of Rose Hill Road. Fultz was charged with two counts of 1st degree trafficking in a controlled substance.

Junior Renner, 44, of Castle Village Apartments, Brodhead, was arrested and charged with one count of trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree and Fiona Marcum, 40, also of Castle Village Apartments, was charged with trafficking in marijuana under eight ounces. Marcum told police she was afraid she would lose her children because of her arrest.

## State now buying right-of-way for new Highway 150

The Kentucky Department of Highways has begun purchasing right-of-way for the construction of the new Hwy. 150 between Brodhead and Crab Orchard, according to Stephanie Daffron, Public Information Director with the Department of Highways in Somerset.

Joe Cox, project engineer and on Tuesday that he hoped all needed property for the first segment would

be bought by the end of the year. "The 2005-06 fiscal year begins July 1st and, once we have the property, we can begin to let bids," Cox said. "Once we award the contracts, a completion date for the project will be set," he said.

The estimated cost of the construction on the 7.2 miles of new highways is \$23.5 million.

## Six from county sentenced on UNITE drug charges

Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski counties, announced recently that six defendants were sentenced to imprisonment, resulting from drug charges brought by UNITE during Judge Jeffrey I. Burdette's Criminal Motion Hour on April 8, 2005 in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

According to UNITE Prosecutor David L. Daltow, Thomas Jeffrey Renner, 37, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to eight years imprisonment

for multiple counts of Trafficking in a Controlled Substance and for being a persistent felony offender. UNITE operatives purchased hydrocodone from Renner in July, 2004. In addition, Renner was arrested in November, 2004, with hydrocodone and xanax on his person. Renner, who was also revoked on a probation sentence from a 2002 felony charge, has a total sentence of 10 years imprisonment.



"Two ships that pass in the night." It's an old cliché that has long been associated with two people who have a chance encounter and perhaps fall in love, or at least develop a good, long-time friendship.

Have you ever met someone under such circumstances? Could it be our spouse? Could it be a best friend? Could it be someone who has changed your life? If either party had done something differently that day, would you have ever met? Was it destiny? Was it fate? Was it arranged by and "unseen hand"? Who will ever know, at least in this life-time?

I know that in the case of Stanley and I, it was such an encounter. We had known each other for at least twenty years, but by chance we met again after not seeing each other for several years. What would have happened if one or the other of us had been tied up in traffic a few minutes, gotten involved in conversation with someone else, or otherwise been sidetracked? We would have probably never gotten reacquainted, and would have traveled down life's path alone. I once heard a philosopher say that every individual we meet has an impact on our lives, either for the

good or for the bad. If that be the case, I guess it would be wise to put ourselves in a potential situation to meet a more desirable element of an individual. I think our mothers called it "not hanging with the wrong crowd".

I know that in my case, I have met several individuals who have had a positive influence on my life, and a few who have not, unfortunately. We just have to sort out the "calls" and go on about life. It gets easier with age and experience. Kids, that's precisely why your parents are so intent, sometimes, about your not associating with a certain individual or group. They can see a particular character flaw that stands out like a pink elephant, but you're quite blind to it.

Sometimes parents fail in their obligations to their children, and lose their parenting skills, if they ever had any. Who knew that someone young would really want to spend time with us, listen to what we had to say, learn from our past experiences, want to be mentored, not think we were old fashioned, and take our advice. It just goes to show you, you never can tell what kind of impression you can make on someone when you're not even trying.

So, we've been adopted, and are now "Ma and Pa Cook". I guess you could say we are in the coal mine and diamond business. "Pa" says that he can see "diamonds in the rough".

# Points East

Sometime around the first of March I finally found some guys brave enough to take the old maple snag out of my front yard.

It stood thirty feet or so and met every definition you've ever heard of "logs".

The original intent was to rent a chain saw with a six foot bar—one that it takes two good men to use—but one that could fell the old snag down into a stump and then slice it up into table tops.

I called John Edwards and we figured right off the bat that we could do the job until we called the rental place.

They wanted \$225.00 just to rent the saw and \$75.00 (nonrefundable) for insurance in case we killed ourselves trying to use that saw. Not only that, but we were gonna have to wait a week or ten days because they were gonna have to ship the chain saw in from Oregon.

Which led us to a much more economical "Plan B".

Plan B included chainsaws with 22 inch bars. And a back hoe. The notion being that we'd saw the tree down by cutting notches in the front side as deep as they would get with the Homelites and so forth.

