Rockcastle County Federal Emergency Management Director Hal Holbrook attended a meeting on Memorial Day in London which for Atea 11, of which Rockcastle County belongs.

Holbrook said that Laurel, Whit-Holbrook said that Laurel, Whit-ley, Knox and McCreary Counties would house as many as 6,000 people after they were processed in London. "If that doesn't do the job then we are set up to take 300 more here. We are simply waiting," Holbrook

said.

The effort of our county is to be prepared to accept some of these displaced people in need," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis, who has helped holbrook with locating possible facilities for evacues.

Carloftis said most of the places being considered are church facilities.

"We may have to find long ten facilities because we have no ide how long we will need to help or fellow man," Carloftis said.

Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln ounty Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette netecced a local man to 15 years in sison Tuesday after be pled guity sexual abuse of a minor. Don Roberts, 46, of Brodhead ed guity on Tuesday to all ten unts he was indicted on in Janu-yy.

Judge Burdette had harsh words for Roberts because of a letter to the editor he submitted to the Signal after his original guilty plea on July 6, which stated he did not admit guilt and had entered a Alford Plea.

An Alford Plead, means a defendant agrees to a guilty plea but does not admit to being guilty of the charves.

Burdette told Roberts he was spitting in the face of the community and only harming his victim and her family further.
