## “Sex” business ordinance gets first reading by court

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court held the first reading on an ordinance that will regulate sexually-oriented businesses, and their employees. The ordinance was proposed in 2004 but the court had never followed through with it and that was brought to their attention by Magistrate Ralph Allen. Allen said he felt the ordinance was necessary in order to forestall the establishment of this type of business in the county.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds already had the ordinance prepared from the first May, 2004 action and he read the ordinance to the court. Reynolds told the magistrates that while the ordinance could prohibit the establishment of this type of business in the county, constitutionally, the ordinance provides restrictions that will make it much harder for their establishments.

The entire ordinance can be found on pages A8 and A9 of this week's Signal.

These items were also set for special taxing districts for 2006 and for the motor vehicles and watercraft for the

county, with the exception of the Public Library.

The county's rate for motor vehicles and watercraft will be the same for 2006, 8.2¢ per \$100 assessed value, and for the Board of Health, Soil Conservation and Public Schools. The Extension District took the 4% increase allowed by law which will increase their revenue a little over \$2,000 to \$86,440.

The court also accepted Sheriff Darrell Doan's tax settlement for 2004. The biggest discrepancies were with the school tax - \$6,800 additional due, \$3,000 additional due the extension service and \$1100 more due the library.

County Treasurer Joe Clontz told the court the \$6,800 figure came about when the tax commission due the sheriff for collection the taxes due the school were mistakenly deducted up front by the Sheriff's office instead of being returned to the Sheriff by the school board which is the accepted method of payment of the commission.

On question as to whether the \$6,800 was deducted by the school board from their commission check to the sheriff or whether it was paid before it was realized the amount had already been deducted, Clontz said it was unclear and would have to be cleared up by audit.

Clontz also said the amounts shown owed to the sheriff's office by the school board would have to be re-checked since he didn't feel these amounts were accurate.

There is also a question as to a \$28,000 payment for commission made to the sheriff's office by the school board. The check should have been for the commission on the \$28,000 and Clontz said this would also have to be cleared up by an audit.

If these amounts are owed to the

special taxing districts, the money will have to come from the county's general fund since they have a fee pooling agreement with the sheriff's department and the money was deposited into the general fund. Of course, they would then be charged back to the sheriff's department as expense items.

The settlement was accepted by the court, subject to a future audit.

On the recommendation of Magistrate Ralph Allen, the court also approved lowering the speed limit on Maple Grove Road to 35 mph. Allen said he had been presented with a petition, containing 61 names, asking for the change.

The court also heard a request from Brian Bullock, representing the Broadhead Fire Department, for help with \$40,000 additional money needed for purchase of a \$146,000 new pumper fire truck. The truck will be used primarily as a county fire truck and as a back-up for the city of Broadhead's fire truck, a 1998 model for which the city is paying.

The department has received a grant of \$106,600 and has temporarily financed the difference (\$40,000) with the company building the truck.

On question, Bullock told the court that the city of Broadhead was presently doing as much financially as they could and could not take on this extra indebtedness. He said the department was debt free due to the city's efforts.

Judge Buzz Carlotts told Bullock that he would not ask the magistrates to take action on their request at Tuesday's meeting since he needed time to contact KACO to see if their financing was a better option than the one already in place. The interest rate on the \$40,000, financed with E1 Mfg., is 4.7% making the payment

## Polly still being held on \$100,000 cash bond

Matthew Polly, 42, of Hummel, is still being held on a \$100,000 cash bond after his preliminary hearing Monday August 8th.

Polly was charged in July with nine counts involving minor children.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said two of the nine counts were dismissed but seven remain.

"We are determined to get a conviction in this case," Reynolds said.

Polly is charged with one count of sodomy second degree, three counts of sodomy in the third degree and three counts of unlawful transaction with a minor.

All charges are felonies and involved three male juveniles.

Rockcastle County Sheriff's Detective Matt Bryant is investigating the case which will be presented to the Grand Jury on September 9th.

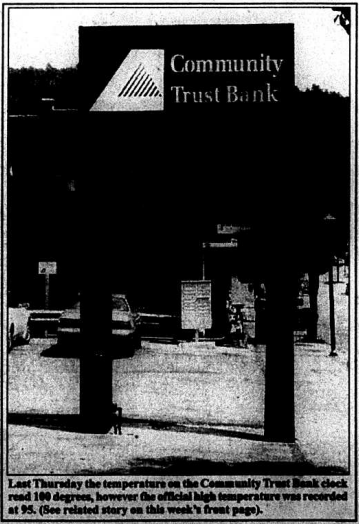
## Rockets will face Admirals on Saturday

## Movie Warehouse robbed during the day on Sunday

Sunday evening, Rockcastle County Sheriff's deputies and Mt. Vernon City Police responded to a call of an armed robbery in progress at Movie Warehouse on West Main Street.

Upon investigation by the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office, the thief was identified as David Lee Durham, 26, of Livingston.

During the course of committing the robbery, Durham apparently left his vehicle parked and running in front of Movie Warehouse and left in another vehicle, according to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Joe Rush.

Rush said that witnesses inside the store positively identified Durham, who turned himself in at the Sheriff's office on Monday afternoon.

Durham's bond was set at \$50,000 cash by District Judge Scott Lawless. Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said Wednesday morning he would request that Durham's bond remain the same.

"My office is working in conjunction with law enforcement officials in connection with the rash of break-ins and we will try every legal means to keep those people charged in jail once they are arrested," Reynolds said.

Reynolds said the Durham case would go to the Grand Jury next month.

Sunday, two employees, Martin Abney and Ty Bottoms were working at the time of the robbery.

"We always keep two employees in the store at all times for safety reasons," said Mark Parsons a co-owner of the store.

Durham told the kids he had a gun in his pocket and he had his hand inside his pocket and they cooperated," Parsons said.

Durham took money from the register and then tried to find the phone line but couldn't and then told employees not to call police.

Police said that when Durham left the store, employees immediately locked the door.

Parsons would not say how much money Durham got in the robbery. When Durham turned himself in, he did not give any money back and declined to make a statement, according to police. He also did not say who was driving the other car in which he left the parking lot.

"We are just glad no one was hurt," Parsons said.

Following the police's on site investigation, business returned to normal at the store.

Parsons said he asked his two employees if they wanted to go home and they said no.

Movie Warehouse is Rockcastle County's only home rental store.

Last week several break-ins occurred in the Mt. Vernon area. Reynolds said he did not think Durham was involved in those break-ins and police have suspects, but have not made any arrests.

## Recorded high temp in August is 95

Kentucky's reputation for unexpected weather patterns has certainly held true from August 2004 to August 2005.

Rockcastle County weatherman Bud Cox reported on Wednesday that the high for this month is currently 95 degrees and was recorded on August 13th. The low for the month came in at 64 degrees on four separate occasions.

In August 2004, the high for the month was relatively less at 89 degrees. The low was a shivering 48 degrees a year ago this month.

Perhaps the most significant statistics relate to the vast difference in rainfall. As of August 17th at 2 p.m., the county had seen only 1.09 inches of rainfall for the month. Whereas, in 2005, 4.20 inches fell during the month of August.

There will be music and dancing until 10 p.m., or later, and food and vendors will still be available.

Cloggers will be performing beginning at 1 p.m. and the band will have special entertainment at 2 p.m.

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## Bus driver complains about 1004 crossing

Veteran school bus driver Barbara Collins, who has driven a bus for the local system for four years, is concerned about her current route.

On her route she must go over the railroad crossing on Hwy. 1004 at the bottom of Brush Creek Hill.

"I can't see for the trees and legally I am not supposed to cross the track when I can't see," Mrs. Collins said this week.

The picture on this week's front page shows the obstruction and Rockcastle County Schools Transportation Director David Perkins is also concerned.

"We have contacted CSX Railroad, the state and the county about the problem and so far nothing has been done," he said.

"We have had, and are still having problems with the crossing on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon, because of malfunctioning railroad lights and have to direct traffic there all of the time," Perkins said Wednesday. "I appreciate the concerns of all of our bus drivers," he said.

