

Customers must also sign a written log or electronic record showing the date of their transactions, their name, date of birth and address, and the amount and name of the product being purchased. Those under the age of 18 are not permitted to buy any quantity of ephedrine, pseudoephedrine or phe-nylproganolamine.

ephedrine, pseudoephedrine or phenylproganolamine.

"The intent of this law is to make it more difficult to purchase the products used to manufacture meth," Reynolds said. "The logs can be used by law enforcement officials to determine if a person is purchasing

by law enforcement officials to de-termine if a person is purchasing enough of the ingredients to manu-facture meth.

In addition to the stricter requir-ments for purchasing products used to make meth, limits have been placed on the amount that can be purchased at one time, according to Reynolds.

Purchased at one Reynolds. "Under the new law, no one can than nine grams or

"Under the new law, no one can purchase more than nine grams or three packages in a 10-day period of any of these drugs. This applies only to over the counter medications, not prescriptions." Reynolds said.

The new law specifically menufacturing methamphetamine when he or she knowingly and unlawfully possesses two or more chemicals or two or more items of equipment needed for the manufacture of meth.

The manufacture of meth is a class B felony for the first offense and a class A felony for the second and subsequent offenses. A class B felony is

sequent offenses. A class B felony is punishable by 10 to 20 years imprisonment and/or up to a \$10,000 fine, a class A felony is punishable by 20 years to life imprisonment and/or up to a 10,000 fine. Reynolds said an improsoment and/or up to a 10,000 fine. Reynolds said an important part of the new law is its protection of children. The law makes it a felony to expose a child to the toxic funes and wastes created by the meth—"cooking" process.




