Mt. Vernon is offering free trash disposal

Citations could follow free trash disposal program

The Mt. Vernon city council is trying to do their part to help clean-up Rockcastle County.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Clarice Kirby announced this week that the city would use a Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment (PRIDE) grant to offer free trash disposal.

"We applied for and received a \$25,000 grant to fund this project and we will run the program until the money runs out," Mayor Kirby said.

Residents are encouraged to take their junk, garbage and even white goods, such as old appliances to the collection site.

The site is located on Main Street, in Mt. Vernon, across from NAPA Auto Parts and next to the Rockcastle County Courthouse.

Mayor Kirby encourage residents within the city limits of Mt. Vernon to clean up all over their property.

"Property owners should take advantage of this offer, because if we (the city), cite residents under our trash ordinance it will cost landowners more money, such as fines and they will also be required to pay the cost of disposing of the garbage."

"After the free offer is over city police will be issuing warning tickets per our ordinance for trash and junk things that are visible to anyone. After that, Police Chief Terry Jackson will be checking back to see if you have cleaned up around your property," Mayor Kirby said.

"Non-compliance with the warning citations will result in citation requiring property owners to appear in Rockcastle District Court," she said.

The Mayor said that senior citi-

zens or disabled persons who need help with lifting or hauling may be able to receive assistance from city employees. Those needing help should call Mt. Vernon City Hall, at (606) 256-3437 for assistance and more information about the program.

There will be two dumpsters located on the city lot. Dumpster number one will be for junk and garbage and dumpster number two will be used for stoves, refrigerators, washers, dryers, freezers or other white goods.

The program begins Thursday, (today).

Two charged by Mt. Vernon police this week

A Mt. Vernon man was arrested Saturday morning after police found him in Bishop's Tire on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

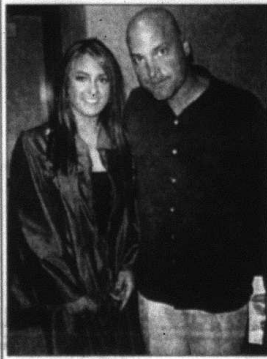
Mt. Vernon police also made a drug related arrest last Thursday.

Phillips family has contributed heavily to defense of country

690 Phillips men served in the Revolutionary War, and though no direct link can be made to the local

Phillips family, there was no doubt one.

The first documentation of the Phillips family's involvement in fighting for our country came in the Civil War when John Luther Phillips, who was too old to take up arms himself, contributed the services of four of his sons to enlist in the volunteer forces of the Union cause. They all enlisted in Company G, 4th Regiment Kentucky Volunteer Mounted Infantry, one of the three infantry regiments which President Lincoln authorized Lt. William Nelson to raise in Kentucky in the summer of 1861.

Five sons tried to enlist but James was too young and, instead, served as a civilian employee of the Quartermaster's Department and was assigned to Camp Nelson as a teamster.

In addition to Phillips four sons, he also had nine nephews and two of his brothers-in-law enlisted with the

Union forces and all, except four, returned safely home. One of his nephews, John Phillips, enlisted in the Confederate Army and lost his life at the Battle of Lookout Mountain.

One of the sons, John C. Phillips, was at Chickamauga, GA in 1863 where he lost part of his tongue and eight teeth in battle. He spent the rest of his service time in the hospital and returned to Three Links to spend the rest of his life.

According to family records, there were, all told, 80 young men by the name of Phillips who served in the various Kentucky regiments with the Union Army of the West.

History repeated itself with the family of John Luther Phillips, grandson of the John C. Phillips mentioned above, had four sons serve their country in the armed services.

Luther J. Phillips served in the U.S. Army in WWII and Clarence H. (Cont. to A-11)

\$2.5 million in drug money confiscated during the past year

The Rockcastle UNITE Coalition held their annual meeting at the Rockcastle County High School Auditorium recently. Operation UNITE (Unlawful Narcotics Investigation and Treatment and Education) is a counter-drug initiative helping to combat drug abuse in Southern and Eastern Kentucky.

