Evacuees may be coming to Rockcastle

Rockcastle County Federal Emergency Management Director Hal Holbrook attended a meeting on Memorial Day in London which for Area 11, of which Rockcastle County belongs.

Holbrook was told that evacuees from the Gulf Coast area were headed to Kentucky and as many as 300 could end up in Rockcastle County shelters.

Holbrook said that Laurel, Whiteley, Knox and McCreary Counties would house as many as 6,000 people after they were processed in London. "If that doesn't do the job then we are set up to take 300 more here. We are simply waiting," Holbrook said.

"The effort of our county is to be prepared to accept some of these displaced people in need," said Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotta, who has helped Holbrook with locating possible facilities for evacuees.

Carlotta said most of the places being considered are church facilities. "We may have to find long term facilities because we have no idea how long we will need to help our fellow man," Carlotta said.

Hospital will receive funds to expand current facility

U.S. Representative Hal Rogers (KY-5), announced last week that the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has approved \$736,548 in grants for Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center (RHCCC) to help build an outpatient service center (OSC) in Mt. Vernon.

"The people of this area deserve access to the best medical and healthcare facilities available," Rogers said. "An OSC in Rockcastle County will provide health service and efficient and effective treatment while ensuring minimal disruption in patient's lives."

The OSC will contain facilities for an emergency room, radiology department, chemotherapy infusion services, a clinical laboratory and administrative space. It will also have a pediatric pulmonary clinic representative and will provide space for physical, occupational, speech and respiratory therapy as well as cardiac rehabilitation.

Burdette sentences Roberts to 15 years

Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln County Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette sentenced a local man to 15 years in prison Tuesday after he pled guilty to sexual abuse of a minor.

Don Roberts, 46, of Brodhead pled guilty on Tuesday to all ten counts he was indicted on in January.

Judge Burdette had harsh words for Roberts because of a letter to the editor he submitted to the Signal after his original guilty plea on July 6, which stated he did not admit guilt and had entered a Alford Plea.

An Alford Plea, means a defendant agrees to a guilty plea but does not admit to being guilty of the charges.

Burdette told Roberts he was spitting in the face of the community and only harming his victim and her family further. "The Judge told Roberts it was totally unacceptable that he would use the victim's name in a false statement to the public, knowing he had committed such a horrible crime."

Before final sentencing, Roberts admitted he had done all of the things he was indicted for, which were two counts of sexual abuse first degree, three counts of sexual abuse second

degree four counts of sodomy second degree and one count of incest.

Roberts, a former Little League baseball coach and a former employee of Rockcastle Hospital, will not ever be eligible for probation or conditional discharge and will not be eligible for parole for three years.

The Judge also ordered Roberts to go through a comprehensive sex offender rehabilitation program.

Roberts did express some remorse during sentencing and told Burdette he wanted to become a good member of society again.

On direct question, when asked if he were guilty of the charges, Roberts said "yes" and withdrew his Alford Plea.

Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley, who prosecuted the case, said he was pleased with the sentence of 15 years.

"However his young victim will no doubt suffer from these crimes for the rest of her life - I equate what he did to probably worse than murder," Bartley said in the courtroom after sentencing.

Roberts will be registered as a sex offender and will be required by law to tell anyone he associates with in a relationship of his crime

Crawford to hold book signing at Cox Hardware Sept. 13th

One of Washington, D.C.'s most popular news commentators, Craig Crawford, will be in Mt. Vernon September 13 for a book signing for his newest book "Attack the Messenger". Crawford, the son of Bill and Tabitha Crawford of Orlando, Florida, and formerly of Mt. Vernon, is a White House columnist for Congressional Quarterly. His wit and wisdom are featured almost daily on national television and radio programs including "The Early Show" on CBS, various programs on NPR and MSNBC including "Countdown with Keith Olbermann" and "Hardball" and CBS network radio. He is also a frequent commentator for NBC's "Nightly News" CBS's "Evening News" and "Imus in the Morning."

