

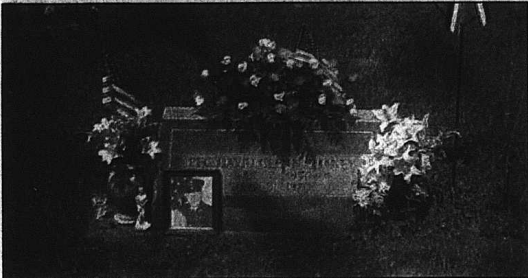

Vietnam Veteran remembered

A Vietnam soldier's pledge, made and delayed but never forgotten for 35 years, finally was fulfilled Saturday in an emotional moment at McKinney Cemetery at Blue Springs.

"I made a promise," Richard Hines said solemnly, standing by David Chaney's grave, "and I'm here to keep that promise."

With that, Hines placed a battered scabbard, containing an old Bowie knife in Steven Chaney's hands, while about 50 Chaney family members, friends and neighbors looked on and tried with little success to halt their tears.

David Chaney's knife was back home.

He bought it in 1969 and took it with him to Vietnam, where he served in an Army tank unit. The Chaney family had always assumed the knife was destroyed in the attack that hit David's tank and killed him in 1970. What the Chaney's didn't know,

until recently, was that David had given the knife to Hines, his closest buddy, for safekeeping shortly before he died. David had a premonition that he might not get home.

Hines brought the knife back to the United States when his Vietnam tour ended, and it remained with him for years while he moved about the country. But he never forgot his pledge to David to keep the knife safe.

Saturday, Hines and five other buddies from David Chaney's old

outfit - Troop A, 2nd Squadron, 1st Armored Cavalry - came from cities scattered around the country to stand at Chaney's grave and present the knife to the Chaney family.

David's brothers, Steven, Stanley and Dennis Chaney, and his sister, Twila Luening, said they were both gratified and stunned, not only that their late brother's prized possession was returned, but by the unlikely story of how it happened.

Another infant dies in Rockcastle County

The recent overwhelming heat has claimed the life of a Rockcastle County infant.

Police were called to the home of Chelsey Dawn McCown on Riddle Lane in Brodhead around 3:30 p.m. last Thursday after Ms. McCown's two-year-old son was found dead in a sweltering car.

The Rockcastle County Child Fatality Review Committee heard the facts of the case on Tuesday afternoon and did not find any reason to go further into the investigation.

The child fatality review system is a local review team, which focuses on interagency communication and cooperation during the review process of a juvenile's death.

"In its initial development, child fatality review was a process to study and learn more about child abuse and neglect death," according to a release from Diane Pierce from the Rockcastle County Health Department.

"We meet in order to try and find out about a case in which a child dies, in order to help provide information to the public, on how they can help prevent such a death in the future," Mrs. Pierce said.

"We simply listen to the facts of the case and pass it on," she said.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, who is a member of the committee and who pronounced Sebastian Malikiah McCown dead at the scene, said he did not believe there is any evidence of wrong doing by the mother.

"It apparently is just a tragic accident," he said.

After the child's death, the mother spoke out to the press.

Chelsey McCown said she put a gate across the door of the room where her son was playing with his little brother, Silas, and locked the dead bolt on the front door of their duplex in Brodhead.

But when she woke between three and four hours later, she found that Sebastian had managed to get out of the house and climb into her Honda Acura in the drive near the front door, McCown said.

"It's not clear how long the boy was in the car, but preliminary results from the autopsy showed the child had been there for sometime, Dowell said Wednesday.

Young Sebastian was buried on Sunday in a private service.

This is the rest of the tragic story:

Ms. McCown told the *Lexington Herald-Leader*, "I never thought anything like this would happen to me," McCown said.

McCown, 23, a single mother said she works third shift and picked up Sebastian and Silas, who is 19 months old, from the baby sitter about 6 a.m. Thursday.

The boys went back to bed when they woke about 11 a.m. she fixed cereal for them, McCown said.

McCown told the Lexington newspaper that someone called and woke her about 3 p.m. and because she did not hear any voices, she made a very quick search of the house.

