County receives \$150,000 to clean up illegal dump at Boone Gap

U.S. Republican Representative Hal Rogers of Somerset announced last week that \$150,000 in PRIDE funding is headed to help clean up Rockcastle County. The grant was announced during a press conference at The Center for Rural Development in Somerset.

"These funds are an investment in a better quality of life for the entire community," Rogers said. "When we clean up our environment, we make our communities healthier. We make our natural resources more enjoyable for ourselves and more attractive to

tourists. Ultimately, cleaning up the environment will lead to a better future for our children. I commend the local officials who pursued this funding to improve Rockcastle County."

Rockcastle County will use a \$150,000 SuperGrant to clean up the Boone Gap illegal dump. The 50-year-old site is located on a tributary of Roundstone Creek, which flows into the Rockcastle River.

In all, 13 SuperGrants totaling \$1,523,358 were awarded last week.

The SuperGrant program removes large illegal dumps, such as the "old town dumps" that have been around for 40 or 50 years. Counties, cities and nonprofit organizations in PRIDE's 38-county service area are eligible for the grants of up to \$1 million. Since the creation of the pro-

Local man pleads guilty in 2003 bank courier robbery

Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski counties, announced this week that a Mt. Vernon man has been sentenced to six years in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

John E. Rodefer, Jr., 33, of Mt. Vernon pled guilty on November 19, 2004 to charges of Robbery, second degree.

According to Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy A. Bartley, these charges stemmed from a crime that took place March 24, 2003 when a Community Trust Bank courier was robbed.

Bartley said the courier was ap-

proached by Rodefer and shoved to the ground, causing him injury, and several bank bags were taken. However, Bartley said, these proved largely useless to those involved since the bags mainly contained negotiable items.

A full scale investigation was immediately launched by the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department and the Mt. Vernon Police Department. Indictments, including that of

One child still hospitalized Mother dead, children hurt in Friday wreck

A Mt. Vernon mother was killed and her two daughters were seriously injured in a two vehicle accident on Hwy. 461 Friday morning.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell pronounced Chrystal Lynn Smith Lamb, 23, dead at the scene of the accident. One daughter, 2-year-old Haley Madison Lamb, was flown from the scene of the accident by helicopter and her five-year-old sister, Sydney Nicole Smith, was transported to the Rockcastle Hospital and then transferred by helicopter to the University of Kentucky Medical Center, the same hospital as her sister.

Dowell said Mrs. Lamb apparently did not have a seatbelt on, but that the five-year-old was in a booster seat and the two-year-old was in a car

seat riding in the back of the car behind the driver's side. Police said the impact from the wreck threw the two-year-old into the back floorboard and knocked her unconscious.

Mrs. Lamb was thrown on top of her five-year-old. "That is probably the only thing that saved her life, because we don't think the booster seat was attached to the seatbelt," said Mt. Vernon fire and rescue Lt. Jason Hamesl.

The truck driver, Mike Roberston who was driving for Superior Battery Manufacturing Company of Russell Springs said at the scene that Mrs. Lamb's Chrysler Cirrus was traveling toward Mt. Vernon when she hit the guardrail and bounced into his

13 arrested in drug sweep

An early morning drug roundup conducted April 13th in Rockcastle County resulted in the arrests of 12 suspected drug dealers within the first two hours. A third person turned himself in and three other individuals are still being sought.

Led by detectives from Operation UNITE (Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment and Education), two groups of law enforcement officers began serving the arrest warrants about 8 a.m. April 13th. Assisting with the roundup were deputies from Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office and troopers from the Kentucky State Police Post 11.

Most of those being sought have already been indicted by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Following their arrests, the sus-

pected were processed and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail.

This was the second drug roundup in five months conducted by Operation UNITE in Rockcastle County. In late November 2004, law enforcement officers began arresting 33 suspected drug dealers on indictment warrants.

Those charged in last Wednesday's roundup were:

Mark Edward Baker, age 40, of Highway 1004, Mt. Vernon. He is charged with cultivating marijuana over five plants, trafficking in marijuana under 8 ounces, first-degree Persistent Felony Offender, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon,

and any garden related items to the parking lot next to Cox Hardware on Main Street.

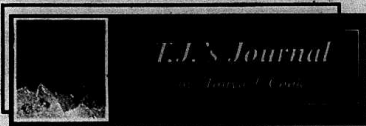

Recently, Stanley and I had business to take care of in Lancaster. We had to make several trips before the business was complete, so we just decided to make one trip "a mixed pleasure with business affair".