Liz Wilson, Coalition Coordinator for Operation UNITE, told the group that the counter-drug initiative has confiscated \$2.5 million in drug money this past year. In addition, thirty-one drug counselors have been added to the schools. Drug treatment centers are planned for Manchester and Pikeville along with Governor Fletcher's initiative for ten other treat-

ment centers.

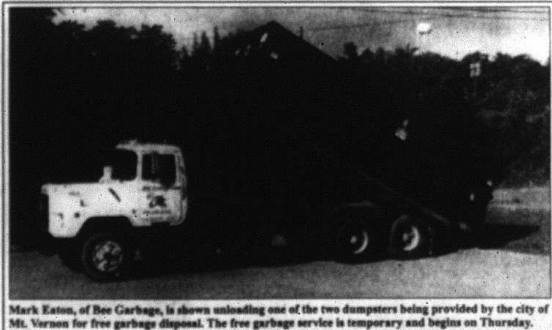
Discovery Festival in Renfro Valley

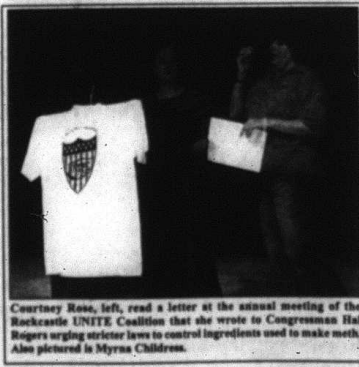
Homecoming at Brodhead

Points East

During the winter of 1974-75 I bonded with over a dozen representatives from small, community based non-profit organizations that were addressing economic development problems in one form or fashion throughout the highlands of Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee.

Finally we incorporated in the spring of 1976 to form The Mountain Association for Community Economic Development (MACED). Based in Berea, KY the organization is now largely confined to serving the Appalachian Counties of Kentucky by providing small business financing and technical assistance, forestry development, and a vast array of other services too numerous to detail in a newspaper column.

The original geography was more than three times larger than the current focus and gradually the Virginia and Tennessee groups dropped out because it was impractical to try to communicate and travel to meetings on limited budgets. We didn't have computers in those days and fax machines were all the rage for anyone who could afford one.

Still, if you've never driven from Roanoke or Abingdon or Big Stone Gap, Virginia to Berea, in a VW Beetle with no functional heater between midnight and dawn on a cold night in January, you have not lived a full life.

In the early MACED organizing

days I made such trips regularly. I was also traveling almost every night across southeastern Kentucky organizing a community base for Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation.

I tremendously enjoyed the work but I can tell you for sure that when the VW's engine blew one night on the Daniel Boone Parkway between Hyden and Middlesboro, I literally rejoiced. Finally I had an excuse to buy another car.

I gave the bug to a wrecker service in exchange for getting it off the road and promptly made another big mistake—Triton Spiffire—convertible and very sexy looking but with a heater basically as functional as the VW and far draftier. But that's another story for another time.

The point of this story was supposed to be about serving MACED which has been an integral part of my life for more than 30 years. Service on the MACED board has been, by far, the most consistent/longest-running part of my career.

Several years ago, the board decided we should limit terms to 6 years for a couple of reasons. In the first place, board vacancies enable other people to serve the region and frankly, six years is long enough to serve on any board when that service is absolutely and totally voluntary.

So last Tuesday night, I officially

News of the Legally Weird

The national media's weekly trip stories of the legally weird include: the "perfect crime", a police dispatcher fired for living with her boyfriend; and an unusual petition for name change.

Michigan law professor Brian Kalt disclosed on National Public Radio this week that the wording of the U.S.

Constitution's Sixth Amendment may provide the opportunity for the commission of a crime which could never be successfully prosecuted.

Sixth Amendment provides that "[i]n all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury, of the state and district wherein the

crime shall have been committed.

"The scene of the perfect crime?" According to Kalt, Yellowstone National Park, or at least the tiny portion of the Park which lies within the state borders of Idaho. Most of Yellowstone lies within Wyoming and Montana. However, a smy sliver of the federal park does encroach upon Idaho state boundaries.

