A 16-month-old Rockcastle County infant died early Thursday morning after a mobile home fire in the Red Hill section.

According to Livingston fire chief Sam Stallworth, at about 1:10 a.m.

## Hearing is set for today

Yard sales will be the subject of a public hearing Thursday (today) in Mt. Vernon.

The City of Mt. Vernon is holding the hearing, which begins at 10 a.m. at City Hall.

According to Mayor Clarice Kirby, briefly the ordinance proposal is "3-3-3".

Her definition of 3-3-3: Three yard sales per year at the same physical address, a three day limit for each yard sale and a \$3.00 registration fee, which will be charged by the city.

The ordinance was the recommendation of a workshop made up of council members. The workshop was formed by Mayor Kirby after several complaints had been received concerning constant, ongoing yard sales in the city limits.

A copy of the summary ordinance appears on the classified pages of this week's newspaper.

Beginning Friday, the city will host its second annual city wide yard sale, which will run through Monday.

Anyone wishing to have a space reserved for free set-up in the city parking lot beside the railroad tracks may call City Hall at (606) 256-3437.

Livingston firefighters were called to the mobile home of Shelley Elise Looney on Hwy. 1955, four miles southeast of Livingston.

According to Stallworth, the fire began in the living room, where a bed and a recliner were situated.

Rockcastle Sheriff's Detective Matt Bryant, said Looney, 27, was in the room where the fire started, but her son, Nathaniel Victor White, was in another room.

"Miss Looney said she tried to get to her son before firefighters arrived, but could not," Bryant said.

Stallworth said firefighters were on the scene in less than ten minutes and that firefighter Albert Carpenter used a breathing apparatus to get to the child. Stallworth, who also helped rescue the child, said the trailer was completely filled with smoke. "You had to feel your way through it," he said.

Stallworth said a helicopter was on the scene in approximately 30 minutes and the infant was flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center where he was pronounced dead around 3 a.m.

Bryant said it was not clear if either Looney or her child were injured when the fire broke out. "They lived there alone," Bryant said.

Looney ran to her grandparents home to call for help, which was located near her trailer.

Bryant said investigators suspect the fire might have been started by a cigarette because only the bed and the right arm rest of the recliner showed

## Mayor asks for water conservation

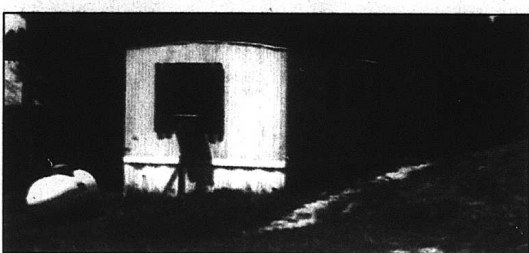
A drought has not been officially declared for Rockcastle County, but the county's largest supplier of water is officially asking for help.

## Fiscal Court passes \$3.5 million budget

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court spent just over an hour and a half on Friday, finalizing the 64 page, \$3.5 million budget for next fiscal year, which begins Friday and runs through June 30, 2006.

The court is budgeted just under \$2 million dollars in the general fund, \$976,000 in the road fund, \$875,000 in the jail fund, \$227,000 in the 911 fund, \$115,000 in the chemical stock-

## \$21,500 obtained for work at three local cemeteries

State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon and Senator Ed Worley, D-Richmond, announced last week that the Buckeye, Chestnut and Newcomb cemeteries in Mt. Vernon will receive a \$21,500 federal grant for maintenance work.

They both thanked Kentucky Governor Ernie Fletcher for making the federal funds available. "The funds will be used to preserve these historic cemeteries, where Civil War soldiers are buried," said Worley, who represents Rockcastle County.

The grant will be given to the Rockcastle Cemetery Board. "We want other people to know about these cemeteries and the soldiers who are buried there," said board member Bernice McFarlane. "We especially want our young people to be proud of our local history."

The board is going to use the money to put signs up on the road to direct people to the Buckeye Cem-

pile emergency preparedness program, \$70,000 in the local government economic assistance fund, \$25,500 in the Economic Development Fund, \$11,000 in the fairground fund, \$1,800 in the forestry fund and \$664 in the disaster and emergency services fund for contingency transfers.

Although the county currently has a fee pooling agreement with the local Sheriff's department, they did not include anything in their budget for the coming year.

The Sheriff's department budget is set up on a calendar year because property taxes are not collected until the fall of the year.

Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlisle told the fiscal court they could withdraw from the fee pooling agreement anytime and the only thing the court is obligated to pay is the Sheriff's salary.

Currently Sheriff Darrell Doan makes \$65,181 a year.

## Orlando man is victim of drowning

An Orlando man apparently drowned on Saturday afternoon in what is commonly known as Boat Dock Springs.

The local swimming hole, which is located on Crooked Creek near Mullins Station, is very popular during the summer swimming season.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell pronounced Jason Glenn Raider, 37, dead at the scene around 5:30 p.m.

Dowell said that preliminary autopsy results showed that Raider died from drowning.

Rockcastle County Sheriff's Detective Matt Bryant said the death was being investigated as an accidental drowning. "There was no bruising or any indication Raider had been harmed before the drowning," he said. "No foul play is suspected."

The detective said that no one actually saw Raider drown and the last one to see him alive was his girlfriend.

Bryant said a 14-year-old girl found Raider's body after it was realized he had not been seen for some time.