McCown said she found her 19-month-old asleep on the floor, but did not find Sebastian in the house.

She did find him in the car, where experts think the temperature was 135 degrees at the time of his death.

According to experts, human organs begin to die at 107 degrees.

Ironically, Shelly Elise Looney, 27, was indicted Friday by a

Rockcastle Grand Jury for second degree manslaughter in the June 23rd death of her 16-month-old son, Nathaniel, who died in a fire at Miss Looney's home at Red Hill.

Looney suffered first, second and third degree burns and was hospitalized after the fire.

She is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center under a \$25,000 bond.

Mother indicted in child's death

Seven indictments were handed down Friday, July 22nd, for the first time in many months, none of the offenses were drug related.

Indicted were:

Shelly Elise Looney, 27, for second degree manslaughter in the June 23rd death of her 16-month-old son, Nathaniel Victor White in a fire at their trailer home near Livingston.

Looney was arrested on June 29th and has been lodged in the Rockcastle Jail on \$25,000 cash or

property bond since that date.

Eddie Shane Hopkins, 18 and Donald Travis Brown, also 18, both of Brodhead were named in a joint indictment. Both men were charged with Burglary, third degree and Theft by Unlawful Taking. Both charges stemmed from an incident at Brodhead Farm Equipment. Bail was set at \$10,000 cash/property for each man.

Relay for Life begins Friday

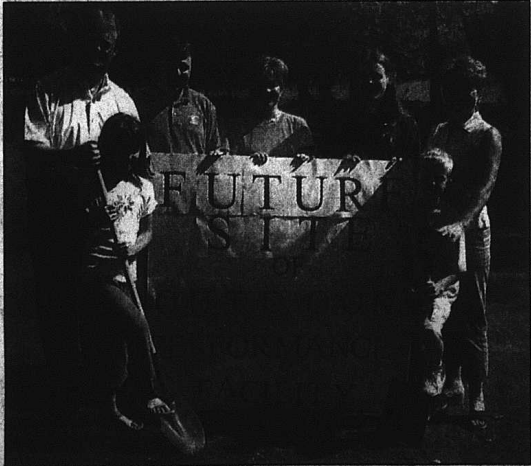

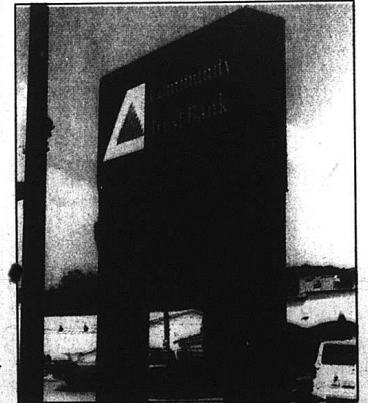

Complaint filed against Chief Justice

Officials said this past week that a complaint filed by the former campaign manager of U.S. Congressman Ben Chandler against state Supreme Court Chief Justice Joseph Lambert and his wife, 28th District Family Court Judge Debra Lambert, will not be recognized by the Judicial Conduct Commission.

The complaint was the result of Mark Nikolas, of Lexington, alleging that the Chief Justice didn't recuse himself from a case involving a campaign donor for Judge Debra Lambert.

Chief Justice Joseph Lambert has been a member of the Kentucky Supreme Court since 1987 and has been Chief Justice since October of 1998.