Any offense which occurred on the land comprising the Idaho portion of Yellowstone would have to be prosecuted in federal court due to the ownership of the parklands. If an offense were committed in that portion of the park... no jury could ever be seated in accordance with the Sixth Amendment's requirement because no people reside within that section of Idaho!

Fortunately, as noted by NPR, Kalt indicates that it is unlikely that a crime could be contemplated and

Close your eyes for a few moments. Listen to the wonderful world of various sounds for our listening pleasure. As I've been taught, the olfactory senses are the most dominant of any of the five senses. They are noted as having the best memory or recall, as well. The sense of smell is wonderful because: who would want to miss the aromas of home cooking, flowers, or cologne, for example? I suppose the evolutionists relate its dominance to our early ancestors who had to rely on it for hunting and the like. I'm sure we all would value the sense of smell more than all of our senses, and I'm sure that it would be the one that would be missed, the most. The sense of touch allows us to feel the various textures around us such as the softness of a kitten's fur or the abrasiveness of sandpaper. We also have the ability to feel the heat from a hot ember or the coldness of ice. Then we have the sense of taste, which goes almost hand in hand with the sense of smell. We could scarcely enjoy our food without this sense. Try eating with a stuffy nose, and the food has practically no taste. Isn't it wonderful how all five of these senses work together to give us a complete sense of our environment?

I've often heard that if one of the senses is missing, the other four work that much harder to compensate. That is often the case with the blind. They are keenly aware of the sounds around them. I had the opportunity to work with an amazing blind lady

at the nursing home at London. She knew as much about what was going on in the world around her as the sighted. She could even distinguish the various gait patterns of all of the nurses and aides who worked there. She could hear your steps pass her door, and call you by name, and ask you to come to her.

I guess that I've always been fascinated with the sense of hearing. When I was growing up as a child, I was usually alone with no other children about with which to play or associate. Therefore, I found ways to entertain myself which I suppose were a little unorthodox. I did the

typical things that a little girl would do such as playing with dolls, jumping rope and playing jacks, or I would watch TV, and then there was always reading, but yet I entertained myself in other ways. I would go away by myself to a large rock that was a short distance from my house. There I spent two or three hours sitting atop this rock quite often just thinking and meditating on various subjects. I would almost lose myself in thought, or let my imagination run wild. Sometimes I would imagine myself without sight. I would try to keep my eyes closed for a long period of time and listen to the surrounding noise. I even tried it in other situations such as in restaurants, stores, parks, and even at home. I became fascinated by the sounds, which were often un-

Hyperactivity Can Be Treated

All children are active. In some children, this activity is poorly controlled. They are inattentive and careless and cannot control their impulses. They are more active than other children, and the disarray of their actions makes it more disturbing to others, especially when they are in groups, such as in school or in team sports.

Hyperactivity, or attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), is much more common in boys than girls. The cause is unknown but a number of forms of metabolic brain injury or physical trauma have been suggested. Some people feel artificial dyes, sweeteners, or other food products are factors. Hereditary factors, however, may play the greatest role.

The problem becomes most evident during school. Not only does the child disrupt the class and hinder organized teaching, but the disease also prevents the child from attaining his own optimal development, both academically and socially.

Early detection and treatment are helpful in preventing the consequences of growing up "hyperactive." It is difficult for these children to make up for lost ground in school and to correct their ingrained habits and acceptance of failure. When hyperactivity is identified, it is usually helpful to treat it.

Most children improve with stimulants such as methylphenidate or amphetamines. These medicines are given in the morning and at noon, so the beneficial effects occur during school. Often the child does not use the medicine over weekends or summer vacations. With time, he will usually outgrow the need for the medicines and can assume a "normal" life.