"Several people helped look for him and the girl managed to pull him to the bank where others helped get him out of the water. I think someone at the scene even performed CPR," Bryant said.

The detective said the drowning apparently took place in a few feet of water and that alcohol was apparently a factor.

## \$100,000 for agriculture

## 18 Indicted by grand jury

Indictments have been returned against 18 people for a variety of charges including several for trafficking in a controlled substance, by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Indictments were returned Friday against:

Rebecca Renee Bussell, 27, Patricia Nun Allen, 31, both of Rt. 3, Brodhead and Jewell Christopher, 46, of Craggs Creek Road, London, for Promoting Contraband, first degree, by knowingly introducing methamphetamine into the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Christopher was also indicted for Tampering With Physical Evidence.

Bail for Bussell and Allen was set at \$5,000 cash/property. Bail for Christopher was set at \$7,500/0%.

Three were indicted for Flagrant Non-Support. Arthur A. Bailey, 27, of 210 Floyd Street, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for failing to provide support for minor child/children in the amount of \$4,325.87; Samantha J. Dillingham, 35 of 350 Gum Sulphur Road, Crab Orchard, for non-support in the amount of \$7,091.29 and Clayton D. Cox, 30, of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon, for non-support in the amount of \$6,633.30.

Indicted for Assault, third degree, was Gerald W. Collier, 51, of 597 George Road, London. Collier was also indicted as a Persistent Felony Offender, second degree.

Clifton G. Hammond, 48, of Livingston was indicted on six counts -- Possession of a Controlled Substance (methamphetamine), Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Possession of Marijuana, Operating a Motor Vehicle Under the Influence of Alcohol/Drugs, No Insurance and Failure to Wear Seatbelt. Bail for

Hammond was set at \$10,000 cash/property.

Eric Gorodetsky, 37, of Plano, TX was indicted for Sodomy, first degree, for engaging in deviate sexual intercourse with a person under 12 years of age. Gorodetsky's bond was set at \$10,000 cash.

Nine persons were indicted for Trafficking in a controlled substance and Complicity to Trafficking.

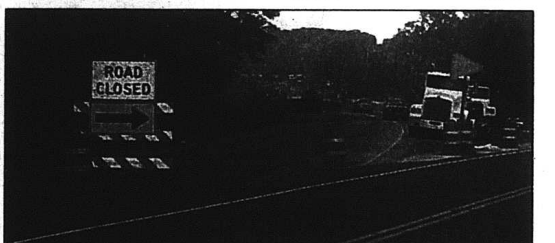
Named in the same indictment on both counts were: Melissa Wagers, 38, of 486 Grimes Road, London and Gary Day, 39, of Day Street in Brodhead. Bond for both Wagers and Day was set at \$5,000 cash/property.

Two from Mt. Vernon and three from Dayton, Ohio were named in the same indictment for Trafficking in a controlled substance. James E. Combs, 36, of 1918 Bluffcragg Inn, Mt. Vernon and Lois Denny, 28, of Valley View Apartments, Mt. Vernon were named in the indictment along with Robert D. Doolin, 23, Sheila D. Angel, 26 and Kevin R. Tinker, 21, all of Dayton, Ohio were also named in the indictment.

Bond for Combs was set at \$10,000 cash. Denny's at \$5,000 cash and bond for Doolin, Denny and Tinker was set at \$50,000 cash.

Also indicted for Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, first degree and Possession of a Controlled Substance was Timothy Gadd, 31, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon. Bond for Gadd was set at \$5,000 cash/property.

Doug James Jackson, 34, of Drafts Road, Berea who was named in the same indictment as Gadd, was charged with Complicity to Trafficking in a Controlled Substance, first degree and his bond was set at \$5,000



The widening of U.S. 25 in Renfro Valley is well underway with the demolition of the old bridge and a temporary two-lane bridge in place. **T.J.'s Narrative**

I thought that the whole purpose of a five-day weekend was to get away, rest, and relax. How come that on the following Monday morning, you're tired, worn out, and run down?

Stanley and I had a long weekend, and that was the case with us. We were going to Stanley's cousin Steve's and his fiancé, Garella's wedding in Hamilton, Ohio on Saturday night. We left about 6 AM Friday morning.

The Dead Sea Scrolls and the Bible. The history of the Bible Exhibit, called "Ink & Blood", was on display in Lexington in Heritage Hall. It was open for the first day at nine o'clock that Friday. Stanley and I were among the first four people to see the exhibit.

Some of the exhibit's curators were still on hand setting up various displays. All of the displays are enclosed in thick glass cubes, except for a few that were still being set up.

Remember one exhibit in particular. It was an ancient writing instrument of the Holy Land. There was genuine papyrus, a paper-like material made from pressed reeds from places like the Nile or Jordan Rivers. There were sharpened reeds that were used for actual writing by getting ink from an inkwell. These ancient writers used inkwells made of pottery or hand-blown glass. I remember seeing a small green glass hand-blown inkwell that seemed so fragile with paper-thin glass, but had lasted many, many centuries.

The chief curator, Dr. Noah, and others have found minute bone fragments inside these pottery inkwells. They theorize that these bone fragments may be the remains of animals the ancient Hebrews sacrificed daily to God, therefore, thus making the ancient Biblical text actually being written with the remains of the sacrifices. These pottery inkwells were from the time of Abraham. How many dynasties, kingdoms, and empires have come and gone since it was crafted?

