The Rockeastle County Child Fatility Review Committee heard the fiets of the case on Tuesday afternoon and did not find any reason to go further into the investigation. The child fatality review system is a local review team, which focuses on interagency communication and cooperation during the review process of a juveniled Seaton. In its initial development, child fatality review was a process to study and learn more about child abuse and neglect death, "according to a release from Diane Pierce from the Rockeastle County Health Department.

We meet in order to try and find out about a case in which a child ides in order to help provide information to the public, on how they can help prevent such a death in the future," Mrs. Pierce said.

"We simply listen to the facts of the case and pass it on," she said.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, who is a member of the committee and who pronounced esbastian Maliskin McCown dead at the scene, said he did not believe there is any evidence of wrong doing by the mother.

The statutes also expressly provide that any "peace officer who has reasonable grounds to believe that an individual is mentally ill and presents a danger or threat of danger to self,

a danger or threat of danger to self, family or others" shall lake the indi-vidual into custody and transport the individual without unnecessary de-lay to a hospital or psychiatric facil-ity "for the purpose of an evaluation ... by a qualified mental health pro-fessional." Thus, in those frequent cases where police locate someone who is nall likelihood suffering from a mental illness, the police need not wait to complete a petition but may without a court order take the sub-

Emergency Help for the Mentally III

In a society beset by increasing numbers of individuals who suffer some form of debilitating mental illness, courts are routinely confronted with the issue of how to help those who are suddenly unable to function or who pose a danger to themselves or others. Traditional strategies of arrest and incorrectation are inappropriate for those who are others. Traditional strategies of arrest and incorrectation are inappropriate for those with the product of the produ approách.

The evaluation can be conducted by a variety of qualified mental health professionals, but is usually conducted by licensed clinical social workers, psychologists, or psychiatrists. Once the evaluation is completed, the results are certified to a District Judge for approval and entering the control of the con

Mentally ill individuals also fre-

Mentally all individuals also frequently present themselves at a hopital. In those cases, authorized staff physicians may order admission or choose to file a petition.

Whatever manner in which the mentally ill individual comes to the attention of the court determines whether the individual should be relased or hospitalized for additional treatment. Kentucky maintains several regional psychiatric hospitals and individuals may also receive appropriate treatment in other public or private institutions. Between Pulsaki and Rockcastel Counties, the District Courts can reasonably be expected to deal with approximately 150 of these deal with approximately 150 of these ourts can reasonably be expected all with approximately 150 of the ases annually.



Snoring and Sleep Apnea

Sleep apnea is when a person fails to breathe for periods of ten seconds
or longer during his sleep. While an occasional episode of sleep apnea
can happen to all of us, a person who has spells of apnea every couple
minutes during the night will not get a good night's sleep. It prevents
getting to the deeper stages of sleep apnea
will only make it worse. Using sleeping aids, such
as sleeping pills, tranquilizers, and alcohol, usually
makes the problem worse by relaxing the tone of the
muscles in the throat region. This causes greater

The result is snorfing, sleep apnea, and poor sleep.
Snoring is an audible sign of airway obstruction. If you snore, your airway may be partially obstructed, especially in certain positions such as

You can evaluate sleep apnea at home by using a tape recorder at night, en listening to your sleep pattern. If there is excessive snoring or frement pauses in breathing of reas-coold sor more, you should discuss it ith your doctor and consider a formal sleep study.

If simple measures, such as sleeping on your side and avoiding sedaws, do not help, there are devices to help keep the airways open during epen and if necessary a surgical reconstruction of the soft palate and sur-unuding tissues may be helpful.

"I was with him when he bought the knife," Dennis Chaney recalled.
"Just before hunting season in 1969, we each bought a Bowie knife at the Western Auto Store in Mt. Vernon. I still have mine, he took his to Vietnam."

David Chaney was killed when his tank was hit by rocket-propelled grenades while responding to a mortar attack in central South Vietnam grenades while responding to a rattack in central South Viet on Aug. 31, 1970. Hines, know the unit as "the Reverend," put on Aug. 31, 1970. Hines, known in the unit as "the Reverend," pulled Chaney's body out of the burning tank. "To this day, I don't know how I was able to do it." Hines said. He said Chaney had given him the Bowie knife not long before. "He told me he knew that I would respect it and care for it," Hines said.

"He had a premonition that he wasn't coming home. My promise to him was that I would get him home, and give him the knife before we came home.

home.
When that wasn't possible, Hines held onto the knife. Last year, during a unit reunion, he revealed to some buddies that he still had the knife. The former soldiers then began trying to reach the Chaney family with the intention of returning the

knife.
They initially planned to deliver the knife quietly. But when the word spread here, a small memorial service was organized with a color guard from Rockeastle County's American Legion Post 71. Harold Burdette, 18, for whom Vietnam is

only a piece of history, played taps, and family members and friends from around the county turned out to be part of the moment. Chancy's parents died some years

ago.
"I just wish they could have been here for this," Twila Luening said

here for this," Twila Lucning said Saturday.

Ricky Bullock, a cousin who was only five when Chaney died but viv-idly remembers his funeral, perhaps summed up the day best: "This is not just about a knife. It's like getting a part of David back home."