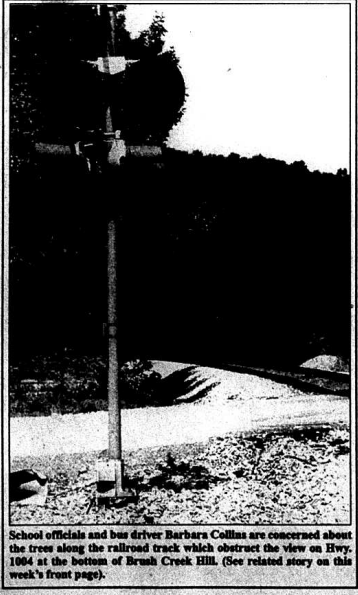
Every school day, 49 school buses travel Rockcastle roadways.

"I have been told by CSX officials they would look into all of the problems and decide whether it was the railroad's problem, the state's or county's or private land owners to correct," Perkins said.

CSX roadmaster Sam Carrington, who is charge of the Cincinnati to Corbin line, could not be reached for comment.

Gary Davis, a representative of Operation Life Saver, who has given local classes to bus drivers concerning safety, said he had also notified CSX about the problems in Rockcastle.

"It sounds like Rockcastle bus drivers are doing what they are supposed to," he said.

## The Pardon Power

The issue of executive pardons arises frequently. A few years ago, then First-Lady Hillary Clinton's brother received almost \$400,000 for "legal work performed on behalf of two convicted felons who obtained pardons from President Clinton. Former Governor Paul Patton pardoned his own chief-of-staff and three others charged with breaking election laws during the 1995 gubernatorial campaign while proclaiming that while he had great faith in the judicial system, it's not perfect." Weekly, or sometimes daily, we ruminate on the speculation that Governor Fletcher may issue executive pardons for members of his administration charged in the merit system controversy. Most interesting, is the announcement that Georgia pardoned a black woman executed in 1945 following her conviction for killing a white man.

Apparently, the only woman ever executed in Georgia's electric chair—19 other women have been hanged in Georgia—received a posthumous pardon 60 years after being tried and convicted by an all-white all-male jury in a one-day trial. According to media accounts, during her trial the woman admitted to shooting the victim but only when he held her captive and attempted to hit her with a metal bar. This is a particularly unusual exercise of the pardon power.

Though these sensational cases attract the public's attention, the exercise of the executive power to grant clemency or pardons is actually fairly routine. A pardon is an act of the chief executive officially nullifying punishment or legal consequences.

An interpretation of the presidential pardon power contained in the U.S. Constitution identified its purpose as "forgiving" a convicted person in part or entirely of the consequences of their actions. Pardons do not set aside a conviction, nor exonerate the offender, but merely mitigate legal consequences.

The Kentucky Constitution grants the executive the power to grant full (absolute) pardons, conditional pardons, or partial pardons. A full pardon restores an offender's civil rights without any reservation or qualification. Full pardons are very rare and chief executives historically grant them upon exiting office as President Clinton chose to do.

Conditional pardons do not become effective until the wrongdoer satisfies some pre-requisite. Partial pardons—the most frequently granted—exonerate a wrongdoer from some, but not all, consequences of the commission of a crime.

It is routine in Kentucky, as in most states, to grant a partial pardon to convicted felons following completion of a sentence. This allows the convicted felon to be restored to the right to vote and the right to office. Many people are under the misconception that this partial pardon restores the right of a convicted felon to possess firearms, but it does not. Most such pardons specifically include language that "This order does not restore to the offender the right to possess, receive, or transport in commerce a firearm." In addition, a 2003 decision indicates that such partial pardons do not restore an individual's right to sit on a jury.

The right of the executive to grant a pardon is absolute. Courts may not set aside pardons, though an executive who fraudulently issues a pardon could in theory be prosecuted under federal or state law.

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# Exercise to Lose Weight

Losing weight and staying at an ideal weight is a lifelong battle for most of us. Everyone wants to lose weight, and everyone thinks that exercise is a quick, though not easy, way to do it.

Actually exercise is a relatively slow way to lose weight. There are 3500 calories in each pound of fat, and this is more than enough to run a marathon. A full marathon! If you run five miles a day every day of the week, you would burn up only one pound of excess fat each week.

The weight loss is even less on the scale because the training will increase your muscle mass. This is good, of course, but the real reason you lose weight is what a person looks like. The good news is that the increased muscle mass burns more calories, even at rest.

Even if it is slow, exercise is still the key to any weight loss program. Your eating habits usually improve right along with increased fitness. One of the most beneficial results is that a person tends to cut out snacks and other "empty" calories that would otherwise be eaten. An ounce of potato chips is the equivalent of walking almost two miles or biking five miles. Exercise can even help suppress hunger pains.

Exercise also promotes a healthier life style. A person may take the stairs rather than the elevator, or walk to talk to the post office rather than take the car. Over time, these small improvements in a person's physical activity, as well as his eating habits, can make a big difference in their weight and health.

Life style changes are the most effective way to control weight, and regular exercise is the foundation for many of the necessary changes

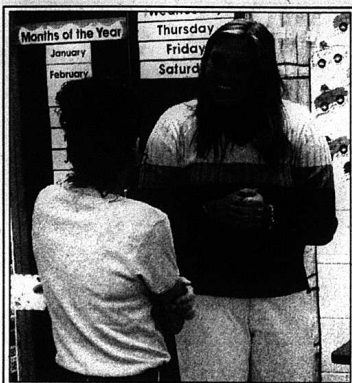

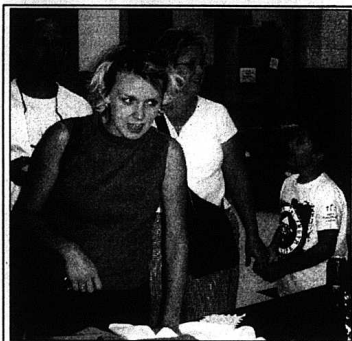

Caregivers whether they be parents, siblings, family care providers or friends, all give selflessly of themselves to meet the many needs of those they are caring for. Often times their dedication and selfless acts go unnoticed by other family members and friends, they need support, understanding, and yes-even time for themselves. The following is A Caregiver's Bill of Rights, by Jo Home:

**I have the right:**  
 To take care of myself. This is not an act of selfishness. It will give me the capability of taking better care of my loved one.  
 To seek help from others even though my loved ones may object. I recognize the limits of my own endurance and strength.  
 To maintain facets of my own life that does not include the person I care for, just as I would if he or she were healthy. I know that I do everything that reasonable can for this person, and I have the right to do some things

just for myself.  
 To get angry, be depressed and express other difficult feelings occasionally.  
 To reject any attempts by me loved one (either conscious or unconscious) to manipulate me through guilt, and/or depression.  
 To receive consideration, affection, forgiveness and acceptance for what I do, from my loved ones, for as long as I offer qualities in return.  
 To take pride in what I am accomplishing and to applaud the courage it has sometimes taken to meet the needs of my loved one.  
 To protect my individuality and my right to make a life for myself that will sustain me in the time when my loved one no longer needs my full-time help.  
 To expect and demand that as new strides are made in finding resources to aid physically and mentally impaired persons in our country, similar strides will be made towards aiding and supporting caregivers.

# Estate planning

Family and Consumer Sciences

Anyone over age 18 should have an estate plan. This is a complex issue because it involves people with different personalities and interests. Also, regulations governing estate plans routinely change. Thus, it's a good idea to consult a professional to help you develop the initial arrangement or review one you already have. You should consult an attorney who specializes in estate planning and also may need to contact a certified public accountant and financial advisor.

Some topics you might want to discuss include making a will, charitable contributions, how to transfer wealth to reduce estate taxes, establish a guardian for minor children, set up a trust to manage money for minor children, make a durable power of attorney and health-care directive should you become incapacitated, and settle an estate. You also might consider opening a joint checking account with one of your children or a trusted friend.

One way to reduce the size of your taxable estate is to make gifts of money, land or other valuables. You can make a gift of \$11,000 per year

to anyone without tax consequences. For example, you and your spouse can give \$11,000 to each child. If a child is married, the spouse also can receive \$11,000 from each of you. Each grandchild also can receive \$11,000 from each of you.

In future years, the value of these gifts will increase based on the rise in the Consumer Price Index.

Also, write down what you want to do with other valuable, sentimental items such as jewelry, furniture, photographs and the like.

It's important to discuss your estate plan with your spouse, children or parents. This avoids surprises when they are emotionally distraught over your death. It also helps them understand the reasons behind details in your will or trust document.