Frozen Shoulder

Presented by Dr. George W. Griffith

Many things can lead to a stiff, frozen shoulder—tendonitis, fractures, infections, and surgery are a few. The end result, however, is the same. A stiff and painful shoulder that prevents you from combing your hair, throwing a ball, and many other activities.

The underlying cause is immobilization of the shoulder. All joints tighten up if they are not continually stretched and used, but the shoulder is one of the most sensitive joints for this. It becomes stiff and tight very quickly from inactivity.

Even when a person has a fracture or dislocation of the shoulder, it is important to do range of motion exercises and stretching exercises to keep the joint mobile. These exercises should usually be started by two weeks after injury. Once the joint has become frozen, it is a difficult problem to correct. Physical therapy is very important. You must keep working at the exercises constantly.

A frozen shoulder often improves with time, but that may take 2-3 years, and some persons do not improve even then. Your orthopedic surgeon might recommend surgery. Under anesthesia, the tight joint capsule is stretched to break down the adhesions. After surgery, aggressive physical therapy is needed to maintain and increase the benefits of surgery.

The best treatment is prevention. Taking care of minor problems, such as tendonitis and bursitis, can allow a person to stay as active as possible. Remember, only by continually using a joint will it stay mobile and useful.

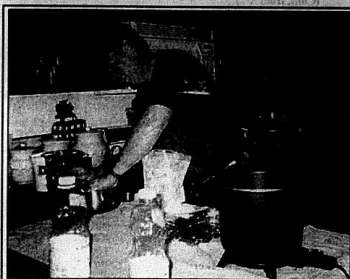

Occupational Therapy helps fine motor control and handwriting

Many children suffer from difficulty with handwriting. Common concerns of handwriting performance usually includes unusual or awkward grip, hand pain or fatigue, difficulty with letter formation and spacing, or messy writing that is hard to read. Handwriting is a complex process of managing written language by coordinating body posture, eyes, arms, hands, and pencils. The development of a child's handwriting can provide clues to developmental problems that a child could have.

Handwriting problems could also hinder a child's learning because teachers cannot follow through with measure how well a child is learning. Many factors can influence a child's handwriting ability including: muscle strength, dexterity, visual/motor coordination and/or learning, touch processing, body posture, and attention.

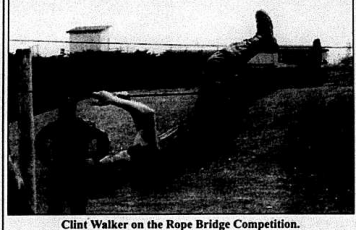

Rockcastle Health and Rehabilitation Center provides compassionate care for local people

Here's a startling statistic: One in five people over the age of 50 is at high risk of needing long-term care within the next year. For most people, the decisions that have to be made when they or a family member needs a facility for ongoing nursing care can be overwhelming.

Rockcastle coultian Steve Coy, PT, who has been the administrator of Rockcastle Health & Rehabilitation Center for the last year, has a strong philosophy about the care residents should receive. In this article, he answers some questions about the center and what people should look for when choosing a long-term care facility.

Q. How is Rockcastle Health & Rehabilitation Center different from other facilities?

A. There are many ways that we are different, and in my opinion, better. Being affiliated with an acute care hospital is a real advantage, and the fact that we are a locally-owned center sets us apart from a lot of facilities. Local ownership and management is at the heart of what our center is all about. We're focused on providing exceptional care by highly trained healthcare professionals who are part of this community. We are friends, neighbors and even family to our residents.

Their family members tell us it's a real comfort to have their loved

ones at Rockcastle Health & Rehabilitation Center because they know us, and we know them.

Q. You accepted this position about a year ago, after many years of working in the hospital. What made the opportunity to manage this facility attractive to you?

A. I have a deep sense of respect for what has been referred to recently as "The Greatest Generation." With the majority of our residents fitting into this category, I welcomed the chance to help make their lives as comfortable and enjoyable as possible while they are at our nursing facility. My guiding principal, and that of all our staff, is to treat our residents with the love and respect they have earned while assisting with their medical, physical, social and spiritual needs.

Q. The name of your facility includes the word Rehabilitation. What does that mean in this instance?

A. Nursing facilities typically offer four basic types of services - medical care, nursing and rehabilitative care, personal care and residential care. Our nationally accredited center offers all of these services with a goal toward helping people meet daily physical, social, medical and psychological needs. And whenever possible, to help people return to their own homes. That's where rehab plays a major role. We offer physical, oc-

cupational and speech therapy. Some residents need these services temporarily and then can return home.

