on July 1s.
During their regular monthly

the county would head into a new
year of operation in better financial
shape than they had been in since he
took office twelve years ago.
Carloftis' comments came after
County Treasurer Joe Clontz Foresented the financial statement for
May.

A positive balance was shown in each of the county's 14 accounts.
Carloffus also told the court that PRIDE, a federal program through Congressman Harold Roger's office, owed the county \$50,000.
Clontz and Jailer James Miller also said the state owed the county nearly \$12,000 for two months of housing state prisoners.

housing state prisoners Miller also said the state had in or also said the state had in-creased the amount they would pay on each inmate by \$4.00 per day, which will increase the monthly in-come at the detention center by \$9,000.

Mrs. Slusher went to the Daniel Boone Development Council office in Mt. Vernon, a home loan partner with Rural Development in providing housing loans to low and verylow income families.

At Daniel Boone she met with Annacy Meadows, a loan assistant from Rural Development and Daniel

Until this year, Callie Slusher was one of those people.
However thanks to the Daniel Boone Development Council and the United States Rural Development low income housing program, that is no longer the case.
In 1975, Mrs. Slusher, now 63, moved from Harlan County to the Red Hill section of Rockcastle County.

old house into which they

The old house into which they moved did not have electricity or indoor plumbing and was heated with a wood and coal stove.

Mrs. Slusher raised her five children without the conveniences of electricity and running water, carrying water from a nearby spring day and washing their clothes by hand.

The family was unable to get electricity to the home, the primarily to the distrance from the power line and the cost involved. Mrs. Slusher said the rushand was not willing to incur her husband was not willing to incur the debt needed to build a new home After her husband's death in OcMrs. Slusher is now anxiously

Mrs. Slusher is now anxiously watching as her new two-bedroom home is being completed.

"I am very thankful for the help I received from the Richmond USDA Rural Development office and the folks at Daniel Boone Development in making it possible for me to own a decent and asfe home," Mrs. Slusher said. Mrs. Slusher's home will be ready for occupancy later this onth.

Like a task force agent's machete Like a tusk force agent's machete stroke at the base of a California sensemila plant, the U.S. Supreme Court effectively eradicated the budding hopes of many that states, not the federal government, would be permitted the last word on prosecutions for medicinal marijuana. In a dispersion, along somewhat unusual lines, the high Court reversed



a lower Court opinion originate ing in California which would have permitted the intrastate, noncommercial cultivation and possession of marijuana for personal medical

reasons.
Nine states--Alaska, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Maine, Nevada, Oregon, Vermont, and Washington--

purports to legalize the use of mar-juans for personal medical purposes. In Calfornia, the law, entitled the Compassionate Use Act, creates an exemption from prosecution for phy-sicians, primary caretakers, and pa-tents who cultivate, presenbe or pos-sess cannabis.

The respondents in the California case used medicinal marijuana pur-suant to a doctor's advice, and, for at least one of the respondents, discon-tinuance would, in the physician's opinion, result in substantial pain and possibly prove fatal. Firewise was developed to help homeowners create defensible space around their homes in the event of a wildfire. The program teaches communities how to do hazard assessments and offers suggestions on how to reduce these hazards. There is grant funding available to help improve access routes, waster supplies, assists with debris clean-up and other community projects in order to reduce wildfire casualties.

I have trained the Brindle Ridge and Livingston Fire Departments

Both fire departments have been more than willing to participate in the program but there seems to be a lack of support from the community. A Firewise council, independent of the fire department, has to be established in order to oversee grant spending and community mitgation projects. Since no discernable distinction exists between marijuana grown or possessed tween marijuana grown or possessed with an intent to further intrastate versus interstate activity, enforce-ment of the Controlled Substances Act is weakened.

Given that the authority to regu-Given that the authority to regu-late commerce rests with the federal government and not the states, Cali-fornia or any other state has no au-thority to preclude enforcement of the Controlled Substances Act. Es-sentially, advocates of medicinal marijuana must look to Congress rather than the states for relief.



it would be any problem to get the money from KACO. However the problem is that neither the Brodhead council or the Rockeastel Fiscal Court would commit to paying a portion of the estimated \$490 monthly payment to repay the loan to KACO. KACO's current fixed interest rate over ten years is 4.22%. Brodhead council members asked city clerk Becky, Bussell to research bow much the fits veneda on

asked city clerk Becky Bussell to re-search how much the city spends on the fire department each month, be-fore they would make a decision. That was Monday night. On Tuesday, the Rockcastle Fis-cal Court also tabled the matter until

Brodhead made a decision.

Carloftis said he had suggested the fire department pay \$100 per month of the payment and that the city and fiscal court split the other \$309.

city and fiscal court split the other 5309.

Bussell said on Tuesday that the city currently pays \$6,521 a year on another fire truck and pays all other expenses for the department, including phone, electricity, gas for city runs and insurance.

Carloftis said the new truck could be used for city and county runs and that it was his understanding the truck would be put in the city's name so they could pay the insurance.

'I am for helping any fire department- these volunteers mean a lot to our county and I am certainly not showing any favoritism toward Brodhead," he said Tuesday morning.

If the new truck is purchased, it would give Brodhead four trucks in operation, but Chief Larry Taylor said Monday, the department planned to sell one of the trucks.

At the request of Mayor Walter Cash the council discussed the use of unlicensed whiches inside the city limits, such as Gators, four wheelers and golf carts.

City Attorney John Ford said he had researched the matter and that state law stated those crossing a two lane roadway on a non-licensed vehicle could do so at a 90 degree angle.



TTPP time is ticking away All tobacco quota holders and pro-All tobacco quota noiders and pro-ducers are being reminded that the deadline to sign-up for the USDA Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP), commonly referred to as the "Tobacco Buyout" is June 17,

"Sign-up is important for quota holders and producers so they can enroll in the tobacco program before upon 17, 2005, and be eligible to receive the first of tem payments," said efferty S Hall, State Executive Director. Eligible quota holders will receive 57 per pound based upon their basic quota at the 2002 marketing year level. Producers of quota will receive up to 53 per pound payment based on their share of the risk in the 2002, 2003, and 2004 crops of quota tobacco.