Before joining Congressional Quarterly, Crawford ran the Hotline, an online news digest that is an institution inside the beltway and out. Before coming to Washington Crawford practiced law in Florida and was a reporter for the Orlando Sentinel. He also once ran for a state legislative seat in Orlando, so he has seen both sides of the story he tells

in his new book "Attack the Messenger" is filled with behind-the-scenes stories about reporters and politicians in conflict. He also looks at the ongoing debate over liberal and conservative bias in the news media and makes a critical view of the harmful effects of advocacy journalism on both the conservative and liberal fronts.

In a review from Tina Brown, a Washington Post columnist, she says, "With wit and modern knowledge, Craig Crawford identifies America's 'Must Wanted' - the con-men, spinners, character assassins, electronic demagogues, greedy bottom-liners and bare-faced liars who - with rather too much help from stupidity in the media - are destroying public faith in the institution of a free press."

This is a timely and entertaining book - which is more than I can say for most of the people in its gallery."

Army Sergeant Lewis is being recommended for prestigious Bronze Star

A Rockcastle County woman's husband is being recommended for the Bronze Star for his heroic actions under fire in Afghanistan.

Sgt. Harvey Lewis, husband of the former Army Ford, daughter of Sam and Judy Ford, was recommended for the honor because of his actions in a fire fight in Afghanistan on the border with Pakistan.

Following is an article which appeared in the Sunday, August 21st issue of the New York Daily News from the border control point Cervantes, Afghanistan, written by James Gordon Meech, Daily News Washington Bureau.

"The bleak border with Pakistan doesn't look worth fighting over, yet battles with terrorists near here since combat resumed in earnest this spring, led U.S. commanders to seek 20 medals for heroism.

The harsh terrain is mostly low mountains, dotted with shrubby holly trees spilling down to dust-choked ravines where Al Qaeda infiltrators sneak into Afghanistan under the noses of Pakistani border guards.

This desolate spot is a key front in the war on terror and a handful of young 82nd Airborne Division paratroopers hold the line here.

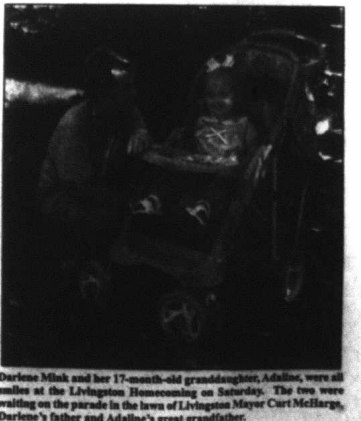
Bravo Company commander Capt. Brandon Teague, 34, has recommended six of his soldiers for Bronze Stars, three for Army Commendation Medals and eight for

I never knew what a wasp was until I entered college in 1967.

Part of my scholarship deal at Pikeville College involved spending the summer after my senior year of high school cleaning out the attics of old buildings on campus. Some of them supposedly predated the Civil War and most, if not all, have long since been torn down to make space for more modern facilities.

Historic preservation was not a priority in the sixties. Old Maid teachers actually lived in those old houses and there was a women's dormitory. I forget the name, that was three stories of rotting brick and spiraling staircases that also had some unused space between the roof and ceilings on the top floor.

My job was to carry a three-gallon tank, attached to a Boy Scout backpack and venture into the attic recesses. The tank was filled with powerful insecticide and it had a handle that you could use to pump up air pressure. You had to reach across your shoulder and pump it up and then there was a hose with a nozzle at the end and you could adjust the spray, once the pressure was up, to fit your needs.

Recently, the words "depression", "holocaust", and even "tribulation" come to mind to describe the recent aftermath conditions following Hurricane Katrina. Never in my remembrance or in the history of the United States has such a disaster happened.

Fortunately, I don't have any family or friends living in the affected areas. Those who were fortunate enough to flee that area must surely be thankful now. They may have lost most of all of their possessions, but

at least they escaped with their lives.

This past week, I've seen pictures on TV flash before my eyes every bit as bad or even worse than the 9/11 disaster in 2001. Pictures were worse than any imaginable spurious conditions of third world countries. I asked myself how had are the conditions going to get before they get better. The answer seems to say "A long time".