Q. One of the biggest concerns people have about long-term care is how to pay for it. What is the most common method of payment?

A. Some people think Medicare will cover nursing facility costs, but the reality is it pays for only a small percentage. That's when Medicaid usually comes in. Medicaid is a government program that assists low-income people, and the majority of nursing facility costs are paid through Medicaid.

Another option is long-term care insurance, which can protect personal assets and provide greater choice in the selection of a facility.

Q. Planning ahead makes paying for long-term care much easier, so getting financial records in order and investigating facilities before you need one is a good idea.

Q. How can someone determine if they've chosen the right center for their loved one?

A. It's important to feel comfortable with the facility you choose. People should talk with administrators and tour the facility. They also should visit at several different times of day, including meal time. During the visit, they should talk to caregivers. Many of them have devoted their careers to caring for the elderly or disabled. Also, talking with residents and their families is important and very helpful.

Q. What can be done to help someone adjust to moving from their home into a nursing facility?

A. For many people, moving into a long-term nursing facility is a big adjustment. Having regular visits from friends and family and getting to know other residents is key to making a smooth transition.

One of the things we do to make residents feel they are a part of our facility is encourage them and their family members to participate in developing the resident's care plan. Having a say in daily activities is an important and empowering aspect of long-term care.

All residents should have the opportunity to be involved in activities that provide mental, physical and social stimulation. Residents should be encouraged to participate, but should be treated with courtesy and respect at all times.

Q. You mentioned that Rockcastle Health & Rehabilitation Center is nationally accredited. What does that mean?

A. We have earned accreditation by the Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO). Only a small number of nursing homes in Kentucky have achieved this, so this is another distinguishing factor for us.

The standards required by the JCAHO are even more demanding than those required by federal and state regulating bodies. So we feel it was quite an achievement and a team effort that required adhering to high standards by all who work here.

Q. If someone wants to learn more about long term care, where can they turn for help?

A. We invite people to call our facility at 758-8711. Just ask for our social services department and Worth Ann Harris will be glad to answer questions, provide brochures or any other information. We also welcome opportunities to speak to community groups about aging, health care and other related subjects. We're always glad to help people any way possible.

Adams and Matt Bryant conducted a search at Bluegrass Inn Apartments in Mt. Vernon on late Thursday night/early Friday morning that netted a large amount of cash, \$3000 worth of Oxycotin tablets, approximately 1/2 ounce of cocaine and 1/2 ounce of suspected "crystal meth," a form of the illicit street drug methamphetamine.

Arrested in connection with the seized items were Kevin Tincher, 27, Sheila Angel, 25 and Robert Doolin, 26, all of Dayton, Ohio and James Combs, 36, of Mount Vernon. All were charged with Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, first degree, three counts. Angel was released on bond on Wednesday. The other three are being held at the Rockcastle County Detention Center on \$50,000 cash bond each.

The case will be presented at a later date to the Rockcastle Grand Jury. The Rockcastle Sheriff's Detectors were assisted by other deputies, and also Sgt. Ed Robinson and Mt. Vernon parolmen Nathaniel Swartz and Brian Carter.

On the same day, three others were set for final sentencing on May 3, 2005.

Duane Didonato, 35, of Brodhead pled guilty to Possession of a Controlled Substance, first degree. Didonato was on probation for Trafficking in Marijuana when he was arrested by Detective Matt Bryant and TFO Barry Adams with Methamphetamine in his possession in the area of Castle Village.

According to Bartley, the state will move to revoke Didonato's probation, for which he has three years of imprisonment pending. The Commonwealth has recommended one year imprisonment on the new charge, to run consecutively to the previous charge for a total of four years imprisonment.

Bobby Douglas, 36, of Mt. Vernon, pled guilty to Fleeing and Evading, first degree. He will serve one year on this charge and is also facing revocation of his probation in Knox County. The one year sentence will be served, in addition to the term of imprisonment imposed in that case.