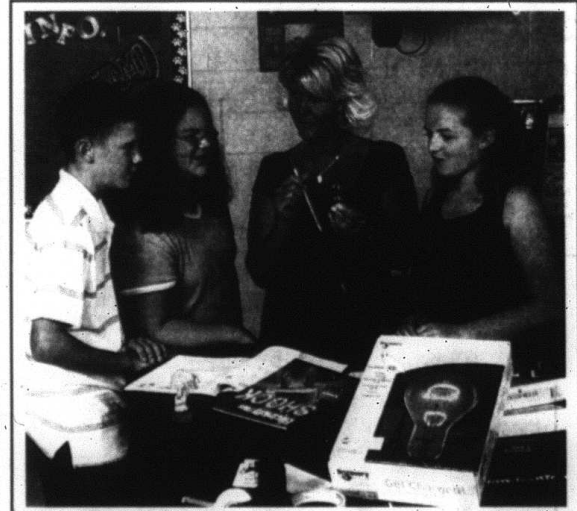

completed entirely within this tiny sliver of lawless land. Since the law provides for prosecution in a location where any portion of an offense occurs, don't be expecting any crime spree in the wooded hills of Idaho's portion of America's favorite national park.

Also courtesy of National Public Radio, North Carolina officials are wrestling with the state's cohabitation law in the wake of the dismissal of a sheriff's dispatcher who was fired for living with her boyfriend without benefit of marriage.

Cohabitation statutes prohibit unmarried couples from living together. Aside from North Carolina, six other

states still have such laws—Florida, Michigan, Mississippi, North Dakota, Virginia and West Virginia.

In this most recent firing, the dispatcher was notified by the sheriff that she would be fired if she continued to share a home with her boyfriend. The dispatcher refused to make other arrangements and was terminated after a few weeks of employment.

According to NPR, a pending lawsuit will likely decide whether such statutes remain constitutional given the U.S. Supreme Court's recent stance right to privacy between consenting adults in the privacy of their own homes.

Lastly, in a report by the Agency France Presse, a Washington D.C. man has commenced legal proceedings in federal court to legally change his name to "Jesus Christ" following the refusal of West Virginia state authorities to honor the man's request that they recognize his chosen identity.

The man apparently claims that he adopted the name change for purely respectful and loving reasons. An appeals court ruling is pending.

Guidelines for Elmwood Cemetery

- The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corporation is a non-profit organization formed several years ago by concerned citizens to provide perpetual care for loved ones who have deceased. The corporation is governed by a board of directors who care for the cemetery through funding received from private individuals and the interest received from the investment of these funds. Officer's and directors receive no salary or compensation for their participation on this board.
- The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corporation Board of Directors attempts to accommodate the wishes of each family which is buried in the Elmwood Cemetery. To do this there MUST be standards by which the grounds can be maintained and kept in a dignified manner. Some of these guidelines were utilized prior to the perpetual care formation, some stipulated in the deed conditions of private developers, and others by motion and vote of the board of directors.
- The following are guidelines that the board has operated since the formation of the perpetual care.
- Mowing of the grass, tree trimming, and general maintenance repairs are done by private contractors.
 - Mowing of the grass will be done, as needed, due to precipitation and financial funds available.
 - Removal of flowers from new grave sites is done when appropriate, during the grass mowing season, prior to mowing.
 - The cemetery is "cleaned" of fresh and/or artificial arrangements, not attached to a monument, after Memorial Day.
 - Any arrangement off a grave stone due to wind is to be replaced. If the correct stone is unable to be ascertained then the nearest stone to the arrangement is to receive the replacement.
 - Only arrangements deemed needing replacement are to be removed and under NO condition are these arrangements to be resold.
 - AT NO TIME has the cemetery board advocated the removal of an arrangement that is on or attached to any grave stone, unless those arrangements deemed needing replaced or which hinder the normal mowing or trimming are to be removed.
 - Barriers, fences, cables, etc. surrounding a grave site are prohibited as these impede the use of lawn mowers necessary for the upkeep of the cemetery. This regulation is stipulated in the deeds of many of the grave sites in portions of the Elmwood Cemetery.
 - The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Board will not be responsible for the correct opening and closing of grave sites.
 - Graves are seeded at appropriate times throughout the year and graves which have sunk will be filled when necessary.
 - The mowing of flowers or shrubs around monuments or grave sites is discouraged as these impede the planting and sprouting around the stone markers and may be damaged during regular mowing and trimming.
 - The raking of leaves, removal of debris and obstructions which impede the care/maintenance and flow of traffic will be done as necessary.
 - The only flag pole permitted within the Elmwood Cemetery grounds will be on a site designated for all veterans.