I also asked myself another question. Why were so many people involved in this disaster? As it turns out, about 25 percent or more of the population of the area were at or below the poverty level, much like many areas in Kentucky. Therefore, we should be able to relate to the situation prior to the hurricane. Having no means of transportation other than the public bus system or not being able to afford enough gas for their car if they owned a car is for the most part, the answer.

Then I question further and wonder why were they below the poverty level. It is probably the lack of adequate education and availability of decent jobs, and in some individuals' case, the lack of self-motivation and desire for a better life.

Such things as wars, disease, epidemics, famines, and natural disasters such as this hurricane take their toll on the elderly, the children, and the weak first. In this case, it took its toll not only on these, but the poor

The unprecedented natural disaster which has befallen our Gulf states and the resulting toll upon our countrymen presents a type of laboratory experiment where the vagaries of human behavior in all of their extremes becomes evident.

Lawlessness Never Reigns

It is said that all laws are attempts to domesticate the ferocity of the human species. When dealing with violations of criminal law, the baseness of the human spirit is all too often apparent. Humankind is replete with superb specimens, those who exhibit the finest traits of our species - intellect, diligence, compassion, humor, or beauty. Unfortunately, the race also includes specimens exhibiting the worst characteristics of a human kind - greed, intolerance, pettiness and indifference. Our criminal law exists to govern those most base instincts.

Even in the best of times, those days when people unite in common spirituality and purpose, a few engage in reprehensible acts which suggest that as a species, we are not yet too far removed from the lesser inhabitants of this planet. When chaos reigns, when we are confronted with unanticipated peril and the normal structures of society are loosened, the worse traits of mankind are magnified. The unprecedented natural disaster which has befallen our Gulf states and the resulting toll upon our countrymen presents a type of laboratory experiment where the vagaries of human behavior in all of their extremes becomes evident.

Yet, the laws of our southern sis-

ter states remain intact. The besieged residents of Louisiana and surrounding areas remain bound by the mores adopted by each state's legislature. Watching television and releasing daily media accounts may give the impression that a state of anarchy exists, but the law is sufficiently flexible to account for devastating circumstances.

This week rescuers were fired upon by five or six gunmen as the national guard attempted to bring relief supplies to stranded residents. Police killed five in response. All states appropriately permit the use of deadly physical force to repel threats of force likely to result in death or

Why Children Need PE Tubes

If your child has ever had an ear infection, you have no doubt heard their parents complain of how frequent they are. You will also hear of many children who eventually needed PE tubes, one of the most common surgeries in young children. Why PE is tubes so common and how do they work?

Doctors are not entirely sure why children seem to have more ear infections now than they did decades ago, but it is a common observation. The most likely reasons have to do with increased pollution in the environment and increased exposure to viral infections as children enter day care centers more frequently, in larger groups, and at younger ages.



The middle ear is the part of the ear located just inside the ear drum. This space contains the area where tiny bones conduct sound from the ear drum to the nerve endings. This cavity is normally filled with air. When congestion, infections, or allergies cause the Eustachian tubes (which connect the ears to the back of the nasal passages) to work improperly, this area can become filled with fluid.

To any bacteria that can reach this area, it is a safe haven where they are relatively protected from the body's defense mechanisms. The body can not eliminate the infection and antibiotics only work for so long before bacteria become resistant.

With time, any fluid trapped in the middle ear becomes thicker, eventually making it very difficult for the body to clear it up without help. PE tubes provide that help by allowing air back into the ear for a period of several months. This gives the ear time for its lining to return to normal and rebuild its defenses. The tubes are normally expelled by the body after 6-12 months and hopefully by then the child has outgrown the problem.

serious bodily injury. Embattled homeowners confronted with looters may properly use physical force, but not deadly physical force, to protect their property from the gangs of thieves who seem intent on enriching themselves at the expense—and perhaps survival—of those who merely seek to endure until the waters recede.

