some months is now a reality.

The longest and oldest plant to locate in Rockcastle Industrial

to locate in Rockcastle Industrial Park Number One is closing. Cintas, the corporation which owns Rockcastle Manufacturing, announced Tuesday they were shutting the doors on their 26-year-old facility on September 16th.

During their 26 years, the lo-cal company has made heavy duty pants for auto manufacturers, hospital uniforms, and never missed

pital uniforms, and never missed a payroll.

The most senior employee at the factory, Carol Bryant, who has been at the company for most of her adult life and is currently the Human Resources Director, would not comment on the closing on Tuesday.

She directed all questions to

Wade Gates, a corporate officer with Cintas. "We are making ev-ery effort to help our employee-partners and their families as much as possible," Gates said.

Mrs. Bryant did say that it was somber atmosphere at the plant

a somber atmosphere at the plant on Tuesday. Another spokesperson for Cintas, which is headquartered in Cincinnati, said Wednesday morning that Rockeastle was a "fantastic plant."

Cintas was streamlining their op-

erations and Rockcastle did not me into their plans for the future.

Manufacturing's 124 employees received the following notice from Cintas on Tuesday morning "To assist the Rockcastle and their families".

All employees will be eligible to continue to receive the medical coverage they now have at no cost, for up to six months, based on tenure. More About Skin Cancers

TWOOPE ADOUTT STREET AND THE CAIRCETS
Sun-induced skin cancers are common and well-known, but the skin can also show signs when there are various cancers of internal organs.
One of the most common of these is Pager's Disease of the breast. Here, a malignancy below the skin extends to the skin surface and causes a weeping, itchy, excerns-like rank of the nipple. Occasionally a person will develop a darkening of the skin in the ampits which is called eanthoois. This is often associated with tumors of the hormone-producing glands. It can also be seen with benign tumors as well as in poel who are obese, have a family history of this trait, and in some hormonal abnormabilities.

The spot called keratoses often develop on the backs and chests of poople as they grow older. Having a few is normal, but when a great number develop suddenly they came be associated with cancers of the stornach, colon, or female reproductive tract.

Hives is another skin reaction that can be related to cancers. Although hives are most commonly caused by altergic reactions or viral infections, they can be seen in cancers such as Hodgkin's Disease, leukemia and others.

You can not expect to remember all the skin changes associated with cancers, but you should see your doctor for any unusual or persistent changes in the skin. He can determine if a biopsy is needed or if other tests are appropriate.

Kentucky's Reporter Privilege

Only one sentence from the 2003 State of the Union address. Sixteen little words uttered by President Bush begat a firestorm of renewed contro-versy over the compelled disclosure of reporters' confidential sources of information.

According to the President's ad-dress, "The British government has learned that Saddam Hussein re-



addam Hussein recently sought siginficant quantities

but on whether

ally sought to obtain uranium. Seven months after the State of the Union address, the New York Times published a column by a former Ambas-sador who denied that credible eviasador who demore described evidence existed to support the claim against Hussein. In what is portrayed as an act of retribution, administration officials apparently leaked the Ambassador's wife's secret identity as a CIA weapons of mass destruction operative—a potential violation of federal law. Recent developments confirm the long suspected involvement of presidential advisor Caf Rove in the disclosures. During the resulting investigation of the leak, several reporters were subpoenade to the compelled disclosures of their sources claiming first Amendment and common law privi-

sure of their sources claiming First Amendment and common law privi-leges. A federal appellate court and the U.S. Supreme Court declined to recognize such a privilege and at least one reporter now faces imprisonment. Numerous op-ed pieces lament the failure of the courts to extend reporters the same protection which is alforded by the attorney-client or psychotherapist privileges.

Over thirty years ago, the U.S. Supreme Court addressed this very issue in a case from Kentucky-Branzburg v. Hayes. That case dealt with a reporter from the Courier-Journal who declined to reveal Journal who declined to reveal sources for a series of drug-related stories. The Court opined that public policy did not justify recognizing a new federal privilege and that it could not seriously entertain "the notion that the First Amendment pronotion that the First Amendment pro-tects a newsman's agreement to con-ceal the criminal conduct of his source, or evidence thereof, on the theory that it is better to write about it." The courts which have addressed his issue in the context of the leaked CIA operative's identity rely heavily upon Branzburg. What is interesting is that the Ken-tuckyl legislature has explicitly cre-ated at least some form of qualified reporter's privilege. Essentially this

This dilemma, pitting the need of iaw enforcement to obtain necessary evidence versus the need of media to procure information while maintain-ing the confidentiality of their sources, was thought by ing the confidentiality of their sources, was thought by many to have been decided with Branzburg in 1972. Current events suggest otherwise. It seems likely that this important issue will revisit the public's consciousness again and again.







No one has died from a tornado from April through June in the United States—a first since official records began in 1950, according to the NOAA Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Oklahoma.

Norman, Oklahoma.
Normally, during the most active tornado mosths of April, May and June, 61 percent of all tornado fishies or an average of 52 deaths occur. Killler tornadoes, however, are possible given the right atmospheric conditions. One such scenario is during a land-falling tropical system. The previous low mark was one tornado-related fatality during the same period in 1992.





Do you know what they are? 1) They need a boy! 2) They need a bee to transfer the pollen from the boy plant's flowers to the ovum of the girl plants flowers! Otherwise no berries! Honey is an obvious benefit of bees as well. Most of you love honey, I presume.

Well, some beekeeper took care of millions of bees (getting an occasional sting along the way) and harvested the honey.

Bee stings are actually beneficial

(Who dy ou suppose race horses are fed pollen? Why were Russian Olympic athletes eating it?) If you have a big bornets nest too close to the house or where you must go with power tools, you may need an exterminator. Especially if you have toddlers. Most bees are simply happy to be buzzing and collecting food for their "cupboards".



SUBSCRIPTION RATE INCREASE!!

Effective August 1, 2005, subscription rates for the Mount Vernon Signal will increase for in-county and out-of-county (in-state) subscriptions.

The new rate for in-county subscriptions will be \$18 per year (still a savings of \$8 per year off the over-the-counter price) and \$23 per year for in-state out-of-county subscribers. Of course, the 10% discount for 62 and over will still apply.

This is the first increase in subscription rates for the Signal in seven years and is brought about by several increases we have absorbed in postal rates.

If your subscription expires before December 31, 2005, you may renew at the old rates of \$16.75 and \$21.75 if you do so by July 31, 2005 for a maximum of one year.