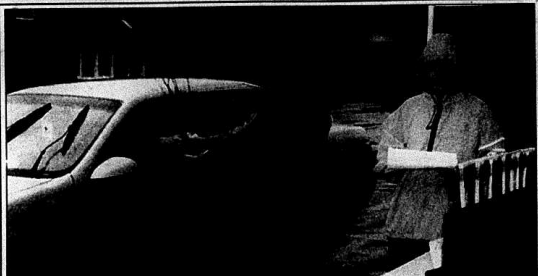

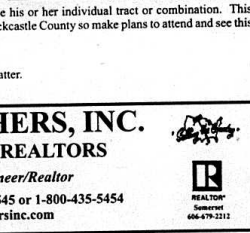

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Agricultural News

Urgent: Tobacco Transition Payment Program
All aspects of the Federal tobacco marketing quota and price support loan programs are ending. Beginning with the 2005 tobacco crop this means, there are no planting restrictions, no marketing cards and no price support loans. Signing up for the Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP), commonly referred to as the "Tobacco Buyout" is the final and only opportunity to receive Federal payments related to tobacco production.

The Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP) provides payments to tobacco quota holders and tobacco producers in annual installments beginning in 2005 and ending in 2014. Payments shall be made by way of direct deposit or check if the individual does not have a financial institution.

The FSA office will not make a lump-sum payment to an individual tobacco quota holder or producer, but a private party may. If a private party enters into an agreement where an individual is to receive a lump-sum payment the individual may sign the Successor-in-interest contracts beginning with the FY2006 payment. Assignment and Successor-in-interest forms will be available from the local FSA office at the appropriate time.

Remember: Those individuals who have not previously completed the SF-1199, Direct Deposit, form will need to bring a voided check to the office at the time for signing up for TTPP. Deadline to sign for TTPP is June 17, 2005.

Crop Reports
Producers are reminded to report their wheat crop by the deadline of May 31, 2005. Crops such as corn, soybeans, tobacco, hay and pasture for crop history should be reported by the deadline of July 15th.

Crop acreage reports filed after July 15th will be required to pay a late filing fee.

2005 Direct and County Cyclical Payment Program (DCP)
Producers are reminded that now is the time to sign-up for the 2005 DCP.

DCP sign-up period for 2005 is October 1, 2004 to June 1, 2005. All owners, operators and tenants who share in the DCP payment on the farm must sign the CCC-509. Forms with signatures obtained after June 1 but before September 30, 2005 will be accepted, but the farm will be assessed a late-file sign-up fee of \$100.00.

Farm producers must apply for DCP each year and can cancel for any year if they so choose.
The form FSA-578, Crop Certification, must be filed before final pay-

ments can be issued.
Crop Disaster Program
The 2003/2004/2005 Crop Disaster Program (CDP), reimburses producers for qualifying losses to agricultural commodities (other than sugar cane or cotton seed) due to damaging weather or related conditions. The damages must be in excess of 35 percent for the loss of production or 20 percent for quality losses. The program, administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA), has no set funding limitation.

CDP covers all crops as follows:

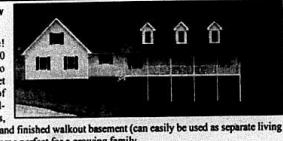

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

Children and Television

Parents, it is a wonderful time to take your child outside to run, hop, skip, jump and to explore with them the magic and mysteries of the arrival of spring in Rockcastle County.

Children spend more time with television than with you, family or their teachers. From the time they are born until they turn 17, children watch 15,000 hours of television. That's five years worth of 8-hour

days!

In that time, children are exposed to about 400 TV commercials a week. They are influenced by these commercials of which many are for toys, unhealthy foods, alcohol and may not be appropriate for your child's viewing.

Television is not a social experience for children. They sit passively in front of the screen. They don't interact with anyone and TV takes away their most important learning tool—questions. Children learn more by asking questions than in any other way and they often cannot tell the difference between the fantasy and reality.

Some parents worry because in one hour of Saturday morning cartoons, the average child will see 54 acts of violence. Of course, watching TV is not all bad. Some are educational. Few educators recommend

that children not watch television at all, but they do recommend a lot less TV than most children now watch.

Limit the amount of TV viewing. Together, choose a few shows a week. Watch with your child. Talk about the shows that you see together. Encourage questions. Let your child know what you like and do not like. The things you value will become clear to your child as you spend TV time together.

Watching TV together on a rainy day can be fun, but remember the amount of time you spend outside

talking and watching our world will have an exciting impact on you and your child.

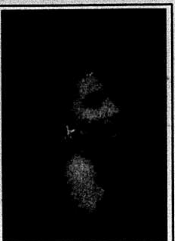

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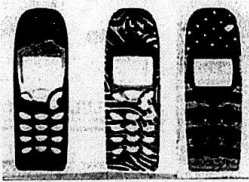


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