This week we saw repeated images of looters stealing from New Orleans businesses. The law recognizes the doctrine of necessity for those who must resort to salvaging perishable food and water to ensure their own survival while condemning those who steal televisions, shoes, and furniture. Though most will never be identified or apprehended, those looters who seek to enrich themselves, instead of fending off starvation and thirst, are and always shall be thieves. Those who took bottled water, food, and necessary medical supplies and distributed those items to the young, the old, and the weakening, are and shall forever be heroes.

Despite perception, lawlessness does not reign in the aftermath of Katrina. Though the homes and structures of Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama may be battered or even absent, the law remains, implicable as ever, and flexible enough to apply to circumstances that most of us would prefer to have never witnessed.

We should be reminded of Helen Keller's observation that "although the world is full of suffering, it is full also of the overcoming of it." For our southern neighbors, the world is full of suffering. We shall overcome that despair and desperation as humankind has thus far overcome all obstacles.

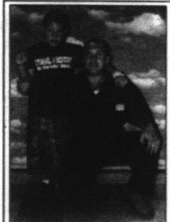

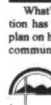

Remembering our War Heroes...

Livingston has been several war heroes, for such a tiny town. In addition to David Smith who received posthumously the highest honor bestowed in the military, the Congressional Medal of Honor, Clyde Ewert Wagner also received much recognition for his actions in WWII.

Wagner was the son of Henry Otis and Leona Jones Wagner and was born July 1, 1910 in Livingston and was educated in the Livingston school system.

On May 1, 1942, he was inducted into the U.S. Army Corp at Fort Thomas and received training at Keeler Field, MS, at the Boeing Aircraft Factory in Seattle, Washington, at Las

Vegas, Nevada and at Amarillo, TX. He was assigned to, and trained with, the Don Gamble B-17 Bomber Crew, as an engineer. He attained the rank of Staff Sgt. in December of 1942 and of Tech Sgt. in April of 1943.

Along with other members of the Don Gamble Crew, he was assigned to the 35th Squadron of the 303rd 8th United States Air Force Bombardment Group and was stationed at the Moleworth Air Base in England. While a member of this unit, he participated in 25 bombing missions, completing this tour on February 25, 1944 at which time he was released from combat and was dis-

charged from the service at Scott Field, Illinois on October 12, 1945. For services rendered he was awarded: The Distinguished Flying Cross, The Air Medal with Three Oak Leaf Clusters, The European Campaign Ribbon with One Bar, The Good Conduct Medal and a ribbon for a Unit Presidential Citation.

Following his discharge, he returned to Livingston and later died July 19, 1967 at his home in Finchville, Kentucky. He was the brother of Edna Wilson of Livingston and Virgil Wagner of Louisville, both now deceased. His memory lives on as a hero, in the hearts of his many nieces and nephews, Jean Mullins, Bobby Wilson, Jo Ann Wikerson, Kenneth Wilson, Carl Wagner, Clyde Wagner and Garl Wagner.

Clyde is mentioned, and a picture of him, which has in it a book written by Bryan D. O'Neal, "Three Engines Half a Wing and a Prayer." You can find this book at your local library.

Defensively the Rockets gave up only 198 yards, 139 on the ground and 59 through the air.

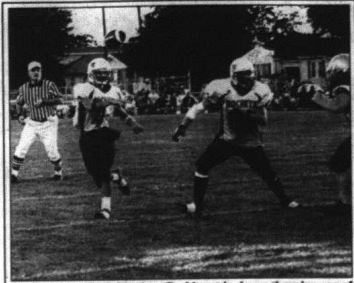
Rover Zach Burkhardt led the defensive unit with nine tackles and assists, which included a sack.