Dear Editor,
My name is Vicki Lynn Ruppe (Nathaniel White's Grammy and Shelley Elise Looney's Mother). I want to tell you my story of the events leading to Nathaniel's death and Shelley being in jail.
I had trouble sleeping that night I really didn't know why. I was lying on the couch when the telephone rang. My mother was on the phone and all I remember hearing was the trailer was on fire and no one could get Nathaniel. I jumped in my car praying please God keep my daughter and grandson safe. I must have done 75-80 all the way to Red Hill. When I got there the EMTs had Nathaniel in the ambulance. Two men were doing CPR on him. I begged them to let me touch him so he would know I was there, but they refused. Sometime during this time I found out my sister had taken my daughter to the hospital, because she was burned trying to save Nathaniel, once again I didn't know how bad. I stood watching them do CPR on my grandbaby for over 1 1/2 hours because the life helicopter was having trouble landing. I stood there helplessly praying Nathaniel would be OK, but I knew he wasn't. It had been long. The EMT said he had been in cardiac arrest when they got him out of the trailer. After they took Nathaniel to UK hospital I went with my parents to Rockcastle Hospital where my daughter was. When I walked in the ER I could here my daughter crying for her baby. When I got to the room at the hospital Shelley was black with soot and had IV's everywhere. She had 1st, 2nd, 3rd degree burns on her body. She was crying wanting to know about her baby. I didn't want to tell her that he died in the fire so I told her that they were taking him to UK hospital. I had to keep the little bit of hope alive. I kissed her and told her I would let her know as soon as I

knew something for sure. I knew in my heart that Nathaniel was in with God. I drove 80 miles an hour with the flashers on to UK Hospital. When my parents and I got there the nurse ask us to go in the waiting room. Being a nurse I knew what was next Nathaniel had died. All I could think of was why and how I was going to tell my baby her baby was dead. We were able to see Nathaniel and hug him and tell him we loved him, this is when I cried and I cried for everyone. The Social Worker at UK told us that they would have to do an autopsy on Nathaniel. The baby had been three enough and now they wanted to cut him up. I asked why and she said the reason was to make sure of my daughter had not given him any drugs. I was really upset with that statement. I could not believe she could say something so cruel to a grieving family. I called the Rockcastle Hospital and ask them not to tell my daughter about her baby because I wanted to be there when she was told. I still could not believe what was happening. When we arrived back at Rockcastle hospital Shelley was in ICU she had carbon monoxide poisoning, a burnt wind pipe, and 1st, 2nd, 3rd degree burns on her body. She was crying my baby, my baby. The doctor had told her that Nathaniel had died. I wanted to hug her but I was afraid I would hurt her. She had IV's everywhere, an oxygen mask and bandages on, she was coughing nonstop and crying. All she was saying was "I want to die" I told her I didn't think we could take losing her too. Before she got out of the ER, Detective Matt Bryant was taking pictures of her cut bleeding hands and asking questions about the fire. Now remember Shelley was still in shock from what was happening. Social Service was there too asking questions. This made me feel like a pack of wolfs circling something that was dying. Shelley spent 1/2 days in the hospital.

for her baby. She cried and cried. Saying "It should have been me, it should have been me. Mom I would trade places with him any day if I could." Sunday I drove Shelley to say her last good byes to her son. She walked slowly to the casket and looked at Nathaniel. Her father and I had to keep her from falling. She cried and cried and kept saying "I want to trade places with him. It should have been me." By this time people started coming in for the funeral. I tried to talk to Nathaniel's paternal aunt and she was very rude to me stating "I have nothing to say to you" All I could think was how sad it was that she was acting that way at Nathaniel's funeral. The father wouldn't even set with Shelley or even acted like she was the baby's mother. The paternal family did not set in the family section they set in a little white. Then there was a knock on my door it was two police officers. They said Matt Bryant wanted to talk to Shelley but I knew better. I called Shelley on her cell phone telling her the police were her to take her to jail. She came right home and they took her to jail for manslaughter. Now you tell me if Shelley is such a flight risk why did she come home? If she did not try to get Nathaniel

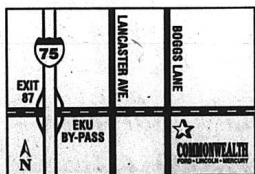

me on that subject. And I'm pretty certain that he's not going to come out and say that Greg Stumbo is a honest man with very good intentions.

Therefore, I will consider his attempt to get a rise out of me a successful one. However, the lame attempt to demote the confidence I have in my personal convictions and beliefs is hereby deemed unsuccessful.

My father made specific mention last week in his editorial that he, along with most of our readers, didn't agree with what I write most of the time. Knowing my father and how he loves controversy, I feel like I'd be letting him down, as a son, if I didn't defend my honor.