Every adult, 18 years or older, should have a will, durable power of attorney and health-care directive. Death and disability are no respecters of age.

It is always a good idea that members of your family understand the location of important documents such as account numbers, life insurance policies, and financial information. The Extension Office can provide you with a publication entitled, "What Every Spouse Should Know." This publication will help you to discuss estate planning issues and will allow you to put into print where documents will be located.

However, neither is the intent nor effect of this ordinance to condone or legitimize the distribution of obscene material and the Fiscal Court recognize that state and federal law prohibits the distribution of obscene materials and expects and encourages state law enforcement officials to enforce state obscenity statutes against any such illegal activities in Rockcastle County.

(b) Findings. Based on evidence concerning the adverse secondary effects of adult uses on the community presented in reports made available to the Fiscal Court, and on findings incorporated in the cases of *City of Renton v. Play Time Theaters, Inc.*, 475 U.S. 41 (1986), *Young v. American Mini Theaters*, 426 U.S. 50 (1976), and *Barnes v. Glen Theater, Inc.* 501 U.S. 560 (1991), and on studies in other communities including, but not limited to, Phoenix, AZ; Minneapolis, MN; Houston, TX; Indianapolis, IN; Amarillo, TX; Garden Grove, CA; Los Angeles, CA; Whittier, CA; Austin, TX; Seattle, WA; Oklahoma City, OK; Cleveland, OH; and Beaumont, TX; and also on findings from the report of the Attorney General's Working Group on the regulation of sexually oriented businesses, (June 6, 1989, State of Minnesota), the Fiscal Court finds:

1. Sexually oriented businesses lend themselves to ancillary unlawful and unhealthy activities that are presently uncontrolled by the operators of the establishments. Further, there is presently no mechanism to make the owners of these establishments responsible for the activities that occur on their premises.
2. Certain employees of sexually oriented business defined in this ordinance as adult theaters and cabarets engage in higher incidents of certain types of illicit sexual behavior than employees of other establishments.
3. Sexual acts occur at sexually oriented businesses, especially those which provide private or semi-private booths or cubicles for viewing films, videos or live sex shows. Offering and providing such space encourages such activities which creates unhealthy conditions.
4. Persons frequent certain adult theaters, adult arcades, and other sexually oriented businesses for the purpose of engaging in sex within the premises of such sexually oriented businesses.
5. At least fifty (50) communicable diseases may be spread by activities occurring in sexually oriented businesses, including but not limited to, syphilis, gonorrhea, human immunodeficiency virus infection (HIV-AIDS), genital herpes, hepatitis B, non-A, non-B, amebiasis, salmonella infections, and shigella infections.
6. There has been an increasing cumulative number of reported cases of AIDS caused by the HIV virus in the United States. Through December 31, 1997, there have been 619,690 reported cases of AIDS in the United States. As of December 31, 1997, there have been 2,583 reported cases of AIDS in Kentucky.
7. The United States Surgeon General in his report of October 22, 1986, advised the American public that AIDS and HIV infection may be transmitted through sexual contact, intravenous drug abuse, exposure to infected blood and blood components, and from an infected mother to her newborn.
8. Sanitary conditions in some sexually oriented businesses are unhealthy, in part, because the activities conducted there are unhealthy, and, in part, because of the unregulated nature of the activities and the failure of the owners and operators of the facilities to self-regulate those activities and maintain those facilities.
9. Children, the family environment and residential neighborhoods suffer injury from the deleterious effects and harmful consequences resulting from the distribution of, and exposure to, certain sexually explicit materials. This is particularly so when such material is prohibited to leave a business's premises and enter the immediate family environment, neighborhood and certain areas where children are likely to be.
10. The findings noted in paragraphs 1 through 9 raise substantial government concerns.
11. Sexually oriented businesses have operational characteristics which should be reasonably regulated in order to protect those substantial governmental concerns.
12. Removal of doors on adult booths and requiring sufficient lighting on premises with adult booths advances a substantial governmental interest in curbing the illegal and unsanitary sexual activity occurring in adult theaters.
13. The general welfare, health and safety of the citizens of Rockcastle County will be promoted by the enactment of this ordinance.

### SECTION II. DEFINITIONS

For purposes of this ordinance, certain terms and words are defined as follows, unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning:

"Adult Amusement Arcade" means any place to which the public is permitted or invited wherein coin operated, slug operated, or for any form of consideration, electronically, electrically, or mechanically controlled still or motion picture machines, projectors, video or laser disk players, or other image producing devices are regularly maintained to show images to five or fewer persons per machine at any one time, and where the images so displayed are distinguishable or characterized by the depicting or describing of "specified sexual activities" or "specified anatomical areas".  
 commercial establishment which regularly features persons who appear in a state of nudity or semi-nude, or live performance which are characterized by the exposure of "specified anatomical areas" or by "specified sexual activities".

"Employee" shall mean any person who performs any service on the premises of a sexually oriented business on a full time, part time, or contract basis, whether or not the person is denominated an employee, independent contractor, agent or otherwise and whether or not said person is paid a salary, wage or other compensation by the operator of said business. "Employee" does not include a person exclusively on the premises for repair or maintenance of the premises or equipment on the premises, or for the delivery of goods on the premises.

"Entertainer" means any person who provides sexually oriented entertainment in a sexually oriented business whether or not an employee of the business and whether or not a fee is charged or accepted for such entertainment.

"Escort" means a person who, for consideration, agrees or offers to act as a companion, guide, or date for another person, or who agrees or offers to privately model lingerie or to privately perform a striptease for another person.

"Escort Agency" means a person or business association who furnishes, offers to furnish, or advertises to furnish escorts as one of its primary business purposes for a fee, tip, or other consideration.

"Establishment" means any sexually oriented business, whether existing or opening of such business; the conversion of an existing business, whether or not a sexually oriented business to any other sexually oriented business; or the relocation of any sexually oriented business.

"Manager" means any person who manages, directs, administers, or is in charge of the affairs and/or the conduct of a sexually oriented business.

### ORDINANCE NO. \_\_\_\_\_

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE REGULATION OF SEXUALLY ORIENTED BUSINESSES AND THEIR EMPLOYEES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FISCAL COURT OF THE COUNTY OF ROCKCASTLE, COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY:

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Court is concerned about the secondary effects and impacts of sexually oriented businesses; and

WHEREAS, sexually oriented businesses require local government supervision in order to protect and preserve the health, safety and welfare of the patrons of such businesses as well as the citizens of Rockcastle County; and

WHEREAS, the concerns over sexually transmitted diseases is a legitimate health concern of Rockcastle County which demands regular regulation of sexually oriented businesses in order to protect the health and well-being of the citizens; and

WHEREAS, there is convincing documentation evidence that sexually oriented businesses, because of their very nature, have a deleterious effect on both adjacent businesses and residential areas, causing increased crime and the degrading of property character and values; and

WHEREAS the Fiscal Court desires to minimize and control these adverse effects and thereby protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizenry; protect the citizens from increased crime; preserve the quality of life; preserve the property values and character of adjacent businesses and neighborhoods; and

WHEREAS, KRS 67.083 grants fiscal courts the authority to enact ordinances regulating establishments or commercial enterprises offering adult entertainment and adult entertainment activities;

### SECTION I. PURPOSE AND FINDINGS

(a) Purpose. It is the purpose of this ordinance to regulate sexually oriented businesses in order to promote the health, safety, and general welfare of the citizens of Rockcastle County, and to establish reasonable and uniform regulations relating to sexually oriented businesses. The provisions of this ordinance have neither the purpose nor effect of imposing a limitation or restriction on the content of any communicative materials, including sexually oriented materials, but to enact a content neutral ordinance which addresses the secondary effects of sexually oriented businesses. Similarly, it is neither the intent nor effect of this ordinance to restrict or deny access by adults to sexually oriented materials protected by the First Amendment, or to deny access by the distributors and exhibitors of sexually oriented entertainment to their intended market.



"Nude", "Nudity" or a "state of nudity" means the showing of the human male or female genitals, pubic area, vulva, anal cleft or cleavage with less than opaque covering of any part of the nipple, or the showing of the covered male genitals in a discernibly turgid state.

"Owner" means any individual, proprietorship, partnership, corporation, association, or other legal entity who has legal title to real estate, with or without actual possession thereof, or has all or part of the beneficial ownership of any real estate and a right to present use or enjoyment thereof, including a mortgage in possession.