The most fascinating articles on display were the actual fragments of

the Dead Sea Scrolls themselves. Could they be the actual reed scrolls of an ancient prophet or even Moses? Dedicated scholars of history and of the Bible have taken these fragments, some no larger than a postage stamp (and in some cases, much larger), and translated the cursive of writing, and miraculously it would fit perfectly into today's text of the Bible, word for word. What a faith-renewing experience. The Bible isn't a myth or fairy tale, as many claim. These fragments are truly the "original" text from such books as Genesis, Leviticus, and Isaiah.

There were displays of various Bibles, some in many languages. There were several Bibles. There was one Bible on display from centuries ago that there are only two in existence in the world, and another Bible on display where there are only seven in existence. There were rare Bibles on display because of serious printing errors. In one of the gospels, "Jesus" had been used where "Judas" should have appeared. Another Bible contained "Thou shalt commit adultery." Although popular among the masses, it was frowned upon by the religious "moral majority" of the day. We even saw a working replica of the Gutenberg printing press that made mass production possible, although slow and tedious by today's standards. It also made the Bible affordable to the public at large, thus the "Ink."

Also, there were short films and written words about such historical figures as Martin Luther, William Tyndale, and John Wyclif, who made it possible for everybody to have a Bible, the world's number one best-seller. Most of these men, as well as others whose only crime was owning a Bible, died for the cause. Thus the "Blood."

I have always wanted to visit the Holy Land, but I guess that this tour is as close as I'll get. It was truly a once in a lifetime experience. The exhibit will be in Lexington until the

**VIEW FROM THE BENCH**  
*The Race Card Shuffle*

In a strongly worded opinion the U.S. Supreme Court dealt a sharp blow last week to prosecutors who seek to purposefully exclude minorities from jury service for what are supposedly race-neutral reasons. The 1986 Texas death penalty case has Kentucky roots.

In a 5-4 decision, Justice S. Kennedy, the Supreme Court addressed the use of "peremptory" challenges to prospective jurors by local prosecutors. The use of "peremptory" challenges, or strikes, to exclude jurors from actually sitting as a juror during a particular trial. The first-called challenges for cause—may be used as often as necessary by lawyers to remove a juror who is not qualified to serve because of residency, age or similar factors, and is unpwilling to apply the law or to impartially consider the evidence.

Peremptory challenges are limited by state law. Kentucky generally allows each prosecutor and defense counsel three peremptory challenges in district court trials, and eight each in circuit court trials. Historically,

peremptory challenges may be used to excuse a prospective juror for any reason. Hence, attorneys frequently use peremptories to strike a juror who for some reason may not be sympathetic to their cause.

In the 1986 Kentucky case, the Supreme Court prohibited the use of peremptories to exclude racial minorities from jury service. Prosecutors in many states had historically used their peremptories to remove minorities from jury service in the misguided belief that racial minorities were less likely to convict defendants especially if of the same race, and were more likely to impose lenient sentences. The abuse of peremptories was magnified in capital cases. When confronted with this issue, the Supreme Court determined that this misuse of peremptory challenges violated not only a defendant's right to a fair and impartial jury, but the right of every citizen—whether a racial minority or not—to serve upon a jury.

As a result of the Kentucky case, prosecutors nationwide were required to announce race-neutral reasons for using peremptory challenges to strike minority jurors. For years afterward, however, many less-than-forthright prosecutors used "sham" or pre-textual reasons to justify dis-

missing a juror. In the 1986 Kentucky case, the Supreme Court prohibited the use of peremptories to exclude racial minorities from jury service. Prosecutors in many states had historically used their peremptories to remove minorities from jury service in the misguided belief that racial minorities were less likely to convict defendants especially if of the same race, and were more likely to impose lenient sentences. The abuse of peremptories was magnified in capital cases. When confronted with this issue, the Supreme Court determined that this misuse of peremptory challenges violated not only a defendant's right to a fair and impartial jury, but the right of every citizen—whether a racial minority or not—to serve upon a jury.

Any tomato I may have had for ripe tomato on July 4th were shattered late last Sunday.

Daughter Jennifer Ochs is very pregnant, you see, and the only way she likes tomatoes is fried when they are green. Combine that with the craving that goes along with pregnancy and you can imagine the guilt I would have felt if she had seen green tomatoes hanging on the vines in my garden while I selfishly refused to pick them.

And I wouldn't have done so for anyone else on the planet. On the other hand, you can't just pick one or two tomatoes and fry them up for just one person and leave everybody else at the table drooling.

Sister-in-law, Helen York, was also here for dinner along with white wine, and more than enough to fry them up for just one person and leave everybody else at the table drooling.

So I decided it would be whole hog or none and I set about selecting the eight largest tomatoes on my early plants, all about the size and shape of tennis balls along with baby zucchini's, baby golden crookneck squash and our first banana peppers.

Boston Bib lettuce, green onions, cauliflower, broccoli and straight-8 cucumbers, all from the garden made a wonderful salad.

We had already had snow peas and the salad stuff for over a week, but I can truthfully tell you that our Sunday evening meal alone, made all the effort I've put into gardening this spring more than worthwhile.

Loretta is the master of the kitchen when it comes to frying fresh veggies. For fried green tomatoes, she uses a couple of three of cups of corn meal, half a cup flour, a dash of two salt and a healthy dose of fresh ground black pepper and tosses

that about in a mixing bowl. She mixes a cup of milk, an egg and a splash of white cooking wine up in a serving dish. Green tomato slices about 1/4 inch thick are first dipped in the liquid mixture, then tossed about until they are well coated in the dry mix and fried in butter at medium heat until they are golden brown on both sides.

