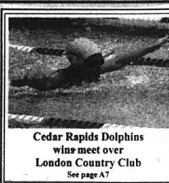

## Technology Center is moving when school starts

Technology in Rockcastle County is on the move, but this time the move is only a few blocks.

Four years ago, several local agencies and concerned businesses took the time, donated the money and contributed the brain power to help set up the Rockcastle County Technology Center.

The center is now located on the third floor of the Rockcastle County Courthouse, but when school starts August 10th it will no longer be at that location.

The new location will be at the Rockcastle Teaching and Learning Center, which is located across from the Rockcastle County Board of Education Central Offices on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

The technology center operates through the Center for Rural Development in Somerset and allows Internet based communications such as video conferencing, from locations all over the world.

"The Rockcastle County School System has been a major player in the technology center and we appreciate their cooperation in this endeavor," Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlifotis said Tuesday.

"Basically all we did was provide the space for the center and we the court will now decide what we are going to do with the area," Carlifotis added.

There will be music, singing, and clogging starting at 2:00 p.m. The fireworks display will begin at dawn.

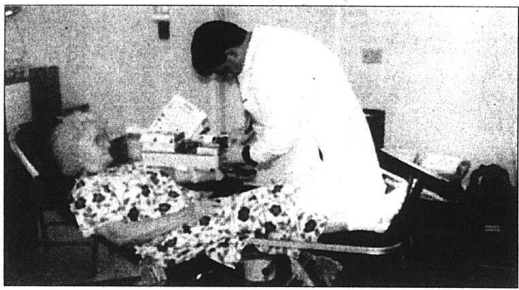

## Personnel actions main topic of business at board meeting

The Rockcastle County Board of Education's regular monthly meeting lasted only one hour last Tuesday, with very few items of business being discussed.

The main items discussed were the personnel actions of Superintendent Larry Hammond.

Rockcastle County Middle School assistant principal William Parsons was hired as assistant director of special education, a district wide position.

Also, hired in certified positions were: Joneta Ellison, as a teacher at Brodhead Elementary School, Jessica Bohannon, science teacher at

RCMS, Marcus Reppert, social studies teacher at RCHS and Robin Bowman, as a learning/behavior disorder teacher at MVES and Brodhead.

Hammond also announced that he had hired Ken Shay Hopkins, a teacher at the Alternative School, as head girl's basketball coach at the middle school.

Other personnel matters taking place this week in the school system was the hiring of Chris Hendrickson as the new assistant principal at the middle school.

Hendrickson, who is currently the principal at the Alternative School,

will replace Parsons.

Hammond said the recommendation to hire Hendrickson came on Monday afternoon.

Another assistant principal position is still open, but applications are no longer being accepted.

Hammond said Tuesday was the deadline for the assistant principal's job at RCHS, which was left vacant by the retirement of Betty Jo McKinney.

Hammond said all applications for the job had been forwarded to Principal John Hale, but that it was his understanding that no interviews had been scheduled.

Hammond said several local educators had applied for the position and that it was the school district's policy to always give a local applicant, the edge, if they were as well

## New committee may help with future problems at Lake Linville

Representatives from various agencies and interests participated in a monthly workshop at the USDA service center last Thursday to discuss the county's water problem.

The very informative meeting's primary objective was to come up with strategies in conserving and protecting Lake Linville to prevent future problems.

In the past several months a lot of complaints about the quality of the water, and especially the smell and taste, have been received by the city of Mt. Vernon.

In seeking prevention of future complications, the participants in the workshop identified past problems.

Local Master Conservatorist, Randall Templeman brought in pictures from around the lake which showed serious threats to the lake's conservation.

The panel agreed that the growth of Blue Green Algae is undoubtedly the source of past problems. The algae, in and of itself, is not known to be harmful, but when it's treated it puts off a distinct smell and taste.

The algae, like any living organism, needs nutrients to survive. These nutrients are being fed into the lake from loose soil that is a result of poor construction planning, agricultural run-off, animal waste, faulty septic systems, and the obvious severe erosion. Speed boats driving up and down the small lake, at excessive speeds, are also contributing to the problem.

Zach Gentry, from the Rockcastle County Conservation District, said that due to the increased rainfall the past few years, nutrients are pouring into the lake feeding the growth and development of the algae.

