Unfortunately, the war would take on a new, more horrifying color for James when he was captured near Newman, GA, following a 36 hour running gun battle with Confederate Cavalry on July 30, 1964. The Confederate prison at Andersonville, Georgia would hold James, and many of his captured friends, for nearly eight morths, slowly taking many of eight months, slowly taking many of them through disease and starvation. By war's end, James would survive his imprisonment at Andersonville to be exchanged April 1, 1865, but not before he contracted tuberculosis the previous winter. It was a condition that would ultimately claim him far too early for a man so young in years. James succumbed his condition at his home on March 22, 1868, at the tender age of 26 years.
Ultimately, James was buried on

Ultimately, James was buried on old McGuire property, but the ravages of time and fading family memories had left his grave in a sorry state of repair in a spot of pasture all but abandoned to frequent human uraffic. Only through determined recent efforts were his descondants able to restore some honor and dignity to a man so poorly honored for his sacrifice.

Guidelines for Elmwood Cemetery

The Elmword Cemetery Perpetual Care Corporation is a non-profit organization formed several years ago by concerned citizens to provide perpetual care for loved ones who have deceased. The corporation is governed by a board directors who care for the cemetery-through funding received from private individuals and the interest received from the injectiment of these funds. Officer's and directors receive no salary or compensation for their participation on this bears. The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corporation Board of Directors attempts to accommodate the wishes of each family which is buried in the Elmwood Cemetery. To do this there MUST be standards by which the grounds can brainstained and kept in a dignified manner. Some of these guidelines were utilized prior to the perpetual care formation some stipulated in the deed conditions of private developers, and others by motion and vote of the baard of directors. The following are guidelines that the board has operated since the formation of the perpetual care:

• Mowing of the grass, tree trimming, and general maintenance cepairs are done by private contractors.

- Mowing of the grass will be done, as needed, due to precipitation and financial funds available. Removal of flowers from new grave sites is done when approprite, during the grass mowing seas prior to mowing.
- The cemetery is "cleaned" of fresh and/or artificial arrangements, not attached to a mon after Memorial Day.
- Any arrangement off a grave stone due to wind is to be replaced. If the correct stone is unable to be ascertained then the nearest stone to the arrangement is to receive the replacement.

 Only arrangements deemed needing replacement are to be removed and under NO condition are
- these arrangements to be resold.
- tines arrangements to be resolu.

 At NO TIME has the cemetery board advocated the removal of an arrangement that is on or attached to any grave stone. Only those arrangements deemed needing replaced or which hinder the normal mowing or trimming are to be removed.
- the normat moving or rrimming are to be removed.

 Barriers, fences, cables, etc. surrounding a grave site are prohibited as these impede the use of lawn mowers necessary for the upkeep of the cemetery. This regulation is stipulated in the deeds of many of the grave sites in portions of the Elmowood Cemetery.

 The Elmowood Cemetery Perpetual Care Board will not be responsible for the correct opening and
- closing of grave sites Graves are seeded at appropriate times throughout the year and graves which have sunk will be
- filled when necessary.

 The planting of flowers or shrubs around monuments or grave sites is discouraged as these impede the mowing and trimming around the stone markers and may be damaged during regular mowing
- and training.

 The raking of leaves, removal of debrit and obstructions which impede the care/maintenance and flow of traffic will be done as necessary.

Record numbers march in rally



An estimated 700 RCHS students marched from Rockcastle County Middle School to downtown Mt. Vernon Friday, May 6. The students joined with middle and elementary school students to rally against drugs. The event, which included almost 3000 students, was organized by UNITE.

Approximately 3,500 kids streaming down Main Street in Mount Vernon is not a sight one often sees. However, this was the scene Priday, May 6, as students from every school in Rockcastle inserbed into town to UNITE against drugs.

"I've been in politics for 30 years and I have never seen anything like this," said Senator Ed Worley as he stepped up to the microphone to speak to the enormous crowd which had gathered to band against the drug problem that has infested the community and our state.

According to RCHS principal John Hale, the march was a joint effort with the UNITE Coalition (a group of concerned citizens dedicated to Unlawful Narcotics Investigation, Treatment and Education), the city of Mount Vernon and Rockcastle County schools, to "better inform the public about the drug crisis."

Organizers outfitted each student with a UNITE t-shirt.
"I hope it raises the awareness level," Mr. Hale said. "By sending the t-shirts out, [citizens] have two opportunities. either way they need to go."

The t-shirts have the phone number of both a drug tiphotline and a drug treatment referral line.

UNITE, according to Liz Wilson, Operation Unite

Coalition Coordinator of the Cumberland River Region, was started by Congressman Hal Rogers when he saw an article in a newspaper about drug abuse. Saying, "This won't happen on my watch!" he lobbied for federal funds to combat drugs through education, treatment and law enforcement.

"Today will be the beginning of a whole new era, as far as drugs are concerned," Representative Danny Ford said

After one year, more than 2.5 million dollars in drug paraphernalia have been confiscated through the UNITE coalition, 197 people have been in drug treatment, and about 800 arrests have been made, according to Paul Hays of Operation UNITE law enforcement.

Hays also said, "UNITE is a model program for not only this state, but other states and the country. Our objective is to reduce the drug culture and the abuse of illegal drugs in this area."