I doubt that there is any way to improve that recipe unless you add a little wine to the butter while they are frying.

For the squash, broccoli, cauliflower, cukes and banana peppers she uses a cup or so of Bisquick, half as much cornmeal, a liberal dose of Italian seasoning, a little salt and several twists on the pepper mill. Then she stirs in enough milk, a splash of white wine, to bring the batter to a consistency about like what you would use for pan cakes. Dip the veggies in the batter so they are well coated. She fries these in canola oil at medium-high heat until the batter browns--a couple of three minutes each on both sides is all it takes.

This also works for lichen eggplant, green peppers, cucumbers, snow peas, roma beans, cauliflower, broccoli, etc.

Or use fresh herbs like basil, organo, rosemary, thyme, chives or garlic blossoms if you have them. Instead of using dry herbs in the batter, sauté fresh herbs in the oil before cooking the veggies. For a southwestern taste, use fresh cilantro and a bit of cayenne. The possibilities on varying the tastes are unlimited.

There are two tricks involved here. The first is to pick the veggies

**Gout Causes a Painful Arthritis**

Gout is a disease which develops when needle-like crystals form in joints. This causes a very painful arthritis. Gout attacks have a fairly sudden onset, causing red, warm, excruciatingly painful joints overnight. Even the weight of the bed sheets on the joint can be very painful.

These crystals develop because of a high level of uric acid in the blood. The uric acid can precipitate out as crystals in the joints as well as in the kidneys and other tissues.

Although the attack is sudden and severe, it is also self-limiting, lasting 7-14 days in most cases. Only a single joint is affected most of the time, usually at the base of the great toe. Other commonly involved joints include the ankles, knees, wrists, and fingers. A variety of pain pills are very helpful in treating the acute symptoms. After an attack has resolved, medicines can be started which work by lowering the uric acid level. Some will lower the body's production of the uric acid and others will help the body excrete it more quickly.

Without taking these preventative medicines, a person is likely to have recurrences of gout. Treatment also helps limit the chance of damage to the kidneys from uric acid deposits.

Gout usually begins in middle-aged men. Women are protected and seldom develop any episodes of gout until after menopause. Gout is more common in people who are overweight, have high blood pressure, diabetes, or use alcohol.

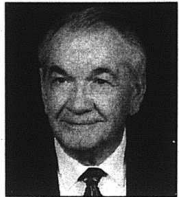

criminary strikes.

Last week in Miller-El v. Texas, the Supreme Court imposed a much heavier burden on trial judges to ensure that a non-discriminatory basis actually exists when an attorney appears to be engaging in race based prosecutory strikes. Miller-El had been charged and convicted of a brutal robbery-murder. At trial, prosecutors used their prosecutory challenges against 10 otherwise qualified black jurors - 91% of the eligible black jury pool. Miller-El's objections to this apparent discrimination were rebuffed by the trial and appellate courts.

The U.S. Supreme Court, however, rejected the proffered reasons. Chief Justice Rehnquist and noted that prosecutors accepted white jurors who were similarly situated. The Court also noted that prosecutors apparently used a Texas invention referred to as the "shuffler" to move black jurors who were coming up for consideration to the back of the jury line, thereby precluding the consideration of black jurors from actual service in Miller-El's death penalty trial.

As a result of last week's decision, prosecutors may not now view a Batson challenge as a mere excuse to exercise their power of creative

thinking to establish a race-neutral justification for a prosecutory peremptory. When assessing a prosecutor's challenge of a minority—where a defendant has raised a Batson challenge—trial courts must now determine the realistic plausibility of the prosecutor's non-racial justification. Hopefully, such abuses will now be curbed. Use of racially based procedures within our courts harm not only the minorities directly impacted, but the integrity of the judiciary.

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## Rainbow Ridge problem has been resolved...

Dear Editor,  
As part owner of Rainbow Ridge, I was greatly concerned to learn that our land may have contributed to the city's water problems.

Our land situation is resolved and we have complied with federal requirements which also meet state requirements. Our situation is relatively current (five years). The problem with the lake has been building for 35 years (lake's age).

Septic systems were mentioned - old ones around the lake road which were placed before strict regulations were instituted may be a problem. The new ones in Rainbow Ridge are approved and inspected several times by the state and meet all requirements. Mayor Kirby has intimated these are a problem but the state says they are fine.

Both the city and county benefit from the high taxes paid by the owners of the twenty or so houses at Rainbow Ridge. The taxes on an \$85,000 house is higher than taxes on a \$12,000 house lot!

I am not educated in lake/outdoor nature matters, but those "in the know" (those who use this lake or others extensively and who have good local country wisdom), say:

1) Although it is not sanitary, when one drinks the water directly from the lake, it does not taste bad. So a large part of the problem must be the filtering system.

2) The lake is too shallow as a result of natural build-up over the years.