The poor construction planning eludes to the fact that after excavating dirt to build houses in Rainbow Ridge Subdivision, the contractors left the dirt in large piles. Weather elements then pushed the dirt down into the lake.

"At the present moment, the water should be getting a lot better," Gentry said. "The warm temperatures kill the algae." However, as fall and winter months approach, the problem is sure to return.

In attempting to control the problem and plan for future protection of the lake, the panel formed a watershed management team headed by Jake Stickeny of the Rockcastle Rural Water Association. Representa-

tives from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), the Farm Services Agency (FSA), the Extension Service, the Division of Water, U.S. Fish and Wildlife, Cumberland Valley Resource Conservation and Development and many local officials have also been named to the team.

The team will primarily try to prevent future problems through education. Their main focus will be educating watershed landowners as to what they can do to protect Lake Linville for generations to come, Gentry said. Currently Lake Linville is the main source of water for the county, pumping nearly 2 million gallons of water per day.

The next monthly meeting will take place on July 21st, at 9:00 a.m. at the USDA Service Center, which is located on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon.

The City of Mt. Vernon's second annual city wide yard sale will run Friday, July 1st through Monday, July 4th.

Mayor Clarence Kirby and the Mt. Vernon City Council also encourages everyone to visit the boat dock on Saturday, July 2nd, for music and a free fireworks display.

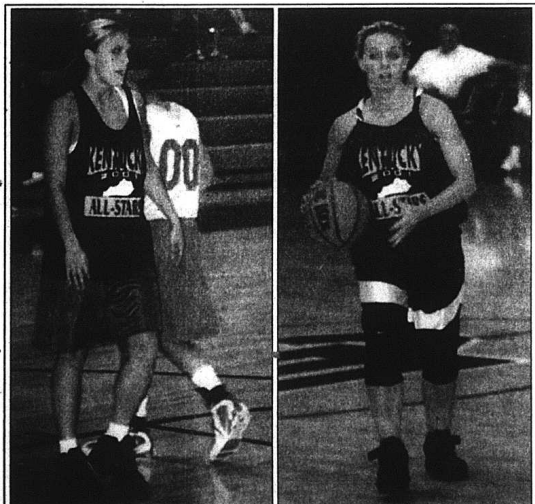
Yard sales will also be the subject of a public hearing next Thursday morning.

According to Mayor Kirby, the brief ordinance proposal is "3-3-3". The Mayor explained.

Three yard sales per year at the same physical address, a three day limit for each yard sale and a \$3.00 registration fee will be charged by the city.

## River Sweep a success

The Rockcastle River Sweep, held this past Saturday, has been labeled a success by organizers.

The event, sponsored by Appalachia-Science in the Public Interest (ASPI) and Eastern Kentucky Pride, was an all-day event in which the volunteers walked from the Old Wilderness Road in Livingston downstream several hundred yards.

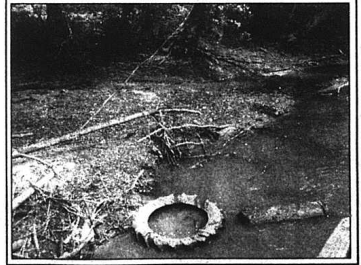
Deb Bledsoe, operations manager for ASPI, said the group removed seventy-eight tires from the river. However, there are still between 100 and 150 tires still left to clean out. Bledsoe said the ASPI and Eastern KY Pride will work diligently until the problem is licked.

Bledsoe credited the likely source for the excessive amount of tires in the river as historic dumping. "Most of the tires looked quite old and don't appear to be the result of any new illegal dumping," Bledsoe said.

Tires can last in water for decades because of their extreme resistance to biodegrade. As they decompose, they release compounds that are harmful to aquatic life.

## VIEW FROM THE BENCH Searching Cyberspace

Kentucky Attorney General Greg Stumbo and a state Grand Jury have presumably begun reviewing e-mails created by members of the Fletcher administration involved in the merit system practices of the Transportation Department. The merit system is designed to insulate many state government positions from political influence. Media accounts suggest

that thousands of electronic messages may be reviewed by investigators in addition to countless physical documents. The results of a search and review of electronically or digitally stored communications is nothing new for law enforcement. Yet many outside the law enforcement seem surprised that so much information can be so readily discovered and used in civil or criminal litigation.