Senior Mikeey Denny, who played well on offense from his center position, turned in a good performance on the defensive side of the ball with five tackles and assists and he also

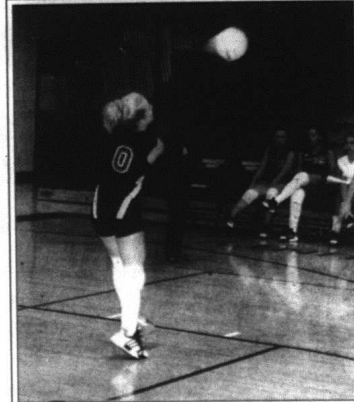

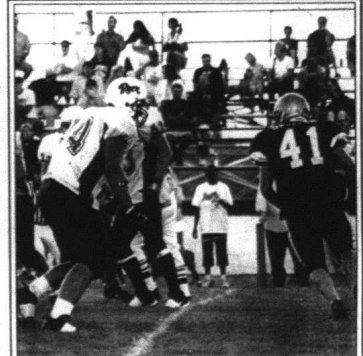

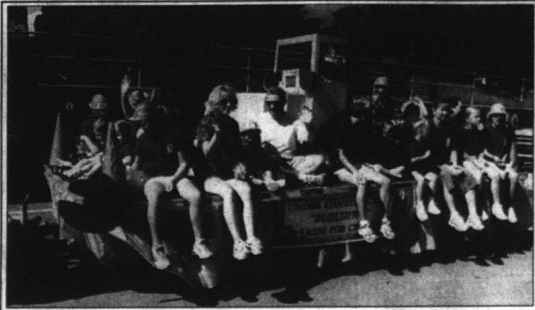

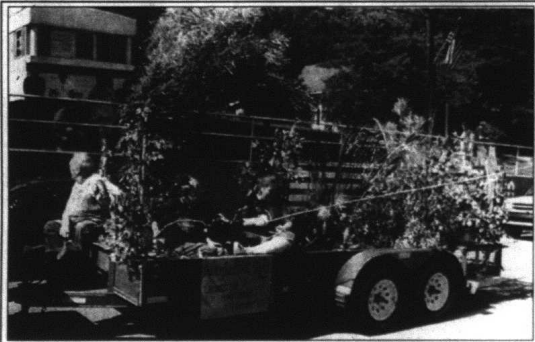

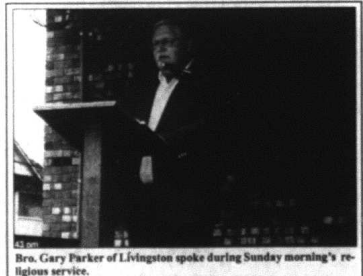

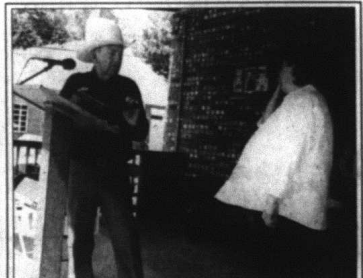

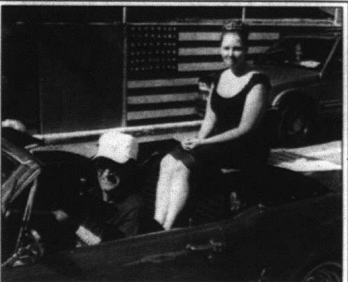

This spartan base, named for Special Forces Sgt. 1st Class Victor Cervantes, killed last June, is manned by 20 of Teague's troopers and a platoon of Afghan soldiers. They have fought over such piles

of rock at Hill 2911, the site of several brutal gun battles. Observation Post 4, a high spot overlooking miles of border, was twice assaulted by Al Qaeda.

To get to Observation Post 4, you have to drive through Ambush Alley, where Al Qaeda ambushed 2nd Lt. Daniel Byars, 25, and his convoy on May 21, hissing the heavy windshield of his Humvee with armor-piercing rounds. The troopers drove the enemy back into Pakistan, where an AC-130 gunship mowed down 12. Byars may get a Bronze Star.

Teague and a patrol waged one of the division's longest battles since Vietnam on June 10 at the nearby Mande Kandow Pass. Al Qaeda gunmen withstood a massive bombardment and kept fighting for nine hours. "They were hard to get at because they were in the cut behind the hilly trees," Teague recalled.

Teague wants a Bronze Star for Sgt. Harvey Lewis' selfless run under fire to retrieve a rocket launcher and fire it to save a wounded buddy.

Another privilege was clipped in the leg and wrist after mistaking an enemy for a friendly Afghan soldier.