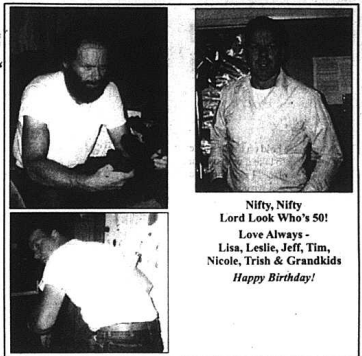

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# Local students compete at National History Day

## Two groups win national award

From June 11-16, 14 Rockcastle County Middle and High School students traveled to College Park, Maryland for National History Day Competition. This was the second year in a row that students from Rockcastle County schools qualified to compete at this national competition. This year, all the projects won first place at the state level with one group bringing home a special award. Jessica Simmons and Melinda Thomason competed in the Senior Group Performance with *Helen Keller: Through the Years*. This was the second year in a row for three of these girls to compete at the national level. They are all to be commended for their mature and professional behavior while competing during the week.

National History Day celebrated its 25th anniversary this year. NHD is a student centered history program with yearly themes and allows students to do in-depth research on specific topics then present their research in one of four categories. Students can win monetary awards, among other awards, at national competition, ranging from \$500 to \$1000 as well as partial to full scholarships to the Universities of Maryland and Hawaii. To compete at the national level, students must place first or second at state competition and work in the early summer to prepare for the national contest. It was truly a great honor to be given the chance to participate again this year.

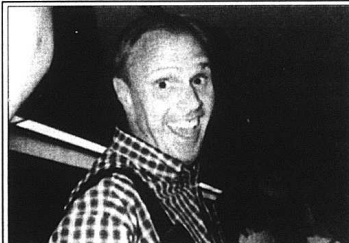

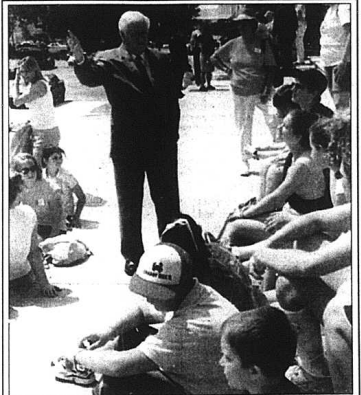

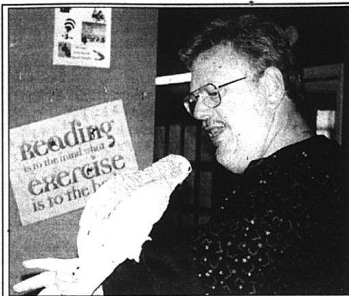

## Eight track athletes named All-State Hammond wins five athlete of the year awards in track

The honors keep coming for several members of the RCHS track and field team. Recently, several athlete of the year awards have been announced, as well as selections for first and second team all-state.

RCHS track and field standout and Western Kentucky University signee Heather Hammond has dominated the post-season awards thus far. She was recently named the 2005 Female Sprinter of the Year by KYTrackXC.com. Heather was named the 2005 Female Track and Field Athlete of the Year by the Herald-Leader and was recognized during half-time of the Kentucky-Tennessee All-Star football game held at Papa John's Stadium in Louisville. Seven other RCHS track and field athletes also shared all-state honors with Heather, giving the team an RCHS track record of eight in one season.

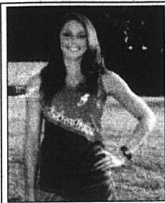

Morgan Thacker, who will be a sophomore this upcoming season, was named second team all-state in long jump after a number two ranking during the regular season and a fourth place finish at state.

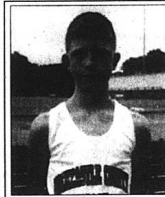

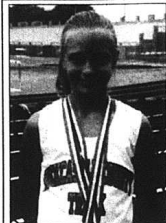

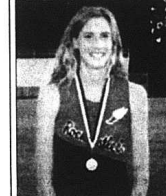

She dominated the competition, easily winning the AAU state championship title in the event and the gold medal, defeating her nearest competitor by nearly two feet with an unbelievable jump of 1'38".

Samantha was equally impressive in the triple jump competition. With another great series of jumps, Samantha easily won the AAU state title in the event and another gold medal. Her performance of 27'4" was

one of her best this season.

This past track season, Samantha played a very important role on the RCMS and RCHS teams that finished as state runners-up in the Middle School and Class 2A State Championships. She also ran on the 400-meter relay team that established a new RCHS record at the state championships and finished sixth overall.

Dustin Smith, who will be a seventh grader at RCMS this upcoming season, got his first taste of summer competition while competing in both the 100 and 200-meter dashes. Dustin performed exceptionally well in both events. In the 100, Dustin finished sixth overall with a new personal best time of 14.8 seconds.

Dustin performed equally as well in the 200-meter dash that followed later in the competition. He blazed his way to another personal best effort of 31.83 seconds and an impressive eighth place finish overall. Both Samantha and Dustin will skip the regional AAU meet and set their sites on the Bluegrass State Games at the end of July.

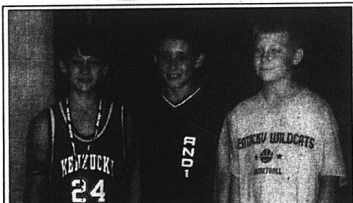

**Water Recreation: Play It Safe & Healthy**  
Water play can provide hours of recreation for families. However, we all need to play it safe when taking part in activities involving water. Drowning kills more than 1,000 children ages 14 and under each year. It is the leading cause of accidental death for children younger than five in the United States. For every child who drowns, another 20 go to the hospital or emergency room after nearly drowning. In addition to drowning, swimming and playing in contaminated water can cause illness.

**Water Safety**  
• Do not leave young children alone near water, not even with other children, not even for a second. Children can drown in only a couple of inches of water.