"Regularly Featured or Regularly Shown" means a substantial or significant use, but not necessarily a majority of the business activity or stock in trade. The fact that a business may have one or more other principal uses unrelated to sexually oriented business shall not relieve the business from the provisions of this ordinance if the business dedicates at least twenty-five (25%) percent of the utilized square footage of its premises for sexually oriented business or at least twenty-five (25%) percent of the gross receipts of a business, excluding food and beverage receipts, result from sexually oriented business.

"Mental States" required to prove violations. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, for the purpose of this ordinance, an act by an employee or any person shall be imputed to the sexually oriented business owner or manager for the purposes of finding a violation if the owner or manager knowingly or negligently allowed such act to occur on the premises of the establishment.

"Semi-nude" or in a "semi-nude condition" means the showing of the female breast below a horizontal line across the top of the areola at its highest point or the showing of male or female buttocks. This definition shall include the entire lower portion of the human female breast, but shall not include any portion of the cleavage of the human female breast, or the wearing apparel provided the areola is not exposed in whole or in part.

"Sexual Activities" shall mean depiction of human genitals in a state of sexual stimulation, acts of human masturbation, sexual intercourse or sodomy, holding or erotic touching of human genitals, pubic region, buttocks or breasts.

"Sexual Encounter Center" means a business or commercial enterprise that, as one of its principal business purposes, offers for any form of consideration physical contact in the form of wrestling or tumbling between persons of the opposite sex; or activities between male and female persons and/or persons of the same sex when one or more of the persons is in a state of nudity or semi-nude.

"Sexually Oriented Business" means an adult amusement arcade, adult book store, adult motel, adult novelty store, adult video store, adult cabaret, adult motion picture theater, adult stage theater, escort agency, or sexual encounter center.

"Specified Anatomical Areas" means the human male genitals in a discernibly turgid state, even if completely and opaquely covered, or less than completely or opaquely covered human genitals, pubic region, buttocks, or a female breast below a point immediately above the top of the areola.

"Specified Sexual Activities" means the fondling or other erotic touching of the human genitals, pubic region, buttocks, anus, or female breast; or other sexual acts, including but not limited to actual or simulated, including intercourse, oral copulation, masturbation, or sodomy; or excretory functions as part of or in connection with any of the foregoing activities.

**SECTION III. GENERAL RESTRICTIONS, REQUIREMENTS AND CONDITIONS FOR SEXUALLY ORIENTED BUSINESSES**

All sexually oriented businesses defined under Section II of this ordinance shall comply with the following requirements.

(a) An establishment shall not exhibit any lettering, wording, pictorial or representational matter which is distinguished or characterized by a depiction of sexual activities on any sign subject to public view from outside the establishment.

(b) An establishment shall not display its stock in trade, inventory, or merchandise which depicts, describes or relates to sexual activities in such a manner as to be subject to public view from outside the establishment.

(c) Except as otherwise provided by laws which may be more restrictive, no owner or operator of an establishment shall knowingly permit a person under eighteen (18) years of age to be employed by or enter the establishment. Each establishment shall maintain and retain for a period of two (2) years beyond the last date of employment, the full name, date of birth, last known address, date of termination, and social security number of all persons employed by the sexually oriented business.

(d) An establishment must have an employee on duty at all times in which the business is open and must be positioned at a station in the premises which is located in such a manner that the entrance can be monitored at all times. Any person who reasonably appears to be under the age of eighteen (18) shall be requested to verify his or her age. All persons under the age of eighteen (18) discovered in the establishment shall be immediately escorted out of the premises.

(e) No specified sexual activity, including but not limited to sexual intercourse, sodomy, oral copulation, masturbation, or sexual conduct shall be permitted in or on the premises of any establishment, except for an adult motel. No owner, operator, or employee of an establishment shall knowingly permit these activities to occur on the licensed premises.

**SECTION IV. REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO EXHIBITION OF SEXUALLY EXPLICIT FILMS, VIDEOS OR LIVE ENTERTAINMENT IN VIEWING ROOMS.**

(a) A person who operates or causes to be operated an establishment, other than an adult motel, which exhibits on the premises in a viewing room of less than on hundred fifty (150) square feet of floor space, a film, video cassette, live entertainment, or other video reproduction which depicts "specified sexual activities" or "specified anatomical areas", shall comply with the following requirements:

1. Any wall or partition which is situated so as to create a viewing area which any amusement device or viewing screen is located shall be constructed of not less than one hour fire restrictive material and shall contain no hole or other perforation.

2. The interior of the premises shall be configured in such a manner that there shall be an unobstructed view from a manager's or cashier's station of every area of the premises to which any patron is permitted access for any purpose excluding restrooms. The view required in this section must be by direct line of sight from the manager's or cashier's station.

3. No viewing room or booth shall be obstructed by any doors, curtains, partitions, walls, merchandise, display racks or other materials. No patron shall be permitted access to any area of the premises which has been designated as an area to which patrons are not permitted.

4. No viewing room or booth shall be occupied by more than one person at any time. No owner, operator, or employee shall knowingly permit any viewing room or booth to be occupied by more than one person at any time.

5. No restroom shall contain any video reproduction devices or equipment.

6. The premises shall be equipped with overhead lighting fixtures of sufficient intensity to illuminate every place to which patrons are permitted access at an illumination of not less than ten (10) foot candles as measured at floor level.

7. It shall be the duty of the owner, manager or employee to ensure that the illumination described above is maintained at all times that any customer is present in the premises.

8. No owner, manager or employee shall allow openings of any kind to exist between viewing rooms or booths.

9. No person shall make or attempt to make an opening of any kind between viewing booths or rooms.

10. The owner, manager or employees shall, during each business day, cause the wall between the viewing booths to be regularly inspected to determine if any openings or holes exist.

11. All floor coverings in viewing rooms or booths shall be non-porous, easily cleanable surfaces, with no rugs or carpeting.

12. There must be at least one employee on duty and situated at the manager's station at all times that any patron is present inside the premises. The manager or cashier's station shall be a maximum of 32 square feet and if multiple managers or cashier's stations are needed then an employee shall be present at each station when any patron is present in the area which is monitored by that particular station.

(b) All establishments in operation in Rockcastle County on the effective date of this ordinance shall comply with the terms and conditions hereof within ninety (90) days after the effective date of this ordinance.

**SECTION V. INSPECTION**

All establishments shall permit representatives of Rockcastle County, including representatives of the Sheriff's Department, Fire Department, or other County departments or agencies to inspect the premises for the purpose of ensuring compliance with the law, at any time it is occupied or open for business. Upon observing any violation of this ordinance, by the owner, manager or employee, such duly authorized representative shall make arrests without warrants for violations committed within their presence.

**SECTION VI. REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO LIVE PERFORMANCES OR OTHER ENTERTAINMENT.**

(a) It shall be a violation for a patron, employee, or any other person to knowingly or intentionally, in an establishment, appear in a state of nudity, regardless of whether such public nudity is expressive in nature.

(b) It shall be a violation for any person to knowingly or intentionally in an establishment appear in a semi-nude condition unless the person is an employee who, while semi-nude, shall be at least six (6) feet from any patron or customer and on a stage at least eighteen (18) inches from the floor.

(c) It shall be a violation for any employee, while semi-nude in a sexually oriented business, to knowingly or intentionally receive any pay or gratuity directly from any customer or for any customer to knowingly or intentionally pay or give any gratuity directly to any employee, while said employee is semi-nude in a sexually oriented business.

(d) It shall be a violation for any employee, while semi-nude, to knowingly or intentionally touch a customer or the clothing of a customer.

(e) No employee, while semi-nude, shall be visible from any public place outside the premises during any performance.

**SECTION VII. LOCATION RESTRICTIONS**

(a) The public entrance to a sexually oriented business shall not be located within 1000 feet of any building containing a public or private elementary, middle or secondary school, institution of higher education or business college, or any park-like area of open space under the control of a governmental agency, or any building used for a place of religious worship, or any building used for a governmental function or public library. Such distance shall be measured along a straight line from the nearest property line of the property on which the building or park-like area is located to the entrance to such establishment engaging in a sexually oriented business.

(b) The public entrance to an establishment engaging in a sexually oriented business shall not be located within 1,000 feet of the public entrance of another sexually oriented business.