Up until now, I've written only two editorials this summer. The first one pertained to a sincere thanks I offered our teachers for making our school system a very respectable one. The other was an attempt to expose our Attorney General's "crooked" motivation. Because of the comments in his own editorial last week speaking in glowing terms of our school system, I know he agrees with

Moving outside of the family circle of stubborn pride, I willingly admit that I agree with my father on his statements regarding the closing of Rockcastle Manufacturing. He's never been more right in that we need to focus a lot more of our attention to attracting jobs to the county.

However, I firmly believe we are leaving out a vital step in attracting the new jobs. A member of the Rockcastle Development Authority called attracting new jobs to the county a "tough sell." Unfortunately, he is correct.

Before we can "attract" jobs, we have to become "attractive." And

before we can become attractive, investments must be made before we can start reaping the rewards. When companies look at prospective places to bring their companies, they want to know what possible destinations have to offer.

As Dad said, we have excellent health care and schools to offer them. However, we are definitely lacking in the recreation department.

Water parks, 18 hole golf courses and public pools are attractive. I know it's definitely not easy, but we have to make sacrificial investments such as these before we can start attracting new jobs and progressing our economy.

Furthermore, in all of my inquiries pertaining to how we could make progress in the county, I've heard very consistently that we need natural gas to attract more industry. This would undoubtedly require running a line from a county that does have natural gas. I know this isn't going to happen overnight. But, I hope that the wheels are already turning in the natural gas direction. If not, let's at least start the engine.

Now don't write me off as unrealistic. I understand that investments such as these require lots of precise planning, money, and can take years to complete. However, we need to get the ball rolling so that thirty years from now we aren't dealing with the same problems that are plaguing us now.

I understand making the investments I've made mention of aren't simple. But we have to get out of our comfort zone that is extremely simplistic and offer the people of Rockcastle County some opportunity.

Shifting gears from politics to our judicial system, a letter to the editor ran last week referring to the trial of Mr. Dennis Potter.

The charges that the acquitted Mr. Potter had against him always brings about lots of emotion from both parties. And, as Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley said in his closing arguments, nobody wins in a sexual abuse case no matter what the verdict.

I admire the message that Sharon Potter relayed to the parents of Rockcastle County. It was very insightful, full of truth, and well written - especially if she is speaking

from experience. However, I do take issue with the comments criticizing Judge Burdette.

If it had been any other Judge serving Rockcastle County, I wouldn't have the knowledge or experiences to defend them.

However, I've gotten to know Judge Burdette pretty well the past few years. And, because of my dealings with him, I've learned from him - when he didn't even know he was teaching me. What I've learned is that he is an extremely noble man with the utmost integrity.

But all that aside, I can speak about this particular subject because I was probably the one unbiased person (besides the jury and Judge Burdette) that sat through the entire trial.

In admitting evidence into the trial, Judge Burdette was simply fulfilling the responsibilities his capacity demands and interpreting case laws. His own personal opinions are sidelined in a trial of that setting, and he did an extremely good job of letting the jury know that. He repeatedly told the jury to disregard all of his judgements of overruling or sustaining attorney's objections, and that his rulings should not be bearing on the opinions they formed regarding the verdict in the case.

Members of David's old unit used the internet and some help from Myrna Childress to locate the family. They initially contacted Childress, who placed some information about Chaney on a Veterans' Web site. She then located Steven Chaney and the two groups got together.

"I was totally shocked," said Steven Chaney, 45, who was 11 when his brother died. "It just amazed me that they would want to do this, and come all this way, after 35 years."

But David Chaney's former buddies - Hines of St. Helen, Mich.; Larry Drummond of Overland Park,

Kan.; Randy Teal of Ocean Springs, Miss.; Vic Reyes of Berwyn, Ill.; Tony Dodson of Philadelphia and Jon "Brian" Kostock of New Haven, Indiana, said that returning the knife was something they had to do.

"It was our duty," Dodson said. "It's a step in the healing process," said Teal, who was on the same tank with David Chaney the day he died. "There's not a day that David is not in our minds, not a single day."