Agricultural News

Direct and County Cyclical Payment Program (DCP)

Producers are reminded the deadline to enroll a farm in DCP for the 2005 year is June 1, 2005. All owners, operators and tenants who share in the DCP payment on the farm must sign the CCC-509 before close of business June 1, 2005 to be considered timely filed.

Forms with signatures obtained after June 1 but before September 30, 2005 will be accepted, but the farm will be assigned a late-file sign-up fee of \$100.00.

Farm producers must apply for DCP each year and can cancel for any year if they so choose.

The form FSA-578, Crop Certification, must be filed before final payments can be issued.

Tobacco Transition Payment Program

Tobacco quota holders and producers are being mailed a reminder to enroll a farm in the USDA Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP), commonly referred to as the "Tobacco Buyout" is June 17, 2005.

If you have already signed the TTPP forms you do not need to re-sign the deadline. This is only to remind those producers who have not signed to come in before the deadline.

Quota holders who owned a farm on October 22, 2004 are eligible for a payment. If quota holders or producers have interests in farms in more than one county, contracts must be entered into for each of these farms at the appropriate FSA County Office.

The Debt Collection Improvement Act of 1996 requires that Federal payments be made by electronic funds transfer after January 2, 1999. If you do not have this on file in the county office you will need to sign the SF-1199, Direct Deposit Sign-up Form.

The FSA office will not make a lump-sum payment to an individual tobacco quota.

Holder or producer, but a private party may. If a private party enters

into an agreement where an individual is to receive a lump-sum payment the individual may sign the Successor-in-Interest contracts beginning with the FY2006 payment. Assignment and Successor-in-Interest forms will be available from the local FSA office at the appropriate time.

"If you have not signed up yet, you should contact your local FSA Office," said Warden Alexander, Rockcastle County Executive Director. "If you are eligible, sign-up by June 17th or you will not receive a 2005 payment."

REMEMBER: COME IN TODAY AND SIGN BEFORE JUNE 17, 2005.

Crop Disaster Program

Farmers who suffered 2003 or 2004 crop losses from damaging weather can sign-up at their local USDA Farm Service Agency office to receive assistance under the Crop Disaster Program (CDP). "A producer has the choice of receiving payment from crop losses for either the 2003 or 2004 crop year.

Eligibility for the Crop-Disaster Program (CDP) is similar to that of the 2001-2002 crop disaster programs. Producers suffering a greater than 35-percent production loss and/or more than a 20-percent quality loss are eligible. Under the current program the payment rate for CDP has been increased to 65 percent of the established commodity price for insured crops and noninsured crops, and 60 percent of the price for uninsured commodities.

Producers may apply for CDP for a crop that is eligible for coverage under the Federal Crop Insurance or the Noninsured Assistance Program. Tobacco is included as an eligible crop for this disaster program. The payment limitation is \$80,000 per person for all 2003/2004 payments. The closing date for the program is August 1, 2005.

Sales and Purchases of Land

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership.

Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

REMEMBER: FSA's records are only as current as producers provide.

Farm Loan Program

The FSA Farm Loan Representative with concern to FSA loans (farm, operating, youth and etc.) will be in Rockcastle County at the Rockcastle FSA office the first and third Thursdays of each month from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

Rural Development

The Rural Development Representative with concern to low income housing loans will be in Rockcastle County at the Rockcastle FSA office the second Tuesday of each month from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

Office Closure

The USDA Service Center (FSA and NRCS) offices will be closed Monday, May 30, 2005 for Memorial Day. Offices will reopen Tuesday, May 31 at regular office hours.