Then we'd cut her from the back, use the backhoe bucket to push forward and once we had a gap, stick a saw in the middle and cut out the core we couldn't reach sawing straight through.

It worked like a top and the earth shook when the old snag fell. It's now lying at the back edge of the garden. I've seen smaller gardens. The stump, still standing, is more or less oblong, but at one measurement, it is 74 inches in diameter even though the average is about 50 inches. It's like a two-tiered table top and we have discovered that it makes a perfect platform for bird feeding.

A ten pound sack of all purpose songbird feed is scarcely more than noticeable when emptied in the middle of the stump but come dawn and dusk we are out with the cameras and the Perens' Directory try-

ing to figure out who and what the newcomers are.

Jays, cardinals, nuthatches, doves, mice, at least half a dozen different kinds of sparrows, name your favorite woodpecker, and even a few finches have wintered over with us. And we've kept nest blocks attached to the perimerson tree all winter.

But now we have warblers and flycatchers that I'd never even seen close up, lighting on the stump to take breakfast and dinner. Robins, uninterested in the grain delight, poke among the grass for worms. And barn swallows by the dozens are already putting on acrobatic displays at sunset.

You really haven't lived until you

have sat on your front porch swing and had the barn swallows literally combing your hair as they weaved between the porch posts and even underneath the swing. No matter what the Navy or the Air Force may come up with, there will never be an airplane as agile as a barn swallow. I have no idea where they winter but as Loretta put it just last evening, "The Top Guns are back."

No flying insect has a chance with our barn swallows. But the nicer thing is just to know that they trust us and we trust them to fly as close as they dare.

In the meantime, it's getting late and deadline is upon me. If you are interested in watching birds, please stop by and visit. My good friend and ornithologist, Jeni Hoefield, has moved to Utah and I'm at wit's end with identifying all the migrants passing through.

All I know for sure is that they are a heartfelt pleasure and the old maple stump that used to be a nesting tree still serves a wonderful purpose. It used to be a city, but now it's the most popular rest stop on the route.

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

The estimated cost of the purchase of the property for the right-of-way is \$7.4 million. The cost of utilities relocation is estimated at \$2.2 million, bringing the total cost of the project to \$33.1 million.

Strand and Associates, a private company is in charge of purchasing the right-of-way for the state and have set up a temporary office on Main Street in Brodhead.

Cox said that no time frame has been set for purchasing right-of-way for the completion of the project from Brodhead to Hwy. 461 but if the money becomes available he would like to see the state go ahead and purchase the property. "As it stands now, final right-of-way purchases will be completed until the current project is complete, but that could change at any time," he said.

The project now underway will end on the west side of Brodhead at the George Jones property.

The final phase will take the road behind Piney Grove Cemetery and the Rockcastle County Fairgrounds, completely bypassing the city of Brodhead.

## Black Moles May be Cancer

One of the warning signs of cancer is a change in a mole. Moles that grow, bleed or change color may indicate the more serious kind of skin cancer called "black moles," or melanomas. The more common skin cancers develop as an ulcer, grow slowly and rarely spread, while these black melanomas spread very easily and are very resistant to treatment.

In women, melanomas are most commonly found on the legs and in men on the head or neck -- the areas of greatest sun exposure. Long-term sun exposure and sun burns are causative factors.

Most melanomas actually begin in normal skin with only a quarter originating in moles. Their identification can be very difficult, so almost all moles that are removed by your doctor are sent to a pathologist to check under the microscope. Usually melanomas are rather dark compared to normal moles and they usually are irregular in shape. There may be variations in color, with red and light-colored areas within the black background. They are usually painless and occur most commonly in middle-aged people.

If a person has a mole that has changed or that is suspicious in appearance, the treatment is to remove it and examine it under the microscope. Early discovery of this cancer is extremely important since it is very difficult to treat once it has spread. Also, just because a black mole has not changed for a year or two does not always mean it is benign. Melanomas may remain in an "inactive" stage for years before spreading.

There is no need to remove all moles to prevent the risk of skin cancer. Fortunately, moles rarely turn cancerous and just watching for changes, especially in the high risk areas, is usually enough.

## Children suffering from dysfunction of sensory integration

At first glance you would think they are just playing. Some children are laughing as they play on swings; others are listening to music, while another is jumping into ball pit. If you look a little closer, though, you will discover that each of these children is actually receiving therapy for a condition known as dysfunction of sensory integration.