• If you have or use a pool, watch children under age 12 at all time. Make sure they walk-not run on the pool deck.

• Surround all pools, hot tubs, and spas with a fence at least 5 feet high. The fence should have a self-closing, self-latching gate. It's important that the fence is one that children cannot climb. Don't think of your home as part of the fence, because children can open doors to get to the pool. Never leave furniture near the fence that would enable a child to climb over the fence.

• Keep the pool area locked when not in use.

• Take all toys out of the pool area after swimming so children won't go back into the water to retrieve them.

• Learn to swim.  
• Keep rescue equipment by the pool—shepherd's hook, safety ring and a rope.

• Remember that floating toys like water wings and air mattresses are not substitute for a life vest, or for adult supervision.

• Don't swim during lightning storms

• Keep electrical appliances away from the pool.

• Learn CPR.

• Above ground pools are usually not deep enough for diving.

• Boat engines give off dangerously high levels of carbon monoxide. Avoid swimming, rafting, surfing, or skiing too close to a boat engine. Be cautious when boats are parked in groups or idling near each other.

Parents should never be lured into thinking that their child is safe near the water, even if the child has had swimming or water instruction and don't let a pool fence give you a false sense of security. The pool fencing alone is not enough to prevent drowning. There is no substitute for supervision.

**Waterscapes Growing Landscape Features**  
 While many a nice yard may have a swimming pool or a hot tub, a growing number of yards are sporting new waterfalls and ponds filled with koi, goldfish, and water lilies.

Maybe this is only a current rage, but I believe it reflects the need of a generation that is growing older and wanting to find it's roots and get back to nature and the wilderness. Rather than pack up and move far from the conveniences of the city, a lot of folks are "getting back to nature" by bringing those features in nature they like to their homes or in near cities. Trees, shrubs and rocks are standard in a lot of landscaped yards. Waterfalls, streams and ponds are highlights in the landscape of a growing number of folks.

Perhaps it's the phenomenon known as "cocooning" (staying at home and spending leisure time with family and friends) that is responsible for the trend to create and enjoy "paradise" at home instead of visiting some crowded tourist destination. Waterscapes are a rapidly growing part of this recreating at home trend.

Some homeowners who desire a waterscape hesitate for fear of upkeep. Others for initial cost. But you can have a high-quality low-maintenance waterscape, including pond, waterfall, maybe a stream, for less than the pool or hot tub. And it is likely to provide even more frequent enjoyment.

Considering what it costs for a

weeks vacation at some amusement park or mountain cabin or beach condo, for a growing number of homeowners investing travel dollars at home makes real good sense. And the enjoyment is substantial and often not just at vacation time!

An aquascape may be more care free than you think. A well-built pond with a waterfall, a skimmer, filter, no visible pond rubber, and with clear water may require only a couple minutes per week. (And just a falls with pond filled with pea gravel is almost totally free of upkeep!)

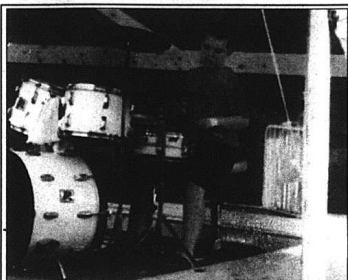
Adding the soothing sounds of water to the landscape has never been more attractive.

First, consider a few pointers; where do you like to spend time outside, what about views from inside, the layout of the land (it's harder to get water to run uphill). Will you enjoy it more if it adjoins a deck or a patio or a gazebo? Or would you like your waterfall out front where everyone would see it?

Take your time as you think about a waterscape at your place. Improper construction or making too small a pond usually leads to re-doing it on down the road.

So whether you do it yourself or hire a professional, you'll find adding water to your yard will enhance the quality of the time you spend outside and away from the retrace. I say "happy pondering" in your paradise.

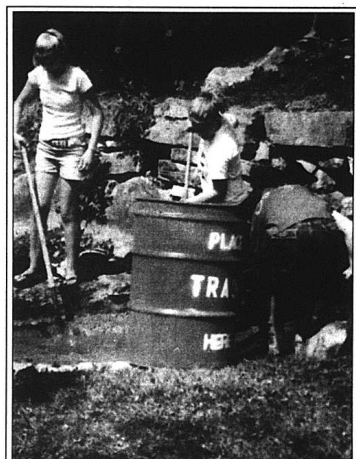

# Balancing food and physical activity

The food and physical activity choices you make everyday affect how you feel today and impact your health in the future. You can feel better today and stay healthy for tomorrow by eating well and enjoying an active life.

The 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans encourage us to make smart food choices from all food groups, to find the balance between food consumption and physical activity and to get the most nutrition out of your calories.

The new guidelines recommend eating at least two cups of fruit and two and a half cups of vegetables each day. They advise getting three cups a day of low fat or fat free milk, yogurt or cheese. The guidelines tell consumers to focus on whole grains and lean protein.

Eating more dark green vegetables like broccoli, greens and spinach as well as orange like carrots, pumpkin and sweet potato will help you get the most nutrition out of your calories.

Regular physical activity is impor-

tant to your overall health and can be the most important way to achieve a healthy weight. About 60 minutes of physical activity is needed each day by most adults to lose weight or maintain weight loss. Most adults should be active at least 30 minutes a day and children and teenagers about 60 minutes.