**SECTION VIII. ENTERTAINMENT PERMIT**

Notwithstanding anything in this ordinance to the contrary, nothing in this ordinance is intended to supersede or abrogate the requirement for any establishment providing entertainment as defined in KRS 231.010 to obtain a permit to operate a place of entertainment pursuant to KRS Chapter 231.

**SECTION IX. SEVERABILITY**

If any section, subsection, or clause of this ordinance shall be deemed to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, the validity of the remaining sections, subsections, and clauses shall not be affected.

**SECTION X. PENALTIES**

Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of not more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, or be imprisoned in the county jail for not more than twelve (12) months, or both, fine and imprisonment, for each offense. Any person cited under this ordinance may be cited again for the same violation one or more days after a prior citation and each citation shall constitute a separate offense.

**SECTION XI. EFFECTIVE DATE**

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and approval.

## Homeland Security team in Rockcastle

A team of Kentucky Community Preparedness Program assessors are in Rockcastle County this week, scrutinizing the community's preparedness levels, and offering recommendations to make the community safer.

Working closely with local law enforcement and community leaders, assessors will conduct vulnerability assessments to identify the community's weaknesses. The team will analyze facilities, structures and security policies and their relationship to each other, and will then offer recommendations for security improvements.

Communities that complete the entire assessment program will be certified as a Ready and Prepared Kentucky Community and will be eligible to be reimbursed up to \$10,000 for making recommended changes.

"This is the state's premier homeland security initiative," said Governor Ernie Fletcher. "We amassed a team of experienced and knowledgeable assessors and sent them out into Kentucky to help identify weaknesses and give our communities the

information and resources they need to strengthen those weaknesses to become ready and prepared."

The Kentucky Community Preparedness Program is the Department of Criminal Justice Training's Homeland Security initiative that strengthens the security of Kentucky communities by locating and eliminating potential vulnerabilities. It focuses on hostile acts and crime in small- and medium-sized communities through a system of risk assessments and recommendations for improved security.

"When people think about terrorism they think internationally, but the truth is domestic terrorists, whether that be in the form of a local extremist group or someone opening fire in a school or business, could cause just as much devastation to a community, and that is really where we are focusing," said KCTPP Team Leader Tom Lindquist. "By going through this process a community is helping to prepare itself from any kind of catastrophic event, whether it is an attack or a natural disaster."

KCTPP is funded by a \$2.4 million grant from the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security. The grant will

allow DOJCT to implement the program in 60 small- and medium-sized communities throughout the state during a 12-month period.

"So far it is going very well," said Hal Holbrook local Director of Emergency Management.

This week's comprehensive review is headquartered in the offices of the Emergency Operations Center in the courthouse, which Holbrook heads.

Holbrook is also the director of the Federal Stockpile Emergency Preparedness program, which is in place in Rockcastle because of the nerve gas stored at the U.S. Army Depot in Richmond.

about \$5,150 a year or \$433 a month.

Bullock told the court that the fire department could make the monthly payment but it would drastically strain their resources. Carlofis said Wednesday that he felt the county needed to contribute at least half the payment for the truck.

Russell Barron also was before the court asking for official affiliation with the county for the South Central Search and Rescue squad. Barron said the group needed the affiliation in order to be recognized by the state and to qualify for grants for operation. The department, which operates regionally, deals primarily with land and water search and rescue.

Judge Carlofis said that he had been contacted by Hal Holbrook, Jr., Director of Emergency Management and of the Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program (CSEPP), who asked that no action be taken by the court at present so that it could be determined if the affiliation would be in conflict with Homeland Security.

The court also:

- Approved the expenditure of \$4,776 to the post office for 12,000 envelopes/stamps for all taxing districts' tax bills;
- Tabled a request for \$500 for program support for the Hot Rods, saying they did not support any other individual sport programs in the county;
- Approved the payment of \$500 in program support to the I-66 Foundation and
- Approved the advertisement for bids for sixteen new voting machines at an approximate cost of \$80,000 and an absentee voting system, required by the Help Americans Vote Act. The court will only be responsible for about \$5,000 of the expense with the rest covered by the state.

## \$6,850 in Agricultural funds awarded to Rockcastle County

The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board, chaired by Governor Ernie Fletcher, mailed a check for \$6,850 in support of a Forage Improvement Shared-use program in Rockcastle County. The Rockcastle County Conservation District submitted a proposal for cost-share assistance to the Rockcastle County Agricultural Development Council and the Agricultural Development Board.

The Forage Improvement Shared-use program was established with the purpose of impacting a high number of producers, who cannot justify ownership expenses associated with certain equipment, by helping them access technology necessary to improve their operations in an economical manner. The Forage Improvement Shared-use program will be used to purchase a no-till drill.

The Kentucky Legislature continues to make great strides towards lessening Kentucky's dependence on tobacco production while revitaliz-

ing the farm economy by investing 50% of Kentucky's Master Settlement Agreement into the Kentucky Agricultural Development Fund. To date Kentucky has invested over \$179 million to an array of county, regional, and state projects designed to increase net farm income and create sustainable new farm-based business enterprises. The Rockcastle County Forage Improvement Shared-use program represents just one of the over 2,050 projects that have been funded through Agricultural Development Fund, since the inception of the program in January 2001.

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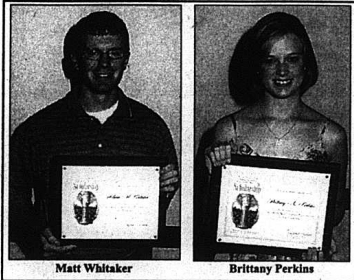

## Two receive scholarship awards from Philip Morris

## UNITE unveils Treatment Voucher program

A new \$1.6 million initiative to help low-income drug addicts in the Fifth Congressional District receive treatment was unveiled Friday, August 12, by U.S. Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers.

Operation UNITE's Treatment Voucher Program will pay up to \$3,000 for short-term (up to 30 days) or \$5,000 for long-term (more than 30 days) residential treatment for adults. The amount increases to \$6,000 short-term or \$10,000 long-term for juveniles.

More than 300 addicts will be able to benefit from the program, Rogers announced.

"However, the addict must be serious about getting help," Rogers stressed. "Most importantly, he or she must take responsibility and do their part. This program is available to an individual one time only. We're willing to reach out, if they are willing to accept responsibility for their own well-being."

Coalition representatives, government officials and treatment providers from across the 29-county region attended the press conference, held at the London-Laurel County Tourist Commission office.

Joining Rogers for the announcement were UNITE Executive Director Karen Engle; Teresa A. Barton, executive director of the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy; and Mike Sewell, regional director of substance abuse for Cumberland River Comprehensive Care.

"If you need to know why (a

waiting time to enter a facility is reduced from more than a month to just a few days in many cases, Engle said.

"For the past year, UNITE has operated a treatment hotline (1-866-908-6483) where families in crisis can call to receive help," Rogers said. "Time and again, addicts called the hotline only to find out they needed financial assistance before entering treatment."

The Treatment Voucher Program is a means to provide that financial assistance.

Engle noted that vouchers have been available for about one month and that there are currently 19 individuals in treatment and four who have completed short-term treatments.

Operation UNITE has entered into contracts with several facilities that have dedicated treatment space for the program, but voucher recipients may choose to receive help from any facility.

As a result of the contracts, the

voucher program is needed) look at your local newspaper, radio or television station," Sewell said. "Look at things like divorce, domestic violence, suicide and homicide. An awful lot of people that do these things do it under the influence of drugs or alcohol."

The bottom line, Sewell continued, is that "properly done, treatment works."

Sewell said "the value of the voucher system cannot be overestimated," noting that every dollar spent on treatment represents a sav-

ing another tool to help in the battle."

Rogers noted that UNITE has opened more than 2,200 criminal cases and taken \$4.5 million worth of drugs off the street in the past year. This school year there will be 31 substance abuse counselors working in middle and high schools, and Drug Courts are currently helping 227 people receive treatment.

Even with two new treatment facilities coming to Pike and Clay counties, thanks to \$3 million in state and federal funding, "the load is still too heavy," Rogers said. "Drugs are tearing families apart, ruining lives, and stretching the resources of law enforcement and social service agencies to the absolute limit."

Rogers concluded with a challenge to those attending the announcement. "All of you are a vital part of this organization and this campaign. We will kill it (drug abuse) won't be the end of the problem. It's if we work together."

