Stallsworth said fürefigheters were on the scene in less than ten minutes and that fürefighter Albert Carpenter used a breathing appearatus to get to the child. Stallsworth, who also helped rescue the child, said the trailer was completely filled with smoke. "You had to feel your way through it," he said.

Rockeastle County Sheriff's De-tective Mart Bryant said the death was being investigated as an acciden-tal drowning." There was no bruis-ing or any indication Raider had been harmed before the drowning," has aid. "No foul play is suspected." The detective said that no one an-anally saw Raider drown and the last one to see him alive was his girl-friend.

Bryant said a 14-year-old girl found Raider's body after it was re-alized he had not been seen for some-time.

"Several people helped look for him and the girl managed to pull him to the bank where others helped get him out of the water. I think some one at the scene even performed CPR, "Bryant said.

The detective said the drowning apparently took place in a few feet of water and that alcohol was appar-ently a factor.



The Dead Sea Scrolls and the His-tory of the Bible Exhibit, called "Ink & Blood", was on display in Lexing-ton in Heritage Hall. It was open for the first day at nine o'clock that Fri-day. Stanley and I were among the first four people to see the exhibit. Some of the exhibit's curators were still on hand setting up various dis-plays. All of the displays are enclosed in thick glass cubes, except for a few that were still being set up. that were still being set up.

I remember one exhibit in particu-

lar. It was of ancient writing instru-ments of the Holy Land. There was lar. It was of ancient writing instru-ments of the Holy Land. There was genuine papyrus, a paper-like mate-al made from pressed recels from places like the Nile or Jordan Rav-were used for actual writing by get-ting ink from an inkwell. These an-cient writers used inkwells made of pottery or hand-blown glass. I re-ient writers used inkwells made of pottery or hand-blown glass. In-feraglie with paper-thin glass, but had lasted many, many centuries. The hiefe curator, Dr. Noah, and others have found minute bone fragments inside these pottery inkwells. They theorize that these bone fragments may be the remains of animals the ancient Hebrews sacrificed daily to God, therefore, thus making the an-God, therefore, thus making the an-cient Biblical texts actually being written with the remains of the sacrifices. These pottery inkwells were from the time of Abraham. How many dynasties, kingdoms, and empires have come and gone since it was crafted?

The most fascinating articles on display were the actual fragments of

the Dead Sea Scrolls themselves. Could these be the actual reed strokes of an ancient prophet or even Moses? Dedicated scholars of history and of the Bible have taken these fragments, some no larger than a postage stamp' (and in some cases, much larger), and translated the portion of writing, and misroulously it would fir perfectly

Peremptory challenges are limited by state law. Kentucky generally allows each prosecutor and defense counsel three peremptory challenges in district court trials, and eight each in circuit court trials. Historically

peremptory challenges may be used to excuse a prospective juror for any reason. Hence, attorneys frequently use peremptories to strike a juror who for some reason may not be sympa-

use peremptories to star a jurior wise for some reason may not be sympathetic to their cause. In the Box Kentely case, the Interpretation of peremptories to exclude racial minorities from jury service. Prosecutors in many states had historically used their peremptories to remove minorities from jury service in the misguided belief that racial minorities were less likely to convict defendants especially if of the same race, and were more likely to impose leniont sentences. The abuse of peremptories was magnified in capital cases. When confronted with sissue, the Supreme Court determined that this missue of peremptory challenges violated not only a defendant right to a fair and impartial jury, but right to a fair and impartial jury, but the right of every citizen--whether a racial minority or not--to serve upon

a jury.

As a result of the Kentucky case, prosecutors nationwide were re-quired to announce race-neutral rea-sons for using peremptory challenges to strike minority jurors. For years afterward, however, many less-thanforthright prosecutors used "sham' or pre-textual reasons to justify dis

Any chance I may have had for ripe tomatoes on July 4th were shat-tered late last Sunday. Daughter Jennifer Ochs is very

Daughter Jennifer Ochs is very pregnant, you see, and the only-way she likes tomatoes is fried when they are green. Combline that with the craving that goes along with pregnancy and you can imagine the guilt I would have felt if she had seen green tomatoes hanging on the vines in my garden while I selfishly refused to pick them.

And I wouldn't have done so for anyone else on the planet. On the other hand, you can't just pick one or two tomatoes and fry them up for just one person and leave everybody else at the table drooling. Sister-in-law, Helen York, was also here for dinner along with Loretta and me.