Everyone is born with the five basic senses; taste, sight, smell, hearing, and touch. In addition, our bodies also sense movement, the pull of gravity, as well as the position of our bodies during activities or at rest. The information we gain through our senses becomes food for our brain. From this information we learn how to respond to everyday situations.

Children, however, who have sensory integration dysfunction, are not able to appropriately process information they receive through their senses. Without the ability to respond properly to their surroundings, children may learn at a slower pace, develop behavioral problems and struggle to develop relationships with other children. As a result, these children can sometimes have a low self-esteem.

There are recognizable signs that suggest a child may suffer from dysfunction of sensory integration. Signs to look for include:

- \*A child that does not roll, creep, sit or stand as children the same age do.
- \*Is irritated by the way things feel like tags in their clothes or the seam in the toe of their socks.
- \*Has an extreme tolerance for or sensitivity to pain.
- \*Seeks intensive pounding or creates into people or objects.
- \*Have coordination problems.
- \*Activity level is excessively high or low.
- \*Poor self-concept.
- \*Behavioral problems.

If you notice that your child exhibits a number of these characteristics, the occupational therapy staff at Rockcastle Hospital can evaluate your child in the pediatric outpatient department. Recommendations for speech and physical therapy can also be made.

Many times when a child comes for therapy it looks like they are playing. In real life, children naturally develop their motor skills, their perception and their ability to respond to sensation to allow them to play appropriately. The idea is to guide children through challenging tasks, in a safe environment, that will foster more successful sensory responses. Our goal is to help a child learn to adapt to their environment so they can become independent and successful at school, home and at play.

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

Ronnie Miller, 39, of Broadhead was charged with second degree trafficking in a controlled substance.

Jerry Muncy, 49, of McFerron Street, Mt. Vernon was also arrested on four different charges.

Muncy was charged with two counts of trafficking in a controlled substance, second degree, trafficking in a controlled substance, 1000 yards from a school and possession of marijuana.

Also arrested was Carolyn Miller, 56, of Broadhead. She was charged with second degree trafficking in a controlled substance.

Two local men already in the Rockcastle County Detention Center were also charged in the UNITE bust.

John Matthew Harding, 21, of Mt. Vernon was sentenced to five years imprisonment on two counts of Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, first degree. According to Dalton, UNITE detectives purchased cocaine from Harding on two occasions -- once at a residence on Hwy. 2108 and another at Apollo Pizza -- both occurring in August, 2004. Judge Burdette denied a defense motion for probation.

Michael Bullock, 32, of Mt. Vernon was sentenced to five years imprisonment for Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, first degree, first offense and Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, third degree, first offense. According to Dalton, UNITE operatives purchased oxycotin and xanax from Bullock in the parking lot of Castle Village Apartments in Broadhead in August, 2004.

Danny Hicks, 33, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to five years imprisonment for Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, first degree, first offense. According to Dalton, in August, 2004, Hicks sold methamphetamine to UNITE operatives also the parking lot of Castle Village Apartments.

Robin Hibbard, 38, of Broadhead, was sentenced to two years imprisonment for two counts of Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, second degree, first offense. According to Dalton, Hibbard sold hydrocodone to UNITE operatives on two occasions in August 2004. Judge Burdette denied a defense motion for probation and remanded Hibbard to jail.

Kathy Stamper, 38, of Broadhead was sentenced to two years imprisonment for multiple counts of Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, second degree, first offense. According to Dalton, Stamper sold hydrocodone to UNITE operatives in July and August 2004. In addition, Stamper was caught with hydrocodone and alprazolam during a raid in August 2004. Judge Burdette denied a defense motion for probation.

In addition to those six sentencing hearings, three other UNITE cases drew closer to conclusion. Bellmita Singleton Carpenter, 31, of Mt. Vernon, pled guilty to three

counts of Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, second degree. According to Dalton, Carpenter is alleged to have sold hydrocodone to UNITE operatives from her residence in Rockcastle Villa Apartments. A three year sentence of imprisonment is expected.

Lewis Cotton, 26, of Mt. Vernon pled guilty to Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, second degree. According to Dalton, Cotton allegedly sold a 40 mg Oxycotin pill to UNITE operatives in July, 2004. A sentence of two years imprisonment is expected.

Betty Newcomb, 48, of Broadhead pled guilty to Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, second degree. Dalton said that in July of 2004, Newcomb allegedly sold hydrocodone to UNITE operatives from her residence in Castle Village apartments. A sentence of one year imprisonment is expected.