No distinction exists between the type of communication—whether stored as a tangible item like a memorandum or business record, or as stored electronic data. Courts which are asked to review the propriety of the Attorney General's seizure and use of such records will apply basic constitutional principles. Both federal and state constitutions apply only to the government, a private individual who had access—even improperly—to sensitive communications could surrender them to an investigating authority.

Assuming a legitimate privacy interest does exist and no exception to the warrant requirement applies, retrieval of stored messages requires a search warrant supported by probable cause. Once a warrant is issued, however, the fight over surrendering such records does not end, as a legitimate claim may exist that some records are privileged.

Kentucky's attorney-client and work product privilege are designed to protect against the compelled disclosure of communications between attorneys and their clients or disclosure of legal strategy. An executive privilege may also exist for some electronic messages as was claimed during *Watergate* and addressed by the U.S. Supreme Court in *United States v. Nixon*.

Though these complicated issues are distilled here to their barest elements, any court tasked with reviewing the propriety of seized electronic communications must rely upon basic Constitutional principles created long before such things as Blackberries, e-mail, text messaging, or stored voice communication. In any event, each inquiry will be determined upon its own specific facts and subject to well established constitutional law.

The people shall be secure in their persons, houses, papers and possessions, from unreasonable search and seizure, and no warrant shall issue to search any place, or seize any person or thing, without describing them as probably as may be, nor without probable cause supported by oath or affirmation.

Kentucky Constitution, Section 10

At the outset, courts will determine whether the information sought is entitled to constitutional protection. If no legitimate expectation of privacy exists, the government is free to "seize" an item without a search

warrant. The issue of whether a right of privacy exists subsumes two issues: (1) is there a "subjective" expectation of privacy, and (2) is that expectation one which society accepts as reasonable? Both elements must be satisfied before constitutional protections apply.

If electronic messages were not treated as private, or if the expectation of privacy is unreasonable, law enforcement need no search warrant but may obtain the messages by grand jury subpoena. Hence, electronic messages between state employees using public equipment—which was also accessible by others—may not be entitled to constitutional protection.

Seizure of confidential messages may not occur absent a valid search warrant or unless an exception to the warrant requirement exists. The most likely exception is based upon consent. If one party to the communication voluntarily discloses the message to investigators, or if a party is authorized agent and grants investigators consent to search, no warrant is required. Moreover, since both federal and state constitutions apply only to the government, a private individual who had access—even improperly—to sensitive communications could surrender them to an investigating authority.

Assuming a legitimate privacy interest does exist and no exception to the warrant requirement applies, retrieval of stored messages requires a search warrant supported by probable cause. 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## Points East

Last weekend no fewer than five quarts of fresh picked strawberries crossed my threshold. And they were all of different varieties. Some as big as golf balls or larger and some as small as the last joint in your pointing finger.

All more or less locally grown if bordering counties count as local. And all delivered by well-meaning friends and relatives who apparently believe that I'm not eating enough berries these days.

And even though I try to be polite, the truth of the matter is that strawberries do not rank very high on my food chain. Everybody else in the family loves them but I have them ranked just below thistle blossoms as something I would eat to survive.

When I was in the early years of grade school, maybe eight or nine years old, my Dad decided to get into the strawberry growing business. Any place on our hillside farm that was unsuitable for growing corn and beans, he set out in strawberry plants. Thousands of strawberry plants.

Strawberry plants that had to be weeded, starting in late February, mulched with straw, and tended almost daily. Strawberry plants that required tons of 0-20-20 fertilizer broadcast by hand out of five gallon oak buckets.

Guess who was deeply involved after school and on weekends spreading that straw and lugging bucket after bucket of granular fertilizer and tending it about. While other kids were playing basketball or tossing horseshoes, I stayed knee deep in strawberry patches.

Early on, Dad learned from somebody that geese would not eat a strawberry plant but they would pick the other weeds clean as a whistle.

We used to go to Perry County and borrow two or three dozen geese early in March. They would eat the weeds and deposit the droppings back in the form of raw manure.