Loretta and me. So I decided it would be whole So I decided it would be whole hog or one and I set about selecting the eight largest tomatoes on my early plants, all about the size and shape of tennis balls along with baby zucchinis, baby golden crookneck squash and our first bannan peppers. Boston Bib lettuce, green onions, cauliflower, breccoil and straight-8 cucumbers, all from the garden made a wonderful said. We had already had snow peas and the said as stuff for over a week, but I can truthfully tell you that our Sturdey evening meal alone, made all the effort I 've put into gardening this spring more than worthwhile.

Loretta is the master of the kitchen when I it comes to frying fresh

when it comes to frying fresh veggies. For fried green tomatoes, she uses a couple or three of cups of corn meal, half a cup of flour, a dash or two of salt and a healthy dose of fresh ground black pepper and tosses

that about in a mixing bowl. She mixes a cup of milk, an egg and a splash of white cooking wine up in a serving dish. Orean tomato slices about 14 inch thick are first dipped in the liquid mixture, then tossed about until they are well coated in the dry mix and fired in butter at medium heat until they are golden brown on both sides.

both sides.

I doubt that there is anyway to improve that recipe unless you add a little wine to the butter while they are

frying.

For the squash, brocolli, cauliflower, cukes and banana peppers she flower, cukes and banana peppers she uses a cup or so of Bisquik, half as much commeal, a liberal dose of Ital-ian seasoning, a little salt and sev-eral twists on the much commeal, a liberal close of Italian seasoning, a little sail and several twists on the pepper mill. Then sets the strist is enough milk, a splash of white wine, to bring the batter to a consistency about like what you would use for pan cakes. Dip the veggies in the batter so they are well coated. She fries these in canol a oil at medium-high heat until the batter browns—a couple or three minutes each on both sides is all it takes. This also works for Ichiban egg-lant, green peppers, cucumbers, snow peas, roma beans, cauliflower, brocolli, etc.

Or use fresh herbs like basil, rorgano, rosemary, thyme, chives or garlie blossoms if you have them. Instead of Jusing by berbs in the batter, sault fresh herbs in the olberter, south fresh herbs in the olberter.

ter, saute tresh neros in the oil be-fore cooking the veggies. For a southwestern taste, use fresh cilantro and a bit of cayenne. The possibili-ties on varying the tastes are unlim-

There are two tricks involved here. The first is to pick the veggies (Cont. to A-4)

#### Gout Causes a Painful Arthritis

Gout Causes a Painful Arthritis

Presented by Dr. Kevin Rowe

Gout is a disease which develops when needle-like crystals form in joints. This causes a very painful arthritis.
Gout attacks have a fairly sudden onset, causing red, warm, excruciatingly painful joints overnight. Even the weight of the bed sheets on the joint can be very painful.

These crystals develop because of a high level of uric acid in the blood. The uric acid can precipitate out as crystals in the joints as well as in the kidneys and other tissues.

Although the attack is sudden and severe, it is also self-limiting, lasting 7:14 days in most cases. Only a single joint is affected most of the time, usually at the base of the great toe. Other commonly involved joints include the anticks, knees, writes, and fingers.

A variety of pain pills are very helpful in treating the acute symptoms. After an attack has resolved, medicines can be started which work by lowering the uric acid level. Some will lower the body's production of the uric acid and others will help the body excrete it more quickly.

quickly. Without taking these preventative medicines, a person is likely to have recurrences of gout. Treatment also helps limit the chance of damage to the kidneys from uric acid deposits.

Gout usually begins in middle-aged men. Women are protected and seldom develop any episodes of gout until after menopause. Gout is more common in people who are overweight, have high blood pressure, diabetes, or use alcohol.

Last week in Miller-El v. Texas, the Supreme Court imposed a much heavier burden on trial judges to ensure that a non-discriminatory basis actually exists when an attorney apears to be engaging in race based peremptory strikes. Miller-El had been charged and convicted of a brutal robbery-murder. At trial, prosecutors used their peremptory challenges against 10 otherwise qualified black jury pool. Miller-El's objections to this apparent discrimination were rebuffed by the trial and appellate courts.

The U.S. Sypreme Court, however, rejected the proffered reasons of Texas prosecutors and noted that prosecutors accepted white jurors who were similarly situated. The Court also noted that prosecutors apparently used a Texas invention referred to as the "shuffle" to move black jurors who were coming up for consideration to the back of the jury line, thereby precluding the consideration to the back of the jury line, thereby precluding the consideration of black jurors from actual service in Miller-El's death penalty trial.





Water Recreation:
Play It Safe & Healthy
Water play can provide hours of
recreation for families. However, we
all need to play it safe when taking
part in activities involving water.
Drowning kills more than 1,000 chiltern ages 14 and under each year. It
is the leading cause of accidental
death for children younger than five
in the United States. For every child
who drowns, another 20 go to the
hospital or emergency room after
early drowning. In addition to
drowning, swimming and playing in
contaminated water can cause tilhess.