A time to honor the cost of freedom

May is a month of remembrance for most Americans, a time to pay private and public homage to our military heroes who made the ultimate sacrifice defending freedom on battlefields near and far.

America's fallen heroes must never be forgotten. Their unselfish sacrifice in wars against enemies of freedom, both ancient and fresh, deserves recognition and gratitude. While every American should tend and harbor the fragile flame of freedom by remembering those who died to keep it alive, veterans are hence-bound to do so: It's an unspoken oath sealed with blood.

Gen. John A. Logan, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, a post-Civil War veterans organization, understood the need for veterans to hold closely the sacrifices of their comrades.

In his 1868 General Order No. 11, Logan asked what better duty could veterans perform than to cherish "tenderly the memory of our hero dead, who made their breasts the barricade between our country and its foes?"

Veterans have an obligation to protect that legacy. Above all, they must be forever vigilant in keeping alive the memory of those who paid the ultimate sacrifice.

"If other eyes grow dull, other heads slack, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life remain to us," Logan wrote in proclaiming May 30, 1868, a day for the purpose of strewing flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of veterans. It was Logan's desire that the tradition "be kept up from year to year, until a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades."

Logan's charge to Veterans of the GAR is as relevant today as it was 137 years ago. More than 1,500 of our nation's military heroes have paid the ultimate sacrifice in Afghanistan and Iraq in the fight to crush tyranny and in its ashes plant the seeds of freedom. They join a legion of young men and women who died before them to protect the tenets of liberty, democracy and the American way of life.

Men and women throughout the ages bravely have stepped forward to answer freedom's call. Many died never having experienced life's precious gifts of love and marriage, the sight and touch of a firstborn son or daughter. Their lives were cut short before giving a daughter's hand in matrimony or seeing the sparkle in a grandchild's eye. They left behind grieving widows and orphans, while sacrificing dreams of fruitful careers and comfortable retirement so that we who survive might forever live free of tyranny's bond. They gave their lives as a gift of love and patriotism so that their family, sweethearts, friends, neighbors and fellow Americans might forever breathe the sweet air of freedom.

We who inherit freedom's fruits through the sacrifices of fellow patriots - from American colonists who fought at the birth of our nation to troops felled battling the jackboot of oppression and terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan - owe these brave warriors honor, respect and gratitude. Take time this Memorial Day to remember them all.

Courtney Rose, an RCIES student, read a letter she wrote to United States Congressman Harold Rogers urging him to encourage stricter laws to control ingredients used to make methamphetamines. New legislation was passed in Frankfort last year that limits accessibility to meth precursors. A controlled substance endangerment law for children's exposure to meth labs was also passed and a law to control internet drug trafficking which allows law enforcement to seize packages if a pharmacy is not licensed in Kentucky.

Van Ingram, from the Office of Drug Control Policy also spoke to the group. He said that Governor Ernie Fletcher has allotted \$1 million for treatment programs in county jails, \$500,000 for pilot programs for drug prevention in schools, \$2 million to expand drug courts and create new courts and \$500,000 for drug task forces.

Phillips served in the U.S. Navy in WWII. William Albert Phillips, U.S. Air Force, served during the Korean War and Loyd Donald Phillips, U.S. Navy, served during the Korean War and Vietnam War. Many other citizens also served, including a former Rockcastle County Magistrate Wally Phillips.

Staff Sgt. Luther J. Phillips served from Nov. 6, 1942 to July 3, 1945. He underwent basic training at Camp Wheeler, GA, and was shipped out April 20, 1943 to Casa Bianca, North Africa and from there to Salerno, Italy in Sept. of 1943. He was wounded in Italy three times, receiving a Purple Heart, two Oak Leaf Chesters and three Bronze Stars.

Clarence Henry Phillips, Cowswain SVN, took boot training at Great Lakes, IL. He then went to Chicago, IL for NATTC training. Amphibious training at Fort Huemene and fire fighter training at 29 Palms, CA. He served in the fire department as Captain of the fire crew, Naval Air Base in Saipan for 16 months and was discharged May 24, 1946. Mullins is the proud owner of a commendation signed by President Harry Truman for his service to his country.