David Glenn Chaney grew up in the Rockcastle County community of Bloss, the oldest son of Lewis and Georgia Chaney.

"He was a man of steel," said Bobby Phelps of Mt. Vernon, who went through basic and advanced training with David. When

David was killed, Phelps escorted his body back home.

"I was with him when he bought the knife," Dennis Chaney recalled. "Just before hunting season in 1969, we each bought a Bowie knife at the Western Auto Store in Mt. Vernon. I still have mine, he took his to Vietnam."

David Chaney was killed when his tank was hit by rocket-propelled grenades while responding to a mortar attack in central South Vietnam on Aug. 31, 1970. Hines, known in the unit as "the Reverend," pulled Chaney's body out of the burning tank. "To this day, I don't know how I was able to do it," Hines said.

He said Chaney had given him the Bowie knife not long before. "He told me he knew that I would respect it and care for it," Hines said.

"He had a premonition that he wasn't coming home. My promise to him was that I would get him home, and give him the knife before we came home."

When that wasn't possible, Hines held onto the knife. Last year, during a unit reunion, he revealed to some buddies that he still had the knife. The former soldiers then began trying to reach the Chaney family with the intention of returning the knife.

They initially planned to deliver the knife quietly. But when the word spread here, a small memorial service was organized with a color guard from Rockcastle County's American Legion Post 71. Harold Burdette, 18, for whom Vietnam is

only a piece of history, played taps, and family members and friends from around the county turned out to be part of the moment.

Chaney's parents died some years ago. "I just wish they could have been here for this," Twila Luening said Saturday.

Ricky Bullock, a cousin who was only five when Chaney died but vividly remembers his funeral, perhaps summed up the day best: "This is not just about a knife. It's like getting a part of David back home."

The students spent the week immersed in health career in-

formation, practice and listening to guest speakers talk about health careers, plus conducted fun, forensic science experiments and practiced math skills needed for any health career.

"It was a fun experience and very educational," said camper Jessica Renner. "I liked the guest speakers and really liked scrubbing in for surgery." To simulate various medical procedures, students got to stitch ba-

Students also used crime solving skills to match synthetic blood samples and analyzed various pieces of evidence for saliva to identify suspects and their crimes.

Two pharmacy students from the University of Kentucky shared with the students the importance of being a pharmacist and helped the students solve medical math problems, to show how math is used daily in a health career. Other guest speakers included physicians, the CEO, nurses, x-ray and lab technicians, a dietitian, therapists and everything in-between. The week ended with an ice cream party outside with all the students in their MASH Camp t-shirts, looking like the future doctors, nurses, therapists, etc. they might become.

Computer Numerical Controls are used to program modern metal milling and lathe machines to manufacture specific parts.

Overall, seventeen SCC students in teams and as individuals placed in the top ten places in five technical skill categories at the National SkillsUSA Contests.

The SCC "Chapter Business" Team's silver medal (second place) was the best finish for any of the SCC participants.

More than 4,600 students from community and technical colleges, area technical centers and vocational high schools competed in 80 different contest categories and in 46 skilled trade contests during the three-day championship. Students

representing Kentucky earned 41 Top Ten Awards and 16 gold, silver or bronze medals. SCC earned one of the medals and five of the Top Ten Awards.

"I am very proud of the Somerset Community College students who took part in the 2005 National SkillsUSA Championships," said Dr. Jo Marshall, President and CEO of the College. "Our success at this event is yet another indication of the quality of our technical programs and of the dedication and ability of our faculty. I particularly want to thank Daniel Burnett, Regina Swanner and Cindy Burton, the SCC faculty advisors for our SkillsUSA team and to Steve Phillippi, a retired SCC administrator, who now is the Kentucky State Director of the SkillsUSA program."

The SkillsUSA program gives Kentucky college and high school students in technical and career programs an opportunity to demonstrate their abilities in regional, state and national championships. Another

important aspect of the SkillsUSA program is the development of student leadership skills. SkillsUSA was formerly known as Vocational Indus-

trial Clubs of America (VICA). It is a partnership of students, teachers and industry working together to ensure a skilled and qualified American workforce.