"It's no secret we have an epidemic facing our region. This is the most devastating scourge I've seen in my 25 years in Congress," Rogers said. "Unfortunately, this program won't be the end of the problem. It's

By Anyone Affiliated With the Roman Catholic Diocese  
Of Covington, Kentucky

**A Class Action Settlement May Affect Your Rights**

If you were the victim of sexual abuse by anyone affiliated with the Roman Catholic Diocese of Covington, Kentucky, you may be able to participate in a Settlement Fund. The plaintiffs have reached a Settlement agreement with the Diocese under which the Diocese will advance \$40 million from its assets into a Settlement Fund. The Diocese is also pursuing a claim against its own insurance carriers in the Federal Court to compel them to pay an additional \$80 million for the benefit of claimants into the Settlement Fund and to reimburse the Diocese for its \$40 million advance. The Diocese's claim against the insurance carriers is still pending and the outcome has not been determined. The Parties have agreed upon four categories of injury and specified the range of compensation to be paid in each category. The Settlement Fund will provide payments to claimants from the Diocese's \$40 million advance and from monies obtained from the Diocese's claim against its insurance companies. The maximum amount of monies in the Settlement Fund will be \$120 million.

The Diocese will be reimbursed by the Fund for any amounts recovered from its insurers that exceed \$80 million. The amount of the actual payments to a particular claimant will depend on (1) the total amount of the Settlement Fund, (2) the number and nature of the total claims submitted and (3) the nature and extent of the individual claimant's injury. If any funds remain unused after all claims and expenses are paid in full, the remaining funds will be returned to the Diocese or its insurers. Under the agreement there will be no injunctive relief.

To preserve your rights to participate in the Settlement or any further proceeding, victims must take immediate action. You must immediately complete the Confidential Census Form below and send it to Class Counsel no later than November 10, 2005.

**People Who May Benefit From the Settlement**

- a priest, a member of a religious order, or anyone else assigned to or employed by the Diocese of Covington or any Diocesan parish or institution subjected you to acts of sexual abuse at any time in the past; and
- you were a minor when the abuse occurred.

You have the right to exclude yourself from the Class if (1) you were abused before 1956, (2) you were abused by someone other than a priest or member of a religious order, or (3) you were born after October 21, 1980. You may obtain an exclusion form from Class Counsel. Unless you exclude

Research shows that children are often more willing to eat healthy foods and be active if they see their parents and other family members doing these things first. # Survey reveals much about fitness

## 83% exercise three times per week; many watch three hours of TV per day

Though a recent survey revealed that 48 local middle school students (14 of them boys) don't like to sweat, Jacob Holbrook isn't one of them.

In fact, when I called him to ask about his fitness habits, he was playing outside in 92 degree heat. "I play a lot outside with my little brother," said Jacob, an eighth grader whose favorite sport is baseball.

That he plays sports with his brother is an important detail, as 102 students surveyed said that the lack of anyone to exercise with prevented them from participating in physical activities.

That and many other questions were answered by the survey,

which was administered to 456 middle school students by the Southern Kentucky Area Health Education Center (AHEC) after CATS testing in May. The survey will be used to give healthcare providers and community members an inside look at the physical fitness of our county's youth. AHEC will also use the survey data for seeking grants that could be used to benefit all students in its 15-county area.

Rockcastle County can boast many fine examples of active, physically fit kids. Katelyn Blair, a sixth grader who has played basketball five years and softball four years, runs every other night. "It's important

for me to stay in shape," Katelyn said. "If I didn't play both sports like I do I wouldn't be able to

move."

"Our bodies were made to move," said Nancy Keber, health educator for the Rockcastle County Health Department. What can stand in the way of the kind of movement a good workout provides? TV-watching and video game playing, to name two. The average student spends more than three hours a day watching television and more than two hours playing video or computer games, according to the survey.

Eighty-three percent of the students reported that they exercise for at least 20 minutes three or more times a week. The American College of Sport Medicine recommends 20-30 minutes of exercise every day for optimal health and well-being in children.

Statistically speaking, Kentucky is one of the least physically fit states. As adults we should set an example for our kids' health. We could run, jog, or play a sport to show them that fitness can be fun. As Keber put it, "we need to think how we can keep our kids moving. What incentives and opportunities can we provide?"

*More than 100 of the students were asked about whether they would consider a healthcare career in the future, as another AHEC mission is to promote health careers in the area. Forty percent said yes. The most common reason the other 60 percent don't want to pursue a health career is a distaste for needles or blood. Many may not realize that only about half of the employees in a typical hospital actually deal with needles and/or blood.*

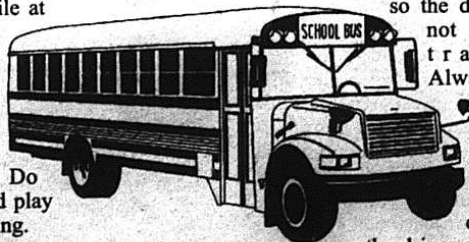
Katelyn knows how important sports, even at home with her dad and brother, have been to help her stay in shape. "If you haven't tried any kind of sport you should definitely try one," she emphasized.

And any sport will do—baseball, basketball, croquette, hockey, Ultimate Frisbee, golf, make up your own game to play—but get out there and move!

# Follow these tips to stay safe on the school bus

### Walking to the Bus Stop

- Always walk on the sidewalk to the bus stop never run. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left facing traffic.
- Go to bus stop about five minutes before bus is scheduled to arrive. While at the bus stop, wait quietly in a safe place well away from the road. Do not run and play while waiting.

- When entering the bus go directly to a seat. Remain seated and face forward during the entire ride.

### Riding the Bus

- Always speak quietly on the bus so the driver will not be distracted. Always be silent when a bus comes to a railroad crossing so the driver can hear if a train is coming.
- Never throw things on the bus or out the windows. Keep the aisles clear at all times. Feet should be

directly in front of you on the floor and book bags should be kept in your lap.

- Never play with the emergency exits. Large instruments or sports equipment should not block the aisle or emergency exits. If there is an emergency listen to the driver and follow instructions.
- Hands should be kept on to yourself at all times while riding on the bus. Fighting and picking on others creates a dangerous bus ride.

### Exiting the Bus

- If you leave something on the bus, never return to the bus to get it. The driver may not see you come back and she may begin moving the bus. Make sure the drawstrings and other loose objects are secure before getting

off the bus so that they do not get caught on the handrail or the door.

- Respect the Danger zone which surrounds all sides of the bus. The Danger Zone is ten feet wide on all sides of the bus. Always remain 10 steps away from the bus to be out of the Danger Zone and where the driver can see you.
- Always cross the street in front of the bus. If you drop something near the bus, tell the bus driver before you attempt to pick it up, so they will know where you are.
- Never speak to strangers at the bus stop and never get into the car with a stranger. Always go straight home and tell your parents if a stranger tries to talk to you or pick you up.

4. Set water thermostat to 120 degrees or less.
5. Install carbon monoxide detectors.
6. Keep Poison Control Hotline number by each phone: 1-800-222-1222.
7. Keep all cleaning products, medicines, and vitamins out of children's reach.
8. Keep all knives and sharp utensils out of children's reach.
9. Buckle children into an age/size appropriate car seat in the backseat with every car ride.
10. Closely supervise young children at all times.
11. Install and use a chain latch on the inside of exterior doors.
12. Keep children under 3 from choking hazards including small toys, hot dogs, grapes, popcorn, hard candy, and peanuts.
13. Don't let children ride with adults on ATVs, lawn mowers, or farm equipment.
14. Ensure that children and teens wear helmets while riding a bike, scooter, or ATV.
15. Never leave a child inside a vehicle.

Back to school is an important and active time for most families. Not only are there school supplies, clothes, and books to purchase—schedules have to be arranged and modified for the coming school year. Busy times are ahead for all. Your child will start bringing home their books and homework—math, social studies, science, and reading.

Reading is one of the most important skills one will use in school, career and life. Filling out job applications, purchasing food at the grocery store, or even looking up a phone number all require reading. It is crucial to ensure that children are reading at their age level to avoid problems in high school, college, and their future careers. There are many services available which can assist a child in reaching his/her potential for reading. These include school based reading programs/services, library reading programs, tutors, learning centers, and speech language pathologists. All of these are

potential sources and opportunities for a child to improve their reading skills.