As the program came to a close, the speakers congratulated the mass of students.

"I am proud of each and every one of you," Representative Ford said.

"It takes a lot of courage to be here today and we support you 100 percent," added Senator Worley.

As the number of citizens present on Main Street showed, the merch against drugs on Friday was a success.

"There isn't a family in Rockcastle that hasn't been affected [by drugs]. We all need to work together to help solve the problem. We can only do that by providing more recreational activities and better jobs for our citizens." Mr. Hale said. "Prevention is much better than cure."





A long time ago in a Star Wars galaxy far, far away... Star

It's the phrase that started it all. Revenge of the Sith will be the phrase that brings it all to an end May 19.

The story is one most know, the setting, however, is a setting from outer space. A princess

in distress and an evil villain that seems impossible to defeat, and with magic and technology from out of this world, it's no wonder Star Wars has become such a fan friendly film.

Lucas started the original trilogy with A New Hope (1977), and baffled millions with the story. Young hero Luke Skywalker discovers the abilities one can perform using the Force, and that his father had once been a Jedi, a force wielding hero. After a daring rescue to save Princess Leia from the

clutches of the evil Darth Vader of the Galactic Empire, Luke and his new friends Han and Chewbacca must destroy the Death Star, an armored space station with enough power to obliterate an entire planet.

Stunning audiences again in 1980, Lucas released *The Empire Strikes Back*. There we are introduced to many new characters: Yoda, a 900 year old Jedi who begins teaching Luke how to use the force, and Lando Calrision, one of Han's old friends who seems only out for his own wealth. We are also introduced to our first real lightsaber duel, when Luke must face Vader and finds out the truth about the "death" of his father.

When Return of The Jedi (1983) was released, the Emperor became a main character in the Star Wars universe, visiting the second Death Star to oversee its completion. Fans were ecstatic by the end of the film. after another ingeniously choreographed lightsaber

battle, the death of the empire, and the destruction of the second Death Star, ending the Empire, and bringing Vader back over to the good side of the force.

Then in 1999 George Lucas astounded audiences with something many believed would never happen. The original trilogy to the Star Wars saga was kicked off with The Phantom Menace, the story of a prospective future Jedi. Anakin Skywalker. The story introduces the Sith, and ends with a classic victorious battle over Naboo.

Attack Of The Clones is the latest in the release of the prequel trilogy. This epic installment introduces the clone army used by the Republic in order to smash separatists who have waged war in order to separate from the Republic. The movie also traces the romance of Anakin Skywalker and Padme Amidala, as both Anakin and Obi-Wan grow stronger in the force.

When May 19 comes around many will be stunned yet again as Lucas finally unveils Revenge of the Süh, ending the Star Wars saga, and completing the movie series forever. Eight time state champ recalls past, looks to future

Life is like a race: there is a start and a finish. You're fighting against the clock and not anyone else. Out on the track alone, you still have teammates cheering you on from the sidelines. Yes, there are a lot of things life has in common with a race, but what if e a large part of your life has centered around running a race.

Senior Heather Hammond has run track for five years and has won eight state championships. She is so talented that she has signed to run track at Western Kentucky University. Life is like a race, and one that Heather is not going to spon lose.

Red Chare: You've achieved so much on the track team, set so many records, placed well in many competitions. Please give us a summary of what all it is that you have done

RG: How has your family influenced you?



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Bench offers a different perspective of softball



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
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Substitute recovers after weight loss surgery

In recent years, weight-loss surgery has become increasingly popular. Everyone from weatherman Al Roker to substitute teacher Mark Whicker has gone "under the knife" to have the beneficial (but potentially risky) surgery. Bill Lynch, a substitute teacher and former social studies teacher at RCHS, undergone lapband surgery during spring break.

Lap-band surgery is similar to gastric bypass. However, instead of shrinking the stomach, a band is actually placed around the stomach, restricting its food intake. As with gastric bypass, the patient feels fuller more quickly, therefore the weight is lost more quickly. The risks are the same, as well: both have the potential risks of death and infections resulting from the procedure.

According to Mr. Lynch, the actual procedure went almost flawlessly. "I went back after the surgery and everything is completely healed," says Mr. Lynch.

"I have some stomach hernias and they have to repair them later on." he said in a phone interview last week. "Everything else went well."

The surgery didn't take very long as compared to other types of surgeries which can last almost eight hours. Mr. Lynch's relatively short surgery only lasted for three hours and fifteen minutes.

The healing process is brief, as well.

"I went back [to the doctor] six weeks after the surgery and it was completely healed," said Lynch. "[After the surgery] I could do pretty much what I wanted to do, but no lifting," he added.

Despite the fact that the healing process doesn't take a long time, the pain is still considerable. Mr. Lynch says that after the surgery, he was "sore. Very sore."

His eating habits have been adjusted dramatically.

"I can't have any sugar, caffeine and no carbonated drinks," he said. "I have to eat very small meals three times a day. I have to have 64 ounces of fluids a day and 70 grams of protein."

Nearly seven weeks after the surgery, Lynch has already lost 43 ½ pounds.

"And the doctors say I can lose 80% of what I want to lose."

Several individuals in the county have undergone weight loss surgery, including substitute Mr. Whicker and vocational teacher Ms. Patty Himes.