The National SkillsUSA Championships consists of such varied events as Television News Anchor/Reporter, Computer Programming, Entrepreneurship, Firefighting, American Spirit, Total Quality Management, Practical Nursing, Precision Machining Technology, Cosmetology, 3-D Visualization and Animation and many more.

The SCC Business Chapter Team, which won the Silver Medal, is composed of Danny Dick, Jonathan Fox, Steven Gassineau, Thad Stone, Lucas Snell, and Bryan Wells.

Students from SCC won two Fourth Place Awards. Justin Phelps took home a national fourth place award for his skill in the Computer Numerical Control - Turning (operating a metal turning lathe to make a part with a computer program operating the machine) event, while the Somerset Community College Opening and Closing Ceremony Team also finished fourth nationally. The SCC Opening and Closing Ceremony Team includes Alicia Fields, Jennifer Gregory, Dena Grubb, Sunshine Longmire, Mary Jo Rodefer, Shenna Sexton and Carrie Siegel.

SCC student Karen Owens finished with a national seventh place award in the Prepared Speech event. The SCC Automated Manufacturing Team earned a national eighth place award. The team is made up of James Cass, Kevin Williams and Jeff

Withers.

SCC student Eric Sizemore finished in tenth place nationally for his skills at Carpentry.

Steve Phillippi, the Kentucky SkillsUSA State Director won an Award of Distinction for his care and promotion of the SkillsUSA program in Kentucky. Phillippi's efforts resulted in a Thirty (30) percent increase in SkillsUSA membership in the state over the past 12 months.

"I think you can see from the awards they won that the students in the Kentucky SkillsUSA delegation did an excellent job of representing the state of Kentucky and our fine career and technical education programs," Phillippi said.

Deadline to nominate extended

The last day for the Farm Service Agency to accept nominations for candidates who are eligible to serve on the local Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Committees has been extended to August 15, 2005.

To be an eligible candidate, a person must participate or cooperate in an FSA program, be of legal voting age and live in the county or area where the election is being held. Nominations and elections are open

to all eligible candidates and voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, marital status or disability.

FSA is committed to promoting diversity on its local county committees so all producers, including minority, female and other under-represented people, have a say in how the Agency's programs are administered locally.

For more information about FSA county committees or to obtain a

nomination form, visit your local FSA county office or go online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/>.

Crop acreage reporting deadline
Producers who participate in the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCCP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), Loan Deficiency Program (LDP) or request a commodity loan are required to file a FSA-578, Crop Acreage Report to receive payments. FSA program participation depends on accurate acreage reports.

Beginning in crop year 2005, producers will be required to provide planting dates on each field for all crops. If you have a crop that has not been planted by the final reporting date, the report must be filed by 15 calendar days after the planting is completed to be timely filed.

The deadline for filing crop reports has been extended to August 15th.

Tobacco Transition Payment Program

Producers are now beginning to receive notification that a contract has been approved for the Tobacco Transition Payment Program (TTPP), "Tobacco Buyout". These contracts, for Rockcastle county, are for the producers who grew tobacco in the crop year 2002, 2003 and/or 2004. These do not include the quota holder contract for the 2002 basic quota.

Producers should note all contracts are not approved at the same time.

Payment will be issued at the rate of \$1.00 per year for 2002, 2003 and 2004 accordingly at a later date through the National Payment System.

Account changes

If you make any changes in your bank account or change banks notify FSA immediately to ensure payments reach your account timely.

Payments can be delayed if we are not aware of changes to your account or routing numbers.

Sales and purchases of land
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA of

the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership.

Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

REMEMBER: FSA's records are only as current as producers provide.

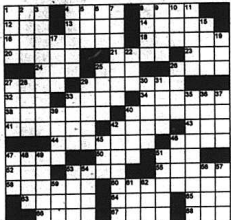

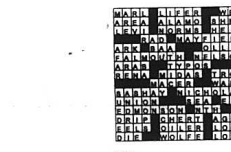