About the time the berries started blooming, we'd load the geese back up and take them home to Mace's Creek. They'd be fat and covered full of down but the ganders were evil and catching them meant bruises and sometimes blood-letting bites on our legs. The women on Mace's Creek would pick off the down feathers and stuff them into quilts or pillows. It was a great trade and actually the only fun I ever had associated with strawberries had to do with teasing geese.

School was usually out about the end of May and always on a Friday. We got that weekend off. The next week was daylight to dark working out the vegetable gardens or hoeing out the corn fields. Every thing had to be weeded out because you know what was coming next.

I ate strawberries for breakfast, lunch and supper. After hours, I helped Mom make strawberry jam, can them whole, freeze them, and grade the last pickings for the year. Sleep eight hours and then get up and head back to the strawberry patch. No weekends off for three straight weeks. Dad either hauled them to market or peddled them in town as fast as we could pick them.

Then when school started again in the fall, strawberry jam sandwiches which even peanut butter didn't help. Strawberry cobbles for dessert three or four times a week.

Somewhere along the line I burned out on strawberries. But if I did have a patch, I'd borrow some geese to help me tend them.

Presently, many doctors consider anything over 160 too high. And it is not just your total cholesterol that matters. Your "good cholesterol," which is called HDL, is also very important in determining the risk of heart disease.

Why is the level getting lower all the time? Studies show that the risk of heart attacks from plugged arteries decreases right along with lowering the cholesterol level. For someone with a high level, lowering the cholesterol level by a single percent gives an increase in life expectancy.

The low density lipoprotein, or LDL, is one of the most important fractions of cholesterol to lower. If you lower the LDL enough, some of the changes and plugging of the arteries can actually be reversed. This is remarkable news and gives a person a great incentive to work hard on his diet.

The first step in lowering the cholesterol is to change your diet to healthier foods which are naturally low in cholesterol and saturated fats. This means limiting most red meats, eggs, liver, butter and other fats. Vegetable oils have no cholesterol, but coconut and palm oil are high in saturated fats which makes them no better for you than butter or lard. If a blood test reveals a high cholesterol, dieting alone may be enough to lower the cholesterol, but if necessary, your doctor can prescribe one of the many effective medicines that are available to improve your cholesterol profile.

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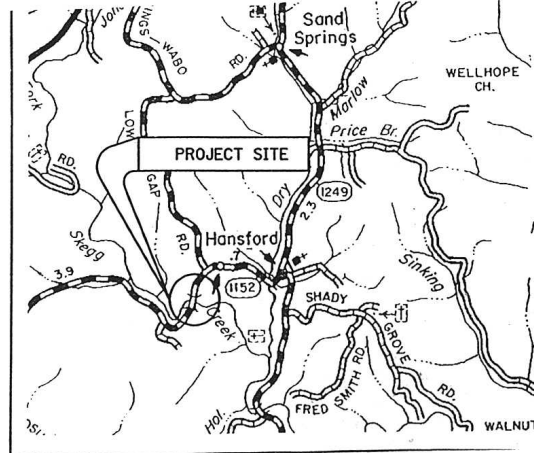

Sold items have been shipped to hundreds of people throughout the country. If the winning bidder lives close enough to CAP's warehouse in Lancaster, Kentucky, they pick the item up themselves; they pay a small handling fee but avoid shipping charges.

## Three Rockcastle teachers receive excellence awards from Campbellsville Univ.

Campbellsville University, in partnership with Lexington, Ky., CBS-affiliate WKYT-TV, presented 137 teachers with awards at the 19th annual Excellence in Teaching Awards Program Saturday, May 14 in the Student Activities Center on campus.

Dr. Frank Cheatham, CU vice president for academic affairs, addressed the teachers and guests of public and private school systems from 54 Kentucky school districts.

"There are four common characteristics of good teachers," Cheatham said: "knowledge of the subject, sound communication skills, a passion for teaching and a love for students."

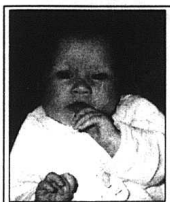

## Local library supporter visits Congress

Mary Congleton, medical librarian at the Southern Kentucky Area Health Education Center (AHEC) was among those urging Capitol Hill legislators to support libraries as part of National Library Legislative Day held in May in Washington, D.C.