Albert Phillips joined the U.S. Air Force July 2, 1951, was trained at Lockland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas. After basic, he went to Westover Air Force Base in Holyoke, MA and was then sent to Camp Kilmer in NJ. From there, he went to the Bermuda Islands and was discharged May 9, 1955 with a rank of Airman First Class. He received the National Defense Medal along with

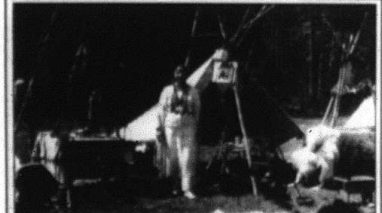

The RCHS Baseball Team put an exclamation point on their tenure as 49th district champions, claiming their 6th consecutive district championship on Tuesday night. The 21-12 Rockets will head into the 13th region tournament in Corbin as a number one seed on Monday.

J.D. Buswell's squad squeaked out a 6-4 victory to seek revenge on a Clay County team that had beaten them 1-0 in their last meeting, their first loss to a district team in 6 years.

Brown battled through numerous walks and fielding blunders early in the game to finally slam the door as he pitched scoreless sixth and seven innings. Brown is now 3-5 on the season with a earned run average of 1.30.

"We definitely didn't play up to our potential. However, this time of year is about surviving and moving on and we were able to take advantage of some key opportunities and win another district championship. We have to refocus and put together

three good games next week to win another regional title," said Rocket head coach J.D. Buswell.

On Monday night, the Rockets defeated Oneida, 10-0 in five innings, to advance to the finals. Ronny Lee McClure was the winning pitcher and senior right fielder Phillip Boreing had a home run in the contest.

Rockcastle County will join Corbin and Middleboro as the favorites in the 13th region tournament next week. Rockcastle County has won four of the last five regional championships with the lone loss coming in 2002. This will be the last time the Rockets play in the 13th region tournament. A Kentucky High School Athletic Association shuffling of the regions will place Rockcastle County in the 12th region next year while North Laurel and South Laurel will both move to the 13th.

The Rockets will find out the exact 13th region tournament bracket later in the week when the drawing is complete.

The Lady Rockets are now 27-9 on the season and will host the 13th regional tournament beginning on Monday at noon.

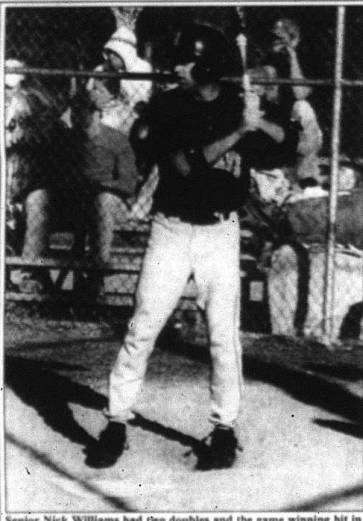

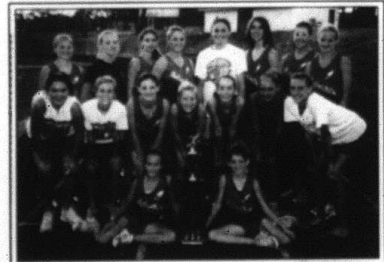

"Whoever makes the fewest mistakes will no doubt win the region and that is going to be our focus this week in practice," said head coach Jessic Mallafey.

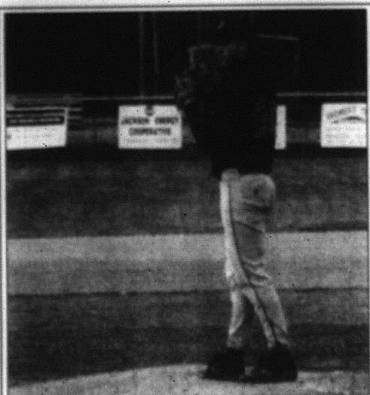
"We have had pretty good team defense all year long and I hope we can continue that in the regional tournament," Mallafey said.