To determine if your child is age appropriate for his/her reading skills—here are some guidelines to follow:\*

### Kindergarten/First Grade (5 and 6 year olds)

- Understands that print goes from left to right.
- Knows the letters and sounds of the alphabet.
- Knows simple words like the, and, it, and is.
- Starts to read signs, food packages, and other everyday items.
- Likes being read to and has favorite books and stories.

# Rockets hope experienced squad can regain region title

After twenty-one years on the job at Rockcastle County, most items on Tom Larkey's agenda as head football coach have become routine.

For example, it's pretty obvious that interviews are routine. In interviewing Larkey, no questions really have to be asked. It takes him about ten minutes to answer any question you could even think of asking him without you having to ask him the first one.

Making out rosters are surely routine at this point. Along with handing out uniforms, organizing records and keeping quality assistant coaches.

And winning. Larkey has had 19 consecutive winning seasons at the Rock. He brings an overall record of 205-76 to the 2005 season. He is 184-56 at Rockcastle County.

In discussing his 2005 team, he cites sheer strength and size as advantages.

Junior Brad Durham, at 6'5, 300 pounds could probably act as the poster boy for the Rockets size and strength.

RCHS also returns an experienced quarterback in Matthew Burkhart. Burkhart, go-

ing into his third year of signal calling, threw for nearly 1,800 yards and 19 touchdowns in 2004.

Junior Dusty Miller, who was one of five tailbacks that saw action last year, will anchor the ball carrying duties this year. When not playing receiver, senior Gabe Stallworth is expected to see some action at tailback as well.

Larkey said that his team would primarily be in a four wide receiver set, which calls for only one back in the backfield. However, when they do have a fullback, it will be senior Bucky Skinner.

The receiving corps will be highlighted by junior Shawn Childress who caught 6 touchdowns for 502 yards a year ago. Skinner will play another receiver when not a fullback. Senior Gabe Stallworth and junior Izak McQueary will start at the other two receivers. Seniors Jared Brown and Alex Centers will also be in the rotation, along with junior Lynn Miracle.

Rockcastle County suffered a devastating blow on the first day of football camp when sophomore Scott Daughtery, who started at a tackle as a

freshman, broke his leg. Daughtery will miss the entire '05 season.

Senior Mikey Denney will return for his third straight year as the starting center. Junior Adam Hensley will make his starting debut at left guard on August 20th while junior Donovan Pigg will return for his second year at the other starting guard. Junior David Robbins will start at left tackle and Brad Durham will fill the other tackle spot.

As for the defensive side of the football, defensive coordinator Adam Coleman is optimistic about his unit.

As with most years at the Rock, many players will be expected to start on both sides of the football. But, in 2005, the number is even more than the norm with nine guys going both ways.

Coleman explains his defense as a typical 4-3 alignment. But, he says his team's ability to play different defenses and his player's ability to play different positions on the field is their biggest strength.

The only potential weakness Coleman sees is their inexperience at linebacker. "The

linebackers are somewhat inexperienced, but they have excellent potential," Coleman said.

Durham, Hensley, Pigg, and Denney will all go both ways, starting on the defensive line as well.

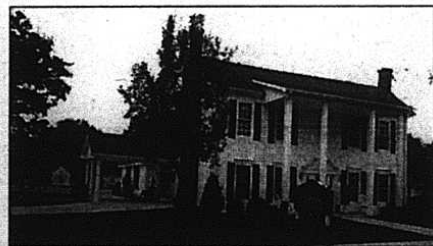
Bucky Skinner will play one outside linebacker and sophomore Zack Burkhart will play the other. Senior Charles Cunagin will anchor the

middle linebacker position.

The cornerbacks will be Izak McQueary and Dusty Miller. Shawn Childress will play strong safety while Matthew Burkhart will play free safety.

"I feel good about our team. Our guys have a substantial amount of experience and a great attitude. I think we will get a lot better as the season progresses," Larkey said.

# Volleyball team aims for third straight regional title

The administrators at RCHS opted to give girls' volleyball a

chance. There were no intramural leagues or middle school programs. No female in Rockcastle County ever dreamed of growing up to become a Lady Rocket volleyball player. RCHS was simply starting from scratch.

As expected, there were no stories in 2001 about the winning

ways of the Lady Rockets in their inaugural season. After all, when you have so many girls who have never picked up a volleyball except for their days in a disorganized middle school physical education class, you can't expect much.

That all changed after the 2003 season. There were eleven seniors on the varsity squad in Larry Lee's first year of coaching. Those seniors came together to win their first district championship in only their third year of existence. Only one week later, the girls captured a regional championship.

In 2004, the Lady Rockets couldn't have been any good. Not a single starter returned from the previous year's regional championship team. Only one girl was on the varsity squad in 2003. So, one would think the rebuilding would start over.

Not a chance.

The Lady Rockets gelled at the right time in 2004, playing a Cinderella role and capturing a second consecutive regional championship.

Ladies and gentlemen, we have a program on our hands.

The Lady Rockets expect to win a third consecutive regional championship.

"With so many returning starters, I expect to win a third straight regional championship," head coach Larry Lee said.

The Lady Rockets return four of six starters from the 2004 regional championship. Two of those players Lee considers to be

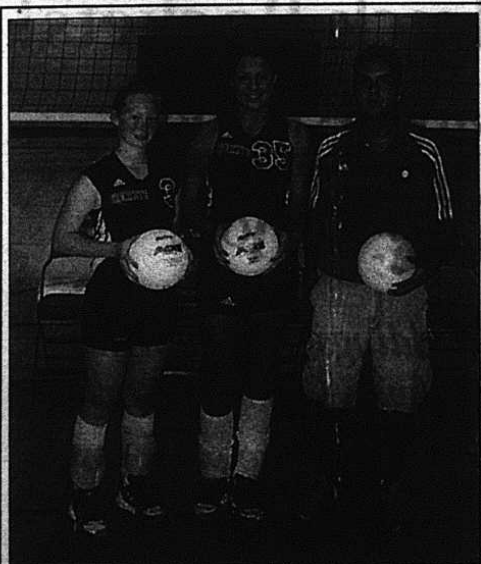
the top two players in the region. "Megan Anderkin and Jill Owens are the top two players in the re-

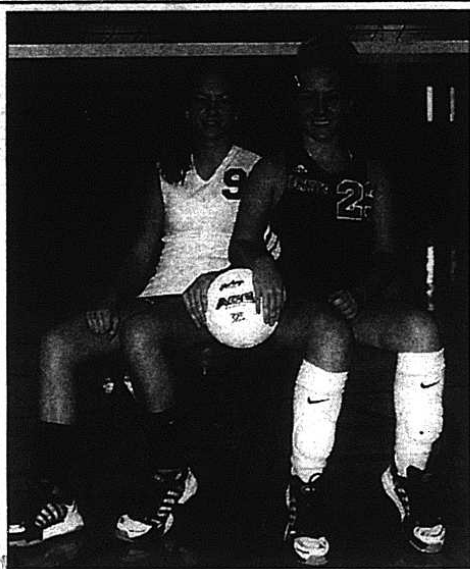

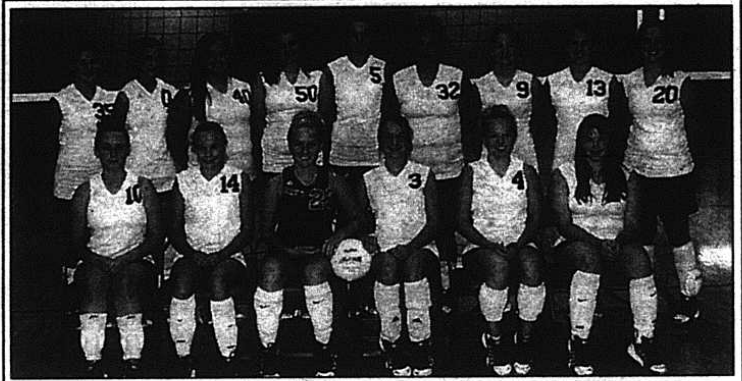

"The central office and the school administration have been instrumental in our success. They have been very aware of our needs and have met them. The start of a middle school program will greatly compliment our varsity program at the high school in a few years," Lee said.