The increased use of cars, televisions and computers has created an environment where it is easy to move too little for good health. You can begin your quest for a more active life by starting where you are now. Try working daily activity into your routine by parking further from the building and taking the stairs instead of the elevator.

### Swim Advisories

Each year, the Kentucky Division of Water and the Health and Family Services issues necessary swim advisories for the state. A swim advisory indicates that people should avoid swimming and other recreational contact with water. Swim advisories are most often issued because of the presence of high levels of fecal coliform bacteria, which is found in human and animal waste.

The bacteria indicate that organisms that can cause infectious disease may be present in the water. To find out if a swim advisory is in effect in your area, contact your local Health Department or the Kentucky Division of Water at (502) 564-3410 or on line at [www.waterky.gov](http://www.waterky.gov).

The Summer brings lots of fun water activities so always know where your children are. Maintain constant eye contact and never, never, never leave a child unattended even for a second.

# Hotter temperatures can be dangerous to our bodies

The arrival of summer typically brings the warmest temperatures of the year to Eastern Kentucky. The mountains, abundance of trees and large lakes found in our part of Kentucky usually preclude us from facing the sweltering heat of the western portion of the state, but as the old saying goes, "It's not the heat but the humidity". At times, we have our share of both.

Humidity combined with excessive heat makes the effect much more dangerous to the body. On average, about 175 Americans succumb to the taxing demands of heat every year. Our bodies dissipate heat by varying the rate and depth of blood circulation, by losing water through the skin and sweat glands, and as a last resort, by panting, when blood is heated above 98.6°F. Sweating cools the body through evaporation. However, high relative humidity retards evaporation, robbing the body of its ability to cool itself.

When heat gain exceeds the level the body can remove, body temperature begins to rise, and heat related illnesses and disorders may develop. This includes heat stress, heat exhaustion, and the very dangerous and potentially fatal, heat stroke. You need to be aware of when you are beginning to approach trouble in dealing with the heat. Often, as heat stress begins to affect the body, there is a noticeable lack of energy. The air feels hot and heavy to breathe. Your face will often feel very hot, sometimes a pulse is noticeable through your forehead and temples. Your body is trying to tell you to cool off now, before core body temperatures climb higher. Ignoring these early symptoms will lead to nausea, impaired judgment, dizziness, skin becoming cool and moist to the touch, weak and rapid pulse - all signs of heat exhaustion. Without intervention and cooling the body, progression to heat stroke, with a very high death rate, will follow.

Anyone can suffer from heat related illnesses, but by taking a few simple precautions, they can be prevented. First, keep informed with the forecast, including information about the expected heat index. Condition yourself for working in hot environments; start slowly and build slowly to more physical work. Drink lots of liquids, but avoid caffeine and alcohol. Take frequent breaks, and if you start feeling overheated or getting a headache, cool off. Wear lightweight, light colored clothing when working in the sun, and take advantage of air conditioners.

The National Weather Service uses a "Heat-Index" to show the combined effects of heat and humidity on the human body. Similar to winter's wind chill equivalent temperature, the heat index is an indication of what the air actually feels like to exposed skin.

The National Weather Service will issue a Heat Advisory when the heat index reaches 105 or higher that will maintain at least 3 hours during the day...with a minimum heat index of 75 at night. An Excessive Heat Warning will be issued when the heat index is 110 degrees or higher during the day with a minimum heat index at night of 75.

As a general rule, when the heat index reaches the following values, here are the potential health problems:

80 to 90 degrees: Fatigue possible with prolonged exposure and physical activity.

90 to 105 degrees: Sunstroke, heat cramps and heat exhaustion possible.

105 to 130 degrees: Sunstroke, heat cramps, and heat exhaustion likely, and heat stroke possible.

130 degrees or greater: Heatstroke likely with continued exposure.

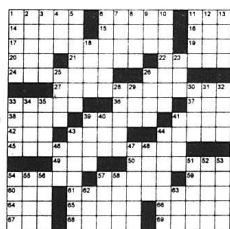

## Emergency exists for area blood supply

An emergency situation continues for Central and Eastern Kentucky's blood supply. According to Central Kentucky Blood Center officials, a tremendous demand for blood in June and lower than anticipated donations have combined to create a very severe shortage.

"Nearly 5,000 patients have benefited from life-saving transfusions so far this month and we expect that number to climb to well over 6,000 patients by the end of June," said Martha Osborne, Donor Services Director. "We simply can't keep up with the demand without strong support from caring individuals in our community."

The shortage has serious implications into the future because of the fast approaching 4th of July holiday weekend. Officials say trauma injuries from car, motorcycle and even boating accidents

can increase during an active holiday weekend.

"There is no substitute for human blood. It must be there when a trauma patient arrives at the hospital," Osborne said.

Healthy adults should make plans to donate blood as soon as possible at a local donor center or mobile blood drive.

There are two centers available for Rockcastle Counties -- one at 330 Waller Avenue in Lexington which is open Monday - Friday 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturday 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The center in Somerset is located at 120 South Highway 27, Suite 4 and is open Monday and Friday 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Tuesday and Thursday 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

severe burn marks. The bed was entirely consumed. Stallsworth said the rest of the trailer sustained mostly smoke damage.

A state fire marshal was also called to the scene.

Bryant said Looney had been drinking before the fire. He said this week that Looney had a blood alcohol level of 0.16 when she was admitted to the Rockcastle Hospital after the fire.

Water's tank ran the entire weekend and we are having trouble getting enough water to our tanks from the water plant, to serve all of our customers," she said.