## Boundary Fencing

Agriculture and Natural Resources

Rockcastle County Extension Office

2005 Phase I funds will be invested in a Livestock Boundary Fencing Improvement Cost-Share program. State guide lines specify property boundary or roadway boundaries. When fenced, farmers must show an increase in the number acres available for pasture as well as a number of cattle on the farm. Phase I fencing funds are to help improve farm income by providing livestock containment, thus increasing herd size or carrying capacity.

Fencing can be barbed wire, woven wire or high tensil permanent fence. All post must be pressure treated wood or metal.

Applications will be accepted at the Extension Office until June 30th. A survey will be used to score each application, forming a ranking system. Farmers will be notified in late July if their applications have ranked high enough in the funding cycle. All funds will be dispersed to approved applicants on a reimbursement basis following project completion and submission of receipts. Reimbursement will not exceed \$1 per foot or \$25000 per farm.

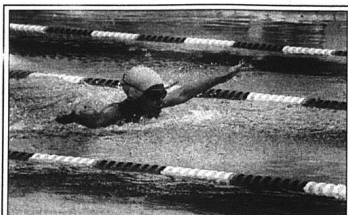

## Higher fees will take effect July 1

There are changes coming at the Rockcastle courthouse.

Effective next Friday, (July 1) changes will take place in County Clerk Norma Houk's office and Circuit Clerk Teresa Vanzant's office.

In Mrs. Houk's office, the changes involve the transfer of vehicles from one owner to another and have to do with a title only transfer.

According to the new state law, sales tax will be collected at the time of a title only transfer.

The customer must present an "Affidavit of Non-Highway Use" Mrs. Houk said.

The customer must also have a receipt signed by the seller stating the year, the make, the serial number and the sale price of the vehicle. Sales tax will be charged at six percent of that sale price amount.

Mrs. Houk said there are exemptions from the sales tax.

1. Occasional sale. If a customer has not had more than two transfers in a twelve month period, the new law will not affect them.

2. Dealers with a resale certificate will not be affected and non profit organizations, such as the county, school system and local churches, who have a purchase exemption certificate, will also not be affected.

Mrs. Houk also said on title only transfers the customer must turn in the license plate to her office at the time of the transfer. "If the customer does not have the plate, he must sign a sworn affidavit that the plate is lost, stolen or state why he or she does not have the plate," Houk said.

Some of the changes in Vanzant's office, include the price of Kentucky Driver's license, which will increase to \$20 from the current \$8.

However those whose driver's license expire in 2005, will be able to renew them for \$8 prior to July 1st.

Other fees include \$30 instead of \$18 for dual licensed drivers and duplicate licenses will increase from \$6 to \$12.

The fee for learner's permits will increase to \$12 and it will also cost \$12 to obtain a picture identification card from the clerk's office.

Thousands of young people are currently playing T-ball, coaches' pitch, little league, Babe Ruth league, softball and other forms of the national pastime. Men and women will be giving a tremendous number of volunteer hours over the next months working as coaches, umpires, ticket and concession salespersons and league officials. Without them these baseball leagues could not exist. To the workers I say, "Thank you!"

Baseball can be both fun and a learning experience for young people. New skills and added self-confidence can be acquired. Why then does baseball sometimes turn into a destructive experience for children that lowers their self-esteem and makes them afraid to try anything new?

We parents and coaches are to blame for that. Something happens when we get to the ballpark that turns us from loving parents into raving lunatics who yell insults at our children and embarrass ourselves and them. Maybe we are reliving our childhoods through Junior. Maybe we don't want to be embarrassed by our children. Maybe we get our own egos involved and don't want to be known as a "losing" coach. Whatever the reason the verbal abuse needs to stop because we are damaging our young people. We do not intend to hurt the children but that is the ultimate result of our verbal attacks.

I remember one little league coach who shouted at the third baseman (who was 10), "Get your head in the game! Don't make a stupid play like that!"

The player had thrown the ball into right field instead of to second base as he intended. The coach seemed not to understand how a ten-year-old could make that kind of mistake.