Do not leave young children
alone near water, not even with other
children, not even for a second. Children can drown in only a couple of
inches of water.

"If you have or use a nool, watch

s of water.

If you have or use a pool, watch children under age 12 at all time.
 Make sure they walk-not run-on the

Make sure they walk-not muon the pool deck.

Surround all pools, hot tubs, and spas with a fence at least 5 feet high. The fence should have a self-closing, self-latching gate. It's important that he fence is one that children cannot climb. Don't think of your home as part of the fence, because children can open doors to get to the pool. Never leave furniture near the fence that would enable a child to climb over the fence.

Kep the pool area locked when not in use.

Take all toys out of the pool area after swimming so children won't go back into the water to retrieve them Learn to swim. The best thing

anyone can do to stay safe in and around the water is to learn to swim—children are usually not developmentally ready for formal swimming lessons until after their fourth brithday—Children should wear life jackets on docks, boats, or at beaches or rivers. NEVER let children swim or play alone near water.

play alone near water.

-Young children should not use pool slides.

\*Keep rescue equipment by the pool-shepherd's hook, safety ring and a rope. \*Remember that floating toys like

water wings and air mattresses are no substitute for a life vest, or for adult supervision.
•Don't swim during lightning

Don't swim during ingnums storms

Keep electrical appliances away from the pool.

Learn CPR.

Above ground pools are usually not deep enough for diving.

Boat engines give off dangerously high levels of carbon monoxide. Avoid swimming, rafting, surfing, or sking too close to a boat engine. Be cautious when boats are parked in groups or iding near each other.

Parents should never be lulled into thinking that their child is safe near the water, even if the child has had swimming or water instruction and don't let a pool fence give you a false sense of security. The pool fencing alone is not enough to prevent drowning. There is no substitute for super-

### Hotter temperatures can be dangerous to our bodies

The arrival of summer typically brings the warmest temperatures of the year to Eastern Kentucky. The mountains, abundance of trees and mountains, abundance of trees and large lakes found in our part of Ken-tucky usually preclude us from fac-ing the sweltering heat of the west-ern portion of the state, but as the old saying goes, "It's not the heat but the humidity". At times, we have our share of both

When heat gain exceeds the level the body can remove, body temperature begins to rise, and heat related illnessees and disorders may develop. This includes heat stress, heat exhaustion, and the very dangerous and potentially fatal, heat stroke. You need to be aware of when you are beginning to approach trouble in dealing with the heat. Often, as heat stress begins to affect the body, there is a noticeable lack of energy. The air members with the strength of When heat gain exceeds the level symptoms will lead to nausea, in paired judgment, dizziness, skin be coming cool and moist to the touc weak and rapid pulse – all signs of heat exhaustion. Without intervention and cooling the body, progression to heat stroke, with a very high death rate, will follow.

Anyone can suffer from heat re-lated illnesses, but by taking a few simple precautions, they can be pre-vented. First, keep informed with the forecast, including information about the expected heat index. Condition yourself for working in hot environ-ments; start slowly and build slowly to more physical work. "We simply can't keep up with the demand without strong support from caring individuals in our communit."





In Fiscal Year 2005, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) will initiate construction of a replacement bridge on CR 1090 (Hummel Road) Bridge over Roundstone Creek in Rockcastle County, Kentucky. The existing CR 1090 Bridge is metal Pratt Pony Truss built in 1905. The bridge is 89' in length and 12'8' width from curb to curb. It was determined eligible for the National Register of Historic Places by the Kentucky State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) in 2005.

In an effort to preserve this historic bridge, the FHWA and the KYTC in cooperation with the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) are seeking to locate a city, county or state government, SHPO-approved historic preservation organization or SHPO-approved individual organization or SHPO-approved individual entity, interested in having this bridge moved to a new site for preservation and reuse. If a recipient agency, organization or individual is found, the FHWA and KYTC will pay all expenses associated with match marking, disassembly, transportation to the new site, and off-loading of the bridge in the amount of which shall not exceed the estimated cost for demolition.

The recipient agency, organization or individual will be responsible for all costs associated with site preparation and re-assembly of the bridge. The recipient will also be responsible for any structural work require for the proposed use (e.g. new deck or replacement of members), liability and long-term maintenance, and any required permits. Any addition costs that the project might bear will be determined on a case-by-case basis. The recipient will keep intact the case basis. The recipient will keep intact the historic fabric of the bridge, making no alterations or modifications to it without the written consent of the SHPO. The bridge will be utilized for purposes consistent with its historic character and obtain SHPO approval prior to any alteration, modification or construction.