"Yes, there is plenty of water in the lake, but getting it to where it is supposed to go is a 24/7 operation at the current time," she said.

Kirby is asking customers to use water for only the most necessary things.

She is asking for customers to limit sprinkler use, car washing, pool fill ups, etc.

"No one that sells you water wants to have to put in place mandatory measures, but if we don't get some measurable amounts of rain soon it's a possibility," the Mayor said.

So far in May and June only 4 and a half inches of rain has been recorded.

Local weatherman Bud Cox said the mercury has reached 89 degrees

and higher six days in June and precipitation has been recorded only ten times.

The most rain fell on June 7th, when 1.64 inches was recorded with .05 inches or less recorded on five of those ten days.

In May of last year, over seven inches of rain fell.

The low recorded temperature was 50 degrees on the 17th.

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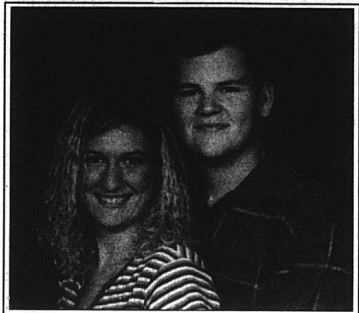

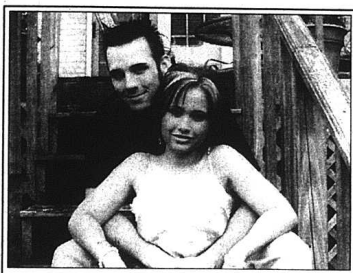

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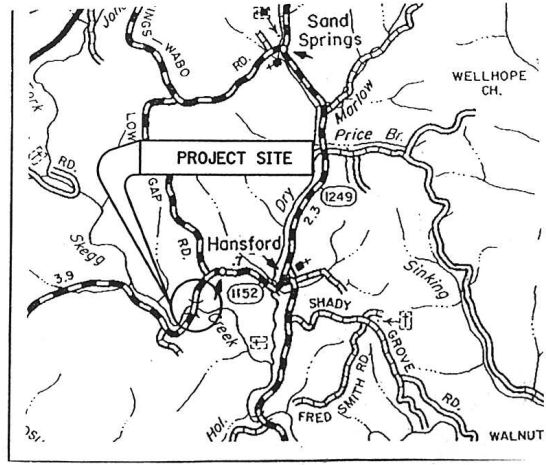

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## Agricultural News

**Nominate and make a difference**  
The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is accepting nominations through August 1st for candidates who are eligible to serve on the local Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Committee. USDA encourages farmers to nominate and make a difference!

County committees play an integral role in the local implementation of FSA programs. FSA encourages all producers, community-based groups and others who care about American agriculture to participate in the county committee election process by nominating eligible candidates, especially minorities and women.

To be an eligible candidate, a person must participate or cooperate in an FSA program, be of legal voting age and live in the county or area where the election is being held. Individuals may nominate themselves or others as candidates. In addition, eligible candidates can be nominated by community-based organizations, especially groups representing socially disadvantaged (SDA) farmers, before the close of the nomination periods. Nominations and elections are open to all eligible candidates and voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, marital status or disability. FSA is committed to promoting diversity on its local county committees so all producers, including minority, female and other under-represented people, have a say in how the Agency's programs are administered locally.

The deadline to submit nomination forms is August 1, 2005. For more information about FSA county committees or to obtain a nomination form, visit your local FSA county office or go online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/publications/elections>.

**Crop Acreage Report**  
Producers who participate in the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program

(DCP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), Loan Deficiency Program (LDP) or request a commodity loan are required to file a FSA-578, Crop Acreage Report. FSA program participation depends on accurate acreage reports.

Beginning in crop year 2005, producers will be required to provide planting dates on each field for all crops. If you have a crop that has not been planted by the final reporting date, the report must be filed by 15 calendar days after the planting is completed to be timely filed.

**Crop Disaster Program**  
Farmers who suffered 2003 or 2004 crop losses from damaging weather can sign-up at their local USDA Farm Service Agency office to receive assistance under the Crop Disaster Program (CDP). "A producer has the choice of receiving payment from crop losses for either the 2003 or 2004 crop year.

Eligibility for the Crop Disaster Program (CDP) is similar to that of the 2001-2002 crop disaster programs. Producers suffering a greater than 35-percent production loss and/or more than a 20-percent quality loss are eligible. Under the current program the payment rate for CDP has increased to 65 percent of the established commodity price for insured crops and noninsured crops, and 60 percent of the price for uninsured commodities.

Producers may apply for CDP for a crop that is eligible for coverage under the Federal Crop Insurance or the Noninsured Assistance Program. Tobacco is included as an eligible crop for this disaster program. The payment limitation is \$80,000 per acre for all 2003-2004 payments. The closing date for the program is August 1, 2005.

If you make any changes in your bank account or change banks, notify FSA immediately to ensure payments reach your account timely.

Payments can be delayed if we are not aware of changes to your account or routing numbers.

**Sales and Purchases of Land**  
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership.

Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

**REMEMBER:** FSA's records are only as current as producers provide.

**Farm Loan Program**  
The FSA Farm Loan Representative with concern to FSA loans (farm, operating, youth and etc.) will be in Rockcastle County at the Rockcastle FSA office each month from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

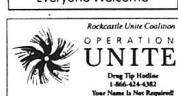