Final sentencing was set for May 13, 2005 in all three cases.

Glenna Mink, of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon, will also appear in court on July 13th to answer a criminal summons for the same charge as Smith. Renner, who also filed the complaint against Mink said she had begun to clean up her property on U.S. 25, just south of Burr.

The nuisance and criminal littering ordinances are part of the county's Solid Waste Management Plan.

Renner said that in the last month alone he has sent out over 30 other notices and more would be forthcoming.

"We mean business," said Renner's boss, Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotta. "I am in favor of a county-wide mandatory garbage pick-up ordinance, but I have found little support from the magistrates," he said on Tuesday.





simply been flat for years," he said. "We do not want to see anyone lose their job and we are still working on making the number as small as possible," Hammond told the group.

Hammond also said that anyone with five years on the job would not be affected and those who were would be eligible to draw unemployment. Hammond and Bray both told the group that the burden of who would be laid off would fall on the shoulders of principal Leon Davidson and that anyone with four years of experience, or less, could be affected.

Roundstone and Brodhead will not be affected because of retirements and attrition, Hammond said. "The number of students enrolled in a school determines the amount of money spent and the number of instructional assistants hired." Because of Mt. Vernon's high enrollment figures, they are the only elementary school affected, Hammond did say that one of the instructional assistants at Mt. Vernon would likely be transferred to the middle school because of a retirement there. Both Hammond and Bray told the group they were optimistic, but not too optimistic. Hammond told the group they would know if they had not been rehired by April 30th.

Board Chairman Terry Burton also told the group that he also hated to see anyone lose their job and that he knew the administration team at the central office would be totally fair in any decisions that had to be made.

As many as eight instructional assistants could lose their jobs, however, one, who was hired through a reading grant, was told at the time of her hiring that her job was for only one year because that was the time frame of the grant received.

The board also approved a change order for Owens Construction Company, the contractor on the new bleachers for the visiting team at the Rockcastle County Football field at

the middle school.

The new bleachers are under construction and should be completed by the beginning of football season in August. The cost of the new bleachers is \$125,000.

Board member Mike Burdette told the board that he had been approached by Mt. Vernon councilman Joe Mullins about raising private funds to put a visitors' locker room under the new bleachers and a restroom on the other end.

Burdette received no response to his comment but said he felt compelled to bring it up because Mullins lives in his district.

Finance officer Bray did tell Burdette that Porta-Pots would be used on the visitor's side.

The board also put on hold the building of a softball/baseball, batting pitching facility at RCHS.

The bids are simply too high. They are almost double what we had talked about spending - but the project is simply on hold for now," Hammond said.

Superintendent Hammond also presented his personnel action report for the last month.

Former RCHS teachers Tom Larkey and Lawrence Bullock were hired as substitute teachers and Larkey was rehired as head football coach at RCHS.

### Urgent: Tobacco Transition Payment Program

All aspects of the Federal tobacco marketing quota and price support programs are ending. Beginning with the 2005 tobacco crop this means, there are no planting restrictions, no marketing cards and no price support loans. Signing up for the Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP), commonly referred to as the "Tobacco Buyout", is the final and only opportunity to receive Federal payments related to tobacco production.

The Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP) provides payments to tobacco quota holders and tobacco producers in annual installments beginning in 2005 and ending in 2014. Payments shall be made by way of direct deposit or check if the individual does not have a financial institution.

The FSA office will not make a lump-sum payment to an individual tobacco quota holder or producer, but a private party may. If a private party enters into an agreement where an individual is to receive a lump-sum payment the individual may sign the Successor-in-interest contracts beginning with the FY2006 payment. Assignment and Successor-in-interest forms will be available from the local FSA office at the appropriate time.

Remember: Those individuals who have not previously completed the SF-1199, Direct Deposit, form will need to bring a voided check to

the office at the time for signing up for TTPP. Deadline to sign for TTPP is June 17, 2005.

**Phase II Payments**  
Governor Ernie Fletcher has advised that the promise that Kentucky farmers will receive their guaranteed 2004 Phase II payments will be honored. The Governor stated he has instructed the Finance Cabinet, the Office of the Budget Director, and the Governor's Office of Agricultural Policy to work together to get the money to the farmers as soon as possible and ahead of the June 30, 2005, deadline set by the Legislature.

**Crop Disaster Program**  
The 2003/2004/2005 Crop Disaster Program (CDP), reimburses producers for qualifying losses to agricultural commodities (other than sugar cane or cotton seed) due to damaging weather or related conditions. The damages must be in excess of 35 percent for the loss of production or 20 percent for quality losses. The program, administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA), has no set funding limitation.