After arriving with a Special Forces quick reaction force, Cervantes was shot in the head by an insurgent hiding in the hilly.

"Holidays will never be the same for me after that fight," said Teague. "No holiday at my house."

On June 26, 2nd Lt. Louis Fernandez, 22, of Miami, FL and several soldiers on Hill 2911 took fire from every direction from 20 Al Qaeda. "We were outnumbered and surrounded," Fernandez said.

Rounds were ping-pong past his face, breaking rocks at his feet and snapping tree limbs all around them, he said. But they blasted their way out, using up all their ammo.

"We were lucky," Fernandez said. "God was with us."

Sgt. Lewis is from Ages, Ky., the son of David and Terri Lewis. He is a member of the 82nd Airborne Parachute Infantry Regiment Bravo Co., known as the "White Devils."

He began his military career in May of 2002 and, upon completion of basic training, began an eight month tour of duty in Afghanistan. After this tour, he and Amy married and lived for a while in Fayetteville, NC before completing a four month tour in Iraq. He is currently in his third deployment overseas, a 12 month tour in Afghanistan.

Any is expecting the couple's first child in October and Sgt. Lewis will be given a two-week leave before returning to Afghanistan until April.

After this deployment, Lewis' four years will be completed and the couple plans to return to Kentucky.

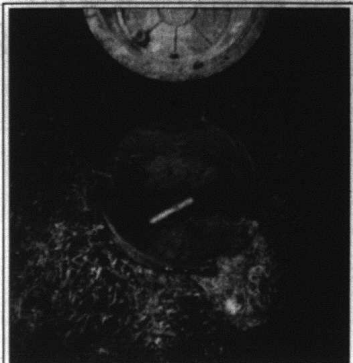

Guest speaker will be Roger Stapleton, State Coordinator for the Renaissance on Main program.

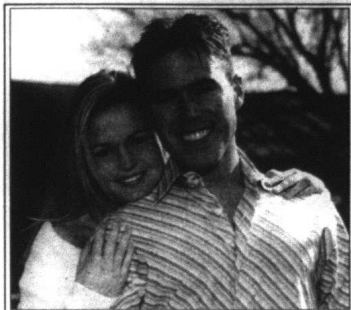

"What Saith The Scriptures"

Is gambling sinful? How should we feel about gambling? Is it wrong? Let us look to God's word for the answer. First the word "gambling" is not found in the Bible, but neither are the words, insect, rape, abortion, shoplifting, bootlegging, larceny, etc.; yet we shouldn't conclude that any of these things are OK.

God recognizes 4 legitimate means of gain:

1. The Law of labor, where by one works to earn money, or something of value. Lk 10:7, Eph 4:28
2. The Law of exchange, where we buy, sell, trade and make a gain. Jm 1:13
3. The Law of giving, of my own will I choose to give another something. Ac 24:17
4. The Law of inheritance, that by family descent I receive goods of a dead relative. Lk 12:13

Now as we study gambling it does not fall under any 4 of these means of gain. It is not working, it is not "horse trading" or receiving a gift nor is it an inheritance. Where then ought we to classify it? Actually gambling is stealing by consent. Based on some element of chance, one wages or puts up a certain stake, against another man's wager or stake, and whatever the outcome of this element of chance determines who gets the other man's money. You see God teaches, "Thou shalt not steal" Rm. 13:9. Though it is done with consent it still does not make it right. Dueling is murder by consent. A unmarried couple may mutually consent to have sex, yet it still is fornication.

Covetousness is generally the root cause of gambling. The Bible is very plain in it's condemnation of the covetous spirit. Luke 12:15, "And he said unto them, Take heed, and beware of covetousness for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." See also, Col 3:5

Your best "bet" is not to make one!

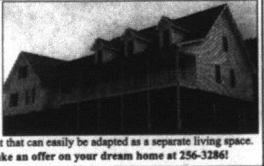

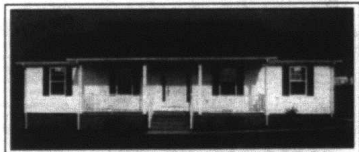