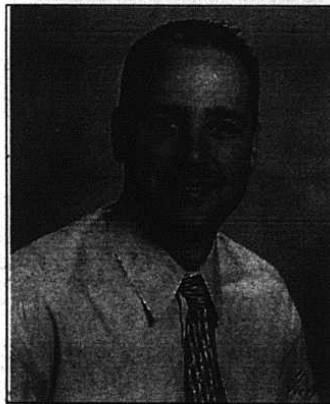
The game will start at 8 p.m. on Saturday, August 20th. The game will be played at Admiral Stadium in Danville.

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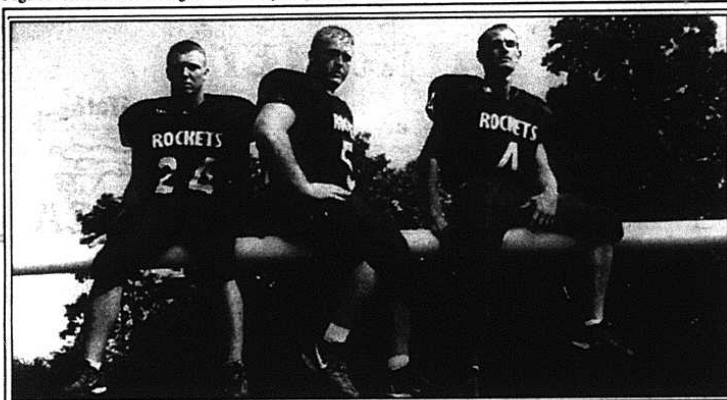

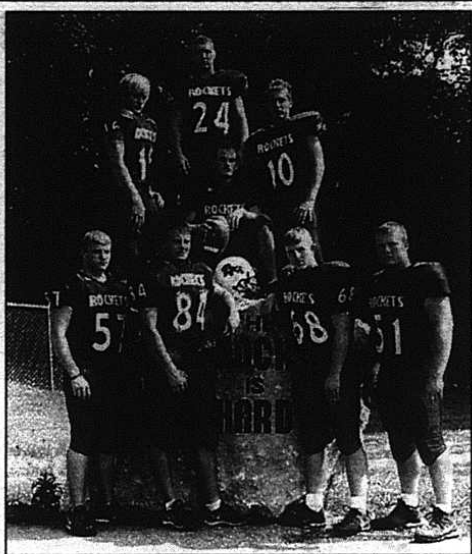

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# 2005 Gridiron schedule one of Rockets toughest

When the Rockcastle Rockets take the field on Saturday night they will be facing a Boyle County team they have never defeated.

And it is not the Rebels, it's their crosstown rivals, the Danville Admirals.

The Admirals are the first team on a tough Rockets schedule.

Jerry Pensol, former Rockcastle assistant coach and now the voice of the ROCK on WRVK radio, said this week that the Rockets have a very tough schedule.

"It is possibly the hardest schedule they have ever had," he said.

The Rockets have lost five straight to the Admirals, dating back to 1983.

"No one really wants to open up with Danville, but it will be a really good test for our team and it will give us an idea of how good we are or how good we're not," said head coach Tom Larkey.

Larkey has led the Rockets to 19 winning seasons, including two state championship games, and a record of 184-56 in his 21 seasons.

Danville is considered one of the top five teams in Class A.

Saturday night's game begins at 8 p.m. and it will be the third trip for the Rockets to the Bob Allen Pigskin Classic.

Week two the Rockets face a former district foe, Cawood, in a 7:30 contest in Harlan.

The Rockets will likely face their second toughest opponent of the season on September 2nd, when they travel to Cynthiana.

Top Rocket assistant Tony Saylor said this week that Harrison County could be the winner of the west in the state.

"A lot of people, including coaches, think they are better than Lexington Catholic, Fort Thomas Highlands and Boyle County, teams who you always have to look out for," he said.

"We could eventually face Harrison County again in the state finals, but that is a long time and a lot of hard work down the road," Larkey said.

"We simply don't know at this time," he added.

The Rockets will face Lincoln in their home opener on September 9th in the Renfro Valley Jamboree Bowl.

Lincoln County lost only one starter from a year ago.

"They will be a good team and if we are not ready, we will lose our opener," Saylor said.

The good news for the Rockets, after week four, they have an off week.

"After those first four games I'm sure we will need just a little break before we head into our district schedule," Larkey said.

The Rockets will open their six game district schedule at Whitesburg where they will face Letcher Central, a first time consolidated school of Whitesburg, Fleming-Neon and Letcher County.

"They have some very good players from the three schools and the trip alone will be enough to put us at a disadvantage," Larkey said.

In week six, the Rockets host Clay County, which is homecoming and never a good thing for an opponent.

"They will play us tough," Saylor said.

In week seven, the Rockets travel to Middlesboro where they will face their district arch rival Bell County.

Dudley Hilton's Bobcats won last season 56-7 at the ROCK.

"We obviously hope it is a different outcome this year, but we will have to be hitting on all cylinders against Bell County," Larkey said.

The Rockets will play the next two games at home against Madison Southern and Perry Central, the last of their four home games.

Their final game of the regular season will be at Knox Central and the sixth game of the season on the road. "Knox Central is much improved," Larkey said.

To back up the coach's comments, it should be noted that Knox Central defeated Corbin in a scrimmage game last week.

Playoffs will begin the next week and, unless the Rocket football field is built on a fault, their first game will no doubt be on their home field.

It should be noted for all Rocket fans that for 19 years straight the Rockets have had winning seasons and brought home three regional titles.

All home games begin at 7:30 a.m.



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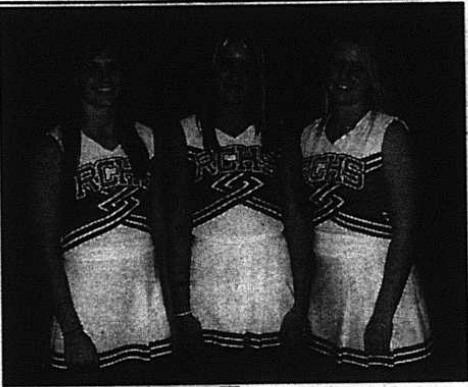


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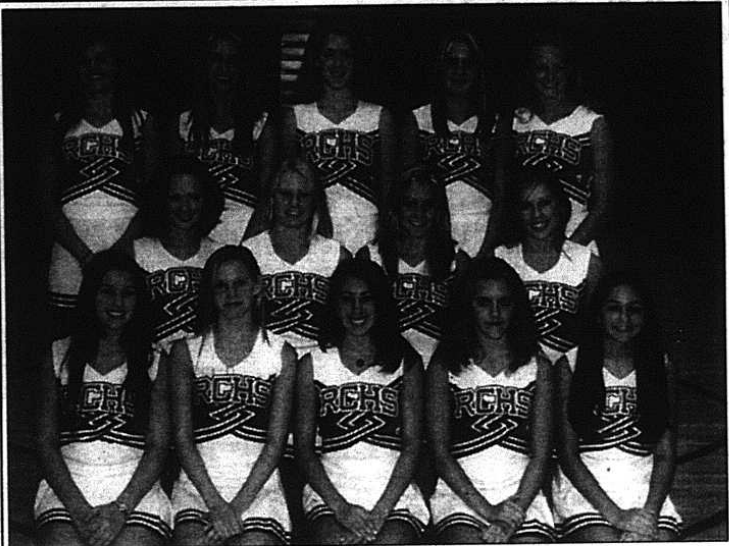

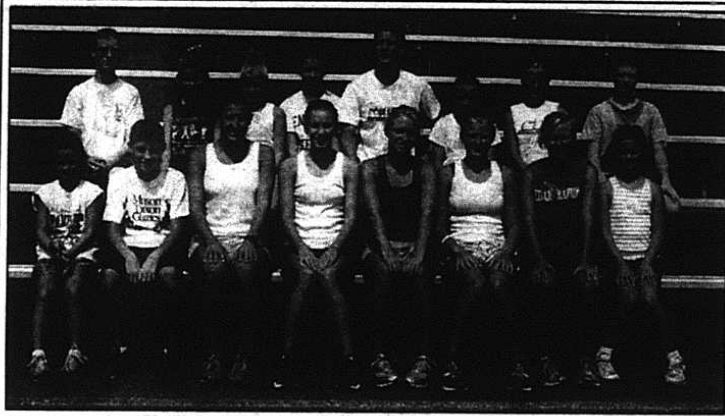