CDP covers all crops as follows:  
-Insured Crops-Crops insured by either catastrophic (CAT) or buy-up coverage of 50/100 or greater crop insurance.  
-Uninsured Crops-Crops for which crop insurance was available but not purchased.  
-Noninsurable Crops-Crops for which crop insurance was not avail-

able. Producers must be in compliance with the Highly Erodible Land Conservation and Wetland conservation provisions (soil and swampland). Payments will be issued to producers for losses in excess of 35 percent:

- +65 percent of the established price for insured crops
- +65 percent of the established price for noninsurable crops and
- +60 percent of the established price for uninsured crops.

As condition of receiving benefits under CDP, any producer who fails to purchase crop insurance and/or NAP coverage, shall be required to refund the full amount of the CDP payment for the crop plus interest. Additional information is available at the local FSA office and on the FSA's Web site: www.fsa.usda.gov.

**Sales and Purchases of Land**  
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership.

Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address. REMEMBER: FSA's records are only as current as producers provide.

**Farm Loan Program**  
The FSA Farm Loan Representative with concern to FSA loans (farm, operating, youth and etc.) will be in Rockcastle County at the Rockcastle FSA office the first and third Thursdays of each month from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

**Rural Development**  
The Rural Development Representative with concern to low income housing loans will be in Rockcastle County at the Rockcastle FSA office the second Tuesday of each month from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

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## Rockcastle County kicks off PRIDE Spring Cleanup



## 155 participate in HOFNOD trainings

Three Operation UNITE-sponsored workshops to train mentees on how to implement the national Hooked On Fishing-Not On Drugs® (HOFNOD) program drew a total of 155 participants April 6-8. The sessions were conducted at Felner 4-H Camp, Buckhorn Lake State Resort Park, and Jenny Wiley State Resort Park.

Participating in the workshops were representatives from area churches, UNITE coalition members, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, school districts, the Girl Scouts of America, 4-H, civic organizations, UNITE substance abuse counselors, police agencies, Wal-Mart, and the Community Action Agency in Richmond. Approximately 45 students from anti-drug clubs at Buckhorn and Perry Central high schools also attended the Buckhorn workshop.

HOFNOD is the flagship education program of the Future Fisherman Foundation, the recruitment and education arm of the American Sportfishing Association. It is widely used in more than 30 states and territories to foster angling skills, conservation ethics and social skills.

"The Future Fisherman Foundation is pleased to be working with Operation UNITE to further the cause of drug prevention," said Laura Jerome, assistant director of the Future Fisherman Foundation and national HOFNOD coordinator.

"Operation UNITE is definitely taking the lead in utilizing Hooked On Fishing-Not On Drugs as a community-based program to help our youth make wise choices concerning their free time and their health."

"The Future Fisherman Foundation looks forward to promoting Op-

eration UNITE's effort for Kentucky's youth as a model for other communities nationwide who wish to encourage their youth to make positive life decisions," added Jerome, who flew in from Alexandria, Virginia, for the workshop in Laurel County.

"So many of our children do not have positive role models," said Karen Engle, executive director for UNITE (Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment and Education). "Hooked On Fishing-Not On Drugs is an on-going program that provides caring adults in a mentoring relationship, giving youth a fun alternative to using drugs."

HOFNOD is not a one-day fishing event, but an on-going program, noted Danielle Wells, UNITE activities coordinator. In the long term, participants learn angling skills, complete a series of environmental awareness activities, demonstrate positive life skills, and become responsible stewards of aquatic resources. Youth experience a sense of belonging, develop a sense of self-worth, learn social skills through peer relationships, and strengthen their values and ethics.

In addition to a program overview, participants were given hands-on instruction in various HOFNOD activities by Wells and Marc Johnson, Kentucky HOFNOD coordinator for the Kentucky Division of Fish and Wildlife Resources. They also learned about state regulations and were given resources to implement programs in their home counties.

Johnson said he would much rather see youth experiment with new fishing techniques or tackle than to experiment with drugs.

"Why do fishing and drug prevention go together? Addiction is a family disease. When children are around drugs they are more likely to begin using drugs," Wells said. "Fishing generates communication among friends and families and provides individuals a chance to discuss problems. Fishing provides a special bond between a parent and child, can offer personal challenge and prestige among peers, and is an inexpensive activity."