Not long afterward I was watching an Atlanta Braves game when their third baseman threw a certain double-play ball into right field. He missed the second baseman by a wider margin than that did the ten-year-

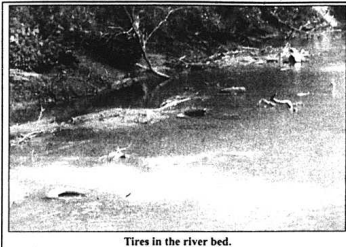

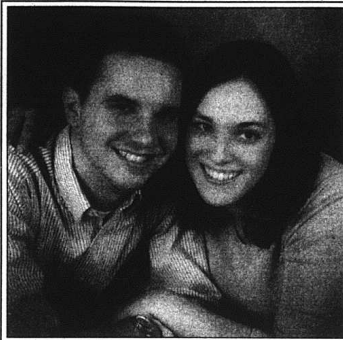

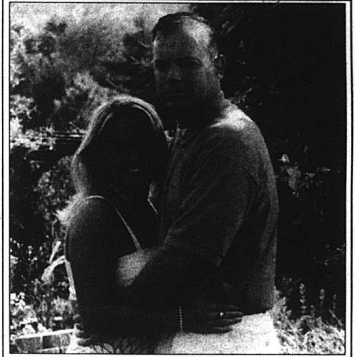

### Phase II payments on the way

Governor Fletcher has announced that the Kentucky 2004 Phase II Tobacco Settlement payments will be mailed the week of June 20th. The Kentucky 2004 Phase II payment made by the state to nearly 164,000 tobacco growers and quota holders is in lieu of the payment they should have received from the tobacco companies in early January of this year.

During the 2005 Session, Governor Fletcher and the General Assembly worked to provide \$114 million to ensure Kentucky producers received a 2004 Phase II payment. In addition, the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative has provided \$10 million to bring the total payment to Kentucky farmers to \$124 million. To date, no other state has stepped forward to provide their producers with a 2004 Phase II payment. Also,

Governor Fletcher JOBS for Kentucky tax modernization plan that the 2004 Phase II supplemental payment will be exempt from the state income tax, including the portion provided by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is accepting nominations through August 1st for candidates who are eligible to serve on the local Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Committee. USDA encourages farmers to nominate and make a difference!

County committees play an integral role in the local implementation of FSA programs. FSA encourages all producers, community-based groups and others who care about American agriculture to participate in the county committee election process by nominating eligible candidates, especially minorities and women.

To be an eligible candidate, a person must participate or cooperate in an FSA program, be of legal voting age and live in the county or area where the election is being held. Individuals may nominate themselves or others as candidates. In addition, eligible candidates can be nominated by community-based organizations, especially groups representing socially disadvantaged (SDA) farmers, before the close of the nomination period. Nominations and elections are open to all eligible candidates and voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, marital status or disability. FSA is committed to promoting diversity in local county committees so all producers, including minority, female and other under-represented people, have a say in how the Agency's programs are administered locally.

The deadline to submit nomination forms is August 1, 2005. For more information about FSA county committees or to obtain a nomination form, visit your local FSA county office or go online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/publications/elections>.

**Crop acreage reporting**  
Producers who participate in the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), Loan Deficiency Program (LDP) or request a commodity loan are required to file a FSA - 578, Crop Acreage Report. FSA program participation depends on accurate acreage reports.

Beginning in crop year 2005, producers will be required to provide planting dates on each field for all crops. If you have a crop that has not been planted by the final reporting date, the report must be filed by 15 calendar days after the planting is completed to be timely filed.

**Account changes**  
If you make any changes in your bank account or change banks notify FSA immediately to ensure payments reach your account timely. Payments can be delayed if we are not aware of changes to your account or routing numbers.

**Sales and purchases of land**  
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership.

Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address. REMEMBER: FSA's records are only as current as producers provide. **Farm Loan Program**  
The FSA Farm Loan Representative with concern to FSA loans (farm, operating, youth and etc.) will be in Rockcastle County at the Rockcastle FSA office the first and third Thursday of each month from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

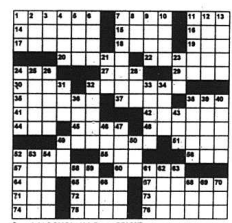
